### Dear Vijay:

I will have to go out-of-town on February 15, for some 3M related work. This was on very short notice and so my plans of discussing a whole host of things at the Board Meeting have to be carried out by appropriate notification through mail. Iwill be contacting the relevant parties on the phone and discussing matters before I leave. Anyway, here are some of the salient points of interest:

- 1. The General Community Programs Committee met on January 30, 1989, with Godan Nambudiripad, Jacob Cherusseril, Sadanand Pathre, Raj Ramaswami and myself in attendance. Godan did an excellent job of preparing the objectives for the Committee. Some of the possible activities for consideration are enclosed herewith as Attachment I. Please reserve some time in the Board Meeting for Godan to discuss this. Godan will submit the budget for this committee.
- 2. I have had a conversation with Neena Gada regarding the budget for the Festival of Nations for this year. She is going to project it on the basis of the 1988 income/expense and send over the numbers with Ram when he comes to the Board Meeting.
- 3. I have reserved the Landmark Center for Sunday, September 24, 1989, for the India Day Festivals. I have also reserved the auditorium in the basement of Landmark Center for that day in case we can coordinate some performances by artists sponsored by e.g. Indian Music Society for that evening. Reserving the auditorium does not cost anyhing extra and if some organization uses the auditorium facilities for the evening, maybe they could cost share with us for the India Day. Give it some thought. I am enclosing the rental agreement with Landmark Center as Attachment II. This has to be mailed back to them immediately with the \$75.00 setup charge. Please attend to this!
- 4. The grant application for the Tagore program to the Metropolitan Regional Council has been submitted in good time. I am enclosing a copy of that application (as I finished it) as Attachment III. Rita has the final version and I will have her send copies to you and me ASAP.

- 5. I have discussed with Shanti the progress of arrangements for the Youth Festival. She will check with Anup Mathur about the breakdown of expenses for last year's program and come up with this year's projection. This she will present to the Board on the 15th. Hari Arimilli is pursuing the cost estimates for some other projects the Youth Affairs Committee would like to run. Shanti will elaborate on these at the Board Meeting.
- 6. Raj Ramaswamy has agreed to take on the India Day responsibilities for 1989 and he will attend the February Board meeting. I have arranged a separate meeting with Raj on February 18th. to lay out the plans for that program. At that meeting we will decide if Raj will need any help from others to take on active responsibility for any aspect of that program but you may sound him out on that point on the 15th. A budget for that program will be submitted soon thereafter.

With the budgets for the Youth Festival from Shanti, the Festival of Nations from Neena and the General Community Programs from Godan we will have all the numbers for the programs committee except for the India Day, and that we shall be able to finalize before the March meeting.

I hope these cover the main points I needed to touch upon. Godan and the rest of the General Community Program Committee had expressed some interest in reevaluating the mission of the Club in view of its larger presence after these many successful years in the Twin Cities. I do not know if you will have time for that discussion in the Board Meeting; if you do, sound them out. Hope you have a successful meeting! Best wishes.

#### **MISSION & GOALS**

I. What are the mission and goals of your organization?

The India Club is a non-profit organization of Asian Indians and Asian Indian-Americans in Minnesota, established to promote their educational, cultural, artistic and social needs; to foster and develop fellowship and understanding and to promote Asian Indian heritage in Minnesota through the creation, presentation and sponsorship of artistic, cultural and educational endeavors.

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY**

The India Club has a long history of cultural-artistic-educational projects since its establishment. In the past nine years, efforts towards professionalism and artistic quality, combined with innovative experimentation of original works and adaptations from the rich dance and musical repertoire of India and its diverse cultural and artistic subcultures have strengthened the artistic efforts of the India Club. Over the years we have absorbed in our programs new talents. Even within the Indian community, the spectrum of cultural diversity and artistic styles is breathtaking.

The India Club has undertaken many major projects in the past ten years:

- \* Participation in the Festival of Nations Celebrations dances and exhibits. In 1987 the India Club won the First prize for its artistic exhibit.
- \* The India Club's participation at the Festival of India Celebrations since 1984 with over 3,000 in attendance at he Landmark Center with a 4 hour program of continuous Indian music and dances from all regions of India.
- \* Co-sponsorship of performing arts presentations at the Ordway Theater for local and visiting artists.
- \* Sponsorship of Tagore's musical dance drama <u>Shaap Mochan</u> at the Northrop Auditorium in 1987 with 2,500 in attendance. The presentation was open to the public with no admission charge.
- \* Sponsorship of Tagore's musical dance drama <u>Shyama</u> at the Northrop Auditorium in 1988 with 4,000 in attendance. The presentation was open to the public with no admission charge.
- \* Sponsorship of various musical and artistic programs with local Twin Cities artists at many Indian festivals/activities.

# PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This year's production is based on Rabindra Nath Tagore's musical dance drama, <u>TASHER DESH</u> (Land of Cards). Written in 1933-34, the play portrays a society that is bound by immutable rules and traditions. Into this dispirited land, its citizenry (cards) being faceless and only recognizable by the class (suit) they belong to, arrives a free spirit from abroad in the form of a prince. All the rules are broken and all the age-old traditions fall by the wayside as a breath of fresh air sweeps through the land.

The musical dance drama will be conducted by Ms. Rita Mustaphi, a well-known performer and choreographer in the Indian music dance community in the Twin Cities. Professional American dancers like Derek Phillips and Jocelyn Gorham of the Nancy Hauser Dance Company and Donald La Course of the Ethnic Dance Theater will join their Indian counterparts like Rita Mustaphi and Indrani Mallick and students of Nrityajoti (Twin Cities' school of Indian Dance) for this production. Ms. Manisha Sarkar who has performed and directed extensively both in India and in the U.S. will shoulder the music direction resposibilities. She will be assisted by a group of vocalists and musicians that have had musical training in India and have performed in many musical events in the Twin Cities over last ten years. David P. McKoskey, Director of the Dance Production Clearinghouse of Minnesota Dance Alliance will assist in the lighting and production aspects of the show. The production is scheduled for July 29, 1989 at the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium.

The program is now in its planning stages and an Advisory Committee has been formed bringing together representatives from organizations that will actively be involved, namely, India Club, SILC, Indo-American Association, Nrityajoti etc.

The arts community will greatly benefit from our project. We expect to recruit volunteers and professional local artists from the Twin Cities Metropolitan Region and the State of Minnesota. These will include vocalists, narrators, musicians and support personnel. At least 30 % of the dancers, musicians and other artists will be drawn from outside the Indian community. The producers of <a href="Tasher Desh">Tasher Desh</a> hope to use this program to disseminate to all of our artists in Minnesota the importance of artistry and culture of India. The producers believe that the format in which we have presented these dance dramas in the past, namely, through continuous English narratives of the proceedings, is a rather unique way of presentation of these works, not attempted elsewhere in the U.S. This effort is bearing fruit as an audience is developing in this community with a greater appreciation for this art form.

#### III. PROJECT DESCRIPTION (Cont ed)

We will promote our program both during the implementation stage (to seek out volunteers and professional artists from the Twin Cities metropolitan region) and at the completion stage (to attract audience). Promotional material will be displayed at schools, colleges, the University of Minnesota, nursing homes, the Children's Home Society, youth publications, minority and ethnic group publications, local and suburban newspapers, network television and through public radio and television. A general admission of \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children, students and senior citizens will be charged.

#### **PROJECT EVALUATION**

IV. How will you evaluate the success of this project? What are your organization's specific objectives for this project and how will you determine whether they have been achieved?

The success of the program will evaluated from two perspectives :

- Artistic success.
- Audience acceptance.

The artistic success and the audience acceptance will be measured in terms of the feedback provided by the participants and the audience respectively. These comments will be provided to us in written form. The India Club will prepare a short-form questionnaire and this will be distributed before the program to be collected for tabulation after the performance. The tabulation of the feedback will be carried out by a group independent of the production team for the project. A review meeting with the artists, production personnel and volunteers to solicit their comments and professional appraisal will also be carried out.

#### NEED FOR THE PROJECT

V. Discuss how the project is appropriate to the mission and history of the organization and how it will advance your organization toward its goals. The India Club's cultural and artistic programs have had an excellent record over the years. Our 1987 musical dance drama Shaap Mochan and 1988 production of Shyama, both performed at the Northrop Auditorium were extremely successful. We have presented many musical and dance performances in the past several tears in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. We have a choreographer in the Tagore style of Indian dance in Ms. Rita Mustaphi and this year our music director for Shaap Mochan (1987), Ms.Manisha Sarkar, returns to direct Tasher Desh. A whole ensemble of male and female musicians and vocalists and dancers are available to us in this project. Dancers from The Ethnic Dance Theater and Nancy Hauser Dance Company will join us ths year for this project. India Club, the School of Indian Literature and Culture (SILC) and the Indo-American Association of the University of Minnesota are working together to make this project a success.

We believe that the <u>Tasher Desh</u> project will fit very appropriately to our organization's goal of dissemination of the artistry and culture of India to the Minnesota community. We also believe our project will provide a forum for Indian and non-Indian artists and volunteers to work together and combine their artistic talents to produce a dance drama of a very high quality.

### TASHER DESH A musical dance drama

# Rabindra Nath Tagore

Tasher Desh was written by Rabindra Nath Tagore in 1933-34. It was based on a short story he had written much earlier, entitled "Ekti Ashare Galpo", and contained in his short story collection "Galpoguccha".

Composed in four scenes, it depicts an imaginary land of cards that is governed by immutable laws, rules and traditions. The inhabitants of this land are recognized more by their class (suit) than by their selves. Laughter, adventure and for that matter, freedom and individuality, are foreign to this society. To this land arrives a prince from a distant nation, who is the embodiment of the free human spirit. He breaks the rules and ridicules the institutions that the cards have built. The cards envy his spirit and liveliness and the consequences of this confrontation is the soul of this drama.

This highly symbolic composition is usually presented with colorful costumes, a lively score and some of Tagore's most memorable humor. India Club. Inc.

Essed upon the information submitted, it appears that the organization qualifies as a private-operating foundation as defined in section 4942(j)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Attachment E contains a copy of our workpaper and computations relative to this conclusion.

In order to qualify as a private operating foundation, an organization must make qualifying distributions directly for the active conduct of the activit constituting the purpose of function for which it is organized and operated. These distributions must exceed 85% of the lesser of its adjusted net income or its minimum investment return. According to our computations (see line 2 of Attachment E), this amounts to \$245.65 for the periods involved and your organization made qualifying distributions in excess of \$2,044.00 (see line 2(e) of Attachment E).


In addition, an organization must satisfy one of three alternative tests described in section 53.4942(b)-2 of the Income Tax Regulations. These test are commonly referred to as (a) the assets test, (b) the endowment test, and (c) the support test.

froording to our computations, you satisfy the requirements of the endowment it, in that you made qualifying distributions in excess of two-thirds of y minimum investment return (see line 3(c) of Attachment E) for the periods involved.

Attachment C contains a copy of our computations relative to the computation of your minimum investment return for the years 1981 through 1983.

As a private operating foundation, you are excluded from the income distributions requirements and related excise taxes imposed under section 4942 of the Internal Revenue Code.

In the future, you should complete the Frivate Operating Foundation portion of the Form 990-FF rather than the Distributable Amount and Undistributed Income portions.

The India Club is a non-profit organization of Asian Indians and Asian Indian-Americans in Minnesota, established to promote their educational, cultural, artistic and social needs; to foster and develop fellowship and understanding and to promote Asian Indian heritage in Minnesota through the creation, presentation and sponsorship of artistic, cultural and educational endeavors.

The India Club has a long history of cultural-artistic-educational projects since its establishment. In the past nine years, efforts towards professionalism and artistic quality, combined with innovative experimentation of original works and adaptations from the rich dance and musical repertoire of India and its diverse cultural and artistic subcultures have strengthened the artistic efforts of the India Club. Over the years we have absorbed in our programs new talents. Even within the Indian community, the spectrum of cultural diversity and artistic styles is breathtaking.

The India Club has undertaken many major projects in the past ten years:

- \* Participation in the Festival of Nations Celebrations dances and exhibits. In 1987 the India Club won the First prize for its artistic exhibit.
- \* The India Club's participation at the Festival of India Celebrations since 1984 with over 3,000 in attendance at he Landmark Center with a 4 hour program of continuous Indian music and dances from all regions of India.
- \* Co-sponsorship of performing arts presentations at the Ordway Theater for local and visiting artists.
- \* Sponsorship of Tagore's musical dance drama <u>Shaap Mochan</u> at the Northrop Auditorium in 1987 with 2,500 in attendance. The presentation was open to the public with no admission charge.
- \* Sponsorship of Tagore's musical dance drama <u>Shyama</u> at the Northrop Auditorium in 1988 with 4,000 in attendance. The presentation was open to the public with no admission charge.
- \* Sponsorship of various musical and artistic programs with local Twin Cities artists at many Indian festivals/activities.

This year's production is based on Rabindra Nath Tagore's musical dance drama, TASHER DESH ( Land of Cards). Written in 1933-34, the play portrays a society that is bound by immutable rules and traditions. Into this dispirited land, its citizenry (cards) being faceless and only recognizable by the class (suit) they belong to, arrives a free spirit from abroad in the form of a prince. All the rules are broken and all the age-old traditions fall by the wayside as a breath of fresh air sweeps through the land.

The musical dance drama will be conducted by Ms. Rita Mustaphi, a well-known performer and choreographer in the Indian music dance community in the Twin Cities. Professional American dancers like Derek Phillips and Jocelyn Gorham of the Nancy Hauser Dance Company and Donald LaCourse of the Ethnic Dance Theater will join. their Indian counterparts like Rita Mustaphi and Indrani Mallick and students of Nrityajoti (Twin Cities' school of Indian Dance) for this production. Ms. Manisha Sarkar who has performed and directed extensively both in India and in the U.S. will shoulder the music direction resposibilities. She will be assisted by a group of vocalists and musicians that have had musical training in India and have performed in many musical events in the Twin Cities over last ten years. David P. McKoskey, Director of the Dance Production Clearinghouse of Minnesota Dance Alliance will assist in the lighting and production aspects of the show. The production is scheduled for July 29, 1989 at the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium.

The program is now in its planning stages and an Advisory Committee has been. formed bringing together representatives from organizations that will actively be involved, namely, India Club, SILC, Indo-American Association, Nrityajoti etc.

The arts community will greatly benefit from our project. We expect to recruit volunteers and professional local artists from the Twin Cities Metropolitan Region and the State of Minnesota. These will include vocalists, narrators, musicians and support personnel. At least 30 % of the dancers, musicians and other artists will be drawn from outside the Indian community. The producers of Tasher Desh Inope to use this program to disseminate to all of our artists in Minnesota the importance of artistry and culture of India. The producers believe that the format in which we have presented these dance dramas in the past, namely, through continuous English narratives of the proceedings, is a rather unique way of presentation of these works, not attempted elsewhere in the U.S. This effort is bearing fruit as an audience is developing in this community with a greater appreciation for this art form.

We will promote our program both during the implementation stage (to seek out volunteers and professional artists from the Twin Cities metropolitan region) and at the completion stage (to attract audience). Promotional material will be displayed at schools, colleges, the University of Minnesota, nursing homes, the Children's Home Society, youth publications, minority and ethnic group publications, local and suburban newspapers, network television and through public radio and television. A general admission of \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children, students and senior citizens will be charged.

The success of the program will evaluated from two perspectives:

- 1. Artistic success.
- Audience acceptance.

The artistic success and the audience acceptance will be measured in terms of the feedback provided by the participants and the audience respectively. These comments will be provided to us in written form. The India Club will prepare a short-form questionnaire and this will be distributed before the program to be collected for tabulation after the performance. The tabulation of the feedback will be carried out by a group independent of the production team for the project. A review meeting with the artists, production personnel and volunteers to solicit their comments and professional appraisal will also be carried out.

#### NEED FOR THE PROJECT

The India Club's cultural and artistic programs have had an excellent record over the years. Our 1987 musical dance drama Shaap Mochan and 1988 production of Shyama, both performed at the Northrop Auditorium were extremely successful. We have presented many musical and dance performances in the past several tears in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area. We have a choreographer in the Tagore style of Indian dance in Ms. Rita Mustaphi and this year our music director for Shaap Mochan (1987), Ms.Manisha Sarkar, returns to direct Tasher Desh. A whole ensemble of male and female musicians and vocalists and dancers are available to us in this project. Dancers from The Ethnic Dance Theater and Nancy Hauser Dance Company will join us the year for this project. India Club, the School of Indian Literature and Culture (SILC) and the Indo-American Association of the University of Minnesota are working together to make this project a success.

We believe that the <u>Tasher Desh</u> project will fit very appropriately to our organization's goal of dissemination of the artistry and culture of India to the Minnesota community. We also believe our project will provide a forum for Indian and non-Indian artists and volunteers to work together and combine their artistic talents to produce a dance drama of a very high quality.

# TASHER DESH A musical dance drama

by

# Rabindra Nath Tagore

Tasher Desh was written by Rabindra Nath Tagore in 1933-34. It was based on a short story he had written much earlier, entitled "Ekti Ashare Galpo", and contained in his short story collection "Galpoguccha".

Composed in four scenes, it depicts an imaginary land of cards that is governed by immutable laws, rules and traditions. The inhabitants of this land are recognized more by their class (suit) than by their selves. Laughter, adventure and for that matter, freedom and individuality, are foreign to this society. To this land arrives a prince from a distant nation, who is the embodiment of the free human spirit. He breaks the rules and ridicules the institutions that the cards have built. The cards envy his spirit and liveliness and the consequences of this confrontation is the soul of this drama.

This highly symbolic composition is usually presented with colorful costumes, a lively score and some of Tagore's most memorable humor. India Club. Inc.

Essed upon the information submitted, it appears that the organization qualifies as a private-operating foundation as defined in section 4942(j)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Attachment E contains a copy of our workpaper and computations relative to this conclusion.

In order to qualify as a private operating foundation, an organization must make qualifying distributions directly for the active conduct of the activit constituting the purpose of function for which it is organized and operated. These distributions must exceed B5% of the lesser of its adjusted net incore or its minimum investment return. According to our computations (see line 2 of Attachment E), this amounts to \$245.65 for the periods involved and your organization made qualifying distributions in excess of \$2,044.00 (see line 2(e) of Attachment E).

In addition, an organization must satisfy one of three alternative tests described in section 53.4942(b)-2 of the Income Tax Regulations. These testare commonly referred to as (a) the assets test, (b) the endowment test, and (c) the support test.

According to our computations, you satisfy the requirements of the endowment it, in that you made qualifying distributions in excess of two-thirds of you minimum investment return (see line 3(c) of Attachment E) for the periods involved.

Attachment C contains a copy of our computations relative to the computation of your minimum investment return for the years 1981 through 1983.



# A write-up of the Husical Dance Deann

This year's production is based on Rabindra Nath Tagore's musical dance drama, <u>TASHER DESH</u> (Land of Cards). Written in 1933-34, the play portrays a society that is bound by immutable rules and traditions. Into this dispirited land, its citizenry (cards) being faceless and only recognizable by the class (suit) they belong to, arrives a free spirit from abroad in the form of a prince. All the rules are broken and all the age-old traditions fall by the wayside as a breath of fresh air sweeps through the land.

The musical dance drama will be conducted by Ms. Rita Mustaphi, a well-known performer and choreographer in the Indian music dance community in the Twin Cities. Professional American dancers like Derek Phillips and Jocelyn Gorham of the Nancy Hauser Dance Company and Donald La Course of the Ethnic Dance Theater will join their Indian counterparts like Rita Mustaphi and Indrani Mallick and students of Nrityajoti (Twin Cities' school of Indian Dance) for this production. Ms. Manisha Sarkar who has performed and directed extensively both in India and in the U.S. will shoulder the music direction resposibilities. She will be assisted by a group of vocalists and musicians that have had musical braining in India and have performed in many musical events in the Twin Cities over last ten years. David P. McKoskey, Director of the Dance Production Clearinghouse of Minnesota Dance Alliance will assist in the lighting and production aspects of the show. The production is scheduled for July 29, 1989 at the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium.

The program is now in its planning stages and an Advisory Committee has been formed bringing together representatives from organizations that will actively be involved, namely, India Club, SILC, Indo-American Association, Nrityajoti etc.

The arts community will greatly benefit from our project. We expect to recruit volunteers and professional local artists from the Twin Cities Metropolitan Region and the State of Minnesota. These will include vocalists, narrators, musicians and support personnel. At least 30 % of the dancers, musicians and other artists will be drawn from outside the Indian community. The producers of <a href="Tasher Desh">Tasher Desh</a> hope to use this program to disseminate to all of our artists in Minnesota the importance of artists and culture of India. The producers believe that the format in which we have presented these dance dramas in the past, namely, through continuous English narratives of the proceedings, is a rather unique way of presentation of these works, not attempted elsewhere in the U.S. This effort is bearing fruit as an audience is developing in this community with a greater appreciation for this art form.

Dear friend.

The Indo-American Association (IAA) welcomes you to the University of Minnesota. We represent the Indian students at this University.

We are sure that your experiences, academic and social, will prove to be very rewarding and memorable during your stay here. We understand all the fears and worries you might be having in making a decision to come here. And, it is for this reason that we decided to answer some general questions that might make your transition to this place easier.

Contrary to the common belief in India, Minneapolis-St. Paul (Twin Cities) is a big metropolis. Minnesota, known as the land of lakes, has more than 10,000 beautiful lakes. The name Minneapolis is in fact derieved from a native American Indian word, minnie, for water and from the the Greek word, polis, for city. The state of Minnesota boasts of major industries and research centers like the IBM, Cray, Control Data, 3M, Honeywell, Cargill, Pillsbury and General Mills. The University itself has one of the largest campuses in the country with an enrollment of about 50,000.

You must be wondering if there are many Indians in this unheard of place. You will be surprised to know that the Indian student enrollment at the University is about 250. The University's Ames Library of South Asia houses one of America's most prized and sought after collections of Indian books, ranging in topics from the most sublime and esoteric to current issues of today. However, to most students, the main attraction is the newspapers and magazines, like The Hindu, The Statesman, Times of India, Illustrated Weekly, and India Today, which arrive with a delay of less than a week. There are about 1000 families in the Cities. There are about seven Indian stores that carry all the necessary spices, lentils (daal), pickles etc. as well as videos of Indian movies and TV serials; you really do not need to bring spices with you. There are other Indian associations, like the India Club and the Indian Music Society too, within the Twin Cities area. And yes, we also have two temples and a mosque here!

As far as the weather is concerned, winters get very cold! But you need not worry, for even though temperatures go down to -20 C, all buildings and homes are centrally heated; so it is not bad at all. Do not buy any special winter clothing like jackets and snow boots as they can be bought here at reasonable prices. Nevertheless, do bring your usual clothes: sweaters, shirts, trousers etc. Summers are very hot too with temperatures going up to 35 C at times, so get your clothes accordingly. You might went to get a pair or two of leather shoes, for they are quite expensive here. If you wear glasses, it might be a good idea to bring a spare one. It is also advisable to bring your important reference books, as they too are expensive here.

As far as food and lodging are concerned, these tips might be helpful to you. If you are a strict vegetarian, we would advise you not to put up at the University dormitories, since the food there is largely meat based. Nevertheless, housing close to the campus is easy to find;

that is where most of us stay. It will be a good idea to know the "fundamentals" of Indian cooking. All utensils can be purchased here.

If you are coming on assistantship, your pay may not start until four to six weeks because of the necessary paperwork. However, sometimes it is possible to get some advance from the graduate school. If you can, do bring enough money for your initial expenses. You are entitled to a minimum amount of \$750 from your bank according to the RBI regulations. Apart from that you can also purchase \$20 from the airport at the time of departure from India.

Regarding your plane-ticket, do book your ticket up to Minneapolis-St. Paul from India. Buying the connecting ticket from the port of entry could be very expensive. If you are coming via New York, try to get your connecting flight from the same airport (JFK Airport) and not from La Guardia or Newark airports; it will save you a lot of hassle.

Once you have your travel plans confirmed, let us know about your flight information so that we can pick you up at the airport, if necessary. We will also try to arrange for someone to host you for a few days while you get settled. Our ability to do this will depend on how much advance notice we get.

It will help if you can call from your port of entry, confirming your flight information with us. Long distance calls can be made from public phones using quarters (25 cent coins), which you will be able to get from any shop at the airport. A 5-minute call would cost you about three dollars; you might need quite a few quarters. You will have to dial a 1 first; then the area code, 612, and finally the number, for example 649-0508. The instructions are written on the telephones and operator assistance is available free.

We hope that we have eased your worries about this place. If we can be of any more help, feel free to contact us. We are looking forward to seeing you here at the University of Minnesota.

# Overall impressions of students:

Usefulness of host family program : almost 100% Yes but contingent on need of student.

Appropriateness of match: no overall complaints about the host except for lack of initiative, in specific cases. Procedure of random assignment should be continued.

# Special mention:

In a couple of pairs, the pairing was a great success with frequent exchange of visits and meetings. '.... a friendly relationship has developed, go for shopping outings, visit with family, real great ....'.In one other case host visited the student's parents in India and this was much appreciated by the student.

# Suggested improvements:

- \* Increase organized student-host contact. If host has committed to the programme but is unable to make time on his own behalf, this would allow both parties to meet officially which would increase chances of personal participation.
- \* Going by above, IAA may have to informally call for gatherings where host-students are specifically invited to attend. Also, special effort to get them togethar on events such as Diwali, say.
- \* Suggested events picnic, meetings in CMU.

  It would be a good idea to specifically call host-students to the planned summer picnic.
- \* Major suggestion: To contact students when they are still in India and inform them of our existence. (Done by other schools). This is being planned now.
- \* It can be assumed that all students would like to participate in this programme. On student's arrival, host is informed and host makes immediate contact with student (through IAA representatives) and then arranges informal dinner etc. May be IAA can side step univ. airport pickup and arrange that the host picks up the student. (I personally feel that student pickup is better, as new students are more comfortable with other students in the beginning as far as info. about the U goes. Also, some hosts may not be as familiar with the U and housing etc. as others). It is felt that initial contact can lead to a better relationship, as with time some students become used to other students and do not really need a host.

# HOST FAMILY PROGRAMME '88 FEEDBACK FROM THE STUDENTS

Following is a summary of the feedback received from the students who were assigned to Indian families in the fall of '88. A few suggestions made by the students is also compiled at the end.

Total no. of students assigned - 23
Total no. of students contacted for this survey - 16

A few students could not be reached in time, some did not return phone calls and one had changed residence w/o any forwarding number. Statistics were taken rather informally and may show some inconsistencies.

#### A few important statistics:

within 2 weeks: 3
within 2 wks-2 mos: 4

Students who had actual meetings with host (excl. initial contact).

Note: Almost half of those contacted did not "meet" their host in person, yet, after the initial contact.

In several cases phone contact was made in the beginning and then that was also not continued.

Excepting for 3-4 cases, the last meeting / contact (as the case may be) was in winter break or early winter quarter. So regular contact was not kept up even in some of the cases where initial contact was made. Maybe after a couple of quarters, students also do not feel the need for a host, except for the occassional dinner.

#### Response on initiative:

Lack of initiative on part of students (due to overwork / did

feel the need for a host) : 3

Host made few attempts and then it petered off (due to host being busy w/ work, home, moving etc.) : 3

able to commit their time sufficiently to the student. For one, select those who do not have small kids on their hands.

\* Some students did not know quite what to expect from the hosts. Hosts should be requested, (furnished with) set of guidelines on what kind of help can be offered to students. Dinner, shopping trips, old furniture, winter clothes, lastly advice.
