INDIA CLUB of Minnesota, a non-profit organization, is run by Minnesotans who have an interest in India and its culture. The club participates and sponsors social and cultural activities, and has been involved in the Festival of Nations (Spring) and Festival of India (Fall). The club members undertake voluntary services for the community they reside in and work for their progress. It also assists families in adopting, and runs host family programs for new students from India adjusting to life in Minnesota. The CLUB has contributed for the cause of literacy through Literacy as a Movement of People or LAMP.

LAMP was started in 1976 by Dr. B V Parameswara Rao, an Indian nuclear scientist from Penn State University, PA. Under his guidance it has successfully integrated the literacy movement with rural development and is responsible for a lot of innovative projects to achieve maximum literacy.

Our artists of the evening form a very talented and versatile group with noble thoughts to help society. Poet Robert Bly needs no introduction to Minnesotans. A National Book Award winner and a publisher of several volumes of his own poetry, he has had tremendous influence on contemporary poetry as a poet, editor and translator. He is best known for introducing many of the contemporary world's non-English language poets to American audiences.

Born in India, Ranee Ramaswamy is known for the charming grace and purity of style she adopts in her dance technique. Her work has been supported by numerous grants, among them McKnight Choreographic Fellowships given by the Minnesota Dance Alliance, Jerome Foundation fellowship funds and the National Endowment for the Arts fellowship for choreography (1993-95).

Sitar-player David Whetstone learnt to play the instrument in 1971 and studied under various teachers, among them renowned exponent Ustad Vilayat Khan of India, whose innovations have altered contemporary Indian Classical music. An active sitarist in USA, David has toured extensively with Robert Bly. Recipient of the 1987 American Institute studies fellowship and the 1992 Jerome Foundation travel and study grant, he currently teaches at the University of Minnesota, Macalester College, Carlton College and also privately.

KATHAK DANCE OF NORTH INDIA

Kathak dance originated in the remote temples of north India where a group of people namely the Kathakaars danced and sung verses from the great mythological epics. Because of the association of this community with the style of dance, the dance got its name Kathak. Kathakaar is a storyteller. Around the 16th century AD, this great art form entered the grand courtrooms of the Hindu and the Muslim rulers. During this time technical virtuosity and flamboyance is complimented by subtlety in the depiction of moods and emotions. From a form of devotion and temple rituals it became a dance for entertainment and incorporated into its form spectacular elements such as intricate rhythm, fast pirouettes, brisk movements and complicated footwork. What you see in Kathak today is the beautiful fusion of Indo-Persian cultures.
