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Manuel offers broader view of musical possibilities

The training of most musicians tends to focus and ultimately narrow their view of music. The skill of improvisation, for example, which was once expected of every "serious" musician, is now almost solely the province of the jazz or pop musician. An organ and piano recital at Macalester College in St. Paul Sunday offered a broader view of the possibilities of music. The performer was Handel Manuel, a native of Madras, India, who, as music director of the Madras Musical Association for the past 40 years, has led the kind of diverse musical life that is rarely encountered in the West.

He regularly conducts classical choral and orchestral concerts, has on occasion conducted stagings of American musical comedies, has played piano with jazz groups, has composed his own music and has had music composed for him — two works by the American composer Alan Hovhaness, one of which, an organ sonata, Manuel performed Sunday.

It is possible that Manuel is simply a unique individual and would have been so versatile no matter where he grew up. It is also possible that, because he grew up outside Western culture, he received the artifacts of

that culture — that is, its music — without the prejudices and imperatives that go along with it. Since he was largely self-taught, there was no one to tell him that Mozart was "more important" than Fats Waller. He simply liked both kinds of music, different as they are.

Needless to say, most organ and piano recitals (a rare entity, to begin with) don't include works of both Bach and Cole Porter, as did Manuel's program Sunday. The classical half of the program, the first half the organ half—included music by Bach, Mendelssohn and Manuel—a jaunty trumpet tune in Baroque style
— all deftly and colorfully played.
The Hovhaness sonata turned out to
be a striking five-movement work
that exploits this composer's longtime interest in Eastern melodic and
harmonic ideas.

Returning for the second half with his jacket off, Manuel played on piano some light classics ("Country Gardens"), what used to be called novelty tunes (Zez Confrey's "Dizzy Fingers," a bit blurred at Manuel's too-fast tempo) and some pop tunes old and new, displaying a vigorous stride-style plano.

The program was overlong. It might have ended with Manuel's clever set of variations to "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star," each variation done in the style of a given composer. Lots of people have done this. But Manuel does the hard ones, such as Debussy, and the more obscure ones, such as Paderewski, and then he does a variation in the style of Indian raga. The program was not just a breath of fresh air on a hot day. It was the United Nations set to music.

"DEN NAMEN HAT ER VON HANDEL"-That was the headline in a German newspaper, when Handel Manuel toured Europe in 1965. A performance of "The Messiah" by G. F. Handel at Madras, impressed Dr. Manuel, father of Handel Manuel, so much, that he decided to name his new-born son after the great composer Handel.

Pianist, Organist and Conductor, Handel Manuel is one of the few musicians in the world entirely self-taught and equally at home with both serious and light music. As soloist and accompanist, has played with well-known Indian and foreign artistes. Appeared as quest pianist with the Barrel House Jazz Group from West Germany, Bob Barnards Jazz Grop from Australia and Clark Terry and his Jolly Giants from the U.S.A.

The famous American Composer, Alan Hoyhanes, has dedicated to Handel Manuel.

The world premiere of the "Arjuna Symphony" was given in Madras Conducted by Handel manuel with the composer at the piano.

In 1964-65 Handel visited the United Kingdom, Germany and France at the invitation of the British Council, German and French Governments. Has performed in Edinburgh, recorded by the B. B. C., London, French Radio in Paris, and televised in Germany.

The first Indian to hold the post of Music Director of the Madras Musical Association (for the past 40 years) As Conductor, directed Orchestral and Choral Concerts. Stage productions of most of the wellknown Gilbert and Sullivan Operas and Musicals like "The Fiddler on the Roof"
