## THE STORY OF CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL

Central is the oldest of the present ten St. Paul public high schools, having had its start in three small third floor rooms of the Old Franklin building, in 1866. A few years later increased enrollment made necessary a move to larger quarters in the Lindeke Block on Seventh and Jackson Streets, and again in 1883 when the first high school building (of 29 rooms to accommodate 223 students) was erected at Tenth and Minnesota. Further growth necessitated an annex of fourteen rooms in 1888. About that time the old St. Paul High School became known as "Central". By 1909 another new building (now one of five city high schools) was needed for the rapidly increasing teen-age population, and at that time the present school was erected on Lexington Avenue (now Parkway)--since when Centralites are known as the "Minutemen".

Few landmark antiques of the old Tenth Street Central remain. There are the silent "Ludlow" clock; the marred and smudgy Diana Statue with her bambi; the framed drawing of the Old Central in the school office; and the long-used, now perforated stage curtain. Also the front hall cases reveal the trophies of several kinds for various heroic achievements, won through the years. In the new Rehabilitation Era, about to dawn upon us it is said, who knows what will remain of what now is the present old school?

The earliest curriculum offered "mathematics, natural philosophy, history, grammar, Greek, and Latin" with no frills. It is interesting to note that only two students graduated after the first four years. By 1888 there were 625 students in Central, and by 1909 there were 1300. With the turn of the century the curriculum was enlarged to include the manual arts, shop, forge, art, mechanical drawing, sciences, expression, journalism, home planning, modern languages, several histories, and chorus. A clamor for gym resulted in some "bloomer" classes in the attic of old Central.

In 1930 when the 6-3-3 plan of schools was undertaken in this city, Central became a 3-year high school, the ninth grade moving to junior high. Built for about 1500 pupils, this building then had an enrollment over 2500 which spilled over into the Hill School Annex, where some of the tenth grade was sent. Then in the late Thirties came the World War I crop of youngsters--and 8 "portable" school rooms were set up back of the gym along with double sessions, "floating" teachers, and a full house--2800 enrollment.

Then World War II conditions, partial abandonment of the junior high system, and decreasing enrollment restored Central to the 4-year basis and an average enrollment of 1500, in the early Forties.

In regard to special departments, the school library in 1866 consisted of two books, Webster's Unabridged Dictionary and Classical Dictionary of Antiquities. In the present building a library room was provided while the number of books now runs well over 25,000. A full time nurse, a dean of girls, a guidance counselor (now 2), and additional athletic directors and coaches have been added to the faculty during this period, and a crew of 14 (now 9) janitors and janitresses care for the building. A cafeteria lunch room renders another important service to the school. Most recent additions to the staff and special student services include special teachers for students with speech, hearing, or vision defects and students having "reading difficulty".

School publications began in 1876 with a hand written news pamphlet, read aloud to the school. This developed into the "World" literary magazine, first printed in 1885. "The Times", school newspaper, was first published in 1921; the Student "Minuteman", a handbook of student information, appeared in 1925 and "A Handbook of English" (published by the English Department) in 1929. Recently "The Times" has been getting out a printed student directory. The senior annual appeared in various forms from the beginning, and became known as "The Cehisean" in 1922.



Student Activities have expanded widely especially during the past 25 years, as follows

1. Athletics, starting with football in 1890 and hockey in 1900, now include baseball, golf, swimming, track, advanced gym and tumbling.
2. School assemblies in 1903
3. Historical Honor Society started by Miss Newson in 1908
4. Glee Club and Orchestra started by Miss Olive Long 1915  
Also in 1915, the Hi-Y started by Mr. John T. Harp
5. The Literary Club initiated by Miss Grace Elliott in 1919
6. In 1921 the Wardrobe Committee and Paint and Patches begun by Miss Helen Austin  
In 1921, G.A.A. (Girls' Athletic Association) by Misses Elizabeth Stroble and Nellie Heyd  
In 1921, the Times, by Miss Grace Elliott
7. The Student Council beginning 1922, really organized in 1923 by Misses Mary Bryant, Pearle Knight and Irma Meili
8. In 1925, the National Honor Society, Student Council Bookstore and "The Minutemen"
9. In 1926, the Girls' League started by Miss Mary Bryant  
The Rifle Club by Mr. Wm. Bush  
The School Band by Mr. Franklin Blume  
The Quill and Scroll (journalism honor society) by Miss Grace Elliott  
Girls Reserves (now Y-Teens) started by Miss Althea Diether  
And the Al Herman Cup Tradition

Remembering Central's faculty list through the years, one finds there have been 17 men as principal of this school--the last 3 are Mr. James L. Marshall, 1916-1944; Mr. Albert G. Meier, 1944-1949; and Mr. Elmer E. Lenander, 1949-

There have been many famous teachers at Central--some of them serving for long periods of time, beloved of numberless students, and widely known for their varied personalities and accomplishments. Among these were the following:

- Miss Olive Long--Art teacher who painted the stage front curtain, also founded the Glee Club and School Orchestra
- Miss Caroline Austin--English, voted most popular teacher of the city in a Pioneer Press contest and given an all-expense paid European trip
- Miss Emma A. Gray, English Teacher
- Miss Mary Jane Newson--English
- Miss Anna M. Dickson--English
- Miss Susan Crumbacher--English, who taught for 43 years, beloved of all who knew her
- Miss Grace Elliott--Journalism, of literary prestige and promoter of several activities.
- Miss Louise Minor and Miss Alice Hosmer--expert "math" teachers
- Miss Helen Austin--who made dramatics not only popular but also memorable
- Mr. James E. Marshall--vigorous principal whom his teachers will not forget

Many, many more might be named. The 15,000 and more students who have attended school here remember and bear away in their lives the influences for benefit and good of those unmentioned as well as of the above. Central High now strides on through the years toward its centennial--changing, expanding, hampered in its efforts sometimes, sometimes proud of its work; but those who have spent part of their lives within its walls will remember the personalities, the experiences, the records and memories shared here.

In closing, it may be said that St. Paul Central High has long been recognized for its high scholastic standards, has long been widely accepted over the nation for its prestige and leadership in some fields of endeavor, and it is justly proud of a lengthy procession of fine graduates including 9 Rhodes Scholars, the largest number graduated from any one high school in this country.

BOB ECKHARDT acts as a tourist guide in the Alps. His penchant for wearing khaki shorts and 10-inch boots frightens even the natives.

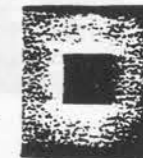
A most efficient missionary administering aid to the heathens is ELSIE McMANIGAL.

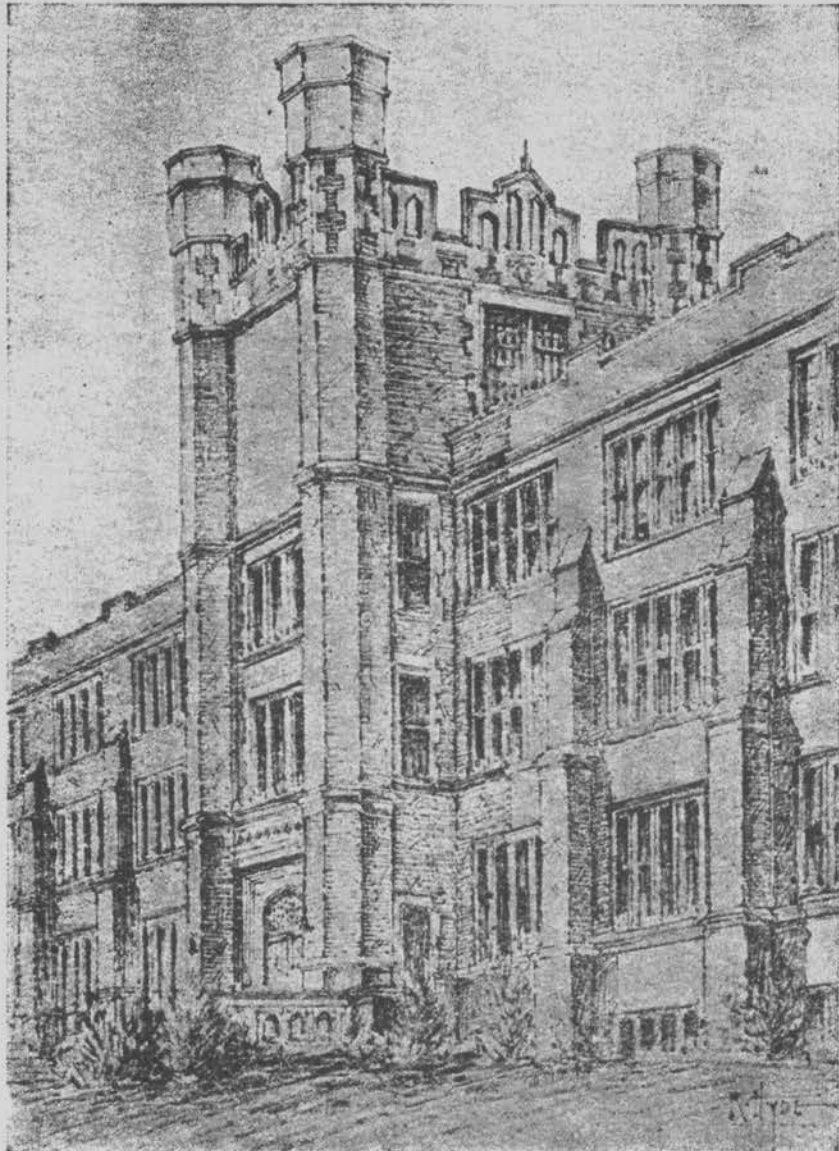

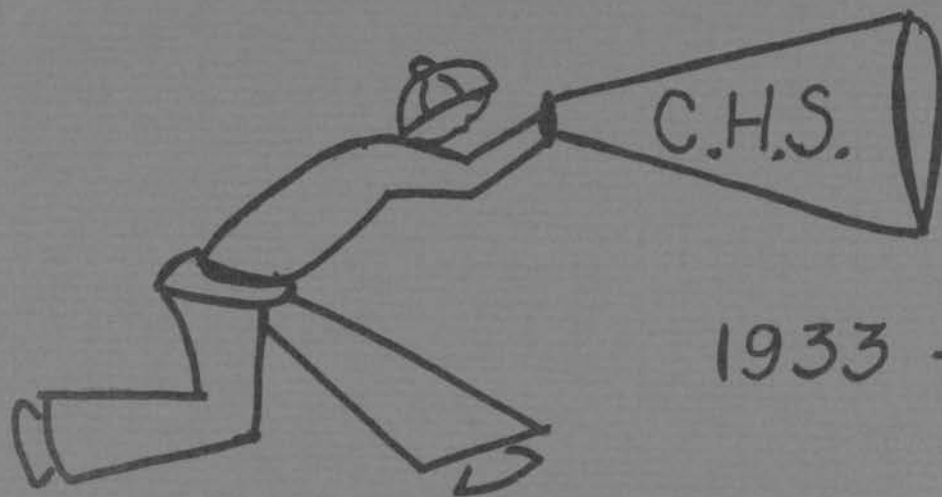
