# THE HISTORY OF AIR DEFENSE

The Air Defense Command as a major United States Air Force Command was formed on March 27, 1946 at Mitchel Air Force Base, New York, with Lieutenant General George B. Stratemeyer in command. The mission assigned the new command was to organize and administer the integrated air defense of the continental United States.

When organized, ADC was allocated what amounted to four poorly manned and equipped radar squadrons and two equally deficient fighter squadrons. In late 1947, when the Air Force achieved coequal status with the Army and Navy, the groundwork was laid for the designation of ADC as the service with primary responsibility for the establishment and operation of a continental air defense system.

In mid-1948 Air Force headquarters ordered ADC to establish air defense systems about the Seattle-Tacoma-Vancouver area, the Hanford atomic works in the Northwest and about the New York-Washington area on the east coast. At that time ADC had only one radar station in operation -- a training facility at Arlington, Washington. The rest of the men assigned to the radar force were on standby at McChord Air Force Base, near Tacoma. Later, a similar surveillance system was set up in the Albuquerque-Los Alamos area in New Mexico.

During December 1948, fighter strength was increased, by pooling the missions and forces of ADC and the Tactical Air Command under a new organization called Continental Air Command. (ConAC) General Stratemeyer served as ConAC commander until the following April, when he was succeeded by Lieutenant General Ennis C. Whitehead. Major General Gordon P. Saville, one of the foremost experts on air defense, was appointed commander of the new Air Defense Command.

An Army decision of 1948 to expand antiaircraft artillery forces led to the deployment of AAA battalions the next year to selected cities and, thus, the first participation by Army units in continental air defenses.

By mid-1949, the Northwest, Northeast and New Mexico systems had expanded to considerable size. When war broke out in Korea, all doubts as to the need for a permanent radar network were dispelled. Elements of the Air Reserve were recalled to active duty. By September of that year, the radar squadrons were able to go on a 24-hour-a-day schedule for the first time since the creation of the temporary defenses. The Army Anti-aircraft Command was established by the Department of Army, July 1, 1950, just a few days after the outbreak of fighting

in Korea. ARAACOM was given responsibility for the planning and deployment of antiaircraft artillery battalions and of maintaining cognizance over the training and readiness of these units. The first commanding general of ARAACOM was Major General Willard W. Irvine. In November it was decided to make air defense the responsibility of a major Air Force command in order to free the commander to give his full attention to this single military phase.

The new organization, a major command, was created on January 1, 1951 with headquarters in Colorado Springs. The majority of the former ConAC headquarters staff section chiefs were transferred to the new ADC. General Whitehead was appointed first commander. Upon his retirement a few months later, he was succeeded by General Benjamin W. Chidlaw.

The same month, ARAACOM Headquarters, which had already been moved from the Pentagon to Mitchel Air Force Base to be located near ConAC, was moved once more, this time to Colorado Springs. On April 10, 1951, all trained Army antiaircraft artillery units allocated to the air defense of the continental United States came under ARAACOM's control -- thus ARAACOM attained the status of a major Army command.

Early in 1951 the fighter force was increased by some twenty federalized Air National Guard squadrons. Authority to activate new Air Force Squadrons soon followed. By late 1952, most of the 75 stations of the permanent Radar Program were operational.

In the latter months of 1950 the changeover from conventional and day jet aircraft to jet all-weather aircraft began. The first F-89's were assigned to ADC in mid-1951. The all-weather version of the famous F-86 Sabre jet began to arrive in early 1953. By the end of the following year the interceptor force was completely all-weather equipped.

The first of the Army Antiaircraft Command's NIKE guided missile units were moved on site in December, 1953, at Fort George G. Meade, Md., beginning a process of converting anti-aircraft artillery defenses to missiles. The NIKE system was the first land-based antiaircraft artillery missile defense deployed to guard American cities. The NIKE is an all-weather, "command guidance" missile which is especially effective against high altitude bombers.

Before the end of 1954, the number of NIKE batteries in ARAACOM's nationwide defense system had equalled the number of conventional 120 millimeter and 90 millimeter gun units put together. National Guard units comprising an antiaircraft artillery augmentation force were taking over the guns.

A large civilian ground observer organization was on duty spotting aircraft in the weaker radar coverage locations. Another plan was formulated at this time calling for aircraft of other branches to augment the ADC forces.

The Continental Air Defense Command (CONAD) was established directly under the Joint Chiefs of Staff, with the Air Force as the executive agency in September 1954. A tri-service command, the first ever, to operate within the boundaries of the United States, it was designed to incorporate all agencies connected with air defense under one commander-in-chief. General Chidlaw, who was the first commander-in-chief, was succeeded upon his retirement by General Earle E. Partridge.

Upon creation of CONAD the United States Navy became the third member of the first combined service command ever to operate within the boundaries of the United States. Although the last of the three services to officially join CONAD the Navy brought many years of experience into the air defense problem. During World War II it was faced with the air defense of island bases as well as task forces at sea. Tactics and equipment developed during those early days by the Navy are generally the same as those now used in continental air defense. Although the official Navy entrance into CONAD did not take place until 1954, it had been contributing picket ships, fighter aircraft, radar and antiaircraft guns to the operational capabilities of the USAF air defense effort since the termination of World War II.

The first Destroyer Escort Radar vessel "USS FESSENDEN", as assigned to picket duties off the East Coast in September, 1952 for operational and training purposes on a round-the-clock basis. YAGR-1, the "USS GUARDIAN" and first of a string of converted World War II Liberty Ships went on station in June 1955, as the first official Navy vessel in the CONAD surveillance system.

By 1956, offshore portions of the double perimeters to extend the warning time away from our coastlines included Navy picket ships, airborne early warning and control aircraft, and Texas Towers patterned after Gulf of Mexico oil rigs located on the continental shelf one hundred or so miles off the coast were planned.

To fulfill a further early warning requirement two lines of radar and automatic warning devices were scheduled for construction across Canada. The mid-Canada Line would stretch across the continent in the vicinity of the Arctic Circle, with seaward flanges to the east and west. Construction was well under way by early 1956.

At the same time a major research and development program was taking place in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Lincoln Laboratory for automatizing the data transmission and display function. This was project SAGE (Semi-Automatic Ground Environment). Once in place, SAGE would revolutionize air defense operational procedures.

Early in 1956, the Army's Missile Master for coordinating the fire of NIKE batteries within a defense was unveiled. This fire direction system is designed to receive information on potential targets from CONAD's warning system, including SAGE, and to pass on this information in refined form to individual batteries within a defense. It is capable of functioning independently in the event communications with the warning system are severed.

During May 1956 the first of the century series of aircraft joined the CONAD inventory. The Convair F-102, a delta wing type aircraft, is armed with both Falcon air-to-air guided missiles and two-inch folding-fin rockets. It will streak from a standing start to combat altitudes within a matter of minutes. When added to the other 100 series now in limited production the CONAD interception capability will be greatly increased further protecting our country from a surprise enemy aerial attack. In a number of areas the latest U. S. Navy fighter aircraft are available to augment the CONAD system in case of air attack. They are made available from Naval Air Stations located at coastal installations.

During February 1957 the Department of Defense announced the Continental Air Defense Command had begun deployment of nuclear weapons within the United States for air defense purposes. Nuclear air defense weapons were then developed which provided by far the most effective form of defense against air attack. The first of those nuclear weapons introduced into the air defense system was an air-to-air rocket launched from interceptor type aircraft. Nuclear capability is also now incorporated into CONAD surface to air defense systems, including the ARAACOM NIKE Hercules, and Talos. It is possible for these weapons to destroy aircraft within a considerable distance from the point of burst.

# THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF

General Earle E. Partridge, is the present Commander of the Continental Air Defense Command. His Headquarters is at Colorado Springs, Colorado, where he arrived to take up his present assignment on July 20, 1955.

General Partridge brings a lifetime of military experience to this assignment. He has been in the Service almost continuously since his enlistment in the Army in July of 1918. In the first World War, he joined the 79th Division at the front in France, participating in the St. Mihiel and Argonne operations prior to the Armistice. He also served in World War II in a wide variety of assignments in the United States, North Africa, Italy, England, and Okinawa.

In the postwar years, General Partridge assisted in the reorganization of the Army Air Forces by serving as Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and soon thereafter was sent to Japan where he commanded the Fifth Air Force from October 1948 to June of 1951. After the outbreak of the Korean war, he moved the Fifth Air Force to Korea, and in returning to this country, he was able to bring to bear his Korean experiences to assist in advancing the Air Force research and development effort as Commander of the newly formed Air Research and Development Command with Headquarters at Baltimore, Maryland.

This assignment was followed by another tour in the Pentagon as Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and by assignment to the Pacific as Commander of the four Far East Air Forces. He was promoted to four-star rank to assume this latter duty.

General Partridge was born in Winchendon, Massachusetts, on July 7, 1900. He attended Norwich University during the year 1919-1920, and the United States Military Academy from 1920 to 1924. He is also a graduate of the Army Flying School, the Air Corps Tactical School, and the Army's Command and General Staff School at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.





## LT. GEN. JOSEPH H. ATKINSON

Commander

Air Defense Command

Just thirty-six days after the turn of the century, Joseph Hampton Atkinson was born in Dublin, Texas on February 5, 1900. His military career began in December 1922 with his enlistment in the Army. Receiving his appointment as a flying cadet, General Atkinson completed his training at Kelly Field in September 1924, the proud recipient of a pilot's rating and a second lieutenant's commission.

Following his Regular commission in 1928, General Atkinson had tactical duty with the 16th Observation Squadron and was a flying instructor at Randolph Field, Texas. His first command was the 29th Pursuit Squadron in Panama in 1934. Returning to command the 11th Bomb Squadron at Hamilton Field, California, General Atkinson remained in bombardment aviation until his assignment at AAF Headquarters, Washington, D. C. in October 1941.

In September 1942, General Atkinson joined the Eighth Bomber Command in Europe as commander of the 97th Bomb Group receiving a Christmas Day, 1942 promotion to brigadier general. A wing commander in the 12th Bomber Command and 15th Air Force, he became deputy commander of the 15th in March 1944.

Returning to the U. S. in July 1944, General Atkinson commanded the 3rd Bomber Command at MacDill Field, Florida. From 1946 to 1949, he served as commanding general of the Alaskan Air Command. From 1949 to 1952, he commanded the 311th Air Division and the Second Air Force under the Strategic Air Command. Returning to Alaska in November 1952 as vice commander of the Alaskan Command, he was designated Commander in Chief in March 1953 where he served until his appointment as commander of the Air Defense Command, Ent Air Force Base, Colorado, on September 17, 1956.

General Atkinson is rated a command pilot and technical observer. He has been awarded the Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with one Silver Oak Leaf Cluster.

Lieutenant General Stanley R. Mickelsen became Commanding General, Army Antiaircraft Command, Colorado Springs, Colorado, on October 1, 1954. His prior assignment had been Commanding General of the Antiaircraft Artillery and Guided Missile Center at Fort Bliss, Texas.

He was born at St. Paul, Minnesota, October 8, 1895, and attended the University of Minnesota. He received his regular commission as a second lieutenant of Coast Artillery October 26, 1917.

His Army career has been principally in the field of Antiaircraft Artillery, and he has served as commander of troops, staff officer, and instructor. General Mickelsen has also served on the War Department General Staff and on the staff of the Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force. Subsequent to World War II, he was engaged primarily in the development and incorporation of guided missiles and atomic weapons into land combat and air defense.

His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal and the Legion of Merit.



**RADM HUGH H. GOODWIN**

**Commander Naval Forces**

Rear Admiral Hugh H. Goodwin has served with the United States Navy for 39 years. While an enlisted man he was appointed to the United States Naval Academy by the Secretary of the Navy. Since that time he has sailed on every class of Navy combatant vessel, destroyer, submarine, cruiser, battleship, and carrier.

He served his first tour in submarine and after two years qualified for command in the old S boats. After duty on battleships and destroyers he completed naval aviation flight training and was assigned to Fighting Squadron One. At that time carrier aviation was struggling with the operational problems of development and carrier pilots were pioneering the tactics that were to make the carrier the offensive power of the fleet.

In 1936 he became commander of the training squadron at the Naval Air Station at Pensacola, Florida. For the remaining years until World War II he served the normal run of naval peacetime assignments. During the war he commissioned the carrier Gambier Bay and fought her through the Marianas Campaign. In August 1944 he became chief of staff for Carrier Division Six. During the latter part of the war he commanded the famed carrier San Jacinto. Following World War II the Admiral served as chief of staff to the Commander in Chief Atlantic Fleet, Vice Commander Military Air Transport Service.

He next became commander of Carrier Division TWO operating as a part of the combined NATO Fleet in exercises in the Atlantic and later the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean. Prior to his assignment in NAVAL FORCES CONAD he served two years as Commander Philippine Command US and Commander Naval Forces Philippines. In April 1956, Admiral Goodwin assumed his present duty, Commander Naval Forces, Continental Air Defense Command.

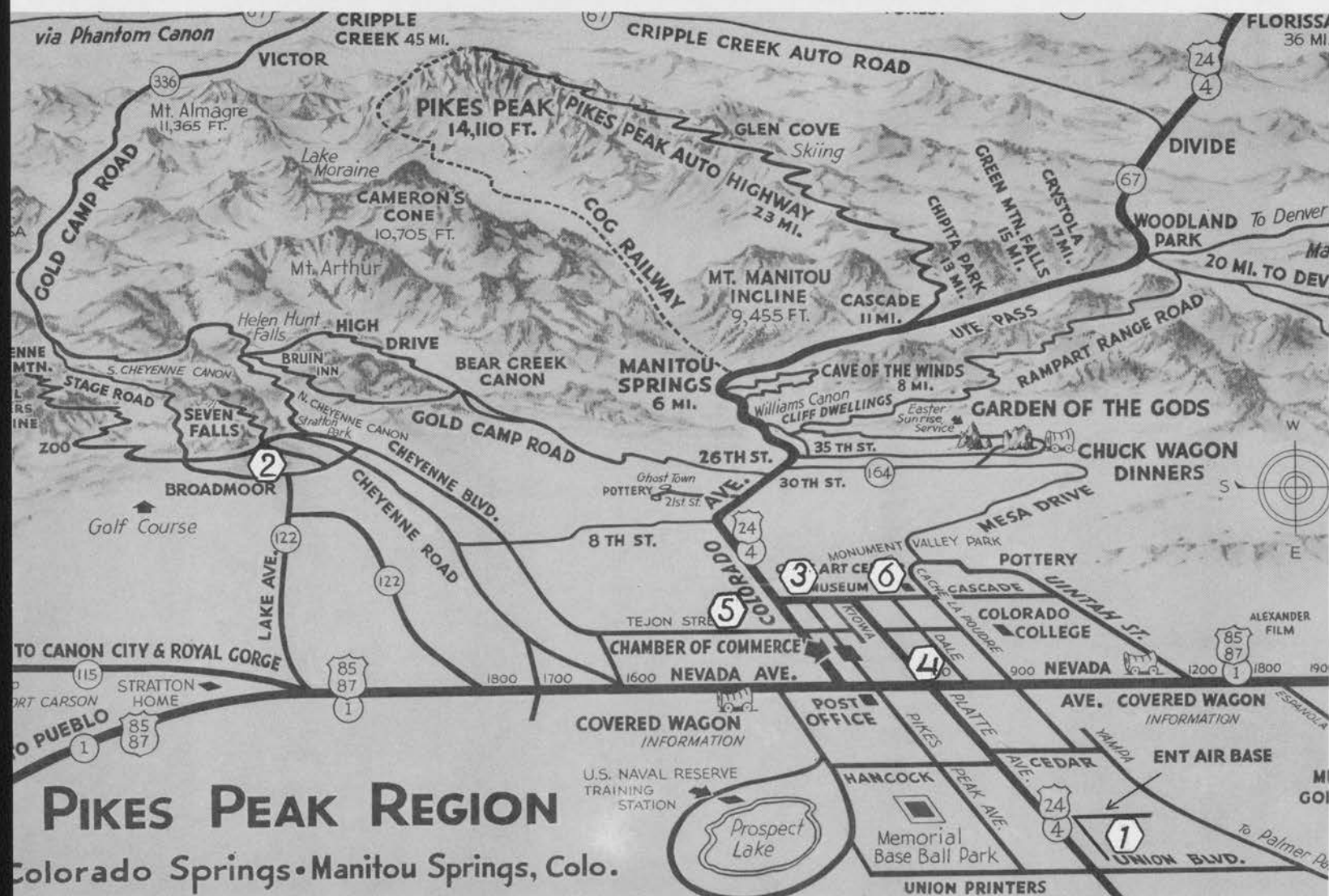
