CONTRACT

- 1. The Martham Gallery of Fine Arts, 224 So. 41st Street, Omaha, Nebraska, referred to hereafter as "The Gallery", agrees to act as sales representative for referred to hereafter as "The Artist", for a period of one year from date.
- 2. If no notification is made by either party within 15 days after contract expires it will automatically be renewed.

COMMISSION

- 3. The Gallery shall receive 33-1/3% of all sales made on its premises.
- 4. The Gallery shall receive 33-1/3% of any portrait, sculpture, or mural commissions it obtains for the Artist.
- 5. The Gallery shall receive no commission on purchase prizes.
- 6. The Gallery shall not receive any commission on royalties, sale of reproduction rights or commercial assignments unless arranged by the Gallery, in which case the commission will be 33-1/3%, unless the Artist has to complete the deal; in which case the Gallery will receive 10%. The Gallery shall receive 33-1/3% on works of fine art which it sells for commercial use. It shall be understood that all sales are made exclusive of reproduction rights, and written acknowledgement of that fact shall be obtained from purchaser by the Gallery. Reproduction rights may be specifically purchased with the Artist's written consent in each case.
- 7. Materials, installation and foundry costs on sculpture and mural commissions which the Gallery obtains for the Artist shall be deducted before calculating commissions.

JURISDICTION

- 8. The Artist shall not show in any other commercial gallery in Omaha, Nebraska. The Artist shall not personally sell to others unless agreed in advance with the Gallery.
- 9. The Gallery may arrange for representation of the Artist by another agency in any field reserved to it by this contract, but must arrange to pay such agency by splitting its own commission, with no added charge to the Artist.
- 10. In addition to continuous sales representation during the term of this agreement, work of the Artist will be exhibited in the Gallery:
 - a. At least one work will appear in a permanent exhibition of the Gallery group.
 - b. At least one work will appear in all Gallery group shows, of which there will be at least 2 every year.
- 11. Storage space will be provided at the Gallery for at least five works.

- 13. The Gallery will meet expenses of packing and shipping work sent to clients.
- 14. The Gallery will insure all work in its possession against loss and damage, except ordinary wear and tear, up to 2/3% of sale price.
- 15. If for any reason this contract is no longer agreeable to either party before the end of the contract year, the Gallery will not assume any charges for sending work back to the Artist. If at the end of a contract year, the Artist requests return of his work, Gallery will assume charges for return.

FINANCES

- 16. The Artist and the Gallery will agree in writing on prices for all work in possession of the Gallery. The Gallery may not accept a lower offer without the Artist's consent in writing.
- 17. All works are received by the Gallery in trust. All sums received by the Gallery on account of works sold are received in trust and the net proceeds, after deduction of commission and expenses agreed, to be chargeable to the Artist, shall be immediately deposited in a bank account and there retained until paid out to the Artist.
- 18. A receipt will be given the Artist for all work received and he must acknowledge in writing all work returned.

We operate on the usual gallery commission of one third of the selling price: the artist ships to us at his expense and if the work is not s sold at theend of a year, we return it at our expense. April 20, 1958 Rental and Sale Gallery Joslyn Art Museum 2218 Dodge Street Omaha, 2, Nebraska Gentlemen: I am in receipt of your communication and entry cards for the Spring and Summer 1958 Rental and Sales Gallery; however there are several questions which I hope you can answer, so that I can make plans accordingly. First of all, I have two watercolors in the current 5th Biennial Exhibition plus one watercolor not accepted by the jury which is also at the Museum. Are these works eligible for submission to the Rental and Sales Gallery? Or do you consider the fact that they have been on exhibition (that is two of the pictures) recently at the Museum - a probably not sold - an indication that different entries would be desirable? If these pictures now at the Museum are eligible for submission, will there be a \$ 5.00 crating charge when they are returned? Let me say that were I to send you different pictures for the Rental and Sales Glallery, I would expect to pay the crating charge, but that I expect the entries from the Biennial to be returned without a crating charge. In any event I do understand that a \$ 1.00 entry fee is required. I notice that one of your requirements is that all work must be wired and ready to hang. This I can agree would help to make the handling and work on the part of your personnel much easier, but it is very difficult to crate and ship and keep in an undamaged condition, pictures which are wired. Please consider the problem of crating out-of-town entries and advise if some other terms can be established for such entries, in regard to screweyls and wires. Sincerely yours, Francis R. Meisch

Dear Mr. Meisch,

This is an invitation for you to enter the Joslyn's winter RENTAL AND SALES GALLERY. This Gallery will open on October 1, 1960 and will continue through March 31, 1961.

A total of three works per artist may be entered for this Gallery. The pictures may be in any of the following catagories; paintings (any media), drawings and prints. All works must be suitably framed, ready for hanging. No entry fee will be charged. Works are to be sent to the Museum prepaid, unless delivered in person. At the end of this period, all pictures which haven't sold will be returned to the artist prepaid or, if they all sell, the shipping crate will be returned prepaid (unless delivered in person). Works should be delivered to the museum by September 26, 1960. Please fill out enclosed entry blanks.

Enclosed you will find a copy of the information given to each person who rents a work of art. You will note that a fee of \$2.00 a month, which goes to you, the Artist, is charged for this privilege, for any picture priced at \$200.00 or under. An additional \$1.00 is added for any \$100.00 or part thereof over the \$200.00 base price. A 15% commission will be charged by the museum for all pictures sold. If a work is sold, a down-payment of 25% is required, the remainder to be paid in no less than three installments within a six month period. The museum will exercise caution in all arrangements.

Payments to the artists for Rental Fees will be made twice during the period, on December 29 and at the close of the Gallery, March 31, If a picture sells, it will be processed and the amount mailed to the artist immediately. A Summer Gallery, April 1, 1961 to September 30, 1961 follows.

We hope that you will consider entering and by so doing let the people of this area enjoy these works which you created. I shall look forward to your answer.



THE MIDWEST

THE MIDWEST is a new exhibition incorporating the Museum's annual Six States and Graphic Arts exhibition.

This exhibition has been established to cover a more representative area in the middle part of the country, to which the Museum is so close. It also affords a stronger single exhibition which represents all pictorial and sculptural media. THE MIDWEST includes painting - oil, watercolor, tempera, gouache, etc., prints and drawings of all types, and sculpture. The area has been expanded to a ten state region which includes the original six states — Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and South Dakota — and four additional states — Minnesota, North Dakota, Oklahoma and Wyoming. There was a gratifying response from 469 artists who submitted 1,150 objects. Much of the work was of high quality and the jury had to be rigid in its selection to bring the exhibition within the maximum space the Museum could provide. Even so, the final exhibition is larger than ever before, and occupies not only the Museum's five large north galleries, but also the exhibit rooms in the Graphic Arts Section.

The Jury of Selection consisted of John F. Helm, Jr., Professor of Drawing and Painting, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas; Richard Foster Howard, Director, Des Moines Art Center, Des Moines, Iowa; and Edward Laning, Head, Painting Department, Kansas City Art Institute, Kansas City, Missouri. It was a balanced jury, following the Museum's plan each year to include practicing artists, teachers and Museum people.

THE MIDWEST, 1950, includes 164 oils and mixed media, 86 watercolors, 39 prints, 18 drawings and 52 pieces of sculpture
— a total of 359 objects. It was apparent, because of the large
number of entries, that a definite basis of selection had to be
determined and adhered to. Of course, the primary decision
must be based always on good painting, drawing or print making, but, in addition, the judges looked for variety of work, originality of concept, and a positive approach that showed that

the variety of directions that artists of the midwest are taking, but, in so doing, the jury had to limit its decision to the best performance in each case. In other words, the visitor will see in this exhibition marked contrasts of work - realism in portraits and landscapes, as it is popularly understood, as well as more personal, subjective interpretations and abstract patterns

A different plan of awards was adopted by the Museum in the last few years. Instead of singling out any one object for first prize, the jury is asked to select a number of outstanding objects in each category for Special Mention. These are noted by an asterisk in the catalog listing.

Cash awards also have been discontinued so that all available funds each year can be put into purchase awards. These awards come from contributions as well as Museum funds, and we hope that each year these can be as liberal as possible to stimulate the good work of the artists of the region, and also to build up the Museum's Permanent Collection. Purchase awards will be made by a special Museum committee near the close of the exhibition, and announcements will be made to all artists who

We hope that all visitors will bear in mind that almost every object in the exhibition is for sale. Here is an excellent opportunity to obtain a piece of original work by a living American artist. The Museum takes no commission on sales, but is concerned with promoting good work to suit everybody's tastes and

I want to take this occasion to thank all the artists of the midwest who entered work. After all, it is their response that makes the exhibition possible, and we are not unmindful of the effort and expense they go to in submitting work. We hope you will be with us next year, and that, in the meantime, you will be free to offer any comments on this new exhibition.

FIRST ANNUAL COMPETITION

While a sharp distinction cannot be made between drawings and paintings, especially in this day of mixed media and techniques, the spirit of this exhibition is a drawing show in contrast to our annual painting show — the Six States Exhibition.

This new Graphic Arts exhibition has been established for a number of reasons:

First of all we wanted a separate showing of drawings and prints because they are usually smaller and often more personal than paintings. Our experience at the Museum has been that when exhibitions include all media, the drawing and print section is considered secondary and usually neglected by the visitors.

We want the exhibition to demonstrate the varied use of line and tone as it is drawn upon paper, stone or metal plate, or cut into the block, also to demonstrate how this lineal and tonal work is developed by the different printing processes — each adding its distinct character to the drawing.

We hope the exhibition will include from year to year original drawings prepared as studies for other work. Too infrequently does the public have a chance to see those very personal notes and sketches which convey an artist's ideas into his more formal work.

Another reason for this Graphic Arts Exhibition is the opportunity it affords the public to collect works of art at nominal prices. We hope that this exhibition each year will help those people to whom an original picture by a living artist is more appealing than a mechanical reproduction of a picture. The cost is about the same for prints and drawings.

Above all, the purpose of this exhibition is to give emphasis to the Graphic Arts media, and to bring together in Omaha once a year fine examples of the work that is produced in this central part of the United States.

Five hundred eleven entries were received. An artist jury, consisting of William S. Schwartz of Chicago and Kady Faulkner of Lincoln, selected 179 pictures representing 97 artists. There are 53 drawings in pencil, ink, chalk, and pastel. The 126 prints include etchings, drypoints, aquatints, mezzotints, lithographs,

wood engravings and serigraphs. Prints in color are also represented. Most of the work has a definite drawing and print character, but some of the brush entries were rejected because the Jury felt that they were developed primarily as paintings and were not truly brush drawings.

We hope that artists will feel free to comment on these matters as we formulate plans for next year.

The Museum is gratified with the initial response to this exhibition and wishes to thank the artists and jury alike for their time and effort in making it possible.





Two years ago the museum's annual Six States exhibition was reorganized to include a larger area and to represent a wider field of design. The resulting exhibition, The Midwest, is really two exhibitions, each held in alternate years. One show is devoted to paintings, drawings, prints and sculpture, the other show includes design in many fields: ceramics, weaving, jewelry, furniture, etc.

Statement of the Jurors

Although we were usually in agreement in the selection of entries to be included in the exhibition, a single vote by either of us was sufficient to warrant its acceptance. The same held true in the award of honorable mentions. We feel that by some standards we might be considered a conservative jury. We found a low percentage of entries in the traditional idiom, the majority being abstract or non-objective.

The quality of the works of art is comparable to that of exhibitions we have juried elsewhere. We believe th oil paintings and graphics are the strongest; the sculpture is the weakest, doubtless because there are few sculptors living in this region.

We enjoyed working together on the jury and feel that we leave you an exhibition of variety and quality. We are glad that we were not asked to award prizes, for it would have been difficult making a selection from the pictures to which we awarded honorable mentions. The show deserves more than a casual look and we hope that you will visit the exhibition many times.



JURORS' STATEMENT

We feel that the 8th MIDWEST BIENNIAL will be a stimulating, high-quality show. Although there is little work that can be considered truly experimental by standards set in other major national shows, the few strong, new approaches represented are competently handled and well understood.

The sculpture entries are particularly varied, exciting and imaginative. In other areas we find less experimentation and impact. The watercolor work, the crafts—particularly the weaving and jewelry—are competent, but not as exciting as the best work in these fields today. We were disappointed with the small number of entries in the graphics section.

In general, the feeling of this show is rather mild, perhaps classic and calm alongside the turbulent mainstream of experimental art in the U.S. today. The artists and craftsmen of the Midwest may be absorbing these trends, sifting through them and using what they find of value.



THE EXHIBITION

The MIDWEST BIENNIAL EXHIBITION is a competitive show open to all artists and craftsmen in a ten-state region, intended to give the artists of the area an opportunity to gain recognition, and to inform the museum public of the most recent developments in the fields represented. The present show is the first MIDWEST to combine crafts with the fine arts on an equal basis in a single show.

The MIDWEST BIENNIAL has been held since 1950, when it was begun as an expanded version of the Six States Exhibition which in turn grew out of the Nebraska-lowa Exhibit of the 1930's. Since those early days the artistic expression of the area has become steadily less regional in character and more representative of national and worldwide artistic trends.

This year the jury selected 217 works from a total 840 entries. The work of 157 artists and craftsmen are represented in this exhibition, in which one can see the best of what is being created today in the Midwest.

The MIDWEST BIENNIAL is the outgrowth of the "Nebraska-lowa Exhibit" which started in the 1930's, grew into the "Six States Exhibition" and then expanded into the present 10-state competition. The 8th MIDWEST BIENNIAL combines the fine arts exhibition and the designer-craftsman exhibition, which in recent years were held on alternate years.

The purpose of the MIDWEST BIENNIAL is to afford the artists and the craftsmen of the region opportunity for further recognition, to have their works weighed in competition with their contemporaries, and to demonstrate to the public the significant artistic and design achievements of this region.

JURY OF SELECTION

- Dr. F. M. Hinkhouse, Director, Phoenix Art Museum, Arizona. Dr. Hinkhouse not only heads one of this country's noted art museums, he is an art connoisseur with his own notable private collection.
- Mr. Charles Gunther, Supervisor of Art Education, Toledo Museum, Ohio. Mr. Gunther is a prominent painter and printmaker in addition to his art education activities, which include the University of Toledo as well as the Toledo Museum.
- Mr. Donald Frith, Associate Professor of Art, University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana. Mr. Frith is a designer-craftsman, whose particular excellence is in ceramics, in addition to being an art instructor.

ELIGIBILITY

- The competition is open to all artists and designer-craftsmen living in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Wyoming.
- The competition is for original work done independently and not in a classroom under direction of an instructor.
- All entries should be of recent date and not previously exhibited at Joslyn.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- The judging will be in two parts: GROUP A, the fine arts, and GROUP B, craft media. See "Rules and Instructions" applying to each group.
- 2. Each entrant may submit a total of three entries.
- 3. There is NO entry fee.
- Permission for reproduction of all work for catalog or publicity purposes is understood to be given by the entrant unless specified otherwise on the entry cards.

PURCHASE AWARDS

- Following the Museum's policy of other years, no specific awards will be made such as "First Prize," etc. However, the jury of selection will designate "Honorable Mention" for the more distinguished works in the exhibition, and funds will be available for purchases of exceptional works which fit into Joslyn Art Museum's permanent collections.
 - 1. Joslyn Art Museum Purchase Fund \$1,000.
 - 2. Junior League Purchase Fund \$400.
 - 3. It is anticipated that other funds will be announced.

DELIVERY AND RETURN OF WORK

- 1. All entries of works, both Groups A and B, must be delivered to Joslyn by January 7, 1964.
- 2. All shipments must be prepaid and insured by entrant.
 - a. Accepted work will be returned prepaid and insured.
 - b. Rejected work will be returned collect and insured.
- Work may be delivered in person to Joslyn December 26, 1963 - January 7, 1964, Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. -5 p.m., North Door. (Museum closed Christmas and New Year's.)
 - a. Rejected work delivered in person may be picked up January 20 - February 1, 1964, Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. - 5 p.m., North Door.
 - b. Accepted work delivered in person may be picked up February 18 - March 7, 1964, Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. - 5 p.m., North Door.
- 4. If some but not all of an entrant's work is accepted, the rejected works may be held until the close of the exhibition and all work returned prepaid. However, Joslyn reserves the right to pro-rate such shipping costs with the entrant in the event of an unusually heavy rejected work.

- 1. The competition is open to original paintings (any media), sculpture, prints, drawings and pastels.

- 1. Each work must have a stated value even if not for sale.
- Catalog listing all entries accepted for the MIDWEST BIENNIAL will be mailed to all entrants as soon as possible.
- 3. The Museum will take customary care in handling works, which will be insured by Joslyn from time of arrival at the Museum until they are returned to the entrant.

The Joslyn Rental and Sale Gallery figures for 1964 are now available and we know you will be most interested in hearing this report.

There were 900 two month rentals during 1964; 114 works were sold compared to 60 sales in 1963. A total of $$14,400.\overline{00}$ was paid to artists by the Gallery. These figures are to us very impressive, especially since they represent only the second year of a full scale Gallery operation.

The interest in original art in Omaha is growing and the potential of the gallery is great. We look forward to increased activity in 1965. We are beginning a program of increased promotion of the Gallery. Joslyn will soon complete its current membership drive and we plan to reach all new members as well as the present list.

As you know, our Gallery judgings are held every four months and are open to anyone who wishes to submit work. Each judging is very exciting for those of us working in the Gallery and we look forward to seeing the current work being done in Omaha. In past judging, we have accepted about 50-60% of those works submitted. We are anxious, of course, to present the best quality work and we have been extremely pleased with the large numbers of entries and hope that this will continue. The three-man jury (1 local artist, 1 Joslyn staff member, 1 member of the Gallery Volunteer Committee) changes with each judging. This personnel formula is used by many other rental Galleries and keeps the jury from becomming set in their opinions.

Instructions for entering the April judging are enclosed. Our next Opening will be on Thursday, April 8th, from 7 to 9 P. M.
