Dear Friend:

Your favor of the 25th, relative to the matter of levying income tax on advertisements, is at hand. Your idea strikes me very favorably, but I fear it will be hopeless to attempt to get such taxes. In the so-called zone system, adopted more than a year ago, an attempt was made in this direction so far as postage was concerned, but the newspapers have been kicking about it ever since and making trouble, and their influence is so strong and they are so aggressive I fear it will be hard work to get such taxation adopted; although my own opinion is that it would be an eminently just and fair tax.



# Pound Papers (batch two) Letters from Dr. Riggs.

Lac qui Parle Mission June 21 1839.

Asks the Dakota word for English "to serve or minister too"....has begun translation of Matthew....Sermon on the mount difficult for people to understand....women cannot understand it as ageneral truth....can understand if you don't want anyone to rip your tent nor kill your hogs then you must not do such things.

Traverse des Sioux Sept. 28 1839. Hopes Pound brothers will translate some of the gospels or epitles this winter.

Lac qui parle dission Dec. 28 1839. School flourishes about 40 this week .... Communion last Sabbath about 80 Indians present...one woman recieved into church...number of others wish to join... I am afraid of most of them....Mrs.Renville probably will not recover...Renville girls not at school last 8 weeks...for last two months Mr.Renville has come here almost every week to translate not often, over 20 verses at a time.... I send you a part of his translations... you will find some verses good and others by no means near the text....Dr.W.is finishing copying my vocabulary..has added all the words he could get .... will be the largest unless you have a better one... "Doct.is learning to pray in Sioux considerably. The says it is terriblemen (sic) but he is not the first one that has thought so. " I have been trying to translate the Acts. Eagle melp has read it nearly all.... he is a very valuable assistant ... says he is ashamed did not try to have the printed books more correct before Doct. W. went on..... great many blunders in them, especially in the Shoka one....he wnats to have themm all corrected and printed again down to the Doctors cathechism and Mr. Stevens first book...bopes P. will prosecute translation "write and revise and rewrite"....the Bible is worth writing and rewriting.

Lac qui parle Mission April 1 1840. Glad to learn that you have made a dictionary and grammar and commenced translating....thinks best way to learn Sioux is by writing....you seem to think T have learned much more Sioux than 1 have...Mazakutemani told me Mrs Denton was before me if so I ought to be ashamed.

Long paragraph in regar to the use of the nasal N and the doubling of Ns. "Thave no desire to have the language more than half Ns"

P.S. May 9. Water so high Indian could not cross... Tatemina will go to morrow...about 10th of June you may expect to see Mary Ann and myself...the Warpetowans more determined not to hear the gospel Tewashtake has been sick. "I asked him whether he prayed to God now. He said he did not. A week ago he prayed very much but he only got worde and on that account he left off. A

Lac qui parle Mission oct. 3 1840. Long agcount of trip to Missouri River ... Advises Pound not to settle on the east side of the Miss... Dr. W. of same opinion... thinks Traverse des Sioux as favorable as any one in the region. P.S. Dr.W. will meet one or both of you at Le Blancs Falk or Spring to look out a place for a station.

Lac qui parle Jan. 2. 1841. I took your Sioux grammar and the small one T ande and made another with some alterations and additions ... arranged the verbs differently.... "your grammar I consider the nucleus I have tried to gather a few little crystals and put around it. I found it more full and in every way better than I expected"....Did you see Mr. Renvilles translation of first seven chapters of John?... ... ( noct.W. had translated John) thinks it best to have Mr. Renville if so disposed to finish that gospel as preperation for the next printing....importanta to have Mr. Renville feel that we value his translation...maybe proper to have a gospel printed with his impress...we may make translations nearer the original yet in language his will be superior...expects Pound brothers have finished Luke...has been trying to measure some of the heights and depths of Paul...before Xmas I marked Mr. Renville and Tate. Jan25. Dont care for any more partnership letters ... cannot judge of Col. Bruce Is plan. asks to have his watch sent up by Dupuis. . Mary Ann joins.

Lac qui parle Mission Apr. 17 1841.
expresses opinion that pronouns must in all cases be joined with the verbs adjectives and adverbs to which they relate also poss.prons...
... Riya and Ya he would write separately ... so compounds with na and Daka etc etc etc... remarks on the Titonwan dialect

Taverse des Sioux July 9 1841... "Today the Governor (Doty) bolds his council... Little doubts treaty will be made with modifications... you have heard of the plan; if not get it from Mr. Sibley... contemplates setting up Indians in their own villages as American farmers as soon as they wish ... provision for schooling... and pleased with the Govs. views about civilizing the Indians... we must not be faithless but believing.

Contemplated a history of the Mission...refers to a proposition of for a new station at Big Stone lake...Aug 2. we send down Bird with the polls...14 votes were cast in this precinct. They must be very valuable for they will cost more than 2 dollards each...cannot advise about your brother's duty to serve (in legislature)...is at work on history of the Mission...last Sabbath the Indians killed a cow for us.

Lacquiparle Nov.19 1849. Writer did not attend the treaty making in 1849...Indinas from below bring strange stories about opposition to missionaries..."if the Faribaults and others are going to try to send off missionaries it may be well to let them know that they may have hard work" Eagle "elp and 19 others send a protest to Governor Ramsay against this....writer has written some articles which he sends to the St Paul Chronicle and Register.

Lacquiparle March 22 1850. Mr.McLeod brought mail..3 or 4 months papers all in a bunch, gives one a headache and a partial insanity...
...seems my papers on education made more stir than I anticipated.
Complains St Paul papers spell it Dakota with an h on the end, why dont

Likes parts of Mc aleod's piece very well .... told him he had perverted some expressions....told him I had taken more pains than any other member of the Mission to represent the trade favorably and therfore he ought to be careful to do me full justice.... is inclined to believe that Sibley and McCleod are favorable to education among the Dakotas. Considers them both committed on that point ... proposed that in a treaty with the upper Indians they should not be allowed to choose and at end of every year appropriation not expended shall reverst to the Treasury. ... Governor Ramsay's plan of disposing of the \$50.000 strikes me favorably....number of men here who talk of being white men in the advent of a treaty....hopes they will. Wakanmanni almost ready to come out on the Lord's side, but many obstacles, he talked of marrying one of his wives and putting the other one away, but neither would have him... average attendance Sabbath during winter about; 30 Sabbath school 17. Mr. Adam's day school dwindled down and stopped a month ago ... if sewing had been introduced 20 or more girls might have been kept to present time but Mr. Adams was not favorable... is making some progress in lexicon... hopes to finish it in May of Mr. Aiton intends leaving the Mission we would prefer spring meeting at Oak Grove rather than trapse away down to Remnicaa" (Mr. Aiton was at Redwing) ... no buffalo near, Indians have done nothing all winter but eat corn and fish a little...snow still very deep. N.B.

Lacquiparle Jan. 3 1845: gossip about matters at the Mission...

A Mr. Riggs in Feb. went out and preached to Indians hunting buffalos...

...wishes to make further progress in the Dakota language...asked Mr.Pound to write him a prayer in Sioux...tells of a little boy badly burned, frozen and starved. Old Aperota when drunk threw him on the fire. We call him George....Wants to know if Mr.Poind finds it as easy to pray as duty requires. "Pray for usi

Traverse des Sioux meb.23 1849. Mr. Riggs finished translating the Psalms and the Shorter catechism and is writing at his grammar....

coffin made for a young woman who hung herself because not willing to live with the man who had bought her...the man is brother to the widow Renville

The widow Renville, her name Tate ....reads and knits...seldom comes to church...does not hold on to the right way...hopes she is exerting an influence in favor of learning...reads and knits some...Chief Mazasha comes to church when he is nearen enough...generally 12 or 15 present....neglects cannot learn Dakota without neglecting duties ....Fray for me....asks again for a prayer in Dakota....tell your daughters to learn to sing as well as they can...the Lord reigneth let us rejoice.

Travers des Sioux Jan. -- 7 1850. Has letter from children in Felicity A (?) Amos going to school. We expect them all to come out with Mr. Hopkins in the Spring...Mr. Potter preached yesterday

Traverse des Sious Feb. 26. 1850. very glad to hear that Mr. Titus was rejoicing in the hope of eternal salvation...hears that Noah has joined the church at Kaposia...At Lacquiparle Mr. Bird's wife Anpohas joined the church...desires that Mr. Potter may not leave them., Hopes that Mr. Riggs Letter in the Chronicle will do good...reference to a letter of McLeodJis to Potter...has spent much time with Indians grinding axes and exchangin potatoes for corn and tallowete...We have 5 cows...Mr. Potter found two bee trees.

March 7. Broken Head wants potatoes and so forth in pay for land ploughed and wood cut off some 10 miles square... they think wood is a cash article, and that they ought to have powder, lead, flour and pork

Indians here have supply of corn and deer meat and have not troubled much with begging...had monthly concert all in English...number of Indians present...some perhaps had never seen a prayer meeting before and were disposed to laugh...Oh that this poor people did feel their need of pardon. May the Lord open their eyes and change their hearts. We all have need of wisdom...I feel that i am a worm and no man. But am not my own and the work is not mine. The Lord of the harvest will see that the work is done. Tate, the widow Renville had a still-born child, no boards for a box for it. A woman here is much afflicted and her father has given many blankets to have her doctored by Rattling Gourds.

The first three letters were addressed to Saml.W. Pound at St Peters the fourth letter was the same at Oak Grove, St. Peters. The last three to Prairieville.

The latest regulations of the War Department with reference to commutation for uniforms make it necessary that all students taking military training should provide themselves with the standard government regulation olive drab, wool, rookie uniform with cap and leggings.

This means that the cadet gray suits used heretofore will not be used hereafter for military purposes. All first-year students who are required to take military training and all other students taking work in the military department will have to provide themselves with the appropriate new uniform before October 20.

The University authorities regret exceedingly that students already in possession of cadet gray suits will not be able to substitute them for the new uniforms now required by the government, but there seems to be no alternative. Under the circumstances it is assumed that the cadet gray suits will be worn as civilian dress at the University.

Obviously the University can purchase the new uniforms at reduced prices. The contract price is \$23.65 for the complete outfit, which is much cheaper than the retail price for the same material. Bills for this amount will be furnished students immediately after the opening of college, October 10, and they will be required to pay the sum indicated on or before October 20.

A telegram from the War Department brings the information that students who go on in the junior and senior years in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps will be allowed commutation for uniforms.

June 12th, 1918.

My dear Sir:

We are living in such exciting times that untrue charges are frequently made against men in public life. Justice demands that before such accusations are believed they be investigated. Adverse criticism of a public official should be based on his own stand on questions involved and his reasons therefor, on actual facts, rather than on what others may erroneously write or say of him on account of personal interest or misinformation. As your Governor, I am anxious to have you know my every official act and the reasons for it before you decide the justice or injustice of any position taken.

More than fifteen years ago, I publicly took the stand that labor had the same right to organize as capital and am of the same opinion now. For several years, I represented, in the state legislature, the labor ward in which I now live and was, at that time, named as one of seven members selected from the house membership to be commended by the joint labor legislation board for work done on behalf of labor. When Lieutenant Governor, I appointed labor committees which were satisfactory to labor and which secured legislation favorable to labor.

An examination of the facts, therefore, will show that before and since becoming Governor I have earnestly striven for what would be to the best interest of employes. One of the last illustrations of this attitude is the appointment of an arbitration board which has already adjusted numerous disputes and was, through my efforts, given such powers as to compel recognition of the right long contended for by labor to arbitrate all questions as to pay and hours.

Knowing that laboring men are loyal and patriotic citizens and desire to give as well as to receive fair treatment, I will at all times gladly submit my record for your consideration.

were assembled at Oswego and quartered in the fort there for a period of a week or ten days, then suddenly allowed to go to our homes. The final battle had been fought and Richmond had fallen. We were not mustered out for we had not been mustered in.

In converstation with General C. C. Andrews recently, I spoke with deep gratification and full knowledge of the difference in public sentiment now and in 1865 toward conscription. To him I related the circumstances in my own life as told here. It should further be said that families and friends of drafted men, and in some cases the towns where they resided, were purchasing substitutes for the conscripts. Pressure was brought to bear upon my family and me to secure exemption from military service in that way. That I refused to do. Now here is the point, the only reason i have for referring to this matter, in writing you. I have not thought it worth while to discuss it with any one, since my conversation with General Andrews.

He advised me to take my case to our representative in Congress and to one or both senators, and ask for a pension or money payment from the Federal government, on the ground that I had stood ready to serve my country, had suffered hardship and been deprived of my liberty for the public good. I have not up to this time very seriously considered the matter with a view to future action. What do you think of it?

There might arise a question, I think, as to whether responsibility rested with State or nation, in this case.

Because of the fact that you have been called upon for heavy subscriptions for War work during the past two years, it had been determined by the Directors of the Minneapolis Fresh Air Fund & Outing Association, that no appeal for funds would be made this year.

Last Saturday I received your letter informing me of the writing for the public prints about the Dakota mission and traders. I amsurprised that Mr. Riggs should say that the Fur Co.have never opportunity posed us or to that effect. So far as I can understand the matter, the general influence of the traders is in opposition to civilation and I do not doubt but that some of them, to say the least, care not how much the Indians, and missionaries ntoo, are involved in trouble both here and hereafter, provided their business may prosper and their reputation esp cape injury. Still, such is the addr ss of H. H. S. that Mr. Potter when he came up to live at Thaverse said to me " I think SIbley is your friend I think he wishes you well" etc. Bro.
