Further my letter of December 27 acknowledging your letter of December 24 about certain train crew changes incidental to withdrawal of Trains 41 and 42: I am again writing you in Mr. Donnelly absence concerning this matter.

When we got your letter of December 24 we then had no knowledge of any crew changes because of discontinuance of Trains 41 and 42. Inquiry of our west-end officers indicates that such train schedule re-arrangement has not disturbed crew situation at Tacoma.

We are not clear as to your comment about East Auburn lay-over for Tacoma passengers. Train No. 1 arrives at East Auburn at 6:00 A.M., departing at 6:10 A.M. Train No. 413, No. 1's connection for Tacoma, leaves East Auburn at 6:12 A.M., or two minutes later than No. 1's departure. Perhaps I have not understood your comment about No. 1's connection, and If so I wish you would write me again.

As you state in your letter, we must frequently make movements in the interest of economy. This applies to our passenger service where, for some years past, we have had to face alarming decreases in revenue. We are glad, however, that changes which were made incidental to discontinuance of trains 41 and 42 were made without causing any train or enginemen to move away from Tacoma.

On October 7 last I wrote you about locating the Puyallup and Summer Fruit Growers' Association on our line at Puyallup or just west of Meeker Junction, the plan contemplating the construction by the Association of a cannery and precooling plant, at a cost of approximately \$40,000. The land on which these facilities are being constructed is owned by the Railway Company and is leased to the Association. In addition, we have worked out an arrangement whereby the Northwestern Improvement Company will advance the funds necessary to construct the cannery and precooling plant, repayment to be made by the Association at the rate of \$5000 per annum with interest at six percent. A part of the arrangement involves the furnishing by the Railway Company, at its own expense, of certain trackage to serve the plant, and I now enclose third copy of Seattle Division AFE ED No. 36, of 1928, to cover, the estimated net cost of which is \$12,560, with a charge to Additions and Betterments of \$11.772. It is estimated that the revenue to be obtained by having the Association located on our tracks will be about \$60,000 the first year, with increases of from five to ten percent annually during the subsequent five-year period.

The leage of the land and the financing of the construction of the cannery and precooling plant by the Northwestern Improvement Company were authorized by the Northern Pacific Board on October 19th, and on November 16 I informally authorized the construction of the necessary trackage. The latter item is covered by item No. 236 of the 1928 budget, and I recommend formal approval by the Committee or Board.

For several years past the Burlington, Union Pacific and Northern Pacific have assisted in financing the Yellowstone Park Hotel Company and the Yellowstone Park Transportation Company by advancing funds secured by the joint notes of the Hotel and Transportation Companies and mortgages covering certain properties of those companies. The advances now outstanding are as follows:

Burlington Union Pacific Northern Pacific Total \$ 154,000 154,000 154,000 \$ 462,000

The advances made by the Northern Pacific are secured by notes and a mortgage on the real properties, leases, franchises, etc. of the Hotel Company and Transportation Company. The advances made by the Burlington and Union Pacific are secured by notes and a mortgage on automobiles, tools, real estate rights in lands and leases, machine shops, paint shops, garages, etc., the mortgage securing the Burlington and Union Pacific advances having been made subsequent to the mortgage securing advances made by the Northern Pacific.

Hr. Child advises that he needs, and is asking for, additional funds which will bring the total indebtedness up to \$1,000,000 -in other words, \$538,000 of new money -- and it is suggested that the
total indebtedness should be assumed in equal parts by the four railroads serving the Park, the present notes and mortgages to be cancelled
and new joint notes of the Hotel Company, Transportation Company and
the Yellowstone Park Camps Company to be issued, secured by a blanket
mortgage of those three companies jointly. While I was in Chicago
the latter part of September last, I discussed this proposal with Mr.
Holden and Mr. Gray, who indicated they would be willing to go along
on this basis, and I advised Mr. Child that the Morthern Pacific would
do so. At that time Mr. Byram was in Europe. Late in October, at Mr.
hild's request, I talked with Mr. Byram who stated that he was willing
to join the other three roads in assuming one-fourth of the total proposed indebtedness; subsequent to that, however, I learned that the

receivers of the St. Paul Road advised that while they had no objection to that road taking one-fourth of the indebtedness, they felt that during receivership no money should be advanced to reduce the amounts previously advanced by the other three railroads prior to the time the St. Paul Road was serving the Park. No further action has been taken to complete the proposed arrangement pending the release of the St. Paul Road from receivership.

Now that the receivership has been terminated, I am bringing the matter to your attention and will appreciate advice as to whether or not the St. Paul Road will go along with the plan as proposed. If so, it will mean that your company will advance \$250,000 and each of the other three companies \$96,000, thereby equalizing the total indebtedness.

- 3. Chart showing comparison of 1926 and 1923 Class one roads and Northern Pacific, revenue ton miles, revenue per ton mile, gross ton miles per train hour and net railway operating income.
- 4. Chart of Class one roads and Northern Pacific 1926 and 1916, percentage of increase or decrease in revenue ton miles, revenue per ton mile and net railway operating income, the latter being based on standard return.
- 5. Statement, table 1, showing changes in relation of various basic data Class 1 roads and Northern Pacific 1926 as compared with 1916 and 1923. Northern Pacific data is outlined on chart No. 1.
- 6. Statement by regions and for Northern Pacific indicating comperison of 1916, 1923 and 1926 of basic operating data.

It was found impracticable to chart Northern Pacific with Class 1 figures on basis shown on page 2 and therefore separate chart for basic data for Northern Pacific was made Chart No. 1).

The important comparison appears to be the relationship of succeeding years to 1911, and therefore comparison of ratio of various elements to year 1911 of the Northern Pacific and Class 1 roads has been shown on Chart 2.

In stating investment in road and equipment for Northern Pacific it has been considered advisable to adjust figures for years 1911 to 1919 inclusive so as to exclude adjustment in connection with land department transactions and other items transferred from account 701. No reduction has been made in investment for Class 1 roads for country as a whole.

Income account figures for Northern Pacific are on basic as stated, although such figures include some items which may apply to a preceding period to the year in which accounting was made, such as for instance mail pay audited in 1920 but applicable to 1917, 1918 and 1919, and equipment adjustment in 1922 applicable in part to preceding years. I note that comparison of increase in gross ton miles per train hour and net railway operating income is stressed. This comparison depends largely on situation in year used on base for comparison, While Northern Pacific gross ton miles per train hour increased from 19,841 in 1923 to 22,950 in 1926, or a ratio 115.7 for latter year, net railway operating income increased to 151.6% of 1923 It will be noted that Northern Pacific 1923 showing figure. as to gross ton miles per train hour was somewhat better than for Northwestern region which undoubtedly explains a somewhat poorer showing in 1926 for rate of increase on Northern Pacific.

In re-stating figures for Class 1 roads some minor discrepancies were noted and adjustment made for purpose of comparison with Northern Pacific.

Since receipt of Mr. Johnson's letter I have been analyzing situation and will give you what I have developed to date.

You will find following figures which are cents for fuel per 1000 gross ton miles in freight service, exclusive of locomotive and tender:

The Great Northern, you will note, has made a better showing than we have, which I explain by the fact that in 1920 they were using in Sand Coulee a very inefficient fuel, whereas in 1927, in practically the same district, they were using oil. Northern Pacific figures are distorted in that cents as indicated are based on Northwestern Improvement Company selling price to the Northern Pacific. This distortion, however, is equally true for both periods.

The Great Northern also makes a better showing in gross ton miles per train hour as is indicated in the following tabulation:

Referring to conversation with you last Thursday about group insurance for the Camas Prairie:

The Camas Prairie has its own group insurance policy and this covers all Camas Prairie employes carried on Camas Prairie rolls. Northern Pacific train and enginemen in service on the Grangeville line are covered by Northern Pacific policy, and Union Pacific train and enginemen employed on the Riparia-Lewiston line are covered by the Union Pacific policy. As you know, we do not bill against tenant lines for any part of the group insurance cost, and in the past, with mileage and train service on the Grangeville and Riparia-Lewiston lines more or less equal the amounts expended by the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific were presumably about equal, so that bill against the Camas Prairie would have been unnecessary even if it had been our practice to bill against joint facility tenants for group insurance cost. With the addition to the Camas Prairie system, however, of the mileage between Lewiston and Stites, and Orofino and Headquarters. the number of Northern Pacific train and enginemen in Camas Prairie service will be substantially greater than the number of Union Pacific employes in that service as the trains on the lines in question are to be manned exclusively by Northern Pacific employes.

In view of the fact that the Camas Prairie has a group insurance policy of its own, I think that some scheme should be worked out whereby the parent lines will be reimbursed by the Camas Prairie for that part of the cost of the premiums paid by the parent lines on train and enginemen which their service with the Camas Prairie Company bears to their total service in a given year.

In addition to the trainmen, the employes named in Mr. Mraz's letter of the 23rd instant will become permanent Camas Prairie employes, and I think that the insurance which they now have with the Northern Pacific should be canceled, and that they should be covered by the Camas Prairie policy.

As you know, we have not billed against tenant lines for any part of the group insurance cost. As to the Camas Prairie, that company has its own group insurance policy, the Union Pacific has its own policy, and the Northern Pacific has its own policy. The Camas Prairie policy gives coverage to all Camas Prairie employes carried on Camas Prairie rolls. The Northern Pacific policy covers Northern Pacific train and enginemen employed part or whole time on the Grangeville line. The Union Pacific policy covers Union Pacific train and enginemen employed on the Riparia-Lewiston line. In the past, with mileage and train service more or less equal, presumably the amounts expended by the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific for coverage of train and enginemen has been about equal. With the additional mileage between Lewiston and Stites, and between Orofino and Headquarters becoming a part of the Camas Prairie system, the Northern Pacific train and enginemen will far outweigh the Union Pacific train and enginemen for the reason that trains operating on the Stites Branch and Orofino Branch are to be manned by Northern Pacific employes.

In addition to the trainmen, the employes named in Mr. Mraz's letter of the 23rd instant will become permanent Camas Prairie employes, and I think that the insurance which they now have with the Northern Pacific should be canceled, and that they should be covered by the Camas Prairie policy.

As to train and enginemen, I think some scheme should be worked out whereby both the Northern Pacific and the Union Pacific will be reimbursed by the Camas Prairie for that part of the annual premiums paid by the parent lines on those employes which their service with the company bears to their total service in a given year with the parent line.

You will recall conversation (telephone, I think) about providing surviving widows of twenty-year pass recipients with annual transportation.

There would be, naturally, a kindly reaction toward us if we made effective such additional annual pass concession, but when we look into situation to see what it involves, we rather hesitate to do it.

A check of our records indicates that to inaugurate this practice would necessitate the issuance of approximately 503 annual passes to widows coming under the above classification. If we were to take care of their families a considerably larger number of passes would be involved. We are also quite sure there are more than 508 surviving widows as we have record of only this number, so that list would increase as time went on.

As related to proposal, we are faced, even with gradually decreasing forces, with the issuance of a larger number of "G" annual passes every year. This is indicated in the following tabulation:

I rather think we should hesitate considerably before we take on any added annual pass obligations in view of the situation outlined above. Furthermore, and I think this is the most important argument against it, we would have a lot of trouble keeping track of these widows and we would have difficulty knowing what they were doing with transportation;

"Your letter twenty-first regarding purchase of coal from MC&I Co. as discussed with Woodworth and Freeman at Billings and where it was proposed by Freeman to furnish three thousand tons per month during period only from August 15th to March 15th, size through five inch and over one inch shaker screen. Size through four inch and over one inch may do for locomotives, but through three or four inch and over three fourths screen would be an inferior coal to Red Lodge No. 2 nut. It would be seriously against the improvement Company interest for railway to purchase any coal from Bear Creek from March 15 to August 15. Replying to your letter of the 19th instant, in regard to rental for track material leased for use at the Lucky Strike mine at Zap:

I do not think that we can burden the new owners of the property with any indebtedness incurred by the former owners, nor do I think that depreciation which should have been paid by the former owners should be credited to the new owners. However, the valuations for track material furnished under the contract of 1920 were based on a value of \$45 per ton for rail, and in the contract of 1922 the valuations were based on a rail price of \$40 per ton. Both of these prices are now too high and I think that what should be done would be to say to the new owners of the property that we are willing to make a contract with them on the basis of \$35 per ton for rail, which is about the price we would have used had we been making an entirely new deal when they took over the property in the latter part of 1927.

The use of the lower price for rail will, I presume, result in lower prices for frogs and switches, and possibly tie plates and rail braces.

If a new contract is made it should, I think, be effective as of the date the new owners purchased the property, and upon receipt of advice from you that the new contract has been negotiated, I will instruct Mr. Sweney to cancel the bills outstanding under the old contract.

With further reference to your letter of the 23rd ultimo, in regard to certain data which you desire to obtain to enable you to make a survey of the prospective future of the coal industry:

I attach a statement which I have had prepared which will give the answers to questions 1 and 2 of the questionnaire enclosed with your letter of the 31st ultimo. Our replies to the remainder of the questions included in your questionnaire are given below:

3. Northern Pacific uses five different kinds of coal, ranging from approximately 8750 BTU to 14,000 BTU per pound as fired. On the basis of dynamometer car tests, the average coal consumption per indicated horsepower hour is 4.9 pounds.

a - Estimated maximum quantity of coal per indicated HPHr is 10 pounds for the lowest quality and 4.0 pounds for the best quality of fuel. Fuel used in firing up and standby losses enroute is included in the estimate.

b - Average consumption per indicated HPHr ten years hence will quite likely be about the same as today, for increased use of cheaper grades of fuel will about offset savings due to use of more efficient locomotives.

4. Answered in 3-b above.

5. Data, taken on dynamometer car tests, of coal consumed by locomotives while standing at sidings, passing tracks, etc., indicates that this amounts to four to seven per cent of the total coal used enroute. Firing-up consumption in roundhouse will vary from six to ten per cent of total consumption en route.

- 6. In certain instances, where volume of traffic is sufficient, economies of electrification will justify the additional capital investment. Where power is furnished from steam-operated central stations, electrification should reduce coal consumption at drawbar over the best type of steam locomotives now entering service.
- 7. Electrification should save more fuel than would construction of multiple tracks to eliminate standby losses.
 - 8. a-Diesel electric locomotives of moderate size, suitable for light weight small-size passenger and freight trains, will no doubt be developed in the near future. The development of a Diesel electric locomotive able to handle economically heavy transcontinental passenger and freight trains is quite unlikely.

b-Diesel electric locomotives can be built to handle certain classes of switching operations equally as well as steam locomotives now do it.

Relative cost of the two types of locomotives, and the cost of coal and fuel oil in the territory under consideration will determine the economics of certain transportation operations by Diesel electric locomotives. Each case becomes a separate study.

- 9. Oil is superior to coal for locomotive fuel and is preferable when economy permits its use.
- 10. Length of locomotive runs has been increased, with an estimated reduction of standby losses of approximately \$128,000 per annum.
- ll. No experiments with powdered fuel for locomotives are being made on the Northern Pacific.
- 12. No Northern Pacific locomotives are using boosters under the tender.

I enclose third copy of Seattle Division AFE ED No. 2 of 1928 covering replacing of turntable at Auburn, Washington, at an estimated net cost of \$49,050, of which \$42,500 is chargeable to Additions and Betterments.

A few years ago a 100-foot turntable was authorized for Auburn but on account of developments with respect to new power possibilities it was decided to be inadvisable to install at Auburn a turntable of less than 115 feet in length; therefore the 100-foot table intended for Auburn was transferred to Jamestown and installed in 1926. The existing 85-foot table at Auburn is too short to properly handle the power operating in and out of that terminal, and Mr. Williamson recommends that it be replaced with a 115-foot table as proposed in the attached AFE. It is expected that with the installation of such a table it will be possible to eliminate one engine hostler on each shift.

My dear Mr. Elliott:

I hand you herewith Walla Walla Valley financial report for the month of December, 1927, from which you will note that the net income for the year 1927 was \$8,765.19 less than last year. This loss is due to a reduction in gross revenue of \$10,760, while it was only possible to make a reduction in operating expenses of about \$2,000.00.

In your letter of the 5th instant, you asked for an estimate showing the financial result to the Northern Pacific because of the ownership of this company. On Pebruary 7th last I wrote you giving a similar estimate for the year 1926. At that time we estimated the gross revenue to the Northern Pacific on business received from the Walla Walla Valley at \$250 per car and on business delivered to that company at \$65 per car. We also assumed that 40% of Northern Pacific gross earnings might be considered as net. During the year 1927 no important change in rates has been made and consequently the revenues per car used for the year 1926 may also be used for 1927. Applying those rates to the interchange of business produces a revenue of \$376,000 for business received from the Walla Walla Company, and \$35,945 on business delivered to that company, or a total of \$411,945. On a 40% basis this leaves a net revenue of \$164,778.

Last year in estimating the amount of revenue we would have obtained if the property had remained in private ownership, we assumed that the business would be divided 50% to the Northern Pacific and 50% to the Union Pacific. Using that basis this year, we produce \$82,389 as the return on the Northwestern Improvement Company investment in the property. This investment as of December 31, 1927, amounted to \$1,010,000, so that the return is a little better than 8%. As a matter of fact, I think it would be entirely fair to consider 50% of the gross as net instead

of the 40% we have assumed, and if the larger figure were used the return would be in excess of 10% on the investment. It should also be borne in mind that the Union Pacific might have purchased the property had we not done so and in that event we would have lost a very substantial part of the business which we enjoyed prior to the date of acquisition by us. I do not think there can be any question of the wisdom of our investment in this property, especially when we can show a return of at least 8% in a year which, because of frost damage, was not a good one.

Referring to your letter of January 17 about the issuance of lower rate bonds on the present market, using the money to buy in our 5's and 6's:

I talked over this matter with Mr. Gay before leaving New York, and I reached the conclusion which you reached that we have nothing to gain by any such move - and that any attempt to purchase our bonds in considerable volume would very quickly put them up to a price at which such financing as is suggested would be out of the question. Mr. Sturgis had made this suggestion to me some time before, and I tried to see him last Saturday before leaving New York, but he was not available.

I think too, as I believe you and I were agreed, that the requirements of our Capital Account are not such as to suggest the necessity or advisability of our putting out any new bonds or raising any new money at this time. It is true, the bond market is an exceptionally good one, and were our need of additional cash apparent, it would undoubtedly be a good time to put out a bond issue; but the only large expenditures that we have in contemplation during the present year are those which may be made in connection with the Brainerd and South Tacoma shops, and the Bitter Root Branch.

It is by no means certain that we shall decide to go ahead with the Brainerd and South Tacoma shop work, and if we do decide to do so, it will then be time enough to consider the advisability of selling bonds. I see nothing in present conditions to suggest that the terms on which our bonds might be sold would be less favorable six months hence than they are now.

Answering yours of the twenty-fifth about transportation matter with Doctor Cooney:

This situation is a particularly difficult one. I do not think any one could agree more heartily with you than I in your statement that the Doctor has been of tremendous assistance to us in many ways at Helena. For that reason I have taken quite a lot of time in the last two days to talk to Mr. Every and others in our organization here in St. Paul to see if we could not devise some way to give this thing to Doctor Cooney, for which he has contended for a good many years. After much thought and discussion I am simply not able to suggest anything.

The transportation privileges now accorded Doctor Cooney are in conformance with the Montana statutes as interpreted by thelaw Department, consequently, from standpoint of existing relationship between Doctor Cooney and the Railway Company, we can go no further than we go at present. Next we have as you know a medical consulting relationship between the Railway Company and certain Helena physicians, but such Helena physicians as consultants are only accorded identically the same transportation privileges as are possessed by Doctor Cooney. Finally, the best opinions I can get here indicate that we could not do what Doctor Conney desires unless we were to put him on our payroll in some full time medical or surgical capacity, which would obviously mean that Doctor Cooney would have to give up his private practice - this is, of course, absurd. I think you know that if there was any way in which we could do this without getting our-selves in trouble, we would certainly be glad to do it. I wish you would be good enough to explain this story in some detail to the Doctor as I want him to at least feel we have exhausted every effort before we concluded that his request would have to be declined.

Dear Mr. Porbes:

Your letter of January 3 and my acknowledgement of January 6 with reference to extent to which it is found necessary to work certain railroad employes a 7-day week. I have taken the time to have made a careful analysis of this situation on the Northern Pacific and the facts are as follows:

The Northern Pacific employs 24,950 men. Of this number 836 (or less than 3% per cent), telegraphers, clerks, draw bridge tenders, pumpers and miscellaneous employes are required to work a 7-day week. These employes are practically all located at isolated points where, in order to relieve them one day in seven, it would be necessary in some instances to send relief employe as high as 200 miles. None of these employes can be described as engaged in severe manual labor. They may get relief at any time for short or long vacations when they can rest or travel the equivalent of the Sundays on which they have been required to perform service.

Exact statistics are not available but I am confident that the number of seven day positions on the Northern Pacific has been reduced in the last fifteen years from about 15 per cent to 35 per cent, the ratio today. Efforts are being made to reduce the number of these 7-day positions still further.

We have 2802 locomotive engineers, locomotive firemen, yard train men, road train men, certain telegraphers, roundhouse, car repair and miscellaneous employes who are required to work on Sundays in order that transcentinental through passenger and freight service be not interrupted, but conditions under which they work are such that relief men are available so that they may rest one or more days in seven whenever they are so inclined. We do not classify these employes as required to work seven days per week.

There then remain 21,312 employes who are not required

Herewith third copy of System AFE ED No. 1 covering the proposed purchase of four power tamping machines, at a cost of \$9600, all of which is chargeable to Additions & Betterments.

Our operating and engineering department officers have closely followed the development of the tamping machines during the past few years and it is their opinion that, in order to get the full benefit of maintenance economies in connection with the extended use of washed gravel ballast, additional power tamping machines should be purchased. Track that is tamped with power machines retains its surface for a longer period of time and permits of lengthening sections and a reduction of the number of men in section crews. It is difficult to estimate with any degree of accuracy the savings in dollars and cents to be realized from the operation of power tamping machines, but our people are of the opinion that a return of twenty percent on the investment is approximately correct. The important economies, however, occur in the reduction of expenditures for labor, which in turn are reflected in the cost of track maintenance per mile.

These power machines are included in items 287 and 292 of the 1928 budget, and I recommend formal approval by the Committee or Board.

The 1928 budget carries an item, No. 442, in the amount of \$130,000 covering the purchase of three gas-electric cars, and we are hopeful that when we are ready to place the order we will be able to obtain a better price than that indicated in the AFE. In any event, the return on the higher cost is sufficiently attractive to warrant approval of the AFE. Will you please submit it to the Committee or Board for that purpose?
