My dear Mr. Elliott:

About a year ago the City of Spokane took up with our west end people the question of separation of grades at Freya Street, Spokane, and while we were of the opinion that the amount of traffic crossing our tracks at that point did not warrant such a separation, we were not able to secure an abandonment or even a postponement of the project.

The estimated cost of the proposed viaduct was \$55,000, and as the City of Spokane is a city of the first class, we could have been compelled, under the laws of Washington, to bear the whole cost. Judge Reid and the Engineering officers, however, negotiated with the city officials with the result that an agreement has been reached that the railway company will bear two-thirds of the cost and in no event more than \$40,000.00, the city to pay the balance of the cost. This agreement has been executed and I am in receipt of advice from Mr. Coman that the city will contract to have the work done at a cost of \$42,110.00. Our proportion of the cost will, therefore, be a little more than \$28,000.00.

In due course an AFE will be submitted to you for approval by the Board, and I am giving you advice at this time so that you will be in possession of the facts when the contract is reported by Mr. Relf, as it will be in regular course of business.

Herewith third copy of Montana Division AFE ED No. 119 covering the replacing of pile bridge No. 233 over Prickly Pear Creek, East Helena, with three double track 30-ft. girder spans, at an estimated net cost of \$30,010, of which \$16,800 is chargeable to Additions and Betterments. For this work it is the intention to construct new masonry and to use second-hand steel from the Mississippi River bridge at Minneapolis. The comparison of the cost is on the basis of the total estimate, but if the out-of-pocket cost is used as the base, the annual cost for the permanent structure will be less than the annual cost if renewed in kind. Item 114 of the 1928 budget provides for an expenditure of \$12,000 for doing this work, which is some \$8,000 less than the AFE estimate. The excess of the AFE is accounted for largely by the fact that the budget estimate was built up on the basis of a single track structure.

Also enclosed is third copy of Tacoma Division AFE ED No. 7 covering the replacement of 140-ft. Howe Truss bridge No. 23 over the Lewis River, near Moulton, Washington, with a 160-ft. steel span, at an estimated net cost of \$24,550, of which \$10,730 is chargeable to Additions and Betterments. Here again it is proposed to use one of the old 160-ft. double track spans from bridge 12-l over the Mississippi River at Minneapolis, changing the span into a single track structure. This will necessitate new masonry at the east end, the work for which, however, will be relatively small. Item 164 of the 1928 budget provides for an expenditure of \$25,000 for this work. The annual maintenance cost for a permanent structure is \$1,473 as compared with an annual cost of \$2,500 if it is renewed in kind.

I recommend formal approval by the Committee or Board of . these two AFE's.

On January 28 Mr. Donnelly advised Mr. Marlow that, for the Northern Pacific, he would be willing to sell our stock (133-1/3 shares) for cash, at \$142.50 per share, or would give Mr. Westbrook an option to purchase it at any time within two years at that price plus 5% interest. The Great Northern and Burlington were agreeable to this proposition for those companies. Subsequently, Mr. Marlow modified the proposal to the extent that instead of paying cash Mr. Westbrook would pay not less than \$10 per share per year for a period of five years, the balance to be paid at the expiration of the five-year period. The Great Northern is willing to sell on that basis. Mr. Donnelly prefers to stick to the original proposal outlined in his letter of January 28. Mr. Holden pointed out that the original agreement dated July 27, 1923, provides for uniform action in making sales of the stock and that none of it shall be sold otherwise except by mutual consent. He pointed out also that to him it seemed undesirable for any one of the three companies to sell its stock on a partial payment basis because of difficulties which would arise in the event of default during the five-year term proposed. It is his judgment that it is better to stand on the original proposition. The Great Northern, in the meantime, has indicated it is willing to consider modifying the agreement of 1923. under which its stock could be sold independently of that held by the Northern Pacific and Burlington.

Under our contract with the Clearwater Timber Company, covering shipments from the new Orofino line, we have, as you know, to make a refund of 1½ on forest products moving from the new line to points east of Beach where the rate is 1½ over the Lewiston rate. The contract provides that these refunds shall be made each year and applied on shipments transported in that year, the account to be closed upon the basis of each year's operations.

I have been asked the question as to what is to be done with respect to forest products moving from the new line under transit privileges where the shipment originates in one year and the movement is completed during the next year. As I understand it, transit privileges are usually for a period of twelve months, so that if a shipment originated late in the year 1928, for instance, the owners would have the right to keep the shipment stored until some time late in 1929.

Do you think that business of the character described above should be entitled to the refund of 1½%? If we consider this business as being entitled to the refund it will not be possible for us to strictly comply with the terms of the contract providing for the closing of accounts at the end of each year, and as a practical matter, I assume that refunds granted on this business would then be taken into account in the year in which the transit privileges were taken advantage of.

I have not yet instructed our accounting officers and before doing so I intend to take the matter up with the Union Pacific people to make sure that both companies take the same position.

Under the contract with the Clearwater Timber Company covering shipments from the new Orofino Line, we have, as you know, to make a refund of lig on forest products moving from the new line to points east of Beach or east of Cheyenne when the rate is lig over the Lewiston rate. The contract also provides that the accounting for these refunds shall be closed with each year's operations.

I have been asked to say how shipments moving under transit privileges are to be handled in connection with the refund. There will, of course, be certain shipments moving under transit privileges which will move from the new line in a given year but will not move from their transit resting place until the following year. Under a strict application of the contract I assume that the Timber Company would not be entitled to receive a refund on such shipments, but our people feel that transit arrangements were contemplated when the contract was made and that the Timber Company is really entitled to refund on this class of shipment. Of course it would not be desirable to keep the accounts open until all such shipments have moved from their resting place and their destination is definitely known, and it is my thought that if the allowance is to be made we should say to the Timber Company that the refund will apply on the business for the year in which movement is made from the transit point rather than from the date of shipment from the Orofino Line.

The narrative of the AFE outlines the existing situation. In trains 1, 2, 3 and 4 the baggage cars are lighted from the mail cars, which are equipped with axle lighting squipment. During the past year there have been several light failures in mail cars, particularly during the winter months when, due to weather conditions, belts slip, thus creating an overload on the mail car generators. The result at such times has been poor light, not only in the baggage but in the mail cars as well where, as stated, some failures have occurred. Light failures in mail cars subject the company to possible fines when, as a result, first class mail is delayed. Just recently two representatives from the Post Office Department at Washington called on Mr. Goodhue with reference to a number of failures involving fines. Mr. Goodhue pointed to our record in endeavoring to keep our postal cars in good condition in every way and our prompt attention in applying corrective methods where required, and finally succeeded in inducing the Post Office representatives to recommend withdrawal of the fines.

Under the circumstances I think it necessary during the coming summer months to equip the baggage cars in trains 1, 2, 3 and 4 with axle lighting device so that these cars will be properly lighted when the fall season begins, and I recommend formal approval of the AFE by the Committee or Board. It is not a budget item.

The proposed article is returned herewith after having been corrected by our Mechanical officers. You will note that sheet two has been entirely rewritten because of changed conditions which have taken place on the system since your article was prepared.

Table 4, showing enginehouse labor costs for 1925, has been changed to include the labor charges at points where through passenger engines received attention by roundhouse forces. The change, you will note, increases the labor cost at Dickinson so as to exceed that for 1927. As a matter of fact, the roundhouse at Dickinson was practically closed on August 12, 1924, when our engine runs were extended through that point. A small force was retained there to take care of switch engines and the main line way freight engine which terminates at that point. The total enginehouse labor expense for Dickinson in 1924 amounted to \$20,621.73 compared with \$18,383.33 in 1927. A small force is also still employed at Forsyth and Paradise to take care of switch engines and local way freight power. The roundhouse at Kootenai, however, was closed completely on May 26. 1924.
