

London 22 April 1815

my dear Sir,

I wrote you on Jan'y 12. Feb'y 6<sup>th</sup> & 26. again  
on the 5<sup>th</sup> of March 1805 respecting the Land granted  
to Capt<sup>n</sup> Carver by the two Sachems - I have been  
searching for the original Deed, without finding  
it - I find Capt<sup>n</sup> Carver sold a quarter of the whole to  
R. Smith and two thirds of the whole to A.B. Gould  
and gave Deeds accordingly. which left only one 1/2 th  
to his Heirs = and People here from N.York tell me  
Rufus & Jonathan Carver & their Sisters sold the  
greater Part on Speculation since 1792 -  
The People who bought on this side the Atlantic  
will not sell their Rights, but intend to claim after  
Carvers Children have been at the expense of  
getting the Deed ratified by Congress & the present  
Sachems of the Nandowissies... whether Congress  
will allow the printed copy is a question - but suppose  
they do - it is doubtful whether the Indians will allow  
it - if they should the expenses will rise to a great  
height - Those Deeds given by Capt. Carver were not  
in Law, because he had no right to the Land, until his  
Deed was ratified by the King, which was never done.  
& Carvers Children's Deeds since, are not for the same  
Reason - because Congress have not ratified the Deed  
Carvers Children ought not to bear the expense  
if able, while Strangers claim the Land as theirs -

you will find what number of Acres have been Sold by the  
children of Capt<sup>n</sup> Corver in America & then you will  
be able to give them advice whether to go on or Stop  
where they are — I will advise them to give one  
General Quitclaim Deed of the Whole to A.B. which  
warrants against the Claims of all the Heirs of another  
Corver deceased — & under that General Quitclaim Deed  
let A.B. pay all Expenses at Congress & with the Indians  
and if A.B. gets Possession of the Territory, then A.B.  
to be held to give a Number of Acres to each Son and  
Daughter of Capt<sup>n</sup> Corver.. But mind this, Rufus Corver  
his Sisters & Brother must suffer A.B. to use their Name,  
in the Petition, as if they alone were concerned in  
Suing for the Land — because the Name of Corver  
will be the strongest Argument you have to succeed  
with Congress & the Indians — When Possession  
is gained by A.B. & A.B has given Deeds to Corver's  
children as per Contract, then Corver's children  
must go & settle on the Land, and each build a House  
in Corversville near the Mouth of Chippewaw River.  
in a limited Time, & the first Settler shall have his  
choice of a Block of Land in said City to build on, & so  
the Second Comer to have the next choice until 400  
Houses are erected — the City Lots should not exceed  
half an Acre each — all made in right Angles.

To shun all Claimants A.B. must have the Indians  
Ratify their Deed to Capt<sup>n</sup> Corver by giving a new Deed  
to A.B. the Assignee of Corver's Children and the  
Title be new, and to a different Person — then all old  
things will be done away —

If my Ideas strike yours, I hope to meet you at Larcher-  
ville with Mr & Mrs Pope & all the Children of Capt. Carver,  
in 1806.) I wish you to consult Rufus Corver &c &c and  
to advise them how to act - & if agreeable to see my  
son, William Birdseye Peters Esqr. of Stratford in  
Connecticut, or at Mr. Abbott Ryckman's House  
in New York, a Merchant there - who will be  
better able to communicate matters to you than  
I can write, & will be your best guide I know  
of in America in this uncertain concern.

The Corvers under existing circumstances I think  
will never receive Benefit from that Land only in  
the way I have above hinted - my son  
is capable & will be ready to advise  
and assist in raising the Money  
to try the Will & pleasure of Congress.

where the first step is - & the second is go to the Ind. -  
Silence & expedition is the Safety of your Application.  
it will prevent opposition, & future Law suits, if my  
plan is, successful - you will Note, that the Fall  
of St Anthony is West of Niagara Fall 450 miles &  
the climate much milder than in Vermont or Detroit.  
please to write to my son - the result of your doings  
with Corvers Children - I despair of ever finding  
the original Deed - The Holdens of Land under Capt  
Carver are not honest enough to do any Justice to  
the Children of Carver in America, pretending to act  
only for Martha Pope - meaning themselves - if R.  
Corver's Letter soon reaches Martha Pope, it may  
open things to your faithful Samuel Peters
