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Nairobi

Wed - July 10, 1985

After one hour of sleep was awakened by pounding and found out that a pool is being built in the room next to where we were camping in the Schilling Office.

By 8:30 was off to the Kenyatta Centre. Ran into Eleanor Aherns in line and moved thru the line with her and some Phillipian women. The hall was full but by scrambling - and being alone I found a marvelous seat on the main floor next to a woman who had graduated from Macalaster - Mary Jacob - who is at Mt. Holyoke.

The opening ceremonies were typical. Speeches and music - couldn't see the Kenyan dancers or a movie - but the women on the podium were spectacular.

Got lost on the return to the hotel, but finally found it and met some people in the Schilling room with whom to have lunch - which we did on the terrace of the hotel.

Were joined by Laverne Leila and Joyce.  
I left to take a bag to the Ambassador  
and returned to wander with  
Laverne and Joyce (since it was too  
late to register)

Met Aileen Grossman and Marcia  
Yugard in front of the hotel and  
visited for a while before joining  
forces to go to the 680 for a drink.  
Nine of us walking into a bar  
filled only with men (2 exceptions)  
caused quite a stir!

Laverne + Joyce invited me to join  
them to meet a Kenyan couple for  
dinner at Hunters Den. When we  
walked in who should be there  
but Barbara Knudsen and a  
Minnesota group.

Dinner was delicious -  
fish (tapioca) masala (No bones -  
a red sauce) Cab back to the  
Ambassador. Michelle Alufour joined  
me - bed at last and a sound  
sleep - after snoozes and one hour  
since Mon

Nairobi

Thurs. July 11, 1985

Alou came knocking on our  
door at 8:20 saying news about  
the hotel didn't look good but to  
check later. Michelle and I  
walked to the University campus  
which was fantastic - an array of  
colorful costumes - a huge jam at  
the entrance where everyone  
was checked by security -

Still can't register - "Come  
back at 2:30" so decided to see  
what workshops I could find.  
Ran into Elizabeth Schippe and  
visited. Found that the Education  
Bldg was the center for information.  
A large board had all  
events for the day listed and  
literature was available from  
Central Information.

Ran into Laverne and we had  
a chat and a walk. She told me  
about her life - Washburn grad -  
25 yrs later entered the U - came  
out summa and working on a  
masters. Delightful person.

Went to a development workshop -  
met two Indian women - one Bombay  
one Delhi with a daughter who graduated

from Swarthmore. After an incredible array of remarks from the floor walked back toward the hotel. Changed money. Had lunch at Jox (Recommended by Doug) and to the New Stanley. Still no room! Now 3:45. I had wanted to go back to campus but Doug said for Michelle and me to wait. Patience paid off about an hour later. We got a room - 331. Got slightly organized and then out to dinner. Missed the "Minnesota meeting" but met Kate Bryant. Asked if she wanted to join us. - then met Joyce Benson and haverse and all went to Stavros - delicious dinner fish again. Marvellous conversation - brought flowers outside and met Argentine women.

Back to bed - after getting organized it was midnight.

Tamara and Fri July 12

Awakened by Tina and decided that she and her father will pick me up at 11:30 tomorrow

Michelle left for breakfast only to return with the news that we had to move into a room with 3. Met Alana and Marcia and negotiated that we three team up and Michelle go with Isabelle K'attelber and Helen Ransome.

Wonderful Doug checked us out so I could go on the city tour. Saw the poorer parts of Nairobi as well as the elegant Murathi area. According to our guide Felix - 200,000 people live in shacks around the city.

Back to collect my belongings and move to another room. Then off to Kenyatta Center to register as an official observer. Got credentials but had to wait for a photo until 2:30 - crazy hours and no one cares! Had lunch on the first floor where stands are being set up to serve the delegates

Got credentials - and headed for a cab to get me to the OEF program. As a cab drove up I opened the door and Betty Friedman hopped out.

The OEF workshop was jammed. Made it in time to hear Arnie Jaffe - she was splendid. A variety of responses followed until 5:45. Met Carolyn Tribe and we had a long visit about how to implement a women's strategy in Mass. - and generally. Nancy Ruben and others were going to dinner for conference organizers, but I decided to honor my date with Marcia and Alex for dinner.

Walked back and made the hotel just as the sky opened up and it poured. We decided on the Tamarend - and it was splendid. I had calamari and crepes.

Observations - women in general very gracious, security at the hotel and at Kenyatta is very tight. So far we haven't heard of a single hotel room where everything works.

Sat July 13, Nairobi

Deerly morning getting prepared to meet Mr. Ruanachis. He arrived to pick me up shortly after 11:30. He is charming - greeted me with a kiss on the head. Their house is modest - in lovely grounds. He popped champagne and we visited before a lovely lunch which Tina had prepared. Mr. P. had much on his mind so after lunch Tina and I took John and the car to the Pan African Museum and to the Mandela project where I bought some kongas - and to the Norfolk Hotel where we admired the birds.

Back to the hotel where I met Michelle and we asked Alex to join us for dinner.

Drinks at the Lillian Towers (Keypa Safari Club) and dinner at the Ibis room of the Norfolk. Alex recounted her tale of the New Year's Eve bombing. Back in our room Alex and I talked until after 2:00 AM.

July 14, Nairobi

Met Catherine Warruck and Freddie in front of the hotel to go to the women's project at Mugumoini. Bumpy and very dusty ride

When I returned there was a message from Tina that she would pick me up at 6:00 for the opening of the Women's Art Project in Parliament. Not such good art - but Mrs. Perez de Cuellar officially opened - then to a reception at the New Stanley for Family Planning. The Pennochios left and I met Michelle. We went to and had a lovely, relaxed dinner and good talk.

Had a busy visit with Mrs. Papandrian

Mon July 15 - Nairobi

Brief stop at a family planning strategy meeting in room 611. Breakfast downstairs with Aileen - debated trying to get into the opening session but decided I'd rather go to a workshop Aileen and Marda and I walked over to the University with a little shopping en route.

Aileen and I went to Maudelo (The Women's project) and then split. I went to the O & F workshop on law & development. Quite good. Met Caroline Tribe by chance and we had lunch at the Norfolk. Then walked to the museum to go to the Ford Foundation workshop but it was disorganized and never started.

Back to the hotel for Tina to pick me up at 3:30 to go to the Museum to see the Stebelox & the 1.7 mil year old man (boy). Richard Leakey was attractive and explained to Sir Gen. Perez de Cuellar about "AD 115,000". The Museum is lovely.

Changed to be picked up at 6:15 for a reception for delegates. Had a visit with an MP from Australia.

Carol Beckwith

Whisked off again to meet Mrs Mubarak and Mrs Leticia Shabani. Listened to a discussion about the impact of the Decade. Mrs. Shabani stated that strides have been made.

After being dropped at the hotel I went to the new African Museum to meet Allen and Marcia. The photographer of the ~~Wahdoogo~~ tube gave a slide talk which was marvelous. She caught a wonderful sense of their lives and describes it splendidly.

Annette Magnuson joined us for dinner.

Tues July 16, Nairobi

Fairly leisurely morning because I decided to go to the official session. Walked over for the 10 AM start. On my way in I met a Kenyan woman and we sat together. She is Florence Muli and is involved in criminal justice. We listened to Mrs. Shabani who was splendid. Listened to a few others and then went out for tea where we had a fabulous conversation - about US policy to developing countries - about marriage - keeping one's name - about women's lot - 2 hours later we went back to hear Mrs. Mubarak! At lunch break Florence left and I wandered around collecting materials which were wonderful. Then went to sit on the floor and met a law professor from Chicago. We had a long conversation about law, judgeships etc. Just after lunch was Maureen Reagan - wearing red. She was not an embarrassment -

but not splendid. listened to several others - especially Margaret Papudreau who I found very strong and good. She suggested that women from troubled areas of the world meet together with a mediator and make proposals for a solution.

By four I had so much material I couldn't carry it. I looked for the working session but decided to go back to the hotel - by cab.

Tina + Mr. P. picked me up at 6:00 for a reception given by Mrs. Shabasi at the SO Hotel.

After they dropped me off I started to sneak out but they were still in front of the hotel so they took me to the Kenyan African Museum where I was to meet Alice. Didn't see her but watched the splendid slide show given by Angela Fiske her from her book on African adornment. She autographed a book for me and had a chat with her and with Nicky Seven Seven. Alice + I had tea downstairs and then the three of us talked at 2 1/2.

Wed. July 17 - Nairobi

Called Nessy thinking it was her birthday! She was surprised and thinks I'm a bit confused.

Had a long conversation on the phone with Carolyn Tribe about our impressions of life here.

Went downstairs for tea (which I never got) and saw Osborne who talked about the need for our support for another conference.

Over to a briefing on what goes on at the Kenyatta Center. U.S. delegates briefed - not splendid. Esther Peterson was one, but didn't speak.

Took in the scene - some photos. Met Mary Mantis by Betty Friedman's tree - also saw Meridel Le Sueur.

Lunch in the faculty room - to another briefing where I heard Marlene O'Keefe from Canada.

To Bella Abzug's happening with elected women from all over. The woman from Ireland

was a delight. In fact several were excellent including Claudine Schrieder. Sat with Carolyn Tribe. Had tea with her and ran into (sat with) a Belgian woman, head of the "partie feministe." Really interesting discussion on work, labor unions etc.

Cabbed back to the hotel via panic - arrived at 5:25 for a message that I would be fetched at 5:45!

Porter in the room. Great haste but indeed I did it.

To the Hilton - but waited while Mr. P went to the Swedish reception - to Kellian Towers for the Greek reception. Mrs. P now calls me Ski-U-Mah! Chatted with her - then to the Bomas of Kenya. Sat next to Mrs. Phillip Healey for awhile. She was charming. The show was spectacular (in parts) but we left at 9:30.

Changed money, washed hair etc.

Mr. P. has taught me a great deal about how to go to receptions. He's got it to a science. Arrive promptly, and leave soon. However in general I like to visit too much!

Gene told wonderful mother-in-law stories before bed time.

Thurs. July 18 - Nairobi

Missip 30<sup>th</sup> Birthday!

7:30 breakfast with Arwonne, Eliz Schippe, Joyce Benson (Duluth) Finette, Mary Jo Leader and we three to plan how to report back on our time here. Inconclusive!

Met Catherine <sup>in the lobby</sup> from the first night (Pop Crisis) who filled me in on what is transpiring in the US on family planning, aid to other nations for birth control, Roes Wade etc. - a travesty!

Walked over to the 9:00 (a bit late) briefing for US participants. Pat Goldman was one of the briefers. The official sessions are moving at their own pace - Vietnam denounced the US yesterday.

Cabbed back to the hotel to meet Tina and go stone (gem) shopping. What fun! Bought a few pieces - but didn't ask to see big stones darn it! Then to the goldsmith where I selected settings.

We met Mr. P and then to pick up goodies for lunch which we took to the house.

Drove to a Masai mission about an hour out on the road to Mombassa. Got a few trinkets, but they didn't have the big gorgeous necklaces which I would love to have.

Dropped Mr. P at his office and went to Abdulla's for Kangas. Marcia was in the room when I got back so we visited for a few minutes before going to the OEF reception.

The reception was here and was very nice - crowded with outstanding women.

Carolyn Tribe asked me to meet friends of hers for dinner including

Bank of the Now legal defense fund. Interesting conversation on harassment cases against ABC, CBS and NBC. By the time I got to the room Marcia andileen were asleep.

Thu. July 19 - Nairobi

A slow leisurely morning. Aileen and I visited until about 10:00. No briefing! Walked over to Kenyatta Center to check up. Sat in on the plenary session for a few minutes and then on Committee One. Saw Joan Goodin busily at work lobbying delegates. Had lunch at the buffet and then took a cab to the Forum. Shared it with Dr. Claire Fulcher from New York. Stopped at Madeleo. Found a banana basket which I like - then to the Forum where I snapped pictures. Ran into Tida and her friends and eventually went to the H/H session. Had to leave at 2:30 to meet Tida at The Hotel. We went to market where I bought more baskets - and to a couple of craft stores. Then to leave things at Pennachos. John brought me back to the Forum for closing ceremonies. Sat next to Paula Herr, the Director of the Museum Shop at the Museum.

She was petit & delightful. Hated to leave but was being picked up at 6:00. Raced and made it.

The reception was at the Russian Embassy. Wonderful gothic type house and red carpet leading to the Ambassador and the first woman in space - the Russian astronaut. She is tall slender and attractive. Lots of cover - a pectoral representation of the accomplishments of Soviet women. Spoke to several Russian women - in English naturally. Mr. P says there is a thaw and much less isolation. The Russians here are more open.

Back to the hotel to meet Aileen and Michelle for dinner at Tamarind. Festive and full of Chinese.

Back to pack and bed at 1:15! Check out.

Sat. July 20 - Nairobi. Masai Ma  
Downstairs by 8:00 and  
off by 8:45 in a safari van.  
Seven of us including Gordon  
Wallace of Population Crisis  
Nancy Ransom

Drove at breakneck speed  
over incredible roads - tons of  
dust. I certainly see why  
safari clothes are recommended.  
The Rift Valley was spectacular.  
Had morning rest stop at  
Narok where I bought a  
Masai necklace

Started seeing game around  
noon. Thompson's gazelle, wildebeast,  
Kudu, zebra, great herds  
of migrating wildebeest.  
It really was a thrill. On to  
see ostrich, baboons

Arrived at Mara Serena  
lodge about 3:00 but they  
held lunch. At 4:00 out on  
a game watch. First saw  
two male lions, then three  
females with several cubs.  
Saw many giraffes.

The van carried a wildlife  
guide with a gun to protect  
us.

Back for dinner - a drink  
beforehand with the ladies,  
and a performance afterward  
by the Masai Men - jumping  
to great heights.

We persuaded a guide  
to take us out at 6:30 tomorrow

Sun. July 21, Mara Serena Lodge  
lovely sunrise & fresh air  
out at 6:30. First saw  
elephants walking across the  
road and directly to a  
hippo pool where we watched  
several lazing in the early  
light. Saw lions - dad and  
them mother and cubs.  
The list of animals was  
endless and spectacular -  
and thrilling.

Back to the lodge for  
breakfast and some boredom.  
Sat around the pool. It got  
very hot so went swimming  
and then spent some time  
in the shop picking up  
trinkets and as a result  
almost missed lunch.

Alene and I visited  
until time to go on the 4:00 pm  
run. She bought some hand-  
some necklaces.

Our afternoon was a  
leisurely "Sunday drive"  
saw lions but then followed  
gazelle, wildebeest, impala, etc.  
Just after our return

it started to pour and the  
rain came in buckets.

After dinner got organized  
washed my hair and to bed.

Mon. July 22 Mara Serena - Narok

left at 7:30 prompt. Saw a cheetah before we had gone far, also several lions, elephants, lots of giraffes, zebra and the usual. After the rain the dust was down but the roads were mucky. The drivers have to be very skilled to get these vans through - but they do it - at breakneck speed!

Arrived at Narok before noon to be met by Donna Klump and the women of the group as well as several city officials and the district officer (DO). The city officials are elected, the DO appointed by the Pres.

Had "tea" with the group and found our rooms at the Spear Hotel, a Kenyan travelers hotel. Got sorted out and had lunch (prepared by the chef Doug + Dianne had imported from Nairobi.) and a visit with the women. Then to visit the

women's project. They greeted us singing and dancing and in colorful dress. They had their wares available for purchase - which we did. It seemed like a big event for the city, which I'm sure it was! We went to the chief counselors home for drinks and to watch "Kenyan TV" that is the cows coming in from the fields. The Commissioner's wife milked their cows - they have 300 head having lost 200 to drought last year. We visited the inside of a typical Masai home - small and very smoky in which the Commissioner's mother lives (with her goats), Loma, & visited the site of a primary school which is to be built, and saw women constructing homes of sticks woven together filled with leaves of shrubs which grow nearby. And plaster both inside and out with cow dung.

Back to the hotel for dinner  
(to which we found later 40  
extras supposedly came because  
of a political fight between the  
Commissioner and some of his  
opponents' supporters) Had  
a question and answer period  
which hinged on why taking  
out garbage is man's work.

The officials left about  
11:00 and we talked until 12:  
about how we could assist  
the Kenyan Women's project.

Rebecca Griep and I visited  
a little before going to sleep.

Tues. July 23 - Narok - Nakuru

Alene and I decided we  
should take up a collection  
(Harabee) for the women's  
group so started an envelope  
around at breakfast.

Donna arrived and we had  
a very frank discussion with  
the women about Kenyan  
customs - female circumcision,  
wife beating - marriage customs,  
female responsibilities etc.

Then at about 11:00 AM went  
to St. Mary's Secondary School  
where Sr. Marie Goretta is head-  
mistress. She graduated from  
Nebraska State and I promised  
her I would greet Margaret  
Prestka. We visited with the  
girls individually and then  
had group discussion before  
a tour of the grounds. The  
girls - 9<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grade or forms  
11-4 are from all over Kenya and  
board here. There were a few  
who had had poles including  
the daughter of a minister in  
Ohio's cabinet who he refuses

to acknowledge.

Toured the grounds -  
back to Spear Hotel for lunch  
and on the road for a very  
bumpy ride. We passed Lake  
Navasha where we could see  
the pink stripe on the lake  
made by the flamingos and  
right on past to Nakuru.  
Stayed at a lovely hotel  
with small guest cottages,  
Boudsone grounds with  
bougenvilla, cosmos, mums -  
poinsettias - a profusion of  
color.

We were bushed, but  
took showers and talked  
until 7:30 when it was  
time for dinner - buffet.  
Tour 1 was here so it was  
old home week.

Had dinner with a couple  
from West Virginia who told  
me that Betty McCreight  
died in March.

It poured - we slept  
like logs.

Lake Nakuru to  
Wed July 24 Nairobi

Off at 9:00 to see the flamingos  
with a few warthogs,  
impala and a cheetah on  
route. We drove right onto  
the beach and it was  
spectacular. Hundreds of  
thousands of pink flamingos  
interspersed with a few  
pelicans. They are a delight  
to watch skittering across  
the surface of the lake  
before takeoff. The sound  
of them all together is sort  
of a whooshing. We stayed  
for well over an hour  
walking on the beach.

Saw some giraffe on the  
way back to the hotel (Lake  
Nakuru Lodge) for lunch.

Left right after lunch  
but organized a group to  
insist upon a stop at a  
tea plantation at Kericho.  
Very old English and Colonial  
Jook pictures and admired  
the Kisii pottery but didn't  
buy any. Also found a lovely

platter.

On to Kisumu - Sunset Beach Hotel on Lake Victoria. Kisumu is the second largest city in Kenya and has many relics of British colonialism. The hotel isn't much from the outside, but our room looks out over the lake and the swimming pool. It was cloudy so no sunset of note.

Dinner was so-so - but with Mary Gates and which was fun.

A group of CARE people came to show us slides of their projects and to tell us about tomorrow's visit.

Reforestation, goat raising and bee keeping (Borey) are what we are to see.

Fell into bed around 11.

Thurs. July 25 - Kisumu - Nairobi

Were in no rush because Alene decided not to go on the tour even if she was unable to get a plane ticket. When we got downstairs we found that she had one. After breakfast we went to town to pick it up and come back to sit in the sun. It was hot and lovely and there were a few other defectors.

Alene felt rotten so it was quiet. Met two young women who are married to Episcopal priests and are here for 6 weeks. They are from Atlanta and very nice.

Packed and took the hotel van to the airport - with a flat tire on the way. Nice flight in a prop plane. Right on time and cabbied to the New Stanley for Alene to stay and for me to pick up my bag. Met Bronnie in the

lobby who is on the way  
to Uganda tomorrow.

Doreng met me at the  
door of the Intercontinental  
7:30 to tell me that we are  
due at a 7:30 dinner. Raced  
to dress and John was  
waiting.

Dinner at a lovely home  
with great art. Ann and  
she a  
planner and he an  
architect are house sitting.  
Birgitta from Sweden  
and from FAO  
were the other two along  
with Mr. P. and Tina. Good  
food, wine and conversation.  
Talked about South Africa,  
peace, and the forum.  
Back to report!

Fri. July 26 - Nairobi - Mombasa

Breakfast in the room and  
were downstairs by 8:30 to be  
picked up to go to the airport.  
The van was late but we  
got there just in time to check  
in and board the plane.

1 hour flight on a 707 from  
which we were whisked to  
the Mombasa Beach Hotel.  
It's lovely and right on the  
water with a pool overlooking  
the Indian Ocean as is our  
room.

Changed into shorts and  
cased the joint. Had a  
drink and lunch by the  
pool and then, in bathing  
suit went for a long walk  
on the beach.

Took a few slides on the  
great slide - washed my  
hair and took a nap.

Went to dinner at Invarial.  
Had Indian Ocean oysters +  
lobster. Fell into bed by 11:00.

Sat. July 27 - Mombasa

After breakfast went to the shop to get White Mischief which I had seen through the window last night but it was already gone - as was the paper.

Walked by a woman in a Decade gown and stopped to visit. She was Nancy Tobin from Wellsley. Talked about the conference she had stayed with Kathy Eldon the food critic for the Times as did Lynn Sher and several other Wellsley people. Mrs. Shahan is a Wellsley grad who has not been recognized by the college. I told her I will speak about it to Dorcella as well as about Wellsley's program with colleges in India.

Nancy's boss is Barbara Lazarus who is going to Carnegie Mellon. Also talked about a career advisor at Barnard who Nancy says is excellent - Martha Green.

Walked on the beach in the afternoon. Had barbecue at the hotel and watched local dancers.

Sun. July 28 - Mombasa - Nairobi

Glorious day. Sat in the sun and read. Walked down the beach, took pictures and went swimming. Washed my hair before lunch so that it could dry in the sun.

Were picked up for the airport about 3:45 which gave us a leisurely time. Our flight had come from Johannesburg so there were no windows. Pass Mt Kilimajaro coming to Nairobi but got only a fleeting glance above the clouds.

Dinner at Alan Bobb's. Good but too much. I had the trots & cramps so wasn't able to appreciate it fully.

Mon. July 29 - Nairobi - The Mountain Lodge - Mt Kenya

Met our group at 9:30. Seems to be a very congenial gathering. One family of 5 and one deaf young woman.

Got our briefing - finished packing - talked to Tina and went to The New Stanley for lunch at The Shore Tree. Saw Barbara Kudrion who is staying here another week.

Then back to the Intercontinental where we assembled and took off in 2 vans. Drove the way we had gone to Mugoinse - passed by Shika - got to Mountain Lodge about 5:15 in time to see a Stately elephant and while we were at dinner a black rhino.

Several others including hyena, wildbeast, monkey, gazelle - came to the salt lick. Got up several times during the night to look out over our balcony to check the action. Always several cape buffalo.

Tues July 30 - Mountain Lodge  
to Samburu River Camp

14 elephants came while  
we were at breakfast so I  
preferred to watch them.  
Drove to Samburu in time  
for lunch thru Isiola  
where the whole flavor of  
the country change to be  
much more Arabic in look,  
dress and surroundings.  
Saw a few camels along the  
road.

The vegetation also  
changed dramatically as  
we crossed the crest of  
the highest "hill". Green  
and lush on the south,  
very arid on the north  
(Isiola) side.

As we approached Mountain  
Lodge we saw an entire herd  
of camels in a dry river bed.  
Also saw ostrich, elephants  
dikdik and several giraffes.

Had lunch at the lodge -  
a brief swim and relaxing  
time before a 4:00 PM  
just after lunch a pack of monkeys  
put on a show for me by our cabin

game drive. Saw familiar  
things and a few greaves  
zebra - Crocodile at the lodge  
just as I was getting  
ready for dinner he came  
to say that a leopard  
had taken bait across the  
stream. Got the glasses and  
watched for about 1/2 hour  
until he came down the  
tree. Bed soon after dinner.

Settings: Foot paths thru  
most fields and near  
roads.

The Samburu are first cousins  
of the Masai and dress in red  
clad with red dust and  
heads covered with elaborate  
decoration.

Birds as well as the beasts  
are fascinating.

Kathy Hoas is amazing - bright  
and very much with the group.

Ernest, our driver, was an  
AFS student near Boston and  
tried out for the Celtics.

Wed. July 31 - Nairobi to  
Mt. Kenya Safari Club -

6:30 game drive -  
elephants and morning  
types like impala,  
gazelle etc. A warthog or  
two. Back for breakfast and  
then announced we were  
leaving directly afterwards  
a change of plan.

Drove back yesterday's  
path and had lunch at  
Kentrout in Isiola - a  
lovely spot with as hand-  
some calla lilies as I have  
ever seen. We had fruit

On to Mt Kenya Safari Club  
which is truly a bit of old  
England mixed with a bit of  
William Holden's Hollywood  
in the middle of Kenya.

Peacocks all over lawns and  
roofs. gorgeous lawns and  
gardens. All in all a

spectacular sight.

Got our rooms and decided  
to go to the animal orphanage,  
but it started to rain. Hung  
around the gift shop. Angela  
Fisher's "Africa Adorned" is  
1150/KS here. I paid her 900 -  
and it was 750 next to the  
New Stanley.

The rain let up so Grace  
and Jake McK and  
hoi and John walked over to  
the orphanage.

I fed an elephant and a  
bongo deer. <sup>(an exceptionally big specimen)</sup> Also saw a bush  
baby which was adorable.

Back to wash my hair. When  
I opened my door I heard  
drums and went to investigate.  
Another group had hired Meru  
dancers and they were  
spectacular with birds  
wings on their arms and  
all with drums.

Back to take a pic of  
Mt. Kenya from our balcony -  
and shortly afterwards watch  
the full moon rise over Mt.

Kenya. For a moment it looked like it had a halo. What a sight!

Gathered for drinks and an elegant 7 course dinner. Splendid service and food. Dressing up was certainly worth it!

After dinner found out that Grace is a psychologist - works with chem. dependent physicians and uses Hazeldon materials.

Perted up our fire for awhile but it finally died.

Thurs Aug. 1 - Mt Kenya Safari Club to Lake Nakasha Safari Club  
9:45 AM

Had a leisurely start after a little shopping. Had picnic lunches in the vans so didn't feel pressed. However, roads weren't good, and shortly after lunch I felt a funny thud in the left rear wheel but when I mentioned it everyone pook-pooked me. (I was in the back seat ~~alone~~) As it turned out all the legs in the rear left wheel were loose and we almost lost it.

Moet + Chandon. Very festive

Had a good long conversation  
with Kathy on the bus.  
Remarkable woman.

Fri Aug 2 - Safari land at Lake  
Mavasha to Kichwa Tembo in  
Masa Mara.

Left promptly at 8:00 in our  
new van. It was hard pulling  
away from the colorful  
parrots - and the albino  
ones as well. - as well as  
from the black swan and  
the white swan, peacocks  
etc.

The road was bumpy even  
on pavement. - We stopped  
in Narok, but at a different  
place near the grain storage  
facility. Got some Kisii  
trinkets and we were on  
our way again. Very  
dusty and bumpy but  
we arrived at 1:15 in  
time for lunch. The  
tents - with attached  
baths - are very pleasant.  
Small - we are in VK which  
Ken says is for Valerie  
Kent when she comes.

Went on an afternoon  
game drive during which

We saw several lions.  
First<sup>2</sup> females, then males,  
and finally a group of  
about 10 cubs. I also  
saw giraffe aplenty - but  
no leopard or cheetah.

Had drinks with the  
group - using Sid's  
Canadian Club. Lor  
sat with the Mc Kewes for  
dinner and Dorothy Dunson  
popped for wine for our  
table. Len was filling  
us in on stories of safaris  
91 yr old woman etc.

After dinner were  
joined by a couple who  
had driven from Resume.  
She, Lisa Conroy, is manic  
depressive, Smith and HBS  
degrees. long talk on  
treatment of the mentally ill.

Sat. Aug 3 - Kichwa Tembo Camp

6:30 game run - saw lions,  
a humping hippo and the  
usual other marvelous  
animals. Back for breakfast  
and a relaxed snooze on the  
deck until 11:00 when I went  
to wash my hair in Cathy and  
Sue's shower. Dried it in the  
sun and read until Lor returned  
from his visit to a Masai  
village. A drink - late lunch -  
and visiting until 3:00 when  
we started to stalk the wily  
rhino. We drove - and drove -  
and drove - to another park  
entrance. Got totally hung  
up on rocks - saw a few  
lions - the other van saw a  
rhino in the distance but couldn't  
get to it. Were far out - it  
started to rain and get  
dark - and slippery. Anyway,  
we made it back about 6:45.

Poured - met Helen Weiss &  
Andy Gilmakers of  
the Women's Conference for the  
SFO UN Society. They are

making a promo film for  
Abercrombie + Kent. Ken  
invited them to join us  
for dinner.

Saw slides on the Masai  
Mara after dinner and  
then some tape Helen +  
Robby had shot.

Bed by 11:00.

I really like the ~~hats~~!

Sun. Aug. 4 - Kichwa Tembo (Lion's  
Head) to Nairobi

5:30 wake up call. Packed  
and out by 6:00 to be told by  
Ken that there had been an  
overbooking and that Sue,  
Rathy + Bud could not come in  
the balloon. So and I debated  
giving up our space - but  
didn't. Got into 4 wheel  
drive vans and set off  
across the field in front of  
the camp. Were delayed  
slightly by a family of lions in  
the path.

When we arrived at the  
launching site were told our  
names were not on the list!  
After a few uneasy moments  
we got into a basket and away  
we went - skimming over the  
fields - raising to above tree  
height when necessary, but  
keeping low because there  
were strong winds. The crews  
were splendid, but not many  
animals - 2 big + 2 small  
giraffe, gazelles, vultures,

wild beasts (but no great migration) not much else, handed with a Thompson + a drag and waited for the follow up vans.

They set up a table, started breakfast on the burners for the balloons and opened champagne. We all toasted our successful flight and sat down on the fuel drums around a table for breakfast. We had a nice conversation. He is fluent in French as well as English. - has 8 brothers and sisters and supports his mother and younger brothers + sisters. Was offered a scholarship in Paris last year but couldn't afford to take advantage of it. - hopes to some day. AFS has become too expensive for all but the very wealthy to participate. Discussed the population problem.

Got to the Intercontinental about 4:30. Picked up bags and came to the Hilton. Talked to Tina - took a bath - walked back to the Intercontinental to pick up a forgotten carry-on bag.

Dinner at the Hilton in the Ambaseli Room. Very pleasant and a good night's sleep.

Mon. Aug. 5 - Nairobi

A day to do all the errands at the Continental breakfast in the room - to Denny to see about my jewelry. He said to come back tomorrow. To select a Robin Anderson batik. Lor chose Zebras. The Starlings are not available because Robin has broken her wrist. So the market for gifts which had not been taken care of. Also got games along the street - and to African Heritage where I got a tape - necklace - earrings etc. lunch at the Red Bull. Saw both Carol Beckwith and Angela Fisher.

Back to the Hilton where Tina and her dad picked us up to go to Giraffe Manor. It is a game park and is lovely. A male giraffe was just killed by a car - John Paul - which is a tragedy - but we saw others. Back to the hotel - I had thought we were having dinner but Lor and I were on

our own so I made reservations at the Intercontinental to hear the African Heritage band.

It was a buffet with both standard and African food. The music was outstanding!

Sues Aug. 6 - Nairobi -

When her called to confirm our plane reservations he found that the plane was delayed about 12 hours - supposedly due to "mechanical difficulty" with the aircraft. We went over to BA to get rearranged and then to the National Museum. Interesting leakey exhibits - reproductions of cave drawings - footprints etc. Saw dioramas - birds - animals etc. Stopped in the shop to say hello to Paula Herr and bought a bag. 





Safari No. 4: Kenya Rural Encounter

This trip is designed to provide you with a unique opportunity to experience Kenya's spectacular wildlife and scenery, as well as to learn first-hand about life in rural Kenya. Following is a very brief outline for Trip 4:

- July 20 - Travel to Masai Mara National Reserve; enjoy game drives and evening relaxation at either Mara Serena Lodge or Cottar's Tented Camp.
- July 21 - Full day to enjoy Masai Mara, game drives and relaxation.
- July 22 - Arrive in Narok, a major Maasai town in the Great Rift Valley, to spend 24 hours with Donna Klump, an anthropologist from Columbia University whose specialty is Maasai culture. Visits to town market, Maasai bomas, hospital, and evening slide lecture. Stay in Narok at Spear Hotel (note: the hotel here will be rather rustic so be prepared i.e. communal bathroom, etc.)
- July 23 - Half day of activity in Narok, meeting women's groups, local community leaders, etc. Drive over the hills to Lake Nakuru home to over 1 million pink flamingoes and spectacular bird life.
- July 24 - Depart Lake Nakuru in the morning, drive to Kisumu, a town on the shores of Lake Victoria. Evening dinner with C.A.R.E. staffers, followed by a slide show on rural Kenya women. Stay at the Sunset Hotel on Lake Victoria.
- July 25 - Spend a full day visiting women's income-generating projects (agroforestry, goat-raising, and bee-keeping) in rural Siaya near Kisumu with C.A.R.E. staff members. You will lunch with one of the women's groups. Final evening program and discussion after dinner.
- July 26 - Drive back to Nairobi, leaving early morning and reaching Nairobi around 3:00 PM.

A few "tips" that were suggested by the Kisumu C.A.R.E. staff:

- Bring comfortable walking shoes and a casual skirt for the Kisumu visit.
- In rural Siaya and Narok, you may have to use local bathroom facilities so bring your own toilet paper those days.
- It has been suggested that visitors to the projects do not smoke cigarettes in front of the women's groups.
- Picture taking should be no problem in Kisumu as long as the women are asked first whether they mind. It would be nice if visitors sent copies of some of the pictures to the members.
- Both women's groups in Siaya are quite religious and will most likely pray before drinking soda and eating food.

\* There will be 1 or 2 Schilling staffers with you both in Narok and Kisumu for the topical parts of the trip.
