MEMORABLE EVENTS.

APRIL 1: GOLD, 151.—2: Assault along the whole line in front of Petersburg; twelve thousand prisoners and fifty pieces of artillery captured.—3: The Union forces under General Weitzel occupy Richmond. GOLD, 149.—9: Surrender of General Lee and his whole army to General Grant. GOLD, 149.—12: Mobile occupied by the Union forces. GOLD, 146.—14: Assassination of President Lincoln by J. Wilkes Booth, an actor, and attempted murder of W. H. Seward, Secretary of State. GOLD, 145.—15: Death of President Lincoln. Andrew Johnson, Vice-President, takes the oath prescribed by the Constitution, and becomes President of the United States. General Anderson hoists the same flag over Fort Sumter which was removed by him in 1861.—17: GOLD, 151.—18: Arrest of Payne, the supposed assassin of Secretary Seward. GOLD, 147.—19: The funeral of President Lincoln at Washington.—21: One hundred and fifty thousand dollars reward offered for the arrest of J. Wilkes Booth. The remains of the late President leave Washington. GOLD, 148.—26: J. Wilkes Booth is killed, and Harrold, an accomplice, is taken. Surrender of General Johnson and all the troops in his department to General W. T. Sherman. GOLD, 150.—29: President Johnson appoints Thursday, the first day of June, as a National Fast.—30: Plot discovered to burn the city of Philadelphia. GOLD, 145. Average rate of gold in April, 146.

MAY 2: President Johnson issues a Proclamation offering a reward of one hundred thousand dollars for the arrest of Jefferson Davis; twenty-five thousand dollars each for Clement C. Clay, Jacob Thompson, George N. Sanders, and Beverly Tucker; and ten thousand dollars for William C. Cleary.—3: GOLD, 141.—4: President Lincoln buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery, Springfield, Ill. Dick Taylor surrenders to General Canby.—6: The Army of the Potomac triumphantly march into the late Rebel Capital. GOLD, 142.—9: Commencement of the trial of the conspirators concerned in the assassination of President Lincoln.—10: Jefferson Davis captured under peculiar circumstances. GOLD, 134.—15: GOLD, 130.—23: Grand review of the Army of the Potomac at the National Capitol. Jefferson Davis indicted for treason; also finds lodgings prepared for him in Fortress Monroe. GOLD, 132.—24: Grand review of General Sherman's army at Washington. GOLD, 135.—25: The Tuscarora, having on board Alexander H. Stephens, Vice-President, and Colonel William Reagan, Postmaster General of the late Southern Confederacy, anchored off Fort Warren, Boston Harbor. GOLD, 138.—26: GOLD, 136.

left here before daylight today.
The 7th Regt. Vols. coming here.

TUESDAY 9

Cool and windy

Attended court & finished
Woodcut's case, Court reduced
to five. Received a paper,

Making out a set of muster
out rolls, for Moses Thomas.

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 10, 1866.

Clear & mild.

Court adjourned sine-die
by order of Put. Maj. Gen. Sherman.

Regt. inspected at 3 P.M. by
Put. Lt. Col. Nelson, a. a. s. G. Dep.
of La. applied for & received a
leave of absence to visit New Orleans.

Mustered out. Wm. Thomas & sold
my revolver for \$25.
THURSDAY 11

Clear & pleasant.
Procured Jas. Williams' pistol
from Lt. Violet. Started for New
Orleans on W. R. Carter, & had a
pleasant trip down for \$6.00.

Springing rain all day.
Arrived in the city early this morning
& registered my name at the March
Place. 6 months pay from Maj. Turner, P.M.
\$922, & left it with him for the night.
Saw Lt. Col. Baldy, Fenne & others,
visited French & Poyroux's markets
Jackson Square, ships & other
places in & about the city.

FRIDAY 12

Cloudy SATURDAY, JANUARY 13, 1866. rainy.
Attending to various business,
bought a citizens dress suit (clothes)
\$7.50, pants \$1.50, boots \$1.50 & c.
visited Museum of Anatomy & other places.
Saw Lt. Col. Long, Lieut. Kieps & all
my old Co. A. 67th who were starting
for home. Came with them on same
boat to Baton Rouge, leaving at 5 P.M.

SUNDAY 14

Dense fog until near noon.
Warm in afternoon, made slow
time last night on account of fog.
Passed some fine buildings & plantations
& arrived at Baton Rouge at 10 P.M.
Bid a last farewell to my old Co.

MONDAY 15

Cloudy light rain.
Made out a set of rolls & had
Put. Thomas Wells mustered out.
Drew clothing & issued it to Co.
Paid Lt. Violet on mess account
\$22. of which 6.75 was for Dec. 1.
Lieut. Lt. Kutchins \$20, rec'd note
New Post, L. M. came.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 16, 1866.

Clear, rather cool.
Received a letter from Mother
& answered it.
Had a good game of ball.

WEDNESDAY 17

Clear fine day
Regt inspected at 9 am, by
Maj. Loring, 10th Regt art/corps,
& found in good conditions.
He also inspected Roll. Returns
roster papers, the 2^d kitchen &c
Made out a set of Rolls & had
Pvt. Warner & Williams mustered out.

THURSDAY 18

Fine day.
on duty as Regt. Officer of
the day, not much to do.

FRIDAY, JANUARY 19, 1866.

Clear & mild
Made out a set of Rolls
& had Sergt. Philip Stedfast
mustered out. Took a walk
to Post House, & all over town.

SATURDAY 20

Cloudy & getting cool
A little rain last night
& a heavy blow.
Mustered out Aaron Sheppard.
Visited James Lodge No. 47, A.F.
& A.M. with St. Butcher &
had a pleasant time.

SUNDAY 21

Clear & mild
A beautiful day
Took a walk through
town visited Cemetery,
Plate house grounds &c
Maj. Moore, in command
of the Post, of Baton Rouge.

MONDAY, JANUARY 22, 1866.

Clear & mild.

The officers have for exercise organized a base ball club & play daily. Paid washing bill \$1.25. Had a fine Battalion Drill. Sold Mr Camp 67 lbs. of coffee for Co. \$13.40.

TUESDAY 23

Clear, nice day.

Bought 50 oranges \$1.50. Making out the Roll of 3 men, who go out to morrow. Heard from my ordnance return for 1st & 2^d Regt. 1865. All right. Rec^d invoices of C & G. B. for Jan'y

WEDNESDAY 24

Clear

Mustered out Corp^s James & Harrison. & Pvt Geo. Washington. Promoted Pvt A. Bridgeford to Serg^t & Pvt. Jm. Perry & Jas. Cotton, Corporal. Gave out Books. Sold Boots to majors orderly for \$18.00.

THURSDAY, JANUARY 25, 1866.

Very fine weather on duty as Officers of the day. Was a witness in Bailey's Horse Case.

Paid \$4.00 on mess acct.

Had Battalion drill, in the formation of squares. Taught a class at night.

larger by paying \$10. to boot
Very warm day & night
Made out Co. Monthly Return
& List of Deserters 20 & sent them in

WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 31, 1866.

Clear & quite warm
On duty as Officer of the day.
Procured a horse & rode to Post
Hosp. fort. Levee & Jail &c.
visited these places also at night.
Drew rations for Co. for 58.
Mess broke up at 10. 20.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 1

Clear & mild.
Mustered out Priv. Wm. Clayburn
20. more to go out. Have now 64.
Enlisted when in my Company
Started new mess. Lt. Hulet's
adj. Adj. & myself. Had a good
oyster breakfast, \$2.00. Bought
stoves for mess. \$8.00.

for Jan'y to 2 month. Sent
Had Battalion drill, passing

Attended St James Lodge
at night with H. Hutchins
Jacob Robinson of my Co. died
in Post Hosp. Steamer W. R.
Carter blown up last night
along matches. 2000 lbs lost.

Cloudy cool, with some rain.
Regt. inspected at 8 am
by Maj. Moore.

Attended M. B. Church at S.
& heard an interesting discourse.
Col. Edgerton returned from
sick leave & takes command.

Cold, chilly, rain all day.
Wrote to Bro Geo. B. Smith in Mass.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1866.

Signal Statements of Jacob
Robinson to A. G. Office. Wash.
Circus came to town.

Straps, 22 pro. Scales, & some other articles
to the violet. A. R. 2. M.

Refused charges against Mrs. Siggs.
Rec'd letter from Home.

THURSDAY 8

Clear & warm.
On duty as Reg. A. of day.
visited all the Posts 3 times.
2 Prisoners charged with murder
came nigh getting away, cut out
of Cell & roof of Prison. Had them
put back & handcuffed, &c.

Min. & answered it.

Presented with a ticket &
visited Pike's Hall (very good)
Rec'd receipts from Lt. Violet,

the Rolls to be signed by
the men, which was done
& 2 Cos. paid. Wrote to Miss Keithley,
my wife & Capt Frost on Ct. M. O.

A clear and beautiful
day, a light wind dried up
the wet ground. Company
paid 6 months pay up to Dec. 31/65.
Settled several debts for the boys
took in & paid out quite a sum.
Rec'd a letter from Sherwin, Boston
enclosing \$500. Had supper

TUESDAY 20

Clear & pleasant.
On duty, Reg. O. of day.
visited guards, twice
& confined 10 for neglect of duty.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1866.

Cloudy & variable
Relieved by Capt. Schuler
Preferred charges against
5 men for abs. without leave
Read Jack Winston
Rec'd a letter from
Mother & Bro. Alex.

THURSDAY 22

cloudy, with a light rain
Ordered to close up a liquor
store, by Col. Edgerly
Regt. marched through the
city it being Washington 3d
& saluted the National Flag
Speeches &c &c

Regt. musters by Col. Edgerton
at 5 P.M.
Saw Col. Edgerton, who concluded
to send me with my Co. to
Clinton La. to command the Post.

THURSDAY, MARCH 1

Clear & warm, Col. Edgerton changed
his mind & sent me out to Clinton
alone on horseback, 32 miles.
Started at 10 a.m.; & reached there 5 P.M.
Roads muddy. Fine town & country
around it. Rose with Dr. Robinson
Saw Capt. Hays of Freedmen's Bureau
Sent a letter home.

FRIDAY MARCH 2, 1866.

Clear and warm
Put up at Col. Norwood's last night.
in company with Mr. or Dr. Robinson
Saw Capt. Hays, & other prominent citizens
Waited on by the Mayor, Aldermen &
other city officials. Sheriff, &c., to
consult me in regard to bringing out
troops. They opposed the measure &
promised Capt. Hays all the aid he wanted.
Returned to Baton Rouge in 6 hours &
reported the facts.

SATURDAY 3

Clear & pleasant
on duty as officer of the day.
Busy completing my muster Roles
& other papers, & will not go
to Clinton for the present.
visited St. James Lodge No. 47, A.F. & A.M.,
with Dr. Hutchins, also the dancing
Halls, in town.

SUNDAY 4

Cloudy but pleasant
Inspection at 8 a.m., & Dismal
at 5 P.M. Had the honor of escorting
the Colored to the Battalion.
Attended Presbyterian Church.

MONDAY, MARCH 5, 1866.

Cloudy rather cool
Made out my returns
of C.E. & F.E. for February
& sent them to Washington
Have toothache. Feel rather
unwell & taking medicine
Wrote a letter to Mother

TUESDAY 6

Cloudy, but pleasant,
on duty as Officer of the day.
Fought Daniel Pan away
last night.

But squared out after him but
did not get him.
4th Cavalry go to N. Orleans
to be mustered out.

were sent us, to be signed
for two months more pay,
which was done after morning
inspection. Went to Church
at night & heard a good sermon.

Cloudy & windy
on duty as Officer of
the Day.
Building a Guard House.
At night done heavy
Patrolling. 3 men shot.
7th Ky. mustered out & going home.

TUESDAY 13

cloudy & windy
referred charges against
Ed. Slaughter & others.
Detailed Pres. of a Council of
Administration, & sold the
effects of 3 deceased Soldiers

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 14, 1866.

cloudy, and warm,
Wrote a letter to Bro Alex.
On duty as Officer of the Day.
Closed up two liquor shops, and
arrested several soldiers & others.
Regt. paid 2 months pay by Maj. Ashburn.

THURSDAY 15

cloudy, rainy & chilly.
Relieved by Capt. Frook.
Referred charges against
Jeff. Woolly Co. & Rich^d Carson Co.
Bought \$300. Bonds of date June 1865
from Ch. Doane & paid \$5.00. Interest.

We were very cordially received.

Clear, warm.
Regt was reviewed & inspected
by Col. Edgerton Comd'g Post.
It soon went home on
30 days leave.

Attended Presbyterian Church
at night. Wrote to G. W. P. A. Chicago.

MONDAY 19

Cloudy, on duty Off. of day.
Rec'd 17 prisoners, released 7.
The Col sent me a horse
and I was ordered to go
through every street in the
lower part of town & report
on the sanitary condition

TUESDAY, MARCH 20, 1866.

Cloudy, relieved by Lieut.
Deering. Mr. Vincent went
to Clinton, also Capt. Frost.
Ignoring up Co. Brooks.
Put Sarge. Bridgford in arrest
for gambling with Oliver Jones.
Rec'd a letter from Mother & Bro.
Preferred charges against 3 men.

WEDNESDAY 21

Cloudy in forenoon with
heavy rain. Clear in afternoon.
On duty. Officer of the day,
also riding through North
part of the city, to report as to
its cleanliness &c. doing
active patrolling, arrested great
numbers.

THURSDAY 22

Clear forenoon. Cloudy and
windy in afternoon.
Preferred charges & had tried
8 men of the 65th Ill. C. Inf.
The Col sent me a horse to
ride on, round the town
with him & the Mayor.

FRIDAY, MARCH 28, 1866.

Cloudy morning with heavy rain, but clear P.M. Confined to tent, reading St Roberts ordered back.

Writing letters for men & one to Miss Smith.

SATURDAY 24

Clear nice day.
Reg. Officer of the day.
Mr Camp, Settler, sent
Bucklin & myself went
to the Masonic Lodge
& saw 2 Bros passed.
& had a pleasant social time.

SUNDAY 25

clear and pleasant
attended M. E. Church, South
in forenoon & Presbyterian
Church in evening

Had company inspection
& dress parade

MONDAY, MARCH 26, 1866.

Cloudy, some rain.
Grade out my manifest
Returns of C. C. & E. C.
Mr. Johnson caught a deserter
Saturday night.
Playing chuckers with Allen
& Hutchins.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 4, 1866.

Cloudy & very windy & dusty.
Released four prisoners.
Wrote & mailed a letter to
father containing photograph.
Peace Proclamation received.
It reduces our pay \$1. per day.
Have \$10.00. to pay for educating
poor colored children.

THURSDAY 5

Heavy rain last night
which continued all day.
Brindy and cool.
In tent reading, Hepworth's
Whip, Hoe & Sword.
Appointed Instructor of the N.C.
officers of the Reg. twice a week.
Attended officers' school.

FRIDAY 6

Cloudy. Had Co. fix kitchen
on duty, as Officers of the day
got my photographs from
Lytell's 1 1/2 doz. \$5.
Sent a letter to Hershey.

SATURDAY, APRIL 7, 1866.

Heavy, continuous rain all
day, but quite cool.
Lay all day in bed, with
headache & sore back.
Reading, Sargents, Peculiar,
a Story of Slavery. Jan 1861.

SUNDAY 8

Cloudy, but pleasant.
Had inspection of Comp.
Genl Roberts reported
back to Comp. in arrest.
Had dress parade.
Punished Jas. Harvey for getting
drunk.

MONDAY 9

Clear, lovely day.
Sent a letter with photo
