But the club song now is sung to the tune of: "If I Knew You Were Coming, I'd A Baked a Cake."

And sometime Friday night, the 40 members undoubtedly will recite the club slogan:

"Down not the one that is down,

"Bring him up in his sorrow,

"For this old world is a funny old world,

"And you may be down tomorrow."

Cameo celebrates 65th Anniversary

The Cameo Social Club will be celebrating its 65th year together next month. The event will take place the weekend of September 1 and 2. A full weekend of festivities is planned.

The history of the Cameo Club goes back to 1925, when out of a need for more active social, cultural and civic life, five teenagers met in the home of Anita Roberts, 978 St. Anthony, September 4, 1925 to organize a club. This was the birth of the Cameo Social Club. The group first chose the name "Birds of Paradise"

from a then current Hawaiian play. There were five charter members, all females. They were: the late Mrs. Herbert F. Foster, Sr., president; the late Mrs. Anita Thomas, vice president; Estyr Bradley Peake, secretary; Audrey Boswell Jones, treasurer and the late Gwen Kelly Twiggs.

In those days, no self-respecting group of teenagers were without a supervisor, chaperon or advisor. The late Annabelle Rideaux, sister of Cynthia Hitt Foster was asked to fill this role. She agreed on the condition that the name be changed to the Cameo Club.

"We met weekly, and collected 10 cents dues from each member. Cynthia was the "Belle" and we just couldn't keep Herbert Foster away from the meetings," notes the club history. Herbert then started bringing George Brooks, Sr. with him.

In October, 1925, plans were

made for the club's first introduction party at which time the males were admitted to membership. The male membership consisted of the late Herbert Foster, Sr., George Brooks, Sr., the late

Artie E. Boyd, the late Ronald Bradshaw, the late George Howard, the late Peter Robinson, the late Charles Hargrave, and the late Albert Patrick.

AKAs ban pledging in college campuses

When the men of Sigma Pi Phi, familiarly known as the Boule, a secret fraternity where membership is based on material and professional success, met in Los Angeles in mid-July several local members and their families were present for an impressive change of focus.

The roster of Minnesota members present included Dr. M.C. Cassius Ellis, Robert Covington, John Garner, Robert Murray, Joseph Sizer, Dr. David Taylor, Dr. Elliot Troup and Rufus Webster.

Nationally prominent members present were: U.S. Secretary of Health, Human Services Louis Sullivan, Democratic National Committee Chairman Ron Brown, Mayor Tom Bradley and NAACP Executive Director Benjamin Hooks--none of whom could be characterized as being interested in socializing and exclusivity and indifferent to the rest of Black America.

But this has been the frequent

charge against the Boule that incoming president Dr. Benjamin Major hopes to change by charging up the social action committee.

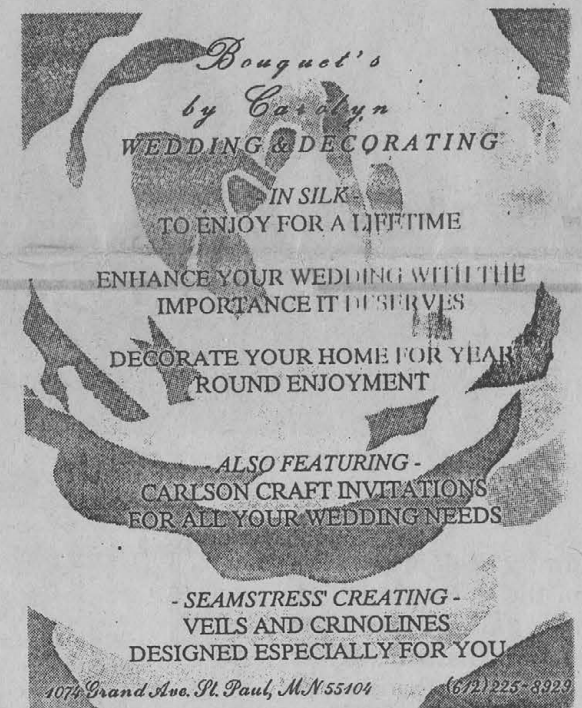
"We don't want to appear as if we were remaining above the problems of most Black people. We owe a lot of people, and we have to give back to our brothers and sisters," said Dr. Major who is retired from the practice of medicine but teaches in the School of Public Health at UC Berkely.

The 1300 Boule members and wives were a far cry from the somber mood of the national NAACP Conference that met in Los Angeles the week before, but the recent NAACP statistics regarding the endangered Black male would be a topic that concerned older members and younger achievers who joined the Boule with the assurance of more activism.

The Boule was originally organized by a group of doctors and dentists in Philadelphia in 1908 to network and help aspiring young men. Segregation kept most avenues of help closed for the African American public and the need for mentors then has continued to this day, Major said.

Worldwide the fraternity boasts 3000 men with the leaders in most communities being members who cherish their secret handshake, the practice of Greek rites and

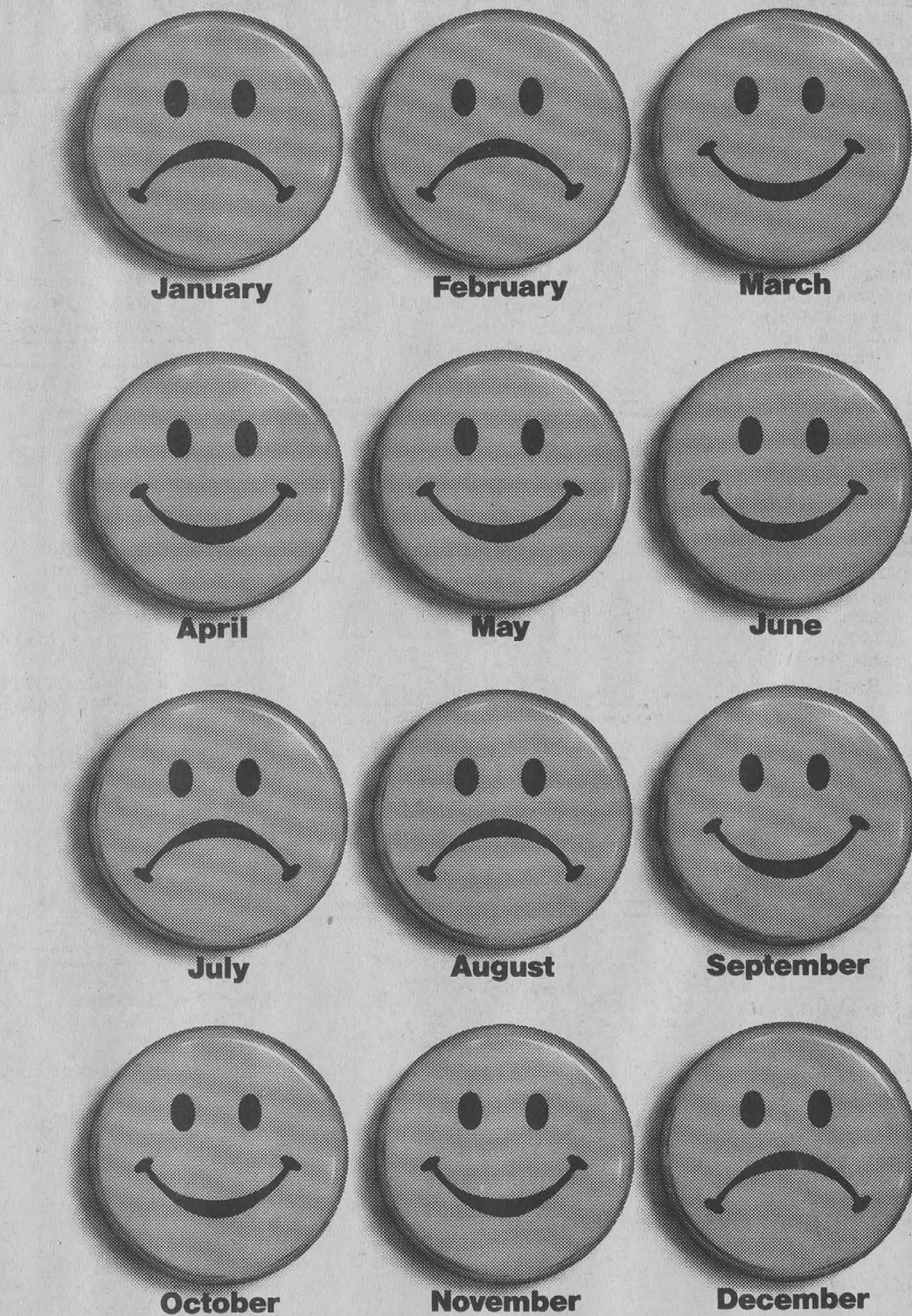

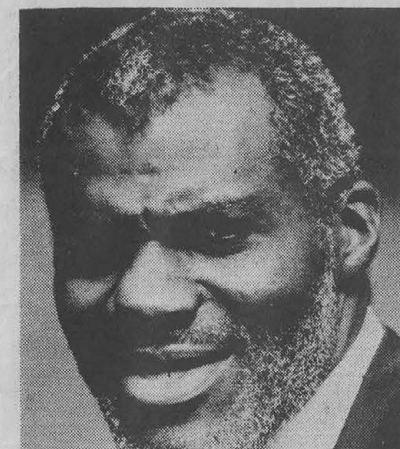

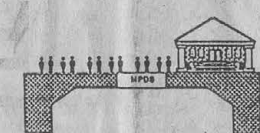

Musical fantasy comes alive on Prince soundtrack

There is the power of faith-in oneself and in a higher power. There is the power of greed and corruption. There is the never-ending power struggle between good and bad, and simply being human. And there is the power of music.

Graffiti Bridge captures the essence of these conflicts through music, sure to be this summer's most sizzling release. Produced, arranged and composed by Prince, this brilliant 17-song collection is a moving musical story and rock opera at once as only he could create. Performing on the soundtrack with Prince are the Time, Tevin Campbell, Mavis Staples and George Clinton.

"The album and the film are two separate works, in two different mediums, complementing and supporting each other," says Arnold Stiefel, one of the producers of the film. "The songs stand on their own as a story and as an album," he said.

"The reason Prince is here is that he offers another world," says bandmember Levi Seacer, Jr., who collaborates with Prince on three songs on the soundtrack. "There's the everyday things we go through in life and then there's the world he offers. His world is a lot of fun. He tells you that you're unique, but you got to dig down deep to find out what it is that makes you unique. Then you cultivate it. Prince is a perfect example of that."

Seacer's description also works to describe the way Prince composed an intricate web of characters on Graffiti Bridge whose personalities come through and unite as the

songs move the storyline along. Spiritually arresting images unfold as the songs' lyrics move like an emotional chameleon throughout the album, forever changing but always depicting the darker shades of seduction to the brightest shades of love.

Although the prolific artist has written numerous songs for a vast array of singers and has repeatedly proven his gift for creating distinctive characters through his music, Graffiti Bridge is the first opportunity to sample both elements in one package. Is the Time what Prince would sound like if he were a 7-piece R&B/funk band? Is "Melody Cool" how he would sound as a female gospel singer? Also featured in the set is the match-up the funk world has been waiting for-Prince and George Clinton! Like two scientists, they came up with a cure for that disease known as UNFUNKY on "We Can Funk." Sure to be the 90s "Knee Deep" with its coarse "I'm testin' positive 4 the funk. I'll gladly pee in anybody's cup..."

"The message behind Graffiti Bridge seems to be a combination of 60s optimism

and 90s darkness," according to the film's co-producer Craig Rice. "The music reflects the attitude that it'll be a lot better if we all get together and sing' while

this enables her to be a better teacher.

Winston revealed what motivated him to choose coaching as a profession. "I taught at a Catholic high school (in Chicago) and they made me coach." He quit that job to pursue his masters at Washington State University, where he served as a graduate assistant coach under George Raveling, now the head man at Southern California. "I was so swept up with what George was doing, the way he handled his players, the way he approached the game, approached life. He inspired me to go back into coaching."

Barnard added his college coach at Kentucky State, Lucious Mitchell, influenced him into coaching. "He got me into the coaching field. After graduating, I went and got my masters and came back and coached with

Lucious Mitchell. From there, I went to Norfolk State (where he coached for 11 years)."

All three coaches readily agreed: to be successful, you must be able to teach effectively. "You got to be an excellent teacher," Bernard said. "Coaching to me is teaching." Winston also teaches English at Emory. "I enjoy these guys going on and becoming doctors and lawyers."

It has never been a secret at the Masters. Now the PGA in full view of this controversy has stepped up procedures to mandate non-exclusionary membership policy. Most clubs will change to meet those guidelines, but does that mean that the tiger no longer has stripes? What this country needs is more Hall Thompsons. We could use one in every form of life, not just limited to sports. Look at the NCAA, NFL and look at the media that supports and helps form the racist opinions that are so much a part of the American way.

It's no different that more Blacks will go to prison whether or not they committed the crime. If the judge is white, the jury is white, how can a Black man get a fair trial when a racist policy has to get national attention for the truth to come out. The game that's played today is different, unlike the turn of the century, when visible racism was acceptable. Today it's acceptable only as a secret. 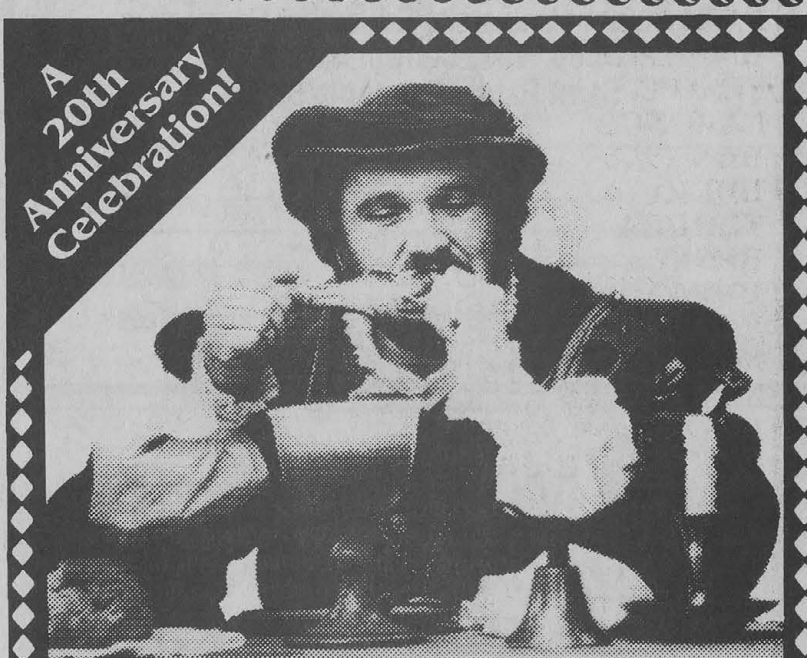

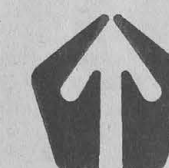

Windom is an Open school and has a limited english proficiency (LET) program. In addition to the regular student body, Windom draws many Hmong and Hispanic students. The challenge is to promote a philosophy which will work for all children so parents, translators and others are involved.

Also the Labor Day weekend produces another celebration and that is the anniversary of Pat and Pearl Schofield. Happy 53rd, Pat and Pearl.

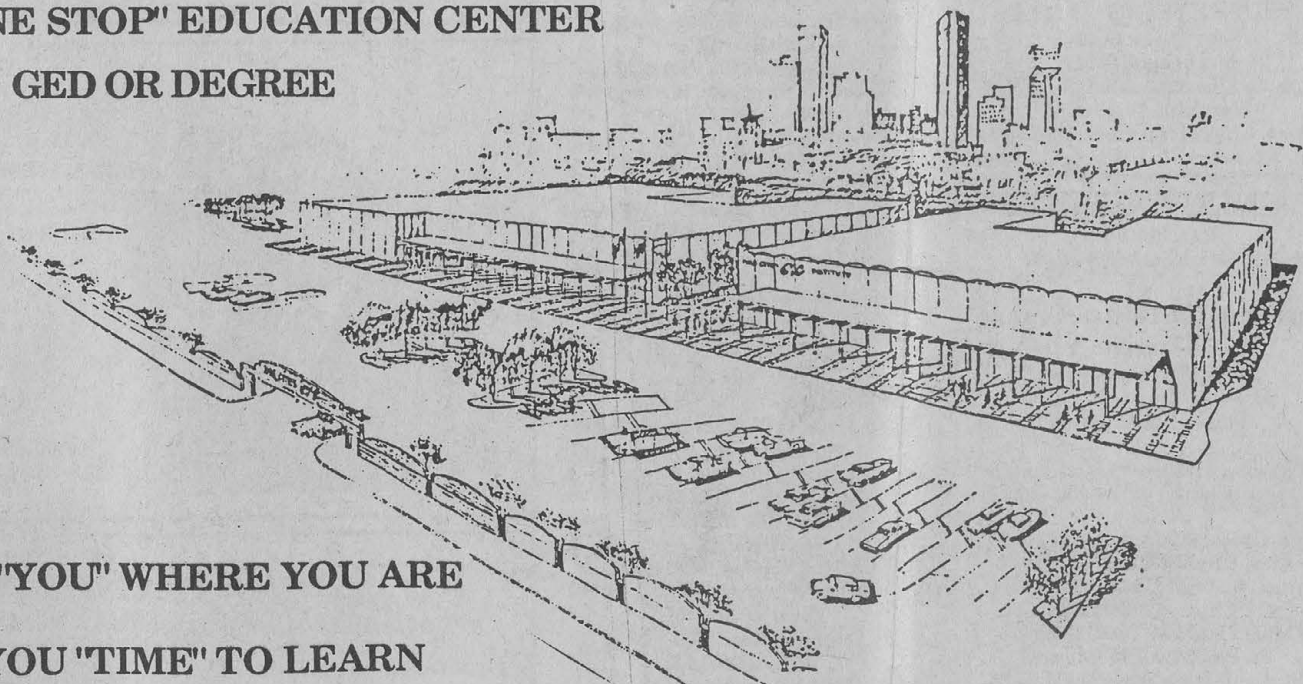

Does Racism Exist Within the Vikings?

In this day and age of Shoal Creek, it is very evident that the mere mention of that word racism starts temperatures to boil in all of us, despite the particular side of course we chose to live on.

It is quite apparent that the Minnesota Vikings, thanks to **Joey Browner**, last season being the catalyst help the Viking organization take a serious look at themselves from top to bottom in view of the national attention that focused on thirty years of life in the NFL.

Although the **Al Davis** hiring of Hall of Famer, **Art Shell**, as the first Black coach in the game's modern era help focus the attention of race relations westward, Viking General Manager Vice President **Mike Lynn**, decided to take a serious look at life on the Viking ship. He found that he had only one Black in the front office, Director of Players personnel, **Frank Gilliam**, who has served this organization for 20 years and is most responsible for the selection of the other Blacks in the organization, those on the field, in 1988. **Jerry Brown** became the first Black Viking Assistant Coach, it is apparent that Lynn recognized the appearance of perceived bias.

The Vikings, since the end of last season made **Chris Doleman**, **Joey Browner** and **Anthony Carter**, millionaires, joining **Herschel Walker** and **Mike Merriweather** and **Wade Wilson**, in that exclusive club in one year Black players are now the majority instead of the minority with big contracts on the Vikings.

The Vikings also opened the door of opportunity to support staff to Blacks **Debra Pruitt**, **Jeff Robinson** in public relations, two Black ball boys, and three Black cheerleaders or danceline members. Despite this sudden change in philosophy, several players who shall remain nameless, feel that the money paid to Doleman, Browner, and Carter is a result of the new billion dollar network TV contract, not Lynn paying from the heart. The players are watching Lynn very closely. They see him at practice now for the first time in seventeen years. The Pacos River unity trip will be successful for the Vikings, only if Lynn can keep the focus off himself and on the field where it belongs.

Vikings Notes/Quotes

Joey Browner says, "There is a sense of urgency with this team this year. We've been there and with lots of playoff

experience on our team, and there is no reason why we shouldn't be back in the playoffs, and go further than what we have. Myself, I just play, and play by example. I don't predict anything, it's just a matter of forty four other guys wanting the same thing as I do."

Jerry Burns says, "There's more attention being paid this year on the team than the holdouts last year by the media. Things have been smooth. However, several nuisance injuries have held the team progress back. However, the team is developing on time. We want to use the exhibition games to not only look at young players, but also to find out if they are winners or not."

Burns on Walker, "Having **Herschel Walker** in training camp has been great. He's a glassy guy. He shows the younger players what real tough hard work ethics mean, relative to success in this game. He's (Walker) getting better at the things we do that perhaps he hasn't had as much experience in previously. We're using him much more in our passing game than we did a year ago, because we recognize the things he can do well and the talents he has there."

call "Slyce". However, **Phillipe** started wanting to go out on his own. "I wanted to do originals. The band wanted to do covers."

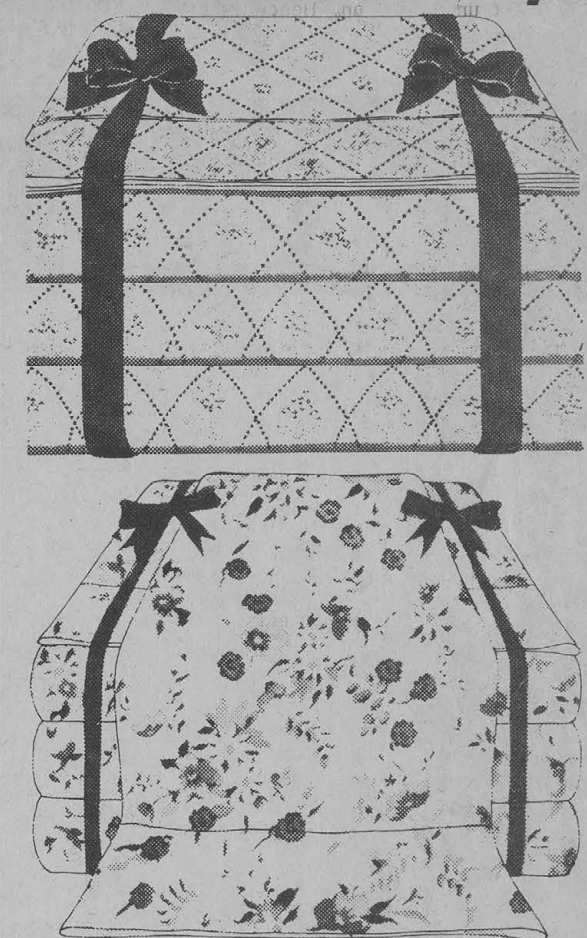

Terry because I wanted to talk to him as a columnist and a member of his church. Here are some of the excerpts from our conversation. "A pastor is the chief executive of the church and I am given this authority by my congregation and the Bible. I feel if members have an ill feeling toward another member, or even toward me as their pastor, it's their duty to come to me and straighten the matter out, and not let situations get out of hand. You must carry a Christ like attitude to the problem so that it can be solved quickly and quietly." Rev. Terry went on with the interview, but then he knows this columnist. We are the same sign, Leo, born on the same day, although I'm much older. We have learned that people will judge you and you have to face life's criticisms. You have to learn that apologies can be made, sometimes to keep peace. And then leave things in the hands of God. That heart to heart conversation lets God know when you are sometimes blamed falsely. If you are guilty of wrongness, then you ask man and God for forgiveness. This goes for all of us who try for living a Christian life. We are quick to judge, find fault and forget that we are all human and subject to error.

I feel that we have one of the community's finest ministers who has a real musical and spiritual leadership. I looked around the choir recently and saw the crowd and it gave me know that there was where it was happening at Greater Sabathani. Our choirs are still a big attraction and we pack houses when we appear. Maybe that's why a good friend of mine said to me recently, "To you little Herbie, Sabathani can do no wrong." Well, yes, we have made some good headlines and I really love my church, I have faith to be as active as I should. But I have helped pack that church with just writing about it and I will do it again.

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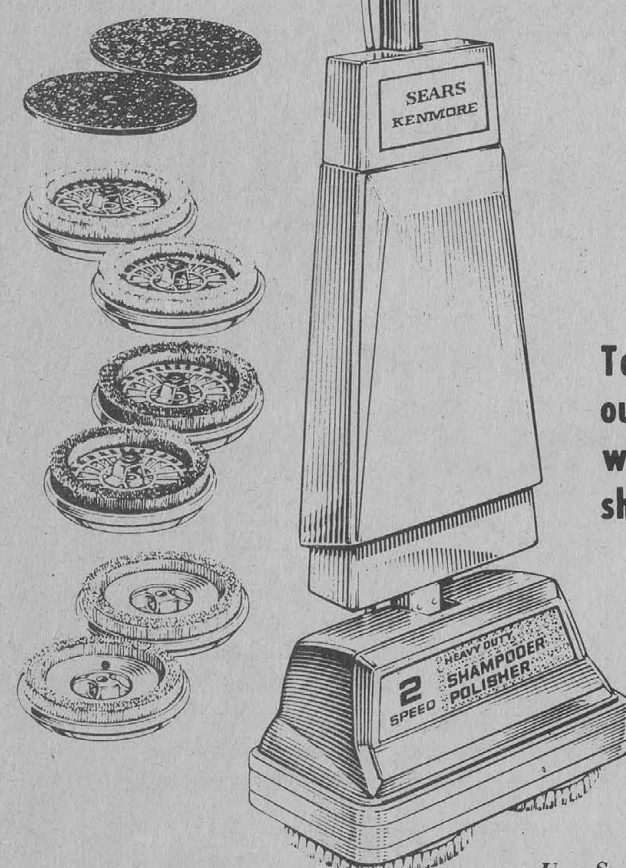
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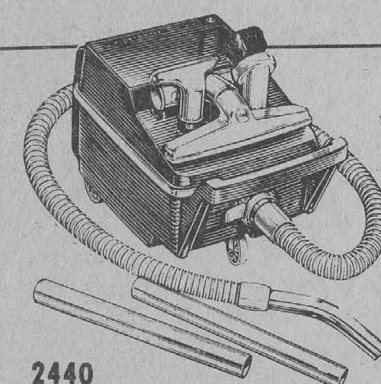

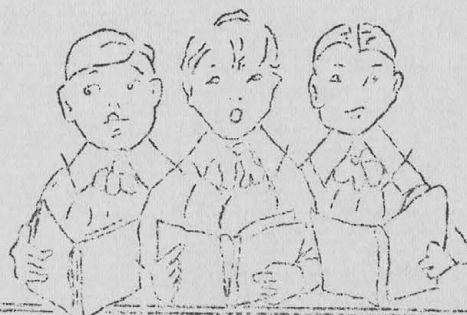

Constitution And By-Laws of the
Cameo Social Club
of
St. Paul, Minnesota

Constitution for 1978

Article I - Name and Object

This association shall be known by the name of the "Cameo Social Club" of the Twin Cities.

"We the members of the Cameo Social Club, in order to provide the community with a social order of individuals with common ideals and aspirations, to foster wholesome social entertainment for the community in general and for the club members specifically, provide assistance to the social leadership of the community as a whole, do establish this constitution as the general laws by which Said club shall be governed.

Article II - Officers

The officers of this club shall be : a President, Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, and a Treasurer.

Article III - Officers Duties

Section I

It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the club, apportion duties, call all special meetings, appoint all committees, and perform such duties as his or her office may require.

Section II

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of that office.

Section III

The Corresponding Secretary shall write all communications of all or special meetings, shall notify absent members after three (3) regular meetings, shall notify each new member of his or her admittance into the club. He shall notify all members of any infraction such as; delinquent dues, fines, etc, for which he or she is responsible. The Treasurer or Financial Secretary shall notify the Corresponding Secretary of delinquencies.

Section IV

The Financial Secretary shall call the roll and collect dues.

Section V

The treasurer shall receive all money belonging to the club; Keep an accurate record of all fines, dues, and of all receipts and expenditures, shall report the state of the treasury and shall make no payment without an order from and countersigned by the President.

Section VI

No office or committee shall assume any direct or final responsibility in making decisions on money matters.

Article IV - Election of Officers

Section I

All elections for officers shall be made by secret ballot and shall be determined by the majority of members present.

Section II

No office shall be held by the same person for more than two consecutive years.

Article V - Members

Section I

The membership shall consist of not more than (45) Forty Five members. Additional names will be placed on a waiting list.

Section II

Any member failing to pay delinquent dues or assessments will be automatically suspended subject to reinstatement if the member so desires.

Section III

Dues shall be \$2.00 per month.

Section IV

New members shall be voted on by secret ballot. Any person receiving three fourth of the votes present shall be admitted as a member of the Cameo Social Club.

Section V

No person who is not a member shall sit in on a meeting.

Article VI - Order of Business

Section I

A motion to change the order of business or to postpone the performance of the regular duties shall require three fourths of the votes of the members present.

Section II - By- Laws

1. This club shall meet every (3rd) third Sunday at 4 P. M. and last not more than (1) one hour.

2. Members unable to attend must notify the hostess or host (2) two hours before the meeting unless an emergency exists.

3. The President shall appoint a budget committee to set up a yearly budget.

4. An initiation fee of \$10.00 shall be paid by each new member upon admittance to the club.

5. That the Quorum shall consist of ten (10) members.

6. The membership shall adopt a set budget drafted by the Budget Committee and voted upon by the majority.

7. No moneys shall be spent over and above the set budget for any one specific affair or project unless approved by the majority vote present.

8. Any member of the committee, without a reasonable excuse failing to answer or participate after three successive calls by the chairman shall be replaced by the chairman.

9. Any chairman of a committee who fails to function on a committee may be replaced by the president.

EXPENSES

All chairman who desire reimbursement for expenses incurred while on club business must itemize and submit bill and/or receipt for payment of same.

10. All chairman programs for a project must be submitted to the club for approval.

Any changes desired in a program after being submitted to the club membership and approved by a majority vote must first be submitted to the Executive Board, who in turn upon the approval of the change or changes, shall recommend the same to the membership: Any member of the club who desires to make any recommendations in regard to a program or project, must first submit the same to the Executive Board.

Any grievance must be put in writing, presented to the Executive board who in turn shall present the same to the club.

11. In the event of Death of a member it shall be the duty of the Sunshine Chairman to send flowers , a plant, or a wreath to immediate family of members whose relatives reside and when services are held within the Twin cities, and to send \$10.00 to relatives of members who reside outside of the cities. (Immediate family: Husband, Wife, Mother, Father, Son or Daughter.) Condolance cards will be sent to others of the family.

12. The books of The Cameo Social Club Shall be audited annually and a complete report given.
