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CONSTITUTION OF THE CAMEO SOCIAL CLUBArticle I

- Section I -- The name of this organization shall be The Cameo Social Club.
- " II -- The purpose of the Cameo Social Club will be to stimulate and develop social activities among its group.
- " III -- Motto: "Down not the one who is down,
Cheer him up in his sorrow,
For this old world is a funny old world,
And you may be down tomorrow."

Article II

- Section I -- The officers of this Club shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary, Financial Secretary, and Treasurer.
- " II -- The officers shall be elected the second meeting in September and February, respectively.
- " III -- The duties of the officers shall be:
- A. President -- The president shall preside over all regular and call meetings and shall be ex-officio over all committees.
 - B. Vice-President -- The vice-president shall preside over all meetings in the absence of the president, and shall investigate all prospective new members.
 - C. Secretary -- The secretary shall keep a record of all meetings and business transacted at the meetings.
 - D. Financial Secretary -- The financial secretary shall collect all dues, issue delinquent notices, and keep a record of all receipts and disbursements.
 - E. Treasurer -- The treasurer shall deposit all money in the bank and keep a record of all money entered in and withdrawn.

Article III

- Section I -- The standing committees - social, initiation, and auditing are to be appointed by the President, and shall be composed of members appointed by the chairman of each committee.
- " II -- The Social Committee shall provide entertainment for the Club, and shall take full charge of all parties assisted by the officers.
- " III -- The Initiation Committee shall see that all new members are properly initiated within thirty days after admission.
- " IV -- The Executive Committee shall meet when called by the President for the purpose of outlining future activities for the Club.
- " V -- Any Committee failing to function shall be replaced by the President.
- " VI -- A Parliamentarian shall be appointed by the President for the purpose of informing the Club members on matters of parliamentary law.
- " VII -- The Auditing Committee shall audit the books at the end of each term.

Article IV

- Section I -- The Club shall meet every other Wednesday at 9 p.m., beginning the second Wednesday in September and closing the fourth Wednesday in June.
- " II -- The Club shall meet at the home of one of its members in alphabetical order. In case member cannot have Club in his turn, he shall take the first or second meeting following.
- " III -- A quorum shall consist of eleven members.

Article V

- Section I -- The Club colors shall be pea green and pink.
- " II -- The Club flowers shall be roses.
- " III -- The Club insignia shall be rosettes.

Article VI

- Section I -- The dues shall be fifteen cents per meeting.
- " II -- The Initiation fee shall be \$2.00.
- " III -- Any member is unfinancial who is four meetings in arrears, and after being notified by letter will have one week to remit before being automatically suspended.
- " IV -- A tax levied by the Club for any affair must be paid regardless of any excuses or absences by each member.
- " V -- Members not paying tax are not allowed to attend any function for which the tax is levied.
- " VI -- Guests to be invited by the Club members will not receive an invitation until the tax is paid.

Article VII

- Section I -- The membership of this Club shall not exceed thirty-two - 16 boys and 16 girls.
- " II -- The age limit shall be 19 for girls and 21 for boys.
- " III -- Prospective members shall receive three-fourths vote of the members present to be admitted to membership in the Club.
- " IV -- If a members proves unworthy of membership in the Club, he can be ejected by a three-fourths vote of the members present at the meeting in which the action is taken.
- " V -- Members are not eligible to vote or hold office unless properly initiated.
- " VI -- The Secretary of the Club shall be exempt from paying dues.
- " VII -- Any former member who resigned from the Club in good standing can be voted in ahead of anyone on the waiting list.
- " VIII -- Any new member will be required to pay initiation fees within two weeks after being voted into the Club.

Article VIII

- Section I -- The Club's money shall be deposited in the First National Bank under a Savings Account. All disbursements must be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by the President.
- " II -- All expenditures shall be duly voted upon and receipts submitted on all reports.

Article IX

- Section I -- The activities of the Club shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present at the meeting in which such an issue is to be decided upon.

Article X

- Section I -- This Constitution can be amended by tabling of the prospective amendment in writing to be voted on at the next meeting, a three-fourths vote being necessary for its adoption.

1961 Cameo Social Club Cotillion Ball


Dear Mrs. Darnell:

NAACP Opens Member Drive--

NEGROES CALLED PLANNING VICTIMS

St. Paul is little different from other cities discriminating against Negroes in urban redevelopment and freeway programs, a national Negro leader said here Sunday.

Clarence Mitchell, Washington bureau chief for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said:

1. Dislocation by freeways and renewal programs affects a disproportionately large part of the colored population.

2. Relocation of colored families is not adequate.

3. Dislocated families are not given adequate chance to move back into renewed areas.

"Nowhere have I seen an adequate plan to solve these problems," he said.

He said clearance programs hit Negro neighborhoods hardest because of property values and be-

cause "those are areas of least resistance."

CHOICE LIMITED

"If there was a natural housing market there would be no problem," he said. "White residents have no problems, but Negroes have no free choice of other housing."

He said the NAACP has had little success fighting these problems through legislation or changes in administrative policies and is resorting to court fights in several southern cities.

Talking to a kickoff rally at St. James AME church for a month-long local NAACP membership drive, Mr. Mitchell warned there is growing resistance to the law in this nation.

He said continued denial of voting rights contrary to last year's civil rights law is following the same pattern as resistance to the Supreme Court decision on segregation.

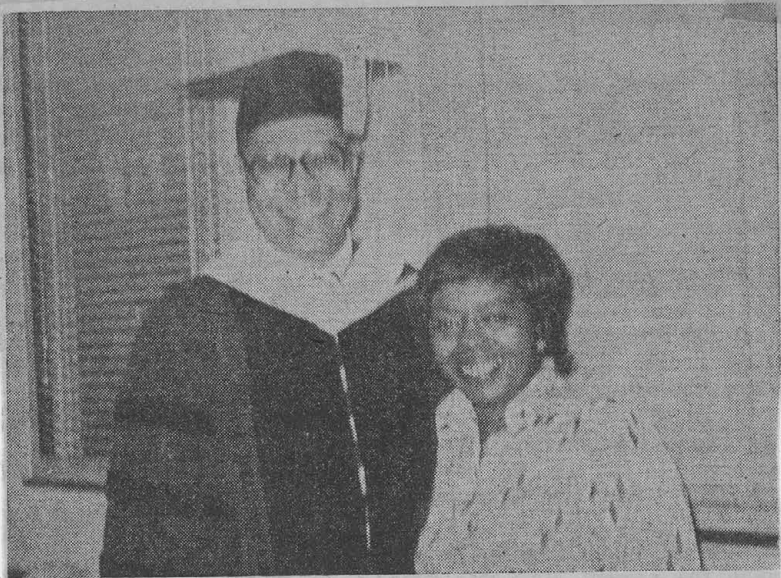

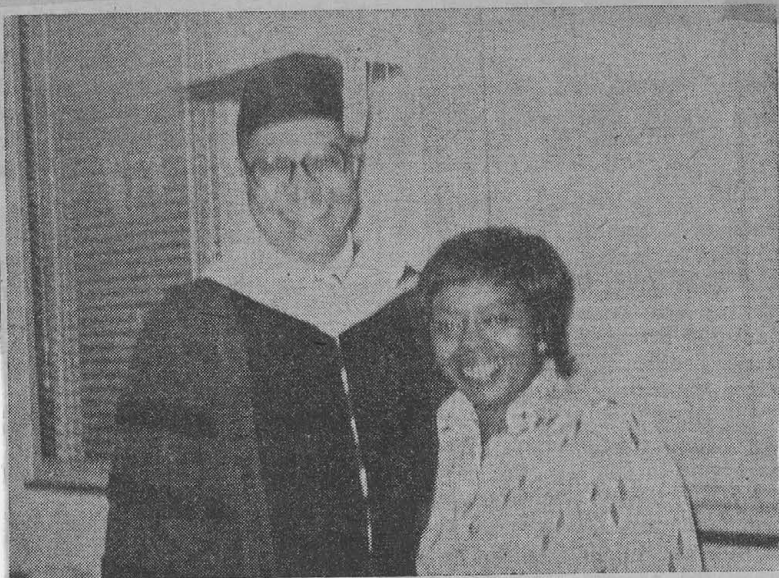

NAACP Opens Member Drive

NEGROES CALLED PL

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St. Paul is little different from other cities discriminating against Negroes in urban redevelopment and freeway programs, a national Negro leader said here Sunday.

Clarence Mitchell, Washington bureau chief for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said:

1. Dislocation by freeways and renewal programs affects a disproportionately large part of the colored population.
2. Relocation of colored families is not adequate.
3. Dislocated families are not given adequate chance to move back into renewed areas.

"Nowhere have I seen an adequate plan to solve these problems," he said.

He said clearance programs hit Negro neighborhoods hardest because of property values and be-

cause "those are areas of least resistance."

CHOICE LIMITED

"If there was a natural housing market there would be no problem," he said. "White residents have no problems, but Negroes have no free choice of other housing."

He said the NAACP has had little success fighting these problems through legislation or changes in administrative policies and is resorting to court fights in several southern cities.

Talking to a kickoff rally at St. James AME church for a month-long local NAACP membership drive, Mr. Mitchell warned there is growing resistance to the law in this nation.

He said continued denial of voting rights contrary to last year's civil rights law is following the same pattern as resistance to the Supreme Court decision on segregation.

"The denial is the result of a major conspiracy involving governors, state legislatures and many leading citizens." He said Minnesota congressmen have stood firm for civil rights issues but many others have voted with southern obstructionists.

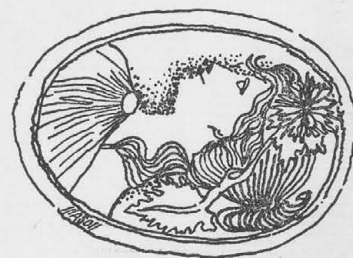

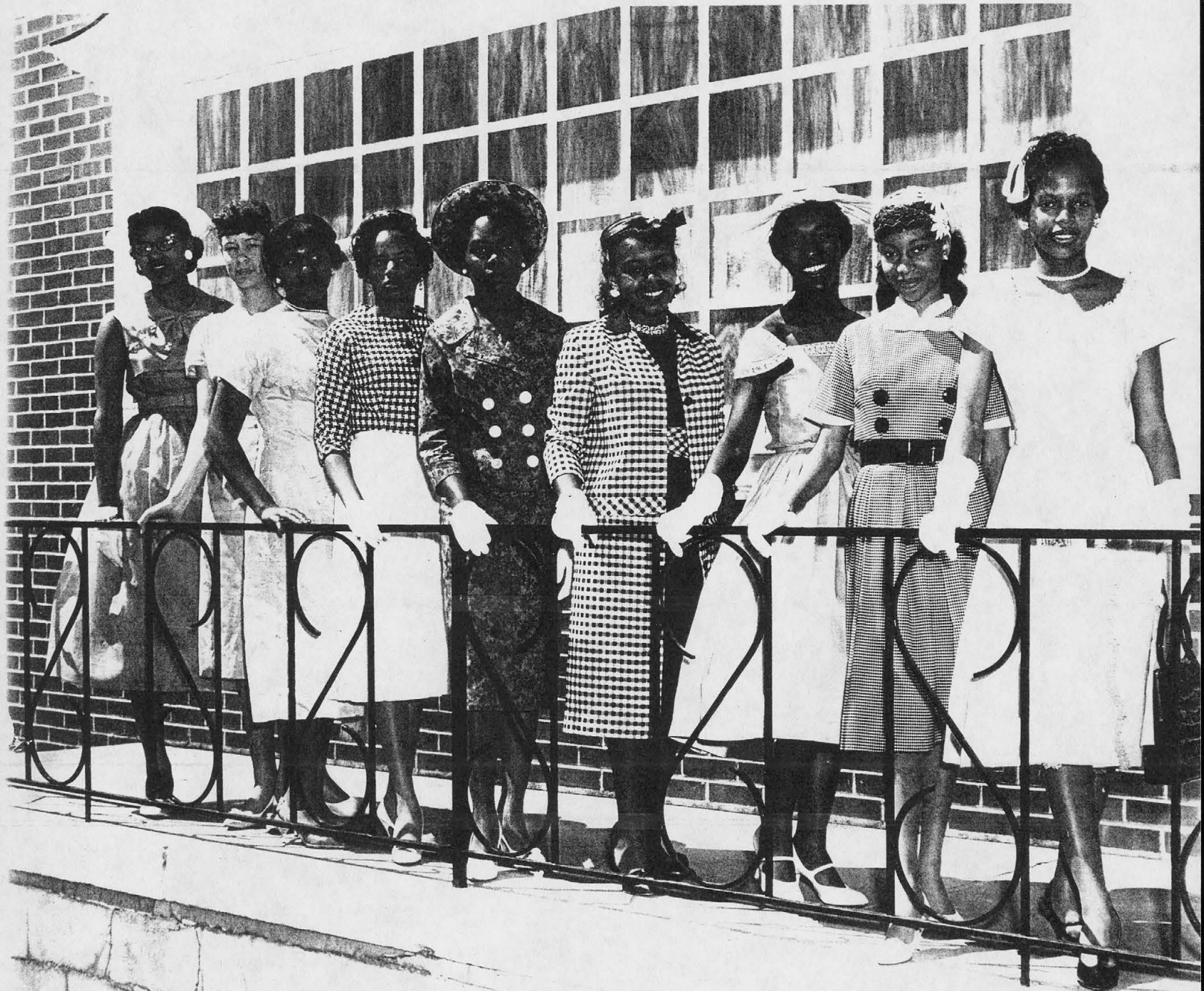

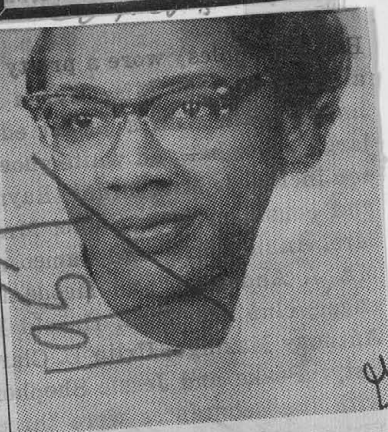

Two Parades—

THERE WERE TWO PARADES in the Twin Cities last week. One was the gigantic Minneapolis Aquatennial extravaganza. The other was, by comparison, a modest march. It formed at Oxford and Rondo and was called a membership "Victory" parade by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The principle participants were five young ladies, in sheer white formals, perched on the backs of shiny convertibles. I went to that parade. Because of a telephone call.

It came from the white judges who, a few nights before, had been asked to pick one of the five as Miss Minnesota NAACP. And they were struck by the frank expression of hopes, fears and aspirations of the five Negro girls.

JOYCE HUGHES (she was the winner), sophomore at Carleton college; aspiring librarian, first Negro cheerleader Carleton has ever had, finished her freshman year with a near-A average, is a former president of Girls' State.

SHERRIE LEE MAZINGO, senior at Central high school, who plans to go to college.

LORRAINE JOHNSON, piano teacher, accomplished piano player, church organist, who will enroll in the Juilliard school of music this fall.

JOETTA KEMP, stenographer in a St. Paul firm.

MARVA BOYD, stenographer in the State Welfare department, still excited over her first job after graduating from Central high school.

TWENTY FIVE YEARS ago the facts in these thumbnail biographies would not have been possible in St. Paul. These girls could have looked forward to becoming maids, waitresses and cleaning women, just as their boy friends could look as high as jobs as porters, dining car waiters.

But let's listen to Marva Boyd. She took a civil service examination and did so well they skipped her over the lowest position and on to the second rung up the ladder.

"It didn't make a bit of difference that I was a Negro," she says. "But I'll tell you this. I never go to work but what I don't feel just a little as if I were on parade as a member of my race. I try to dress simply. I wouldn't wear anything loud in red or yellow, for instance. The other girls would say, 'That's the way all Negroes dress.' I always feel I'm representing my people. I have to be just a little better and try a little harder than anybody else. You never lose that feeling."

Joetta Kemp is the first Negro ever hired at the firm where she works. "The rest of the girls," she says, "treat me like anybody else—at coffee breaks, the company picnic. 'But I have the feeling that I ought to type about 10 words a minute faster than anybody else. I remember when I was hired. Ordinarily the personnel manager's decision would be final. At least I think so. But in my case, he said he would have to check with his higher ups. Maybe I just imagined this. But I got the idea I was a special case. Now I want to do so well there that I'll be a credit to my race and maybe open the door for other Negro girls."

"Sure, I want to get married some day and have a home. And I'd like to have a rambler and put it where I choose and not in this neighborhood, sandwiched in between these houses."

Lorraine Johnson—as a music teacher—is her own employer. "I've got both white and Negroes as pupils," she says.

Joyce Hughes said she thinks Carleton college is a wonderful school in its tolerance toward Negroes. "The people at the college and in Northfield have gone out of their way to be nice," she says. "I'd say I get better treatment than white students. I was a cheer leader at Central in Minneapolis and I loved it. . . . At Carleton I tried out with the rest. I made it."

Miss Mazingo says she looks back on the era in which her mother grew up as a Negro in the city and is amazed at how much more opportunity a Negro girl has among white people these days.

The parade starting whistle blew and the cars began to move. It may have been a smaller procession than the Aquatennial parade, but maybe it had greater meaning.

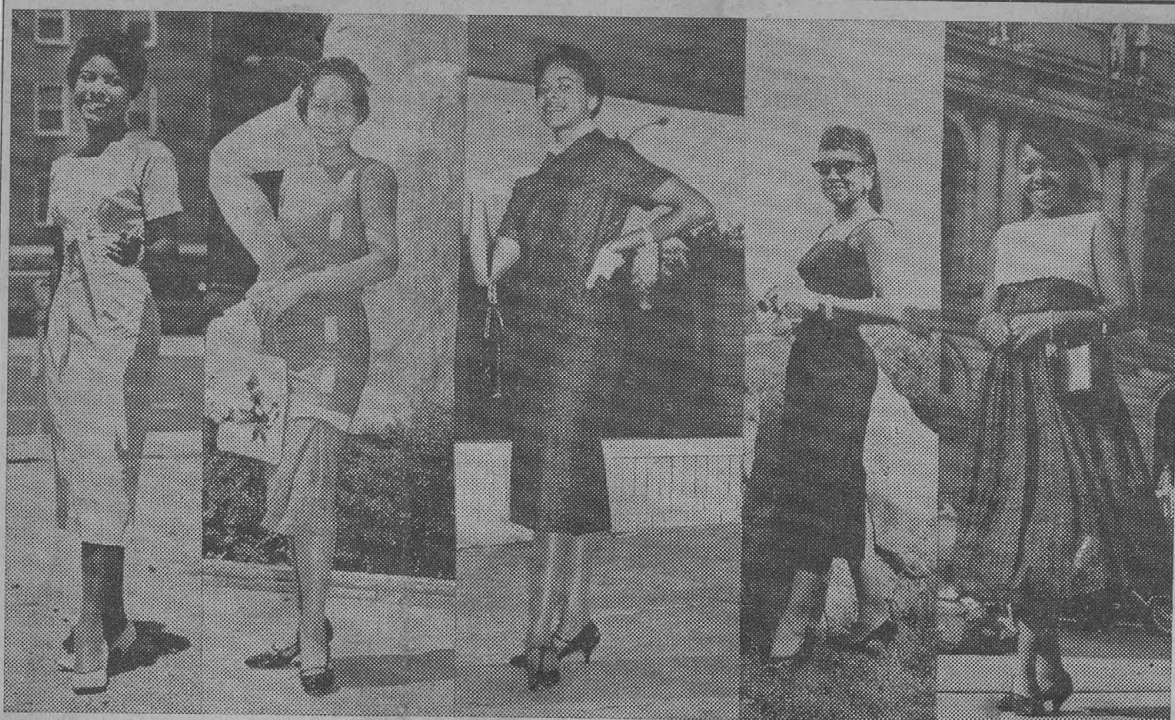

Carleton Girl Going to Spain Under Fulbright Scholarship

NORTHFIELD — A Carleton college senior who made "an arbitrary decision" to take Spanish as a freshman and picked up so many credits she decided to major in it will study Spanish literature next year at the University of Madrid as the first Fulbright scholar in her graduating class.

"I just hope I can master the language," says 21-year-old Joyce Hughes, who received word last week that her year-old application for the scholarship had been accepted. The letter bringing the big news was waiting when she returned home from an Easter visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Solomon Hughes, 3716 Fourth ave. S., Minneapolis.

Characteristically, she kept so quiet about the honor that even her parents and the student she dates at Carleton had to find out about it through other channels. Among the first to congratulate her was a Carleton classmate, Elizabeth Tweedy of Winona, a close friend since 1956, when both girls attended Girls State in St. Paul. Joyce was elected governor that year, the first Negro to win the honor, and later was a Girls Nation delegate.

She is also the first Negro Fulbright coed at Carleton, a fact of which she is proud, although she makes it plain that she has not had special consideration because of her race. "I've been treated like everybody else," she says, "no better, no worse."

Continuing in college a behavior pattern set in grade and high school, she has consistently ranked in the upper 10 per cent of her class scholastically and has been active in a variety of extra-curriculars. She was elected to Phi Beta Kappa several weeks ago and about the same time contributed a show-stopping Cuban dance number to the Carleton production of Guys And Dolls.

She has been an officer of sociology club, Orchestris dance group and Women's league, has been chairman of homecoming and winter carnival committees and has served as a cheerleader since her freshman year.

Clothes have interested her since she made doll wardrobes as a youngster. Last summer she was one of 20 United States coeds who

edited the college edition of Mademoiselle magazine, and she did such an A-plus job as merchandising head that the magazine kept her on an extra month. She designs and makes most of her own clothes, including the gold-embroidered white formal she wore as a Carleton 1960 Winter Carnival queen candidate.

A trim size 7, she prefers the understated look in clothes and keeps her things casual and tailored.

In addition to sewing and design, her hobbies are golf, tennis and bowling. She

reads a lot—"right now poetry, because it's quicker"—and is still a little uncertain about what she will do after next year. She's been offered a University of Minnesota law school scholarship and thinks she probably will return here to study law.

This summer she hopes to find a job and study French and Italian on her own, with a view to "becoming proficient in both and, later, less popular languages, such as Hindu, Arabic and Portuguese." She firmly believes that "the language barrier is often the cause of misunderstanding."

An unruffled person who doesn't upset easily, the Carleton senior admits one big dislike: disorganized people and events. "And I believe in doing things now, not putting them off," she adds.

Asked how that might affect her behavior in a country where manana is a way of life, she chuckled and said, "Maybe I'll have to change my ways."
