


In view of the recommendations of Judge Reid and the operating and traffic department officers, you are authorized to arrange to purchase this property for not to exceed the sum of \$7400.00.


Mr. Charles Donnelly:

Referring to your letter of November 5th and returning file about proposed purchase of a block of ground near our tracks at Auburn:

Mr. Stevens has furnished the attached print colored to show the property to be purchased and proposed location of tracks to serve same. The property is a direct continuation of our existing freight house property and is well adapted for industrial locations. It can be easily and cheaply served by trackage.

While we have no industries definitely in view, we have no sites in the vicinity of the depot, or close enough to the business district to place us in position to offer favorable locations to prospective industries and I, therefore, concur in the recommendation of our Engineering and Operating Department Officers that the property be purchased.

#### MR. CHARLES DONNELLY:

Returning Judge Reid's letter dated October 30 and other papers received with your letter of November 2, about proposed purchase of ground adjacent to our tracks at Auburn, Washington.

When I was in Seattle, Mr. Coman talked with me about the purchase of this ground. The district between Seattle and Tacoma is developing rapidly. The U.P. and CM&StP have made every effort to locate industries on their joint tracks and have been successful to the extent of getting several lettuce packing and shipping houses, including one at Auburn.

Auburn is a good location for us considered from Operating Department standpoint. Our position there is relatively strong and we are justified in doing everything possible to concentrate business at that point, but we have no available sites in the vicinity of our depot or anywhere close to the business district, and, as matter stands today, our competitors would get any new industries developed at that point.

Mr. Coman fully realizes the chance we are taking and understands the embarrassment we will suffer should we buy this land and make no use of it, but he and Mr. Williams are convinced that we ought to have it and I feel that I am justified in endorsing his recommendation that Mr. Donnelly, #2.

My dear Mr. Donnelly:

I enclose herewith a blue print of a part of Auburn, Washington, showing outlined in red a piece of property which the Traffic Department would like to have our company purchase with a view of having a desirable site or sites for future industries.

It is believed that this property can be bought for \$7400.00. Mr. V.E. Williams has made an investigation and reports that in his opinion that would be a reasonable price for the property, particularly when taking into consideration the fact that the tract of land has a frontage of 290 feet on a paved street and an equal frontage on our railroad track. The Traffic Department has not now any industry to locate on this property but feels that it is of great advantage to have property available so when the opportunity arises, a party may be located without danger of his getting away to some other company.

The Traffic Department has in mind the purchase of a small piece of property at Donald I believe in the

Yakima Valley, and in that case as in this, no industry is in sight to be located but it is felt that it is wise in both instances to be ready. I think myself that within the bounds of reason and prudence this is a good policy to follow. Of course, I am not submitting the Donald matter but am merely mentioning it in order that you will understand that this is not an isolated case and that others of a similar nature may be presented to you.

I have no hesitancy in joining in the recommendation that the property be acquired.
