Charge 2<sup>nd</sup> Conduct unbecoming an officer & Gentleman Specification 1<sup>st</sup> In this that he Lieut Cantine did at the Camp at Lochets Harbour between the 5<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> January 1815. Falsely Report himself Sick particularly on the 9<sup>th</sup> January 1815 - Specification 2<sup>nd</sup> In this that he Lieut Cantine did several times between the 5<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> days of January 1815 - absent himself from his Regiment at the Camp at Lochets Harbour, and frequented tavern or taverns at night being during that time either upon the Sick report or Excused from detail by is positively declaring himself to be unwell to perform duty particularly on the 20<sup>th</sup> January 1815. The Court on mature deliberation of the testimony adduced find L<sup>t</sup>. M. C. Cantine of 13<sup>th</sup> Reg<sup>t</sup> not Guilty of either of the Charge or Specifications proffered against him, The Commanding officer approves of the proceedings and Sentence of the Court and Orders that L<sup>t</sup> Cantine will receive his Sword and Duty " By Command

Specification passing out of Cantonment

at Lochets Harbour on or about the 3<sup>rd</sup> day February 1815. Without permission after tattoo. To which Charge & Specification the prisoner pleaded not Guilty. The Court after mature deliberation on the evidence adduced are of Opinion that the said Prisoner. Sergeant Genesius Stoddard is guilty of the Charge & Specification alleged & do Sentence him to be confined to the Chains of a Private Sentinel.

The good conduct of the said Prisoner. Sergeant Genesius Stoddard here before has induced the Court to recommend him to the Commanding officer - Clemency the Court adjourned. The Major Commanding approved the Sentence awarded against Sergeant Genesius Stoddard, but in consequence of his former good conduct it is remitted & he is ordered to return to his Duty.

To which charges the Prisoner pleads not guilty, except to the breathing of his musket, to which he did plead guilty. The Court upon due deliberations find the prisoner guilty and sentence him to be kept at hard labour, sixteen days and to have five Dollars stopped from his monthly wages.

Information having been given to the War Department that many persons have purchased from soldiers their claim for bounty lands it is therefore deemed proper to publish as a Genl. Caution, the following extract of the act of Congress, entitled an Act for Designating Surveying

and Granting the Military bounty lands, pass May 8<sup>th</sup> 1812. by which all sales of Military land Counties, before granted from the War Department, have been granted and Declared to be null & void. Viz. Section 2<sup>d</sup> the Secretary for the Department of War for the being shall from time to time issue warrants for the Military land Counties, to persons entitled thereto. provided always that such warrants shall be issued only in names of the persons, thus entitled, and be by them, or their representatives, applied for within five years after the said persons shall become entitled thereto - and the said warrants shall not be assignable or transferable in any manner whatever.

This provision of the Act will be rigidly adhered to and the most careful scrutiny had, in every case, before a warrant will be issued.
