From hand woven tweeds to slinky satins, Ralph Lauren knows his lady.





Geoffrey Beene, who showed his fall collection at the annual Minneapolis Institute of Arts benefit Saturday, is already working on next spring's collection.

And although he won't talk about what spring will bring, he says; "Whatever it is, it will have nothing to do with peasants. (He's referring to the recent flap in Paris over Yves St. Laurent's peasant look which some fashion prognosticators have said will revolutionize the fashion world.)

"I adore peasants and the way they dress," said Beene, "but I won't be doing it. I'll be going to the totally opposite pole. I really don't want to take the time to discuss it — it's a waste of my time, your time and your reader's time."

Beene believes "the next revolution in fashion will not come from a designer but from the laboratory chemist — things like thermal control and fabrics which travel easily. We're much closer to (the year) 2000 than we realize. This is the first time I've been interested in synthetic fabrics. Qiana, for example, has been doing great things. It's been perfected. I resisted it at first."

Beene appeared first Saturday at a rehearsal tea at L'hotel Sofitel, to which the public was invited. The major show, sponsored by the Friends of the Institute and Dayton's Oval Room, was held preceding a buffet supper which was followed by dancing on the terrace.

The Sofitel garden court-atrium was the spectacular backdrop for the show. Models criss-crossed a multi-level stage and descended to a pool-spanning runway. Both events were a sellout, the afternoon a surprising success to its planners in the numbers it drew.

Beene has never before opened a rehearsal to the public and was horrified when he heard of the plan when he arrived in the Twin Cities. But by mid-show things were on a remarkably even keel and he was saying things like "just needs a little cleaning up."

There were seats for about 300 at the afternoon event and about 380 attended. Some 360 reservations were taken for the evening event.





## Soft water aid to dish washing

WASHINGTON (AP) - "You can't properly clean dishes without hot water or phosphate detergents," Dr. G. H. Watrous, Jr., recently told the International Water Quality Symposium, "but if your water is hard and you soften it you can cut the use of detergents about 50 per cent, and reduce the amount of phosphorous needed to one-sixth."

Hot water is essential, he said.

He recommended its temperature be at least five degrees Fahrenheit higher than the melting point of the fats soiling the dishes, but not so hot that it hardens milk and other protein soil.

Watrous is professor of Food Science and Industry at Pennsylvania State University. The symposium was sponsored by the Water Quality Association.







## GEOFFREY BEENE

Soft spoken, with a Southern background, Geoffrey Beene studied medicine at Tulane University. It took only a short time to discover that science was not his métier—the handwriting on the wall was "the fashion sketches in his anatomy book."

His first training in fashion began in Paris where he studied sketching at Academie Julien during the day and apprenticed with one of the tailors of Molyneux in the evenings.

Beginning his thirteenth year in his own firm, his influence has spread to sportswear via his highly successful "Beene Bag" division. He also designs collections of women's shoes, handbags, scarves, jewelry, furs, tennis and men's wear and this year has produced the first great American men's cologne "Grey Flannel." Among the many citations he has received for his contribution to the creative progress of American fashion are the Coty Fashion Critics Hall of Fame award; a special Hall of Fame citation—the second one ever to be awarded in America; two National Cotton awards; the Neiman-Marcus award and the great honor of having some of his clothes hanging in the Costume Institute of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He is particularly proud that his clothes, now being sold in Europe, graced the cover and a double page spread in British Vogue of September, 1975.



AEROSTATIC MACHINE BUILT FOR THE CITY OF CALAIS

"This lighter-than-air craft built at the Château des Tuileries exists in two forms, one Spherical, the other Cylindrical.

The Globe is 33 and a half feet in diameter and will be filled with inflamable gas obtained from vitrolic acid."

On June 15, 1785, Jean-François Pilâtre de Rozier and Pierre-Ange Romain made an unsuccessful attempt to cross the English Channel aboard this montgolfier of taffeta soaked in linseed oil.

The gilded exterior decoration represented the Winds holding the Arms of France and Navarre.

Altitude reached: 2,000/4,000 ft. Length of journey: about 20 minutes.

A spark caused by operating a metal valve set fire to the hydrogen: the montgolfier burst into flames and fell at Wimereux near Boulogne on the English Channel.

"BON VOYAGE. Aerostatic Experiment carried out by Messrs. Robert in the Tuileries Garden."

"On Sunday September 19, 1784 at noon, signals were given and the Balloon was brought to the Platform built over the water basin; when everything was ready, the Robert brothers and Mr. Colin Hullin got into the Chariot. The Balloon rose majestically."

Jean and Louis Robert and Colin Hullin took off from the Tuileries Garden and landed on the grounds of the Château de Beuvry.

"The three aeronauts were then taken to Béthune, where the Marquis de Gouy, Assistant Captain of an infantry regiment, received them magnificently and gave a superb celebration in their honor."

Length of journey: 6 hr. 42 min. Distance covered; over 120 miles.



"La Machine Aërostatique de MM. Montgolfier frères s'éleva du jardin de M. Réveillon, Fabriquant de papier, Fauxbourg St-Antoine, à la satisfaction d'un concours immense d'amateurs."

C'est en ces termes qu'une gazette de l'époque relate l'expérience du 19 octobre 1783 : l'ascension d'une montgolfière captive montée par Jean-François Pilâtre de Rozier (1757-1785). # PRECURSORS OF AIR TRANSPORTATION

THE AEROSTATIC MACHINE OF THE MONTGOLFIER BROTHERS

"The Aerostatic Machine of the Montgolfier brothers rose in the air from the garden of Mr. Réveillon, papermaker, in the Faubourg St-Antoine, to the satisfaction of a very large number of interested persons."

This was the description given in a gazette of the period of the experiment carried out on October 19, 1783: the ascension of a montgolfier (which remained tied down) directed by Jean-François Pilâtre de Rozier (1757-1785). Shortly thereafter on November 21, 1783 Pilâtre de Rozier made the first unencumbered manned flight aboard a totally unattached montgolfier.

Note that the maneuvering masts permitted the envelope of the balloon to be raised above the fire as it became filled with hot air.

Also note the wooden and canvas (!) platform containing the fire, and a paper factory workman holding a rope.
