Began the new year proper - after Delossy took his two cups of coffee and left - by carrying down the Christmas tree, which several days ago shed its last needles and which was a worn and desiccated hulk with some strips of silver and steel fluttering fantastically. It was a cool, springlike morning, while I propped our tree between bus and car, a woman came out of the house opposite wearing a spring suit. It was just 8 o'clock but the eastern sky at the end of Third Street was still faintly pink and peachy. A busy day. But mostly housecleaning, typing and necessary typing. Did a few errands and enjoyed the sun & clear atmosphere as it has been a muggy winter. Mother came in about 4.30 and Delos about 5. Delos brought our drink in from the Co-op, I had coffee, and we picniced cozily in our apartment. Took mother home about 8.0 had the first lie-downly reading - and - talking evening in days.

Perpetual Adoration. A white altar
with a little pink on it and
candles glowing. Then to the right
and to the left a cross and a
heart of blue & yellow with
lights. It gave the candles which
worshippers have lighted. When
one enters the little church it is
all softly glowing like Christmas
morning. The nuns wear robes egg
blue & white, & their chanting is
like the sound of Japanese wind bells.
