I, DELOS W. LOVELACE, a resident of Claremont, California, declare this to be my Will and revoke all former Wills:

FIRST: I declare that I am married and my wife is MAUD HART LOVELACE. We have one child, MERIAN LOVELACE KIRCHNER, of 36 Grove Street, New York 10014, New York. Neither of us has any other surviving issue.

SECOND: All of the property we now own, in whatever form held, was acquired during our marriage from our earnings, except for a small bequest of \$3,000.00 which MAUD received from her mother in 1947, and a bequest of \$2,500.00 received by MAUD in 1960 from her aunt, MRS. EVANGELINE MATHES of San Diego, California.

THIRD: To my daughter, MERIAN LOVELACE KIRCHNER, the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), as an indication of my love and affection for her. If I predecease my wife, MAUD, and if all of my property goes to MAUD by survivorship, outside of this Will, then it is my hope that MAUD will carry out the gift in this paragraph, although I do not wish to impose a legal obligation to her to do so.

FOURTH: All my properties that I own at my death, whether real or personal including any interest I may then own,

in the books, publications, manuscripts, copyrights and royalties of my own and my wife's I give, devise and bequeath to my wife, MAUD HART LOVELACE, if she survives me, and if she does not, to our daughter, MERIAN LOVELACE KIRCHNER. If neither MAUD nor MERIAN survive me, then I give, devise and bequeath all said property to MERIAN'S children per stirpes, in equal shares, subject nevertheless to the following trust with respect to the share of any of MERIAN'S children that is under the age of twenty-one:

The share of such child of MERIAN'S shall be held by my Trustee, hereinafter named, and the income therefrom applied for the benefit of the child or paid to the child, if the child has sufficient prudence, in the sole discretion of the Trustee, to accept such payments, in order to obtain for such child the benefits of health or education in addition to those furnished by the provisions of parental support of said child. My Trustee shall invest and reinvest the share of this child as a prudent man would do in the management of his own affairs, and the Trustee may invade the principal of the child's share, when necessary in the discretion of the Trustee to provide for the health, welfare or education of the child. The remainder of said trust share shall be distributed to the bene-

ficiary when said beneficiary attains the age of twenty-one years. If any beneficiary dies before this trust terminates, all undistributed portions of the share of that child shall be distributed per stirpes to his or her issue, if any, and if none, shall be distributed so as to augment the other shares held, or previously distributed, of the legacy contained in this paragraph FOURTH, in such proportions and to such persons as would have received distribution had I died immediately after the death of such beneficiary; if none of MERIAN'S children, nor issue of deceased children, be then surviving, such share shall be distributed as a part of the residue of my estate.

I name MERIAN'S husband, ENGLEBERT KIRCHNER, to be Trustee hereunder.

FIFTH: All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, not disposed of in accordance with the terms of the foregoing paragraphs of this Will, shall be divided into five equal shares, and distributed as follows:

A one-fifth (1/5) share to be divided equally, one-half (1/2) thereof to FRANK FOWLER, husband of my wife's late sister HELEN if he survives me, and if not this one-half (1/2) share shall augment the remaining one-half (1/2) share herein, and one-half (1/2) thereof to ALFRED FOWLER, son of my wife's late sister HELEN, who resides at 1436 W. Washington Ave., Santa Ana, California; if he survives me and if not to his wife PATRICIA FOWLER, if she survives me, and if not, to ALFRED'S issue, per stirpes.

A one-fifth (1/5) share to be divided and distributed, one-half (1/2) to DOROTHY HARTLEY, daughter of my late sister AMMA, residing at 17525 Castle, Rosedale, Michigan, and one-half (1/2) to JEANNE CLAY, also AMMA'S daughter, residing at 19751 Fenlawn, Detroit 34, Michigan; if DOROTHY does not survive me, her share shall be distributed to her issue per stirpes, and if none survive me, shall augment the share for JEANNE CLAY and her issue; if JEANNE CLAY does not survive me, her share shall be distributed to her issue per stirpes, and if none survive me, shall augment the share for DOROTHY and her issue. DOROTHY now has two children, HELEN and THOMAS; JEANNE has two children, WILLIAM and DIANE.

A one-fifth (1/5) share to FRANK BATT, son of my late sister GRACE GRIFFITH, if he survives me, and if not, to his wife, WILMA BATT. WILMA and FRANK reside at 3573 Mauricia Avenue, Santa Clara, California. If neither FRANK nor WILMA survive me, then this share shall augment proportionately the other shares of the residue.

A one-fifth (1/5) share in equal sub-shares to those of the following grandchildren of my wife's late sister, KATHLEEN HART FOSTER, who survive me:

One such sub-share to TOM FOSTER, now 12 years old, who is living with his mother, MRS. ANITA EXLINE, 2308 East Streetsboro Road, Hudson, Ohio; one such sub-share to KATHLEEN FOSTER, now one year old, in care of her mother, MRS. JONE FOSTER, of 2742 Dearborn Street, Salt Lake City, Utah; and a third such sub-share to a child now expected to be born to MRS. JONE FOSTER. If any sub-share herein shall fail, it shall augment equally the other sub-shares if any, and if none,

shall augment proportionately the remaining shares of this residue.

A one-fifth (1/5) share to MERIAN'S husband, ENGLEBERT KIRCHNER, if he survives me, and if not, to his mother, MRS. PANNA KIRCHNER, of 18 Forest Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

If there be no persons surviving to take any one of the one-fifth (1/5) shares hereinabove mentioned, then that share shall augment proportionately the remaining shares of the residue.

SIXTH: I name my wife, MAUD HART LOVELACE, to be Executrix of this Will; if she be or become unable or unwilling to so act, then I name my daughter, MERIAN LOVELACE KIRCHNER, the Executrix in her stead; or if she be or become unable or unwilling to so act, then I name STEPHEN I. ZETTERBERG of Claremont, California, the Executor in her stead; I direct that no bond be required of any of these individuals for their services in this fiduciary capacity. My Executrix or Executor, as the case may be, shall have the power to continue to conclusion any business in which I may be engaged at the time of my death, and shall have the power to sell any property in my estate, with or without notice but subject to confirmation as may be required by the probate laws of California.

ADDENDA  
TO OUR  
AGREEMENT AS TO SOURCE OF PROPERTY

DATED: NOVEMBER 17, 1959

We, MAUD HART LOVELACE and DELOS W. LOVELACE, add the following agreed information to our prior Agreement as to Source of Property: In 1960 MAUD inherited the sum of \$2,500.00 from her Aunt, MRS. EVANGELINE MATHES, of San Diego, California; this property, together with the \$3,000.00 received by MAUD from her mother in 1947, constitutes the separate property of MAUD.

We would like to add that MAUD'S short stories also have been copyrighted, and bring in a small revenue and used for anthologies and books for school reading.

The foregoing, together with the statements in our Agreement as to Source of Property dated November 17, 1959, constitutes a true statement of the sources of our property, and our agreement relative thereto.

This authorization is, or I am no judge, well in advance of need. It is also, for the record, given while I am in full possession of all my faculties.

Whenever your professional expertize tells you I am in my terminal illness do not resort to any medication or operation merely to prolong my life. If I seem in extreme pain, do what you consider necessary to keep pain at a bearable level, but do no more. In every other regard let me go as briskly as possible.

As of now death seems to me no more than a proper step from a completed (I do not claim more than poorly) task to new tasks that urgently need to be begun. I hope I always shall see it that way and shall never give it a false importance by resisting when resistance would only stretch it out a trifle.

## MAN OF MANHATTAN.

### A Proposed Adventure-comic Strip!

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The unique feature of this strip is that it will deal with melodrama happening on Manhattan and nowhere else. And its appeal depends upon the fascination which Manhattan happenings have for folks of the hinterlands no less than for quietly living people in the suburban areas around Manhattan. It is the same appeal which for so many years made O.O. McIntyre's column so successful. (I hope)

#### PRINCIPAL CHARACTERS.

(All names subject to change)

Peter Stuyvesant. Pete to pals. Descendant of Manhattanites for more than three hundred years. Hero and veteran of World War II.

Paul Stuyvesant. Peter's old Uncle. He looks like one of the little oldmen whose magic bowls rumble through the Catskill, and his fund of knowledge about Manhattan past and present often seems pure magic. He is Oom Paul to his intimates.

Joe Tipton. Cocky, or Cocky Joe to friends. Also a veteran of World War II. A limehouse Londoner, he had been picked up by Peter after they had shared battle adventures in Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, Germany. Brought over here to serve as Peter's chauffeur he becomes his comrade in arms.

Two girls also will be principal characters. Sometimes they will share in the adventures. Always they will be rivals for Peter's affection. But the author of this strip gives everybody a nickel cigar if he ever leads the readers to believe that either girl has more than the most temporary, briefest hold on Pete's heart.

A cousin of Peter also will be a principal character, but not at once. He'll have to be named. When the strip begins he is presumed to be dead.

To take fullest advantage of Manhattan's unique appeal, all incidents, whenever possible, will take place against a background of Manhattan landmark, such as Father Duffy's Statue, Prometheus at Radio City, the night club facades on 52nd Street.

The adventures begin with Peter's return from the Wars. He had expected to find the Stuyvesant's town house, country house, Catskill lodge, and his own particular penthouse all intact and properly staffed with veteran servants as they had been when he left in 1941. They are not intact. They are not staffed. They are not any longer his own. He is broke.

His cousin is the villain who has accomplished this. He had left the cousin in full charge of his estate, with powers of attorney, and the cousin has betrayed him. Main reason is that the cousin from Hitler's very beginning had sympathized with the Nazis, had believed they would win, and had got so involved before their defeat was plain that he could not pull out.

The cousin, trying for a Nazi victory, and coerced by Nazi agents in this country, had sold the whole Stuyvesant estate. And the New York Police have an apparently reliable report that he had jumped off Brooklyn Bridge.

So Peter is confronted with the need for doing something he never had to do before. He must support himself. And naturally he must support himself in the style to which he has been accustomed.

The cousin has disappeared but his trail is not too hard to pick up and naturally it leads to the Nazi agents. And naturally Peter resolves that his first job will be to get back from these fellows part at least of what they have taken from the Stuyvesants.

This resolve leads to the first sequence of adventures. The others will come along naturally as Peter moves around Manhattan. He will discover that there are always villains from whom ill-gotten money should

be taken. And it is this money which will support him. He will find it, and adventures, and those two rival girls plus a whole harem more, in Little Italy, in Yorkville, in Brooklyn where the Scandinavian seamen have colonized their families, in the Hungarian section, in the Syrian section, in the Jewish areas on the lower East Side. If this thing goes, and Mr. Speed does not flag me to a stop, I may even find him a temporary houri in Harlem.

And don't overlook Oom Paul. He is old, much too old to go along with Peter and Joe on their forays, but his amazing information will be available. Whenever Peter needs a secret stairway in an old Mansion, Oom Paul will have one up his sleeve. When Peter needs a family skeleton Oom Paul will fetch that out, too. Some time Peter may need an underground river to confound his foes. Oom Paul's maps trace half a dozen such, long covered over by Manhattan's skyscrapers but, like Minetta Creek, still very much there underground and fine for flooding out rats when tapped in the right spot.

GIFT OF PERSONAL PAPERS OF

DELOS W. LOVELACE

TO

THE DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER LIBRARY  
ABILENE, KANSAS

In accordance with the provisions of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 as amended (69 Stat. 695) and subject to the conditions set forth in that Act, and regulations issued thereunder, I, Maud Hart Lovelace, hereby give to the United States of America for deposit in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library and for administration therein by the authorities thereof, the papers of the late Delos W. Lovelace, of which I am owner, including correspondence and other historical materials, subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. Title to these papers and other historical materials will pass to the United States of America as of the date of the deposit of these papers in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library.
2. It is my wish to make such papers as may be donated to the United States of America by terms of this instrument available for serious research as soon as possible and to the fullest extent possible following their deposit in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library and at the same time to guard against the possibility of their use to harass, damage, or injure living persons. In pursuance of this objective, the following restrictions as to use are imposed, pursuant to provisions of Sec. 507 (f) (3) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 as amended: Subsequent to the execution of this instrument, the Archivist of the United States will have the correspondence and other papers in this collection reviewed, and will place under seal the following classes of materials:

- a. Papers relating to the family and private business affairs of the late Delos W. Lovelace.
- b. Papers relating to the family and private business affairs of other persons who have had correspondence with the late Delos W. Lovelace.
- c. Papers relating to investigations of individuals or to appointments and personnel matters.
- d. Papers containing statements made by or to the late Delos W. Lovelace in confidence unless in the judgment of the Director of the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library the reason for the confidentiality no longer exists.
- e. All other papers which contain information or statements that might be used to injure, harass, or damage any living person.

Papers that have been placed under seal will be reviewed from time to time and the seal removed from any papers which because of the passage of time or other circumstances no longer require such restriction.

3. Following the completion of the review of the papers provided for above under Section 2, papers that have been placed under seal shall not be made available for inspection, reading, or use by anyone (including public officials), except (a) regular employees of the National Archives and Records Service when performing normal archival work processes on such papers under the work policies and procedures of the National Archives and Records Service, (b) myself, or persons authorized by me in writing to have access to such papers.
4. All papers and other historical materials donated to the United States of America pursuant to the foregoing shall be kept intact permanently in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library subject to the right of the Archivist of the United States to remove them temporarily, or to dispose of by appropriate means any items that he may determine have insufficient value or historical interest to warrant further preservation by the Government.

#### RELIEF FOR THE POOR OF LONDON

When the wreckage and rubble had been  
cleared away and war was at an end, when  
individuals could sleep without fear of swift  
and sudden death from bomb and rocket,
