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THOMAS W. HART DIES AT HIS HOME

Thomas W. Hart, a resident of Minneapolis for a quarter of a century and formerly prominent in public life in Mankato, Minn., died Monday afternoon at his home, 2315 Irving avenue S. Mr. Hart was born in Decorah, Iowa, in 1863, but for many years prior to his coming to Minneapolis was a Mankato resident, and for eight years was treasurer of Blue Earth county. After coming to this city in 1911, he was identified with the wholesale shoe trade. He is survived by his wife, Stella Palmer Hart; three daughters, Mrs. Frohman Foster of St. Paul, Mrs. Delos Lovelace of Pelham, N. Y., and Mrs. Frank Fowler of Minneapolis, and four sisters, Mrs. Eva Vance, San Diego, Calif.; Mrs. Flora Bowder, Lisbon, Iowa; Mrs. Emma Garbutt, London, Ont., and Mrs. Charles Guthrie, Seattle, Wash. The funeral will be conducted Thursday at 2 p.m. at Lakewood cemetery chapel.
