Fowler, 4130 Blaisdell avenue, exchanged marriage vows at the home of the bride's parents last evening, with Dr. L. N. F. Haynes, grandfather of the bridegroom, reading the service, assisted by Dr. David Bryn-Jones, pastor of Trinity Baptist church. Only members of the two families witnessed the service read at 8 o'clock before the fireplace in the living room where palms and chrysanthemums in the brown and yellow autumn tones made a lovely setting. Miss Rachel Wilson of Stillwater played "The Bridal Chorus" from "Lohengrin" for the processional, and also a program of nuptial music before the ceremony.

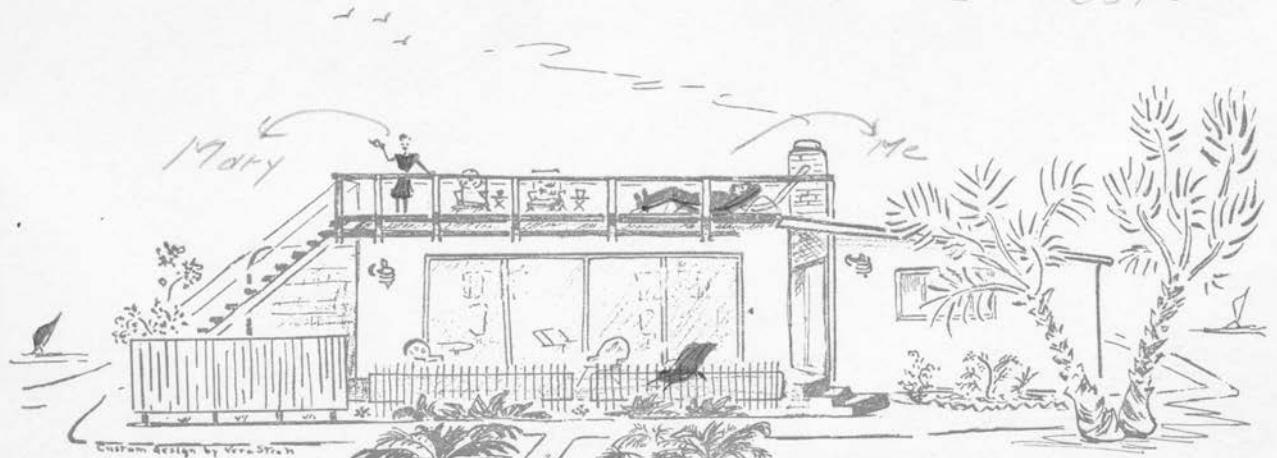

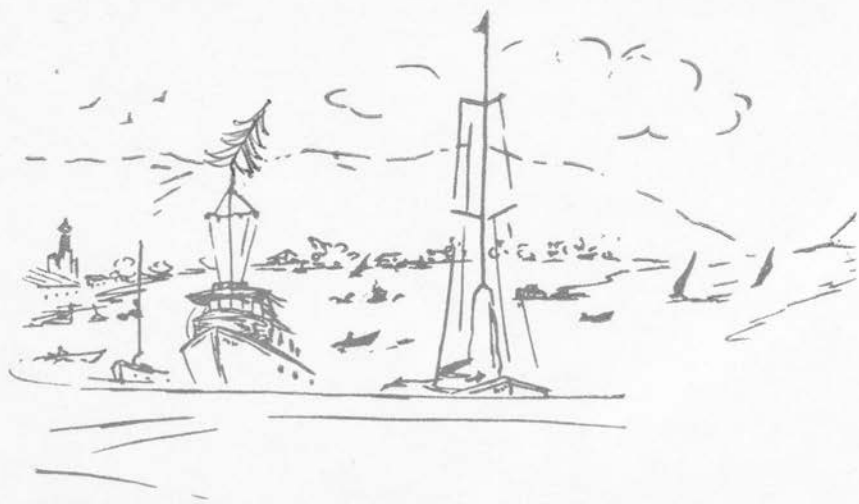
