Dear Miss Nishimori:

I have received your card today. At the present time we do not have a job open for Bookkeeping alone. We may have such a call later. We have a number of jobs open in domestic work and some of them pay very well. My suggestion would be that you plan to come out and take domestic work and we shall be on the lookout for an office job for you.

I do not urge this, however, if you wish to keep your skills. Domestic employers do not like it if the time you have to give is too temporary, and if you do not continue to do office work it is easy to lose your speed.

If you are very eager to come out we could try to help you by arranging for domestic work, or give you your pick of jobs open. The pay is from 50 to \$75 a month with full maintenance.

If you decide to wait, I will send you word as soon as a job opens for which you are qualified.

I have had over seventeen years of experiences in clonstructing dentures, deture repairs and bridge works, etc. My income from that have been average \$2100 yearly from last ten years.


I am thirty seven years and have two small children. We assure you that both children have been brought up in at omosphere as an average American family and both minds about care of house.

Dear Mr. White:



In a recent conversation with Mr. George Rundquist of the Committee for the Resettlement of Japanese Americans he suggested that I get in contact with you in regards to relocations in your area. I am a dentist by profession, having been in private practice for some seven years prior to evacuation. The following is a brief history of my background and activities.

- 1. Born in California, age 32.
- 2. Lived in Hollywood for the past thirty years
- 3. Attended Hollywood High School
- 4. Held membership in the Hollywood Y.M.C.A. all during High School.
- 5. Attended University of California at Los Angeles for two years.
- 6. Attended and graduated from the College of Dentistry, University of Southern California in 1934 with the degrees of B.S. and D.D.S. Received Phi Kappa Phi honors.
- 7. Been in private practice 1934-1942 in Los Angeles.
- 8. Am a member of the Southern California State
 Dental Assn. and the American Dental Assn.
- 9. Was a member of the Board of Management of the Japanese Branch of the Y.M.C.A. of Los Angeles, California

Since evacuation I have been acting as supervisor of Dental Public Health here at Poston. Also I am assisting Dr. Henry Klein of the United States Public Health Service in conducting research work in the problem of dental care.

Naturally I would like to continue to practice my prefession, but I realize that there is a matter of State Board of Examinations. However my first desire is to seek employment in institutions such as hospitals in which the requirements are only graduation from an accredited school and any state license. My second choice is a job as a dental technician, preferably with a private dentist rather than with a dental laboratory. The technician job probably will be more feasible in that it will be easier to find than the other. I would appreciate any assistance which you might be able to render me in my attempt to relocate myself. I am

Miss Edna Porter has turned over your letter of May 5th to the War Relocation Deak where we handle placement, interviews, referrals, etc.

To date our report is as follows:

The wage scale may appear low, but Minneapolisis rated as one of the lowest living cost cities in the country.

It is to be understood that placements have used up many of the jobs mentioned above. In many cases applicants cannot be found for them who are qualified. It has been especially difficult to find couples, though we have excellent opportunities for them.

We have found that our most successful placements result from a thorough knowledge, on our part, here at the Beak, of the qualifications of the individual. A clear statement of the type of work desired is necessary, as we find that permanent placements result only where the individual is satisfied with his or her work. Them, with a job open in the field in which the applicant is qualified, we invite him or her to come to the city on the hospitality plan. This means that he or she sheres in selecting the job. Hospitality is offered a either in our own homes, or on a paid basis of \$1.00 a night at the IMGA or the IMGA. In many cases we call and open jobs for well-qualified persons, preferably on the basis of good impressions of personality and training. We never use the hospitality plan unless a job is open and available at the time the individual is leaving the Center. It is understood that acceptance depends on the interview, but in that we have avoided flooding the city with people the find themselves forced into work they dislike.

The fundamental basis of our work has been careful cooperation with the War Manpower Authority here, and study of the United States Employment Service

employment records. In this way we have known in what fields there are still local unemployed groups in the city, and what fields show a shortage. We have always advised the Nisei against coming here for work in fields where there are still local people in need of work. We have had our volunteer Desk in the United States Employment Service Office, and all standards of wages and working conditions have been cleared with them so that we have avoided undercutting, and have been able to maintain the best standards for work through this backing.

All of our work has been done by volunteer workers, the committee financing letterheads and postage. The USES has contributed space and wwitchboard service, and the committee has financed the cost of the separate line.

We now have four workers in Settlement Houses. A bindergarten teacher, a music director, an essintant teacher and a recreational group leader. We hope for more professional opportunities as the Child Care Centers develop. As our community of Sisei grows we will try to bring out a physician and dentist to practice.

Dear Miss Kishi:

I have talked to Miss Weinlich of Unity Settlement House this morning. This Settlement House is at 250-17th Ave North. The phone is Hy. 9593. Miss Weinlich is looking for someone who can take charge of the Music Department at the Settlement House next fall on a permanenet full-time basis. This would involve accompanist work, choral work and other supervisory work.

For the summer she is having two Carlton Girls stay at the House on a resident basis, their only pay being board and room. She could offer a similar arrangement to you, and I do not think that there would be a heavy schedule of work to go with it. Also, I am quite sure that we could arrange for you to earn enough to take care of your other needs in the time left over. I shall make contacts with the Park Board, and with the Child Care Program for some kind of recreational work for you if you are interested. I do feel that living for the summer in the Settlement House would be a valuable expersione for you, would enable you to make a place for yourself with the people whom the house serves, it might also mean the difference between your getting the job in the fall or not, since if you are known there, work out well, and know the people you will be working with you would be much more valuable than a stranger.





I have talked to the people at the YMCA and they can arrange for you an opportunity to work for your maintenance, room and board and enough money, in addition to cover your laundry. Since you can walk to school what is usually allowed for carfare can go toward the cost of laundry, though if you want to you can arrange to do your own things at the YMCA.

The community standard for room and board is four hours of work a day on the average, one day a week free, or an arrangement for fewer hours of work on certain days and half days Sundays.

The work offered is maintenance work in the YMCA main building. Some dishwashing, perhaps some washing of walls, occasional mirnor repair work, distributing and counting of linen supplies.

I cleared with the Civil Service authority here to ask if there were any Social Service jobs open to young women with your training and background. They say there is nothing they have now.

Your courses are tending toward a major in Education. There might be work in the Nusery Schools ar Child Care Centers which would be open to you. I cannot promise it at the present time, however, as requirements are still high.

There have been some jobs open in day nurseries in Settlement Houses here where working mothers leave their children. The pay is not so very high but there might be an opening.

I, too, want you to return to normal living as soon as possible.

You must realize that these are not normal times. Your normal course of life would be to continue the course meeting the requirements for a degree.

There are colleges here which offer such opportunities, but the tuition fees are a problem. Whether there is to be a national NYA plan of some kind to care for this I do not know. There is none just now. If you could afford tuition we could easily find you a place to earn board and room.

My Idea in suggesting domestic work was to offer you an opportunity to work where your living costs would be at a minimum, and where good pay could be saved toward college fees. This is the way I got my education, and that was in normal times. This is the closest to the usual run of things that I can guarantee for you. If you wish to follow this course we will be glad to do everything we possibly can to help you.

I am sending on a letter of recommendation for Taka. Will you be kind enough to let me have it back again?

I have talked to Miss Frost about Taka's morning hours. She thinks she could use her those hours at thirty a month to complete a salary sufficient for her to continue the sharing of costs with her sister in their apartment.

Needless to say, this is not a good arrangement from the angle of time spent in travel to and fro. I talked to Mrs Elder about something at Emerson school. That would be within walking distance of 1800 Dupont where they live and on the way to you. But she says there is nothing in the nurseru school, there or elsewhere. About the Kindergarten age group there, I am wondering.

Of coursem I could place her in domestic work. But I want her to be able to get all the professional experience she can, and so would prefer some disadvantages to having her work outside her own gield.

St. Mary's Hospital, Minneapolis, has accepted Nisei girls for training. I believe the fee there is \$300.00 for a three year course. I have heard, however, recently, that hospital training is to be offered for women financed by the federal government and a small salary to be paid in addition for the work given.

St. Mary's Hospital Rowhester, Minnesota also offers training, and has accepted our girls. The University is still closed to Misei by oreder of the Secretary of the navy. There is a nursing school there at which there are generous scholarships. There may be a change in policy scon. I hope so.

The classes begin, for freshmen, in the fall.

There is Nurse's Aide work in some of the hospitals, and at Glen Lake Sanatarium. What training is needed I am not sure. They pay maintenance and 62.5 0 a month.

If there is further information needed we will be glad to try to get it for you. If you know of someone interested in coming here have her write us and we will send her a registration blank for the type of training or work she wishes.

Dear Mr. Rarigs

I enclose some correspondence which may interest you. Also the records of some well-qualified workers. How great the need for such people may be I am not in a position to know, but I am not unaware that in these as in other fields there are unfilled calls now at the USES. Take auto-mechanics for example.

While we are working at this at the volunteer deak, as my letter to Mr.Loye describes, I am wondering if you have any suggestions for approaches to employers in need of such man-hours which might result in the utilisation of these skills.

Recently, at meeting with the College Women's club committee for the War gob Information Center, we heard impassioned appeals to women to consider training at Vocational High, at the University in the ESMMT system, even at the retail stores to release War Workers. Aside from the question as to whether this is the best use of college trained women, and aside from the effect upon homes where domestic help cannot replace the work of wives and mothers, why cannot some pressure be brought to bear in the direction of employing Nisei who are otherwise demoralized by conditions in Comcentration camps?

Even where prejudice has been high Japanese-Americans have been used as clerks, stock-clerks, office help and shipping clerks in retail stores. Yet Dayton's which implores college women to come on four hour shifts to fill the places left vacant by war-workers, won't have one in the store. (Of course, if they can get college training at 7.50 a week halfting.) Why shouldn't they?) But there will be the strongest resistance from the College Club against any such plan unless every effort has been made to find workers for these jobs whose skills are otherwise wasted.

This is a very small part of the whole Manpower picture, yet it is as much a part of the fight for democracy as anything could be. The patterns we design, here, for the treament of a minority group may have a long life. If you have suggestion, I will use them, and gladly.


Thank you so very much for the help you are giving me in finding work. I certainly appreciate all that you are doing for me, and for all the other Japanese American young people.

Dear Atsuchi and James:

I'm sorry not to have ensured more quickly, but I have been making inquiries here for jobs for you. Of course if you were here it would be much easier to know just what you would be offered. The jobs as houseboys pay from \$50 to \$75 a month with mainteence for year-round work.

If I knew what you are doing where you are, and how much you are being paid and how you like your work it would be easier to advise you. I do have calls in for gardeners. But at present much depends on the experience in independent work you may have had, and how much you can go shead with work in the house without supervision and training.

I can assure you that if you come here we can find work for you. On the other hand I could have employers write you direct and offer you work. This is not so good as it seems, hoever, for then if you don't find you like the people especially you want to chamge, and it would be better to be able to interview the different employers and see what they offer and how you like them. I know this is difficult because of the distance. Therefor I am hesitant to advise you.

If you like I will have two employers who do not live too far apart write offers to you with a statement of duties and work and pay. Will you let me know if this would help you?

Dear Miss Kishi:

I am of the opinion that you would be very wise to accept the residency at the Settlement House for this summer, because there would be, for you, especially valuable experience and an added value when you are under consideration for it, in the job of Music Department supervisor of that House in the Fall.

I think it may be a little too early for us to plan the work you would do as a supplement to this job. For one thing you must know what hours are e expected of you for this work before you can commit yourself in any other situation. In the second place, we must know when you plan to start work.

With your training and background you will be valuable to the new programs for child care which are opening up. E wen at the present time I have a call for someone to serve two or three hours each of five mornings a week at a salary of thirty a month. Maybe this time could be extended in your case so that you would be earning enough to cover your expenses beyond maintenance.

Therefor, I would say you need not see me before seeing hiss meinlich on Wednesday, unless you yourseless have questions you wish to put to me before seeing her. If you have more details on the above questions, why not drop in afterwards and tell me the result of your interview, and let us talk further of possibilities in supplementary work. If there is not time for coming in afterward, drop me a line and we can follow through on it. If all other jobs sail I can always arrange for you to take on domestic work part time, but I would seel pretty sure that with your Physical Education minor you can have a choice of jobs in the recreational leadership field.

I hope you will take seriously my suggestions of the reading. It will be wise to have that background when planning to enter a professional field with its own standards, aims and jargon.

We were mainly concerned with cases and problems arising from the needs of the 16,000 evacuees at present residing at this Project. Their legal and property problems were peculiar because of the suddenness of the evacuation and the isolation from the outside community.

I am sure that in the future, after most of us are resettled in the various areas of the United States, the evacuees will need legal assistance and assistance in their business affairs with which I think I am qualified to help them.
