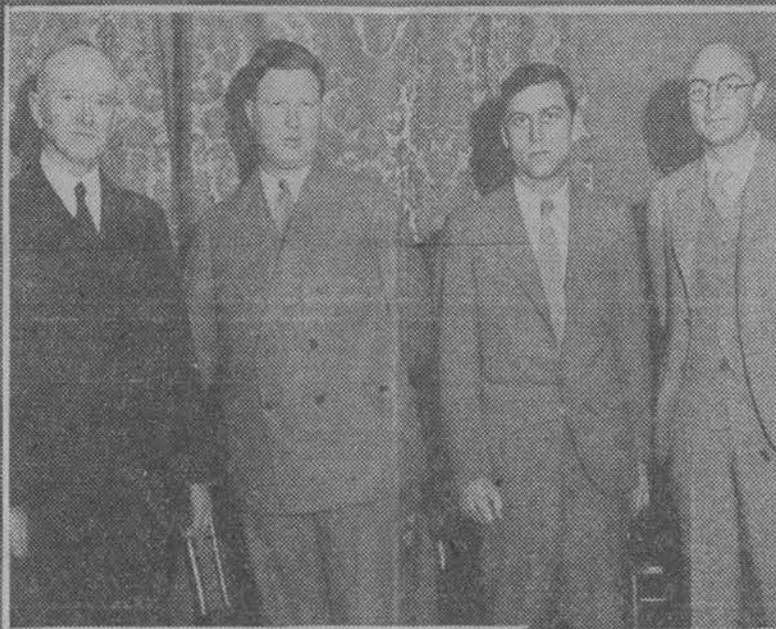

Ten Players Placed in Eight-Table Round of World's Fair Tournament

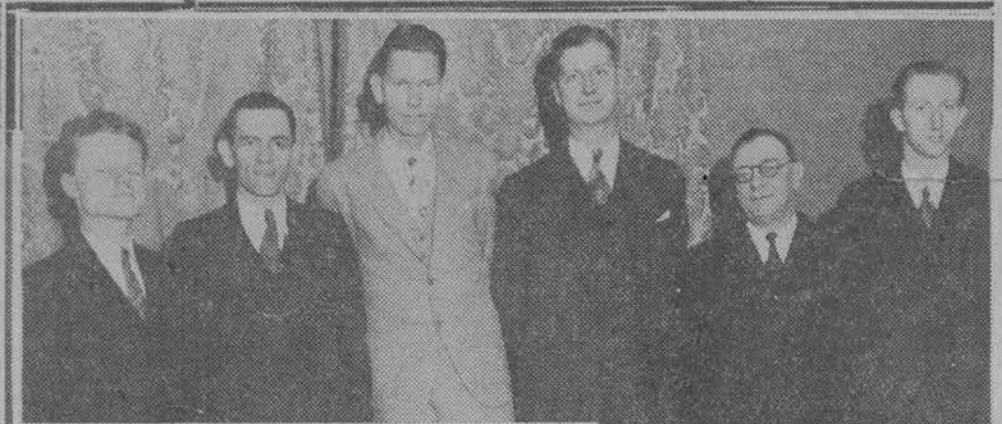
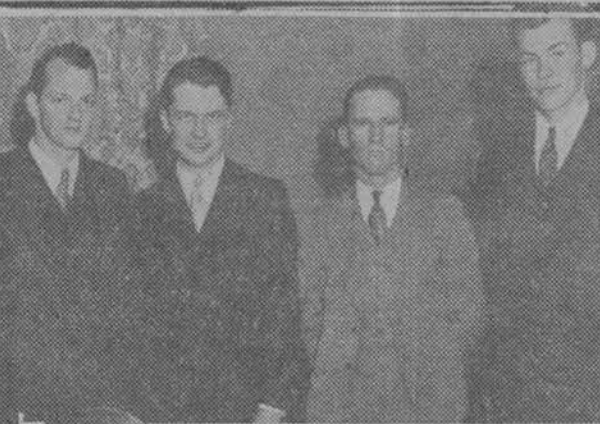
