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Chapter I

RUTH NOMURA TANBARA

My Parents' Background

The "Indra Pura" ship brought my parents Frank Jiro Nomura and Kiyo Takeda Nomura to America from Japan on January 6, 1903. Father was born in Tokyo on October 19, 1874. He passed away on September 12, 1956. Mother was born in Tokyo on January 30, 1882, and died on September 2, 1980. In Tokyo, Father graduated from a boys intermediate school and also studied English in a special evening course. Mother completed courses in a girls secondary school. As was the custom in those days to learn the homemaking arts, she went to the home of Viscountess Okabe in Tokyo for one year to study etiquette, dress, homemaking and the arts. They were married in 1902.

At the turn of the twentieth century, socio-economic conditions in Japan were gloomy due to high taxes, overpopulation, compulsory military service, and discontent over the class system. Furthermore, farmers suffered a frequent rice crop failure. Faced with the attendant possibility of famine, the Nomura family decided to share the small estate among the sons. They heard about America being "the land of opportunity" and an "adventure to seek a better way of life." So my parents decided to come to America on their honeymoon. They arrived in Portland, Oregon, where very few Japanese lived. However, they found housing at the Japanese Methodist Episcopal Mission where the Reverend Sugihara's family assisted immigrants in locating housing and employment. With his knowledge of English, Father was able to communicate well enough to find employment in restaurant work.

My parents planned to go to Chicago and en route made a stopover in Minneapolis to see friends from Japan who were working as bus boys in the Nicollet Hotel during the busy college homecoming season. Father stayed in Minneapolis and worked with them. The winter was so severely cold in Minnesota that my parents changed their original plans of going to Chicago. In 1904, they returned to Portland, where the climate was mild and Mt. Hood reminded them of Mt. Fuji.

As employment opportunities for Asians were scarce, Father found employment in the dining room of the Calumet Hotel and assisted the chef. Mother, wanting to learn American ways of homemaking and cooking, went to the home of Dr. and Mrs. Milo Kirkpatrick and assisted in their home. They were so kind and patient as to teach her the American customs. Later my parents purchased a home which was a privilege to non-citizens in those days. In the years following, the children were born and the Kirkpatricks suggested Christian names for Paul, Ruth, and Howard. My sister, Martha, passed away at eight months.

Dr. Jessie McGavin, a physician in Portland, took care of my family through the years. She named my sister Elsie. Since there were very few Japanese families in the early days, the folk knowledge of medical care was shared among themselves. As the families became established, however, Dr. McGavin served as the family physician for many of the Japanese in Portland.

Father opened the Mt. Fuji Grocery Store on Russell Street on the East side of Portland, and my uncle Yoshizo Takeda came from Japan to help. It was not a cash-and-carry store as today, and customers were so dilatory in paying their accounts that the store was closed a few years later. Having the increasing responsibility of raising a family of four children, coupled with his dedication to the education of his children, Father was employed for many years at the Northern Pacific Terminal Company doing maintenance work and later porter service. He retired before the evacuation in 1942 with honors and many friends.

After Paul completed his courses at Benson Technical School, he opened the Walnut Park Fruit and Vegetable Market on North Union Avenue. All members of the family helped in the store. However, that was the period of the Great Depression in the 1930s when the banks were closed and the economy was at a low ebb. It was a difficult time for everyone, but accorded us a valuable experience of helping our family and many others to survive.

My parents were asked by other Japanese families and state agencies to care for those children whose mothers were ill or passed away in childbirth or accidents. Some of the children were orphans. So through the years, besides their own four children, my parents took care of 13 other children at different times, some for short periods and others for years. Mother was featured in an article with a photo, entitled "The Mothers of the Nations of the World," in the May 7, 1938 issue of the News Telegram, a Portland, Oregon paper, on account of her courage, sacrifice and devotion.

In 1952, Mother and Father celebrated their 50th anniversary at a special dinner at my home in St. Paul.

When the Immigration and Naturalization Act was passed in 1952 repealing the Japanese Exclusion Act of 1924, Mother studied with me at home and passed the citizenship examination to become a naturalized U.S. citizen on May 15, 1957 in St. Paul. She was proud to go to the election booth for the county, state and general elections from 1960 on.

Ruth Tanbara

Ruth Nomura Tanbara was born in Portland, Oregon, and moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, during the relocation of Japanese American citizens. With her background in social work, Mrs. Tanbara and her husband volunteered to establish resettlement programs for fellow Japanese Americans. After the war, Mrs. Tanbara obtained her master's degree at the University of Minnesota and continued teaching at the YWCA. Mr. Hill asked Mrs. Tanbara to be the president of the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee. She agreed and thereby began their professional relationship.

Louis W. Hill, Jr.'s first name is always pronounced "Louie."

BB: When did you first meet Mr. Hill?

RT: We met when the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee was founded over forty years ago.

Mr. Steve Gadler of St. Paul was a colonel in the US Army and was stationed in Japan during the war. Colonel Gadler served as the first president of the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee and organized the program and activities. I was working at the YW. Mr. Hill came over one day. He said he wanted to talk to me. He said he would like me to be the next president of the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee. Well, I have never been president of anything. I said, "I will have to ask my husband. It might be more than I can handle." Mr. Hill said he would guide me and tell me what business has to be done. He said, "You consider it, and then let me know." I said, "If you will help me, it will not be so much trouble because I don't know too much about St. Paul, and I certainly don't know anything about Nagasaki." We were the first Sister City to organize. He explained that he had been in Nagasaki; he knew the mayor and the city. Then I talked to my husband, who said, "If Mr. Hill is going to help you, then there should be no problem." Mr. Hill did not want it known as a board. He said board members make policy, but committee members do all the work. He said, "It is going to be called the St. Paul-Nagasaki Sister City Committee." I think that is true; therefore, we left it that way. Even today, many new members do not like the word committee. I have to explain it every time there is a new board member.

- B: How were your meetings with Mr. Hill organized?
- Every month, I would meet with him about the agenda for the next meeting of the committee because he had certain things that he wanted to bring up. We used to meet a week before the monthly meeting. He always took me to the St. Paul Athletic Club for lunch. During those days, ladies could not go there; it was a men's club. I was always the only lady in the whole building. I asked him, "Why don't you meet me at the YW? It's so international." He said, "No. Everyone will get used to you being here, and they won't mind you because they know you are on business. There is nothing for you to worry about." I said, "I feel like your wife should come or my husband should come." He said, "Why, you can bring your husband any time." But I said, "He is working. He can't just take time off to be here." But Mr. Hill was very kind, very patient. He had great hopes that the Sister City Program would bring a friendly relationship between the two cities. He said that the war had changed a lot of feelings. It did. We are forty years older now, and we have many new affiliations. First, it was with Nagasaki City and St. Paul. Then it became Nagasaki Broadcasting and KSTP of Minnesota; they are

affiliated. Then there were the Boy Scouts and all the YWCAs, and recently the Nagasaki Symphony became affiliated with The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra.

RUTH N. TANBARA Ruth Nouvera Tokuko Tanbara

Married to Earl Kazumi Tambara of Berkeley, California September 16, 1935 Earl died Jan. January 7, 1974 (cerebral thrombosis)

Ruth Nomura was a graduate of Oregon State University, Corvvallis, Oregon Class of 1930 received B.S. Degree in Home Education to teach.

Taught Pre-school to Japanese American Children at the Manley Community Center, Portland Oregon.

Married to Earl K. Tambera, was Advertising Manager of Dollar Steamship Company for 10 years.

After the War in 1941...the Steamship Companywas named THE AMERICAN PRESIDENT LINES.

Earl and Ruth were evacuated from their home in 1942 when World War II Army Officials declared ALL PERSONS OF JAPANESE WERE TO BE EVACUATED FROM THEIR HOMES. Earl and Ruth moved on 48 hours notice to a friends farm in Reedley, California which was out of the War zone. March 2, 1942.

In August 1942 another Army order was issued and the Japanese native of Japan or born in the U.S. were forced to go to Resettlment Centers (there were 10 of them)

Through special U.S.Army permission and the late decicion by the U.S.Supreme Courts it was illegal to keep U.S. Citizens in Resettlment centersEarl and Ruth were given special special permission to go to St. Paul, Minn if they would help resettle Japanese Americans in Camp to Minnesota to find schools, housing, jobs and care in Minnesota. Many came to St.Paul since their brothers or relatives were stationed inthe U.S. Army in Fort Snelling where many Japanese American your men had enlised in the Military Intelligence Language School of which Col Kai Rasmussen was in charge.

After the War, many families returned to the West Coast but many remained in Minnesota, and became part of the Community, joined community Churches registered in Schools, Universities, et employed in the firms in the Twin Cities

Many were High School students and graduates so that entered colleges in St. Paul. Macalester College in St. Paul and the University of Minnesots were the first to accept the students.. Many peple in Minnesota did not know Japanese people until Fort Snelling had many youn Japanese Americans of 16 years and older stationed there.

A University of Minnesota Faculty member was assigned to help the group get acquainted with Minnesotaa and Iowa, so I was sent to communities in Iowa just when the Corn crop was being harvested so I learned about de-tasseling the corn, and I gave lectures on Japanese Americans to the people in churches, libraries and schools.
