I think it is very dear of you to suggest that they be a gift. Let us have it this way -- the making of them I should be glad to have as a gift but won't you let me pay for at least the leather? I can not resist the white doeskin ones. I think driving gloves would wear out sooner and I want these to last as long as possible both because of sentiment and because they will probably be the most beautiful gloves I shall possess. I am tremendously interested in the things you are doing and have been doing since you were married. It is very heartening to have a graduate like you not just follow the crowd and play bridge all day but use your leisure time in more interesting and constructive things than bridge could be. Of course I have no aversion to bridge except when it takes precious time which could be used in so many more constructive ways. How very happy I am to know that you are talking to some of the Japanese girls in California about our Home Economics School at Oregon State College. We are trying very hard to make the work of this school meet the needs of our girls and not be too impractical and it does us much good to have our graduates feel as you have expressed yourself. I wish I might see Elsie more frequently. Somehow the year has been very heavy and there has been such an increase in students that I have not been able to do the things I have wanted to do. Elsie's work has come up. She had an A in Family Relationships; B's in Color and Composition, and Clothing Selection and Construction; C's in Appreciation of Music, English Composition, and Mental Hygiene; and a D in Physical Education. It takes some time for freshmen often to adjust and Elsie's grades are not low and she is showing definite advancement. I am sure we can expect this to continue. How very much I wish you were not so far away from Corvallis and that we could have you give a demonstration of glove making to our staff and students for I know they would be tremendously interested. Is it possible that you will be coming to Portland in the near future and could do that for us? I am also thinking of what an interesting thing it would be to have at our Home Interests Conference in February. We are hoping to have the visiting professor from Japan who has been at Eugene for the year over on our campus for a week.
