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
LETTER FROM BOARD CHAIR AND ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

What a year! The 1996-1997 season marked our twentieth consecutive year producing artistically excellent theatre that provides realistic portrayals of the experiences of African Americans and others of the African Diaspora. Penumbra's steadfast adherence to its artistic mission has won the respect and admiration of artists, audiences and critics on the local as well as the international level. Our twentieth season has been, by far, our most satisfying. Twenty years without amending or making concessions to our mission is a benchmark of which to be most proud.


Ticket office reports for the season show that mainstage productions played to over 88 percent total capacity and our collaboration with the Guthrie fell just short of twenty thousand tickets sold in two weeks!

We reorganized from board (of directors) to board (that upon which plays are presented). 20th Anniversary activities and aggressive cost-cutting measures helped eliminate our deficit, ending our year with a positive unrestricted net asset balance of \$24,388. We are on track. Large and in charge!

The above argues for celebration of our accomplishments. We always remember our rich history and pay homage to the spirit and traditions of those that came before us...that is where we come from. As August Wilson says, "...I'm standing in my grandfather's shoes." As we look to the future, we are excited and full of hope. We have full confidence in our mission and our ability to tell the never-ending stories that fall within our *raison d'être*. Thank you for helping us acknowledge our leadership and responsibility by reaffirming our commitment to our mission.



Penumbra's goals are: to increase public awareness of the significant contributions that African Americans have made in creating a diversified American theatrical tradition; to encourage and facilitate a culturally diverse and all inclusive America by using theatre to teach, criticize, comment and model; to use theatre to create an American mythology that includes African Americans and other people of color in every thread of the fabric in our society; to redefine and expand the consciousness of our audiences and our theatrical communities to include a sympathetic and realistic portrayal of people of color; to encourage and facilitate a proactive approach toward the staging of plays that address the African American experience; to increase the opportunities for audiences to view drama that falls within our *raison d'être* by providing the only consistent professional platform for the illumination of the African American experience in drama in this region; and to continue to maintain and stabilize an African American performing arts community.

Mission Statement





PENUMBRA'S ACCESS AND EDUCATIONAL INITIATIVES

The 1997 Penumbra Summer Arts Institute

Penumbra offered its summer arts institute for 20 high-school age students entitled *Toward an African American Aesthetic in the Presentation and Appreciation of Black Drama*. The Summer Arts Institute offered participants an opportunity to explore the wealth of "overlooked" contributions to theatre created by African Americans.

The Penumbra Community Ticketing Fund

The Fund is an initiative established to introduce the African American experience to individuals less likely to have access to Penumbra due to income or social isolation. Free and reduced cost tickets are made available to subsidize attendance to selected performances of each mainstage production. 1997 Fund contributors included Medtronic Inc., Mervyn's California-Midway, and the Saint Paul Foundation's African American Community Endowment Fund.

Study Guides

With support from the Minneapolis/St. Paul LINKS Incorporated, Penumbra now produces study guides for each of its mainstage performances. Study guides are created with assistance from area arts teachers under the guidance of Kiyoko Motoyama, Director of Theatre Education & Outreach. Study guides are made available to Project SUCESS (Students Undertaking Creative Control Essential to Self-esteem and Success) participants, as well as student matinee attendees.

The Penumbra Theatre Youth Company

Realizing a need to connect students attending the Summer Arts Institute to an on-going initiative where they can hone their talents for the future, Penumbra began an informal Youth Company. Penumbra has enlisted approximately 20 students to participate in weekly roundtable discussions on auditioning, acting, and directing.

Internship Program

Each year Penumbra employs more actors, choreographers, dancers, directors, and administrators of color than all other theaters in Minnesota combined. It is critical we continue to provide employment opportunities for people of color seeking challenging and creative opportunities in theatre. Currently, Penumbra is in the process of seeking funding for the following artistic/technical internships: Design, Electrical, Audio, Wardrobe, and Production.

PENINSULA'S ACCESS AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The 1997 Peninsula Summer Arts Institute

Several significant in-kind contributions supporting Penumbra's marketing endeavors helped create a much-needed aura of excitement and spectacle around the theatre.





REVENUE & EXPENSES


Fiscal Year 1996 Revenue




Fiscal Year 1997 Revenue
