ROGER GUENVEUR SMITH

For the national stage, Roger Guenveur Smith has created and performed Frederick Douglass Now, Christopher Columbus 1992, and with Mark Broyard, the award-winning Inside the Creole Mafia. He also has appeared on the stages of the Mark Taper Forum, New York Shakespeare Festival, Guthrie Theatre and Mabou Mines.

His screen credits include Spike Lee's Do the Right Thing, Malcolm X, and School Daze as well as John Singleton's Poetic Justice and Deep Cover. Television viewers know Roger as "Professor Randolph" from A Different World.

Mr. Smith studied at the Yale School of Drama, Occidental College, and the Keskidee Arts Center in London as a Thomas L Watson Fellow. He has taught extensively, most recently as artist-in-residence at the University of California, Berkeley.

MARK BROYARD

Born in New Orleans, Mark Broyard is a vocalist, choir director and assemblage artist. He has collaborated with Teddy Edwards, James Newton, Vi Redd, the Albert McNiel Jubilee Singers and his own Mark Broyard Ensemble. He is cofounder of the Eric Dolphy Memorial Foundation.
