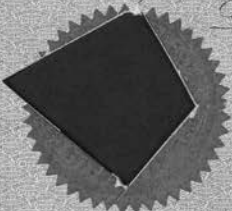

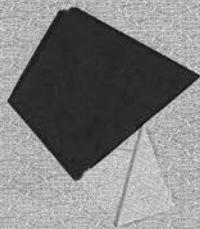

You might let me know whether you would be in any way interested. I may say that Dr. Stroehman has been receiving \$5000 for part time. I am very anxious to secure a man who will devote more time to the work. I think it is a task demanding the primary strength and effort of the incumbent. We have placed Dr. Schlotzky on a "full-time" basis in Pediatrics at a salary of \$6000. By "full-time" I do not mean the Hopkins plan, but rather what some call the Harvard plan and what I call the "geographical full-time" plan. He has the right to a limited consultation privilege and when the new hospital is ready (in September) will have a few beds in which he may receive cases referred by other physicians.

In the case of surgery my idea is somewhat similar although I recognize that the operative side of that specialty makes some difference in the arrangements to be made. The salary could not go as high as I would wish, but the President could do whatever the funds of the University and good public policy would permit.

I am told that you will be coming back to this country about Aug. 15. If events should seem to justify it, I could arrange to meet you in New York for a conference.

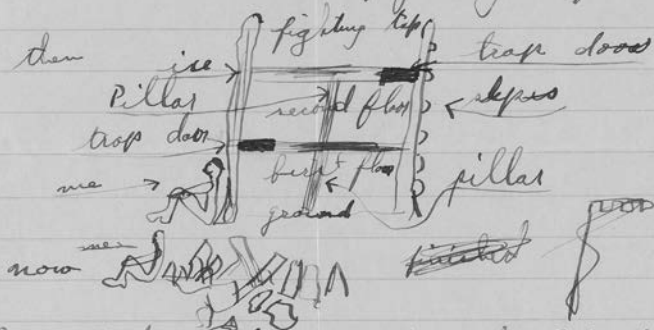

Dear Dr. Schwayzer; I am sending you a report of a years work in our hospital and a brief history of medical work in our mission, I hope it will interest you and help you to see some of the problems I have to face.

You do not know how often I think of those I used to work with at home and when I have difficult cases and things do not go well how I wish I could talk things over with them. We have very few goiter cases but I had a bad case come to me in March from a station in the foot hills. She was one of our nice Christian girls with a very bad exophthalmic goiter. Her pulse was over a hundred and sixty and she was in a wretched nervous state but I kept her in bed on strophanthus and iodine treatment for six weeks, I injected boiling water into the gland as you once wrote me to do. After six weeks treatment I thought she could stand the operation. I used novocain and adrenaline. The operation went along alright only the gland was very vascular and there was more bleeding than I like. Just as I was putting in the last stitch her heart stopped and no stimulation did any good.

I think this is the first case I ever had die on the operating table. Then I thought of you and all the things you would have done and I wondered what I could have done differently. I am glad goiter is not more prevalent down here on the plains. In the Himalayas it is very bad.

Here we have such very bad osteomyelitis so many difficult labours and so many that we are called to see that have suffered many days under the care of the native midwives. When we go there is no chance except in Caesarian section and <sup>they</sup> won't consent to <sup>that</sup> very often of course we do craniotomy but the pelvis is so often too narrow to even insert the finger and it is impossible to extract the child.

Last week I received a telegram from a village fifty miles away like this.

"Come at once bring instruments for full delivery one hand looking out."

My Indian nurse and I went. The woman had been in labour four days and was exhausted. We gave a little chloroform, did version and delivered a dead baby but the uterus was completely ruptured and bleeding profuse. I thought I might close

close the tear or do a hysterectomy and stop the bleeding but she was too far gone I could not give a promise that she would recover so they would not allow me to do anything. While I was trying to stop the bleeding and make her comfortable they came running from another village three miles away to say another woman was in labour to come at once. We went there and found she had been sick four days and it was another hand presenting. I asked what they had intended to do they said they had pulled and pulled on this hand but the child would not come so they were just waiting for the woman to die so they could take the body to the Ganges.

In just a few minutes we delivered this dead baby but I wish you could have seen the relief and joy in their faces when we told them the woman would likely live. There were five other children so they didn't mind this one's death.

Dr. Maybel Samms came out in January a year ago. She spent most of the first year in language study and then came to work with me. She is fine full of pep and enthusiasm, and a cheerful disposition, but she is to be married soon and going to Allahabad soon to live and I shall be alone again and I do not know what to do for another doctor. It is too much for me to do alone. I can't be out making calls and looking after the patients in the hospital and doing the operating.

I hope in three years more to go home for a rest and a change and I do not know who will look after things while I am away.

I hope you are well and having lots of interesting things to do, and that Mrs. Schwayzer and the children are well. The children are likely so grown up that you do not think of them as children any more.

Please give Mrs. Schwayzer my Bahut Bahut Salams.

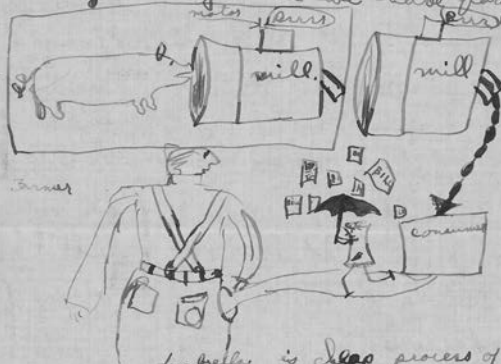

My dear Arnold, [DR. ARNOLD Schnyzer, St. Paul]

Your note of 2nd August arrived by last mail. I wrote to the Hongkong & Shanghai Banking Corp. in Singapore and had today a private note from the Manager informing me that they had 5000 Pulau Bulan Shares of yours. As you will remember these were originally \$10. each but were then reduced, if I remember right to \$2.-

The drop in price of Rubber has delayed the payment of the debts and debentures but I will find out what the position is now and let you know.

I don't think that you will ever get much more than \$2. per share but something would be saved if you could even get that. I would advise you to get out of them once there is a market for the shares, The Estate is a bad one and year by year the assets are diminishing as, the bark renewal is so bad on poor ground like Pulau Bulan.

You better get in touch with the Bank and they can most likely act for you. If they don't hold your Power of Attorney you can sign transfers whenever you want to sell.

Rubber as you know has gone down a good bit but good estates can pay 30% and more at present prices which is not too bad. The idea is that there will be shortage of rubber

in 28 as the demand goes<sup>up</sup> every year and no new areas are coming into bearing by that time and the demand will exceed production as was the case last year when prices went up to over 4/. Today's prices are in the neighborhood of 1/8.

As you know America is threatening all sorts of things, so not to be "squeezed", poor devils, not having all the Rubber and Tin, as well as all the Gold in their control.

Tin is doing very well indeed and all my concerns are doing well.

I think I already wrote you that we intend going home for good next year. How I will<sup>like</sup> doing nothing I don't know, during our long holidays I always had lots of business to attend to.

We are both fit and well, are still doing a lot of riding and Polo, Next month we are playing in Singapore, I am one of the team representing the Malay States versus the Colony. Our Racing mare Little Marvel has done very well, she won 5 Races out of 9 starts since we bought her just after we got back in February.

I am expecting <sup>5 or 6</sup> new Racehorses from Australia next month & hope that they will turn out well.

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



I was very much pleased to receive your acceptance to lecture on the subject of goitre. These lectures are part of the course in Regional Surgery and are given in the amphitheatre at the hospital on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5 to 5:50 p.m. If this is an inconvenient hour for you, I shall endeavor to arrange one more suitable. In the past, two hours have been devoted to the presentation of the subject of goiter, but you may, of course, have more time if you so desire. The anatomy and pathology of the subject have been presented in the respective fundamental departments. The department of medicine gives instruction on goitre and the subject of basal metabolism is presented by Dr. McKinlay. In addition, clinical instruction is given in the clerkship course as well as in the operative clinics.



It is not very practical to have you give instruction without being a member of the faculty of the School, and it would be very much better if you would accept a regular appointment in the surgical department. This will in no wise obligate you to present or future responsibilities.

I am sure that these lectures from you will be valuable to the students, not alone in the information which you will impart but in stimulating them to better effort. They get tired of the same old faces and lecturers, and a newcomer is as welcome as an addition to our routine diet.


Recommendation has been made for your appointment on the faculty of the Medical School as Professorial Lecturer.
