with you. I



I had the most perfect trip home I have ever had, or ever hope to have. All day Wednesday with Nick was grand, and I saw Notre Dame from bottom to top, including what he pointed out as the most intelligent of librarians, and I became worried because she was also pretty. Nick and another chap drove me up to Chicago that night, and we got the girl I was visiting, and all went on a double date to the College Inn, that being very good for dancing. If you have heard this before, stop me. Any way in the course of the next three days I saw four movies, and went out dancing a couple more times and met a heavy necker (not B'Lane) with whom I necked, much to my own disgust later. 
