Now I wish we could get together in Washington this spring! If you're to be there during your Easter vacation I don't at all know it will be possible. You see the D.A.R. Congress isn't until April 18. I can't be away from home more than two weeks because by that time I'll have a new job and so can't afford to be gone long. If we decide (as we expect to), most of our two weeks will be spent going and coming.

About the new job you'd never guess what I'm going to do now. I'm going to start selling and

writing writing insurance. Did you ever hear any thing funnier? I can't imagine me selling any thing. The point is that when my grandfather gave up active control of the bank he still retained his insurance business. His eyesight is failing quite rapidly so I'm going to take over three or four of his companies. I'm to have an office all to myself which thrills me to pieces. It is a darling room. The corner of the bank building roundel, and I'm to have the corner room upstairs. It has three huge windows and a fireplace -- a real one that burns! Of course it is the fireplace that thrills me. now it's time to consider school once again. I don't think I shall return until next fall, however, so that's quite a relief.

Remember Margaret Price? She is in Denver now, working, & lives with a friend of mine. I went to see her recently, & she showed me last year's "Vassarion". It was great to see your picture & all the others, too, which recalled such happy days. And by the way, when I

mentioned your name, she said you were going to get married. Is it true? or just one of those rumors which people circulate?

I went to Tony Sarg's Marionettes yesterday, & honestly, Peg, they were wonderful. I never believed that dolls could be so life-like. I quite forgot they weren't people until the end when the operator stepped down into the stage with them, and then her apparently gigantic size (by contrast)

Made me realize I had been in the world of make believe. "Sinbad the Sailor" was given, a tale which lends itself admirably, of course, to such a production. The costume were elaborate & gay, & the animals (camels, asses, sheep, horses, dog, elephants) were perfect. It was a gala day.

Thank you so much for your good letter which came a short time ago. I do quite appreciate your taking time out of your busy life to write to me. Your kind words of appreciation for the work I'm doing please me very much, but do you know, Dr. Schwyzer, that your kindness and help in the old days at St. Joseph's when I was struggling through Training School and Medical College have made it possible for me to do these things out here.

I have worked hard. When I came here in 1915 I had only a small dispensary and in these years the work has grown until we have a hospital of nearly two hundred beds and that isn't large enough. This is the only hospital in India run by a woman where men are taken care of, and we have a general hospital, where one must be a specialist(?) in every line from cataracts to club feet. I've had many, many hard roads to travel, difficulties that seemed unsurmountable, but I think there is no joy in life equal to doing for those that need it so much, and accomplishing the impossible. These have been busy years but they have been happy years.

A letter from Sister Blendina not long ago telling me of Dr. O'Brien's death and of Sister John and Dr. Chage's severe illness. The old friends have finished their labors and gone home, and I'm sure there was a rich reward waiting for each one.

I hope Mrs. Schwyzer and the children, though I suppose they are young men and women now, are well and happy and that you'll be having a pleasant summer vacation somewhere on the lake or in the mountains, or perhaps it will be in Switzerland. Wherever you are I hope the Lord will bless you richly.
