I was out at Marine with

It is always so beautiful out
there. Dr. & Mrs. Daugherty are on
their last stretch.

While I was writing this after-
noon Daisy Geist came to say
good by. She goes out to Mrs. Louise
Geist this is her wife three children
were with grand Grand Mother
Geist. They had just left, when

Ramsey's came with German letters
to be translated. Solon Miller, his
wife & Reddy appeared. We had a
sips of Sherry & fritters we had a
very nice hour together. Then
Miller took his Radium & gave

We have left one (1) fifty milligram
capsule. So you give me over-all blanket
etc. to sell as I can.

I have good reason to believe Dr. Muller
is about the only man around here capable
of using the radium we had. Now
they use radon needles & seeds.
They never use such large amounts
barely at all - in just one capsule or
bottle. Also our radium was in silver
tubes. how they use platinum tubes.
Get all flies from Stenstrom.
(over)

Re-tubing radium is extremely expensive (Stenstrom). Accordingly we cannot get much for it probably.

I advise strongly to sell - as it is an obsolete type of radium - not too safe.
