Since I last wrote you I have had a letter from Gene with distressing news. Mr. Christensen of the First National Bank died similarly the day before de Lambert's death, also Mr. Todd has had a rather chronic illness, but should be out again soon. I am so very busy.

To my endless joy Helen Hengeler is coming to Paris on her way back to England after Silvio's wedding. It sure will be grand to see her. Don't know if I mentioned that in my last letter. Silvio's wedding is in Gstaad (?) July 16th - Ma is going.

I am back at work after being laid up two days - a good good upset. Made better now - but must watch my diet. It was the same stuff I had at times in Boston.

It sure is grand to work with Dr. Welter. He has helped him on about 25 goiters so far. His total series is between 8 and 9,000, - so Ruch, my Swiss assistant, told me.

as I mentioned in my last letter, there will be

some things I shall need - & they might be sent.

I thought I had a good supply of the mixture of lanolin & vasoline, 50% each. Thought I had much more than I have. Tried to buy a little here, and I can't for two reasons - ① need a doctor's prescription ② they don't have lanolin. Fat & soap constitute the greatest shortage. You remember the trouble I had for many years with scrubbing. I should greatly appreciate it if you would send me from New York - two things -

- a) Large jar a can of Aquaphor
- b.) Large jar of lanolin - vasoline mixture

Though I still have a little - I need it as soon as it can get here. Wrote 7 Carvers about it but they never have been too quick about such things. I know as I asked them to send some things to Uncle Max's old housekeeper last winter. If you can expedite shipping of the two mentioned articles, it shall be greatly appreciated. Let me know how things are at home.
