December 13th:

The fourth meeting was called to order by the Secretary December 13th, at quarter to eleven at the Women's Club, Minneapolis.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and accepted.

Name for the class was discussed but not decided on.

Miss Abbot addressed the meeting, her subject being Three Articles in the Atlantic Monthly for February, April and May, 1911 "The Spirit of the Younger Generation" and two answers.

This was followed by a general discussion of Chapter V of Miss Adam's book "Democracy & Social Ethics".

It was decided to give up reading aloud in class, but to do reading at home, discussing all books, chapter by chapter in class.

It was unanimously voted that the meeting scheduled for December 20th be omitted.

Next meeting to be held December 27th.

Miss Adams' book to be discussed and the "Spiritual Unrest" by Mr. Baker to be read out of class.

Proposed that the class send flowers to Mrs. Winter for Christmas also Browning's poems to be sent to Mrs. George H. Christian.

Miss Truesdale and Miss Winston were authorized to do the purchasing.

December 27th:

The fifth regular meeting was held December 27th, Mrs. Partridge presiding having been elected temporary chairman, eight members present.

A motion was passed that a permanent organization with a name be formed and a short constitution drawn up. A motion was passed that the chair nominate a committee of three to draw up a constitution to be submitted at the next meeting. Miss Wirston, Mrs. Hunt and Miss Abbot were appointed.

The chapter on the Disintegration of the Jews in Baker's "Spiritual Unrest" was discussed.

The meeting adjourned.

January 3d: 1914

The sixth regular meeting was held January 3d, Mrs. Partridge presiding and nine members present.

The constitution drawn up by Mrs. Hunt, Miss Abbot and Miss Winston was read, discussed and accepted. Suggestions for nominations for president - Mrs. Winter, Mrs. De Laittre; for Vice President, Mrs. Atkinson, Mrs. Jackson; for Secretary- Treasurer, Mrs. McKnight.

A suggestion was made that the meeting begin promptly at 10:45, that a fine of 10¢ per every five minutes after be imposed and that the meeting close promptly at 12:30. As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

January 10th: 1914

It was proposed that a fine of 10ϕ be imposed on members for tardiness at meetings.

All meetings to begin promptly at 10:45; Secretary to keep the time and collect the funds.

Motion made that an article pertaining to fines be inserted in the Constitution. Motion seconded.

Constitution read. Article IV Section I of Constitution discussed.

Motion made that section be approved. Motion seconded.

Motion passed that the secretary cast the ballot for the election of President. Ballot cast - Mrs. Winter unanimously elected.

Secretary authorized to notify Mrs. Winter of her election.

Ballot cast for Vice President. Mrs. DeLaittre elected by a majority.

January 21st regular meeting selected for the discussion of a name for the class: Decided that each member bring one name.

No report from Mrs. Jackson and Mrs. Hunt. Change in the division of their program. To report January 17th.

Secretary read two letters from Mrs. Winter written to the class.

General discussion of Baker's book "The Spiritual Unrest" Chapters IV and VI.

The book by Edward T. Devine to be read out of class and discussed January 24th.

The meeting adjourned.

January 24th: 17th

The eighth regular meeting was held January 17th. Nine members were present.

The Vice President, Mrs. De Laittre, presided.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Short discussion of Devine's book "Social Forces".

January 31st: 24th

The Club accepted the invitation of Mrs. De Laittre for luncheon April 25th, this to take place of the last regular meeting.

April 11th:

April 18th:

The twenty-second regular meeting of the Study Club was held April 18th, Mrs. Winter presiding and five members present.

As there was not a quorum, no business was enacted. Mrs. Winter read aloud from the Woman Citizens Library.

The following amendment was submitted, to be voted on at the next regular meeting.

In case of vacancies, members may propose candidates for club membership, but no name shall be proposed unless with four endorsements. No one shall endorse more than one member for one vacancy.

From such a list a nominee shall be elected by a 2/3 vote of the club by informal ballot. Election shall be by ballot and two black balls shall defeat a candidate.

Members shall be notified when an election is to take place, and proxies may be sent by those who are unable to be present.

April 25th:

A motion was made and passed that if a member is unable to be present the day assigned her for her topic, she must write a paper and have a member read it for her.

A suggestion was made that the Study Club join the National Federation of Women's Clubs.

The meeting adjourned.

October 2d:

The twenty-third regular meeting of the Study Club was held Friday morning, October 2d, Mrs. Winter presiding and 17 members present.

It was decided that the program committee submit a program for the next year before the end of March, dealing with the slavic races. This program was adopted, April 2d.

It was decided April 23d at the suggestion of Mrs. Winter that the Study Club would try to raise some money for the War sufferers in Poland. A subscription letter was sent out and money boxes were placed in different stores and public places from which was realized the sum of \$1058.58. Mrs. Yerxa and Miss Edith Winter were elected to the Study Club April 30th. A picnic was held May 7th at Mrs. Partridge's instead of out of doors on account of bad weather.

The first meeting in the fall was held on October 1st. The Club began its new program, a study of the Russian people, their history, literature art and music.

Mrs. Lowry was elected to the Study Club October 15th. Mrs. McKnight asked the members of the club to her house November 3 to hear Mrs. Belouseff a Russian exile, speak.
