Dr. Conger reports that seven or eight states do not have capital punishment. Apparently the death penalty is no deterrent to crime.

Dr. Conger spoke of the hierarch of values and loyalties, the problem of selfishment, and the achievement of the good life.

1933

January: It was moved and carried that the officers of the Study Club be alphabetically chosen. It was moved and carried that three unexplained absences during the year be construed as a wish to withdraw from the Club. It was announced that the secretary had given the approved \$50.00 to Mrs. Stone of Whitter School. The club had a group photograph taken to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of the Club.

February: It was decided that a blank vote or a non-voting member who is present at the meeting constitute a negative ballot.

March: It was moved and carried that the Program Committee make suggestions for topics whenever feasible, and that members having a definite choice send it in to the committee. Mrs. Walter Hudson presented "Government in Business". A discussion ensued as to the possibility of the Club taking some action on the subject so ably presented. A motion was made that the members give it their consideration during the week and bring suggestions for action at the next meeting. Mrs. Hudson presented the idea that the Club could help general political conditions more by joining local taxpayers associations than by communications sent to Washington. The Club voted to give \$5.00 to both the Minneapolis and the Minnesota Taxpayers Associations.

April: The secretary reported that the Minneapolis Taxpayers Association had not been heard from and suggested that as the Club members are probable all Hennepin County taxpayers it might be a good plan to give all our support to the one organization.

August: The question of sabbatical years was discussed, those for this year assigned and placed on record.

December: \$20.00 was sent to assist a "colored girl" of high standing who was in need of financial help to complete her course as a trained nurse in Mrs. Fred Barnry's nurses training course.

1934

January: The young colored girl, for whose education the Club had contributed, failed her nursing examination, therefore the money was returned. The Club sent \$10.00 to the Taxpayers' Association.

February: Sherry was served on a particularly cold, cold day in February...a precedent not to be followed.

April: It was decided to ask Dr. Swenson to give 20 lectures for the sum of

\$200.00. Dues were increased to \$5.00 to take care of this obligation.

June: It was decided that the Study Club take an active in the coming campaign for Governor.

1952

June: It was moved and carried that the business meeting be held in January rather than the spring.
