Ming 1368-1644 A. D. Color in full glory and splendor.

Ching 1644-1912 Ching Te Chen and Fukien pottery centers. Te Hus porcelain figurines.

Shin Chir (Jer) 1644-1661

**Kang-Hsi 1662-1721 White Fukien, monochrome porcelain, marvelpus color and colored pigments. Polychrome porcelain, Blue
and white porcelain

Yung Chang 1723-1735 Chien Lung 1736-1745. Technical perfection

In late Ming and early Ching fine pottery gave way to porcelain. White porcelain vitreous, creamy, hard, transparent. White figures of all gods, Buddha favorite. Much trade with Europe which caused uncertainty between Chinese. Blonde de chenes and Meissen St. Cloud and Chelsea. Best collection in Dresden museum. Monochrome sang de bouf, apple green, ashes of roses, cucumber green. Celaden made to imitate jade supposed to have magic properties. Peach bloom, blue (many shades), mirror black, Yellow green.andbaubergine imperial colors.

Polychrome of Ming and Kang Hsi same in principal but different in exercise and design.

Three colors green, yellow, aubergine etched with metal paint.

Famille noire --black with colors, many imitations.

Famille verte.

These copied by European potters. Vase of famille verte given by J. D. Rockefeller. Blue and white ginger jar with hawthorn which has place of honor in blue and white ware.

Yung Chung All craftsmanship of earlier potters. Liked little things such as snuff bottles etc.

Chien Lung 1736-1795
Devotee of arts; collector. Appointed remarkable man as head of imperial pottery.
Able to produce different effects by control of furnace supply of oxygen.

The 688th meeting of the Study Club was held at
The Minneapolis Institute of Arts with 18 members
present. Mrs. Earl Partridge presided.

Mrs. Pillsbury gave her talk on English Pottery and Porcelain of the 18th Century.

Social Conditions had great ded to do with the making of their porcelains.

First porcelain brought to Queen Elizabeth from Indies.

Very scarce until John Dwight, 1671, an alchemist in the reign of Charles II, established a factory. Elers his workman, from Saxony, probably actually introduced the process.

Lowestoft was the point of entrymfor Chinese pottery. The factory tried to imitate the oriental porcelain. Most of the good Lowestoft is oriental.

Elers was then induded to come to the Staffordshire factory. They first produced "Salt Glaze" about 1700.

Josiah Wedgewood was practical, highly public spirited, ingenius, and wanted to produce a good cheap product for the people in general. Tried for a good cleán white, produced "earthenware" a real revolution with a pressed pattern. He developed "Queens Ware" and "Jasper" which is unglazed, a new kind of paste with a decoration applied by hand. Also produced black Basalt ware, lustre ware, a thin diluted bronze or gold wash, stone pottery and ware with printed designs, which is not highly regarded.

All factories have their recepes.

Around 1750, both porcelain and pottery being produced. At Bow, they imported the material from the Cherokee Indians to start with. This developed into the Chelsea factory, which existed fro 10 years only. They imitated the French products. They used an artificial porcelain made from large amount of glass. Probably inferior but highly regarded as it is so rare. A red anchor is the Chelsea mark. Duesberry tood over the Chelsea factory made Chelsea Derby. Marks are very independable.

Worcester was the most important English porcelain factory. Dr. Wall(his work is very rare) made their

first paste, very fine, a lot of it with Japanese design. Most valuable as collectors items. Half moon mark. Flight and Barr, jewellers, were designers of next period, about 1770. Began to imitate beautiful services with armorial designs, with rather conservative patterns. (Royal Worcester didn't appear until 1860) Some Worcester had printed designs.

Crown Derby was made about end of 18th century. 1800 Josiah Spode discovered Bone China. First to made porcelain paste with no glass. Will take any decoration, not easily broken. A very important discovery. All the factories used this mixture.

Rockingham was very ornate, with raised applied decoration . Period of William IV.

Minton probably the first modern factory.

Mrs. Morrison gave her talk on Potteries.

- 1. Red ware: soft porous body; from pinkish buff to red with colorless glaze. Body similar to English lustre.
- . Brown ware: buff or cream body covered with brown glaze; Rockingham.

Yellow ware: buff to yellow body with colorless glaze. (Simple kitchen ware)

2. Stoneware -- Hard Paste.

First Half of 18th Century. The Remney family waspprominent in this type of pottery.

Body a finer, denser material, fired to vitrification.
Buff colored.
Salt-glazed in light grey to deep cream with darker grey to brown.

- 3. Agate, Lava or Scroddle Ware
 Laminated body; clay of different colors rolled
 out like pastry, each laid on other, alternating
 colors; then beaten; then sliced like a marble
 cake.
- 4. Cream or Queen's Ware.

Cream colored body with colorless glaze.

5. Slip Ware

cream slip. Sometimes body is covered with a light slip and decorations in darker colors.

(Slip is often made of same clay as the body, diluted with water to consistency of thick cream.) Slip decoration applied much as frosting for a pastry bag.

6, Sgaffiro or Scratch Ware

Made almost exclusively in Pennsylvania.

Is the reverse of slip decoration -- a slip of a contrasting color is applied to body of piece; then the pattern is scratched through the slip so that the color of the body shows to make the design

Slip and Sgaffito are often used together. Cox credits this ware with artistic merit.

7. Parian Ware

Made in Bennington about 1850.

Hard-paste porcelain- unglazed.

Etruria pottery in Trenton, N. J. made the best. Broome made the first egg-shell balique in this country.

First American pottery intact was of course the Indian. Some patterns are slightly reminiscent of the Persian.

There were early potteries in Virginia in the 17th Century, in New York, New Jersey. There are records of these, but no examples.

Great progress in first half of 18th century, (The Bow factories used "unaker" clay from Virginia) on account of which the English were worried about their American market. They developed a good bone ware, bringing over workman from England, with an attempt to copy English ware. Very few examples. During the Revolution, most of the potteries were closed down, except for the simplest types. Afterwards the English tried to keep the market. There was a great deal of of transfer print design sent over.

Norton, in 1793, established the Bennington potteries. Fenton sent over for English experts, to help with a higher type product. A good clay had been found near at hand. They made a Parian ware.

Jersey porcelain and pottery Co, was the best of the period but about 1820 they failed. Then made pottery only.

The next maker of fine porcelain was Tucker. Made good copies of scores. Many potteries on east coast, later in Indiana, Ohio, (James Bennett). East Liverpool, Ohio is now lærgest pottery in the world.

The 690th meeting of the Study Club was held at the Minneapolis Institute of Arts, with 19 members present.

Mrs. Earl Partridge presided.

Mrs. Brown gave her topic.

A demonstration was given of the actual construction of clay objects. "Centering" is the difficult part. It is dried out in a plaster of Paris mold before being put in the kiln. The making of the glaze was described. It is either dipped, sprayed or poured on.

The "tunnel -kiln" has made the manufacture of cheap pottery possible.

The patterns are stamped onto the biscuit. One operator works on a single color where the painting is done.

The Rockwood factory, established 1880, combined art and utility. The decoration was done on the wet clay, with low relief after. "Gold stone" and "Tiger-eye" were their most famous glazes.

Walter S. Lenox as at first particularly interested in balique; he developed something that was even better. His secretary, George Brow, carried on after Lenox died. They made and make many/beautiful designs, and use always a slow careful method, using always the finest materials.

The <u>Syracuse</u> factory was started by a Frenchman and his American wife who came from Minnesota.

Another Minnesota man, Carl Walters has a workshop in Woodstock now, specializes in animal figures.

Early Carolina designs were used by Mr. and Mrs. Busby, called "Jugtown ware". Jamestown pottery makes irridescent ware.

Dedham ware uses largely the rabbit design.

Mrs. Wernon Wright's daughter, Anne, does very successful work in pottery in New York.

There are dozens of schools of ceramic art in the

country now. Susie Singer in Pasadena is considered an outstanding artist. New materials are being found in Death Valley.

The <u>Vernon</u> kilns in Los Angeles have Rockwell Kent as one of their artists. Many beautiful wares are now being made.

Royal Copenhagen factories worked right through the war. Much hand craft done in Sweden, Norway, and Finland. The factor things done there are made to look like the hand made ware.

Some work now being done in Spain and much like earliest designs. A great deal of pottery is being made in Mexico and much of it is not very good.

The Quimper ware has been made by one family for centuries. This is in Brittany.

The Black Ware is the famous Indian ware from New Mexico.

My committee...composed of Mrs. Lowe, Mrs. Little, and myself...met to clarify our voting procedure; and after studying the minutes of past meetings, found that the procedure was as follows:

When new members are to be elected, notices are sent out to the members of the Study Club two weeks in advance. At the meeting, suggestions for names for membership are made from the floor vocally. Any number may be suggested. A list is made of the suggested names.

The Club then votes on the suggested names.

The First Step is to have each member write on a ballot the names of all those proposed whom she wishes to have as nominees for membership. One may vote for any number at this stage, without regard to the number of vacancies. To become a nominee, each suggested name must receive two-thirds vote of those present. The teller then reads the names of those who have received the necessary two-thirds vote.

The Second Step. Each name is now voted on individually (by written ballot), beginning with the name which has received the most votes. If names have the same number of votes, they are voted on alphabetically. Two negative ballots shall reject a candidate. A blank or lacking ballot does not count as a negative vote; so if 21 are present, then 21 ballots must be cast. In the minutes of the meeting, the Secretary records the names of the elected candidates only.

At the annual meeting of the Study Club on May 21, 1959, it was voted to amend Article Three of the Bylaws of the society and change the election proceedure to the preferential system of voting. An explanation of this voting system follows:

- 1. The number of vacancies shall be announced.
- 2. Nominations are then in order.
- 3. Every candidate nominated is listed on each member's ballot.
- 4. Each member votes for each candidate in the order of her preference, putting a #1 beside the name of her first choice, # 2 for her second choice, and so on to the last place.
- 5. The tellers count the number of votes for each candidate and list them in order, the candidate with the lowest numberical count having first place, the second lowest the next place and so on to the last place.
- 6. The top one, two, three, or more candidates, dependent on the number of places to be filled, are then announced.
- 7. The first name is then voted upon by written ballot. With two negative votes that candidate fails of election. The next one is then voted upon, etc.
- 8. The survivors of this last vote are declared elected.
