



Lecturer: Mary Ellen Lundsten, Ph.D The lecture series is designed to give you deeper insight into the issues facing policy-makers and citizens in what is known as "the Middle East." This region, which extends from Afghanistan to Morocco, includes the many countries of the Arab world as well as Iran, Afghanistan, Turkey, and Israel. We will draw upon the disciplines of history, comparative politics, theology, sociology, and international relations to help understand the social and political dynamics of this vast area.

Course Content:

Our readings and discussions will consider the role of the Islamic tradition, twentieth-century ideologies, the decolonization and modernization processes, how social groups interact and affect Middle East politics, and how political institutions typically function in this region. We will examine issues widely debated in Middle East public discussion today: efforts at democratization, gender politics, political Islam, water conflicts, and the breakdown of Arab-Israeli negotiations.

No longer are we in a world of pot-hunting and grave-robbing. Archaeology is an exact science today, a discipline that crosses scientific fields of study to allow us to reconstruct ancient society.

September 25

Ancient Egypt: The Pyramid Builders

The glory that was Egypt truly began in the IVth Dynasty (2700-2300 BC) with the age of the pyramids. These monuments to the dead pharaoh were much more than funerary monuments, but symbols of Egypt's greatness.

October 2

Ancient Egypt: Rulers of the World

The New Kingdom (1550-1000 BC) was the period of Egypt's greatest power, ruling the entire Near

East. The exploits of warrior-kings would extend her boundaries into central Africa and the Near East. The names of Thutmose III, Akhnaton, Ramses II and of course, Tutankamun, would echo throughout the land and instill fear in the hearts of all who opposed them.

October 9

Ancient Egypt: A Last Gasp for Glory

The coming of the Greeks and Romans meant a total revision of Egyptian ideals in order to keep up. But could they compete? The Ptolemaic Dynasty (324-60 BC) would be forced to rely on a beautiful queen who was willing to gamble it all for her country.

October 16

The Near East: Dawn of Civilization

The Fertile Crescent was the scene; the time, @5000 BC. Humankind made the radical shift from hunter and gatherer to sedentary farmer; and the world would never be the same again.

October 23

The Near East: Sumer and Akkad

The first great civilizations saw their rise in the 3rd Millennium BCE. At first they shared power in the Tigris and Euphrates Valleys, but then vanity and greed would see their demise.





AMERICA AND THE NEW EURASIA

SYNOPSIS:

The great landmass of Eurasia, stretching from the Atlantic coast of Europe to the Pacific rim of Asia, has been at the center of world economics and geopolitics for most of human history. Over the centuries, large empires rose and fell within the Eurasian expanse, and far-flung trade routes such as the storied Silk Road flourished. With the rise of the West in the modern era and the discovery of the Americas, the center of gravity began to shift away from Eurasia. During the past two hundred years, a period the Chinese define as one of "eating bitterness," much of Eurasia declined into colonial status and eventually withdrew from the world trading system under stagnant communist regimes. Today, however,

after three decades of globalization that have witnessed the opening of China, the collapse of communism in Russia, and the reform of India's economy, Eurasia may be returning to its traditional role. New trade routes and energy pipelines increasingly link the continent, and countries such as Turkey and Russia, and even Germany and Japan, have begun to reconsider their policy options. Eurasia today accounts for over seventy percent of the world population; its reemergence will pose major challenges to U.S. foreign and economic policy. This lecture series will describe the rise of Eurasia and the evolving U.S. policy response. It will attempt to provide a cultural and historical context for understanding the current position of key countries in the Eurasian region.

Presenter Bios

William Davnie served in the Foreign Service from 1981-2007, including service in Southeast Asia, Russia, Tajikistan, Lithuania, Finland, and in Iraq during the surge of 2007. Prior to the Foreign Service, he taught English and researched political Islam in Indonesia for a year, and was a Presbyterian pastor in North Dakota for five years. In the Foreign Service, he was a political officer for most of his career, and Deputy Chief of Mission at the embassies in Tajikistan and Lithuania. On retirement he moved to Minneapolis, where he had lived as a child, along with his wife Charlotte, a Wisconsin native. They have two grown daughters, one a nurse in Florida, the other a Foreign Service Officer with the U.S. Agency for International Development, currently serving in Cambodia after an assignment in Kabul.

Thomas Hanson is a former career Foreign Service Officer. While with the U.S. Department of State his foreign postings included East Germany, France, Norway, the Soviet Union, Sweden, and Georgia. He also assisted in opening new embassies in Mongolia and Estonia. Mr. Hanson has also worked on the Foreign Relations Committees of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives. Most recently, he was Director for NATO and European Affairs at the Atlantic Council of the United States in Washington, D.C. 

Water is our most critical resource - without water there is no life. While nearly 70 percent of the world is covered by water, only 2.5 percent of it is fresh water. The rest is saline and ocean-based. Even then, just 1 percent of our fresh water is easily accessible, with much of it trapped in glaciers and snowfields. In essence, only 0.007 percent of the planet's water is available to fuel and feed its 6.8 billion people. Surprisingly, the water you drink today has been around in one form or another for hundreds of millions of years. While the amount of freshwater on the planet has remained fairly constant over time—continually recycled through the atmosphere and back onto our land and into our cups—the population has exploded. This means that every year competition intensifies for a clean, abundant supply of water for drinking, agriculture and

manufacturing in order to sustain life. Water plays an important economic and political role in Minnesota, the U.S. and throughout the world. Safe drinking water is essential and although access to safe drinking water has improved over the last decades in almost every part of the world, approximately one billion people still lack access to safe water and over 2.5 billion lack access to adequate sanitation. Projections suggest that by 2030, in some regions of the world, water demand will exceed supply by 50%. The challenge we face now is how effectively to conserve, manage, and distribute the water we have and to encourage us to explore the local stories and the global trends defining the world's water crisis. We will learn where freshwater resources exist - how they are used, and how climate, technology, policy, and people play a role both in creating obstacles and finding solutions.







Larkin McPhee will talk about her upcoming hour long special on psychedelic medicine for the NOVA Science Series, scheduled to air on national PBS, October 19th. The film features several current FDA-approved clinical trials treating a range of conditions from addiction to depression to PTSD, as well as a brief look at historical context and indigenous traditions. Traditional psychiatric treatments are of limited benefit and scientists are cautiously optimistic that psychedelics could be a game changer for treating or even curing a range of conditions.

HOW DID STUDY CLUB START?? Remembrances Of Mrs. John S. Pillsbury

"In the summer of 1912 a few of us ex-debutantes were discussing the fact that our lives seemed quite useless and only occupied with pink teas and formal luncheons, ususally given by one of grande-dames of Minneapolis in our honor. For these occasions we were dressed in long satin or broadcloth dresses with huge black hats that seemed to be flowing with ostrich plumes. In the dining rooms the curtains were drawn, and we sat formally at a much decorated table with bonbons to match the pink paper baskets filled with nuts. The room with lighted only by candles. These luncheons gave us no outlet for our intellectual aspirations and when we attempted social work we were not accepted by the professionals. We decided, therefore, to change our life style, so a small group of us organized a club to study art, literature and politics."
