

Dear Mr. Palas:

This letter is in reference to your phone call of Friday, May 5th, referring to an application from Dr. Paul Helpne of Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, to obtain 3.3 Callimico goeldi. The type of work described in the application was much needed for the species and should be supported if possible.

It is my understanding this application also has the support of Dr. Ranier Lorenz, official studbook keeper and student of this animal, and I would second Dr. Lorenz' recommendations with the following reservations:

1. To my knowledge, we are not certain about the population status in the wild, and I cannot make judgment here.
2. I am enclosing a first draft of a model management document which we as the Golden Marmoset Committee of WAPT have designed for that animal. It is my opinion that the requirements spelled out in that draft have basic application to Callimico. Specifically, the item relative to hand carried animals in transit is solidly recommended in the event that the application is approved. We have found numerous unfortunate instances where unsponsored shipments have ended with fatality through over-exposure in pressurized spaces, etc.
3. I would recommend seeking out appropriate officials in Brazil relative to their opinion regarding Callimico resources and desirability of such action.
4. It should be made absolutely certain that the program does not result in terminal or risky procedures with regard to the animals' well-being and that the potential for reproduction is optimized.
5. Before importing, all possible sources of animals in this country should be explored. We have occasionally found unpaired animals going to waste. Dr. Lorenz can confirm this very quickly.

In summary, with reference to the five points above, as chairman of the Golden Marmoset Committee, WAPT, I feel that Dr. Helpne's application has merit and is recommended.

Dear Wayne:

I have a copy of Endangered Species Permit No. ES-158 issued to Dr. Paul G. Heltne, Johns Hopkins University, for 3.3 Goeldi's Marmosets. The text of the permit includes this:

"...in accordance with recommendations of WAPT Golden Marmoset Committee Chairman, Donald D. Bridgwater - and - IUCN Studbooker, Dr. Rainer Lorenz."

While I do not recall the application being referred to the AAZPA Conservation Committee or to WAPT as such, this was not a zoo application, and perhaps USDI feels they should handle non-zoo applications differently.


Should we not question, however, the mention in the permit of the names of individuals consulted? I would not object to references to AAZPA and WAPT. However, individual consultants may feel some qualms about responding if they are to be identified in this manner. It seems unusual.

I am also a bit puzzled by the case. When I last talked with Lorenz, he was concerned about the future of his Callimico colony, saying the operation was being shut down. If this is indeed the case, why import more of the species? I am also curious as to whether the research design for these animals is consistent with the propagation claim. What would be our view, were we consulted, about importation of an endangered species for terminal experiments?

1. In accordance with Title 50 C.F.R., Section 17.12(b)(1), and pursuant to the application submitted on October 8, 1971, DR. PAUL G. HELTNE is hereby authorized:
TO IMPORT - into the United States, at MIAMI, FLORIDA, from IQUITOS, PERU, -or- if advisable for expediency, other South American export points, Six (6) -(3.3.) - GOELDI'S MARMOSETS (Callimico goeldii),- for scientific research and propagation, in accordance with recommendations of WAPT Golden Marmoset Committee Chairman, Donald D. Bridgwater -and- IUCN Studbooker, Dr. Rainer Lorenz. THE PET FARM, INC., Miami, Florida, and DR. HELTNE, are jointly responsible for the acquisition, care, and hand-carrying of these animals continuously from country of origin and export to their final destination at the Johns Hopkins University. The importation provisions of this permit terminate upon importation of the six animals -or-- on June 30, 1973.
2. No marking, as provided in 50 C.F.R., Section 17.6, shall be required for the importation described above. However, should semi-permanent or permanent marking be placed on the animals by permittee at some future time, written notice thereof, stating the manner and location of the marking shall be supplied to the Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Washington, D.C. 20240, within ten calendar days of such marking.
3. The Goeldi's Marmosets, or any progeny thereof, may not be sold, donated, or transferred to any other zoo or individual unless such person has first been issued a permit by the Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.
4. The death of the Goeldi's Marmosets must be reported to the Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, within a period of 10 days. Their escape must be reported by telephone or telegraph within 24 hours. The remains will be disposed of to a scientific institution approved by the Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.
5. The permittee shall allow inspection of the facilities and records by any authorized employee of the Dept. of the Interior during regular business hours.
6. A report of the importation made under authority of this permit, with identifying characteristics given, shall be made to the Director, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.
7. This permit is conditioned upon compliance with all applicable foreign, State, and United States laws/regulations.
8. This permit is specific and may only be utilized for importation in accordance with the terms hereon.

Dear Wayne:

I believe John Perry is forwarding to you some additional information onf "Institut Costa."

I have given some thought to the whole substance and decided that we are in a position of not knowing anything about anything yet. As best I can tell, the Van den Brinks did get a response from someone saying that there would be no golden marmosets available this year but perhaps next year. Still no one has been able to determine just who Professor Weber is.

Saul Kitchener told me that the letterhead originally carried a Sao Paulo, Brazil, address.

The price lists that I have do not show this address but John Perry tells me that information supplied to Van den Brink again had the Brazilian address as the personal contact. This information has been forwarded to Brazil and evidently such activity would be clearly in violation of Brazilian law. I am suggesting that we hold off for another month or so and see if more detailed information is forthcoming.

The man offers on my price list several wildly exotic creatures from South America, all of which would be in violation if brought from the wild. I am enclosing copies of these price lists for your information.

I think what I am saying is that we don't have enough information to say anything with accuracy in the newsletter just yet.

Dear Wayne:

I became aware of Professor Weber about one and one half months ago and took the following action.

First, I asked Saul Kitchener, who had received an offer letter from Professor Weber, to respond inquiring as to availability, costs, etc. Saul did so, copying a letter to his files and to me stating that Lincoln Park had no intention of purchasing any such animals. The intent was simply to solicit a response.

I am enclosing also a copy of a letter from Dr. Faust of Frankfurt to Mr. Perry which seems to agree with Marvin's information.

Several feelers have been put out and I expect between Marvin in Europe and those of us here, we can at least collect sufficient evidence to perhaps publish a black list notice? in our organization.

Dr. Magnanini and Dr. Coimbra-Filho were also made aware of this mysterious person, Professor Weber, who used to maintain a telephone and address in Brazil. Both these gentlemen had no knowledge of the man or the activity, but will go immediately to work at that end.

I will keep you posted.



Dear Mr. Jones,

Many Thanks for your letter of January 29th.

The INSTITUTE COSTA has given us a headache for quite a while now. About half a year ago they offered to the Fauna Preservation Society, London, an Asiatic Cheetah apart from various other, rather mysterious events that have occurred. We on our part do not receive any offers from this institute, and the forwarding agent Weichelt does not give us any information whatever. We have used all possible tricks in order to find out who the people are behind the scene but - so far - without any success. The fact that the firm tries to remain anonymous and do their business solely with the expedition firm Weichelt shows quite clearly, I think, that something is rather odd here. I for myself have my suspicion about it all but, since I have no proof, I cannot speak it out loudly. The only thing I can do is to warn everyone intending to do business with the Institute Costa (or with a Professor Weber who is acting as their director).

I do not think that Simanowski is the man holding the strings for he is an official animal dealer and also very clever. He definitely knows what the Golden Marmosets are worth, and the selling of these animals are not prohibited in Germany. I am certain that he will try to get the business through on his own behalf - if he intends to give them away at all - instead of leaving it to someone else. There is no reason for him to work anonymously. The only opportunity of doing something against the Institute Costa would come along, if they were to break the laws thus giving us the right to inform the police. As things are at the moment, we cannot do anything at all. I would advise everyone interested in obtaining some Golden Marmosets to insist on proper information as to the animals' origin. Something might be found out in this way. Prudence, however, is always most advisable.

We confirm with thanks the receipt of your letter of February 10 th, 1972.

The INSTITUTE COSTA, c/o the forwarding agent Weichelt, 6000 Frankfurt am Main, Flughafenbüro, Frachthof 1, is very well known to us and has been causing us considerable concern and anxieties for some time. "Known to us" means that we are informed of their existence by the firm Weichelt and in addition that a so-called "Professor Weber" is said to be the man behind the scenes. For quite a while we have been trying to find out who this man is but he never appears personally, and the agent Weichelt denies all information. Offers have so far not been made to us, any events of such kind we learned from other people. Some months ago, for instance, he had offered an Asiatic Cheetah to London. We could not find out where this animal came from. You can see from all those mysterious happenings that something is not as it should be. We would, therefore, advise anyone, to use utmost prudence when dealing with this institute. We on our part have unfortunately no means of power to proceed against them. Perhaps one of the American zoos will try to find out the origin of the Golden Lion Marmosets ? !

There is an animal dealer in Germany holding a small breeding stock. This man does to the best of our knowledge not represent the Institute Costa. He is generally well known and has no reason whatever to hide himself behind this institute. Besides, he is so good a business man that he would rather sell the Golden Lion Marmosets himself instead of leaving the deal to other people, if he were to sell them at all. He knows what they are worth, and since there are no restrictions in Germany as regards the sale of these animals, he can offer them at any time. He has - as already mentioned - no reason to hide their origin. Another breeding stock of this species is not known in the Federal Republic of Germany.



Just to set the record straight for my files I do not want to purchase these animals and am only writing to him to see if he will give me any more information about them. There is no way we would try to import these animals, nor do we have any desire to do so.

I did speak to Fred Z. about this place and he states that an actual person called Prof. Weber does not exist. He also says that he doesn't think anyone has ever received any animals from this guy, but on the other hand he says the business is wanted by the police in Germany for tax-evasion.

Fred believes that the man(or men)who runs the Insittut Costa is a n employee of an airline and works out of an office in the freight terminal atthe Frankfurt airport. He also claims there is no phone, etc. for Institut Costa, but there is a phone number listed on the letterhead.

I am enclosing the latest lists I received from Costa. I have noticed that these latest lists do not include the Sao Paulo, Brazil address he used to have on his communications.

Maybe we can get some more information on him from the Brazilians who are scheduled to be at the conference.
