Born 1845, September 11, Newington, Ontario. Died 1936, June 12, Fugene, Oregon. Euried at Windom, Minnesota.

Stayed at home on farm near Newington, Ontario till of age.

Emigrated to the Green Bay Section of Wisconsin, probably in the fall of 1866 or spring of 1867. Norked in lumber camp and saw mills until 1869 then emigrated to Cottonwood County, Minnesota by ox team with Pat Welch and two others.

Took claim (80 acres) in Storden Township, North of Bingham Lake. Few years later traded claims with one Benjamin and obtained the original 80 acres of the home farm in Lakeside. Later bought 160 acres adjoining on the north from Monroe Frank.

Married Enma V. Greenfield living on adjoining claim (probably in spring of 1872) and lived with her folks through summer and went to work in woods near Mankato in winter. Daughter Enma J. Grant born March 16, 1873 -- the mother died March 24, 1873. Her parents took care of child. Continued to work claim in summer and work in woods in winter until spring of 1876 when he married Mary C. Geddes whom he had met at her home on farm 12 miles west of Winnebago Agency, now St. Clair, near Mankato.

They apparently lived that summer in the Greenfield Grainery in Lakewide, keeping Smma with them, then went to the A. Greenfield place on the Des Moines River, south of Windom, where he cut wood through the winter. George W. Grant was born in the dug out on this farm January 13, 1877.

Soon built small two story frame house with cellar on own land -- also a dug out - sod wall barn. Later added one room, one story lean to on house. Following are birth dates of children, given in County record:

Lived on farm until spring of 1905 when moved into Windom and built . house north of town. Moved to Oregon in fall of 1910, having spent the previous year there with Charles Francis and built the house on the outskirts of Bugene.

Lemuel Preston Richardson, son of Thomas and Rachael (Smith) Richardson was born November 9, 1848 in Stockholm, New York. He moved with his parents to Berlin, Wisconsin, in 1854. His mother died the next winter and his father bound him out to Mr. Randall with whom he lived a number of years, taking the name of Randall. When Mr. Randall lost his wife and broke up housekeeping, Lemuel went to his father's home for two years and then worked for a neighbor, Mr. Ennis, where he spent three years. Mr. Ennis had a large apple orchard and young Lemuel decided that when he had a home of his own, he would have plenty apple trees.

When he reached the age of 21, Mr. Ennis gave him a team of colts as part payment. He purchased a wagon in the fall of 1870 and came to Sleepy Eye, Minnesota, the end of the railroad, where he worked using his team and wagon hauling stones for many foundations of buildings going up in that little town on the prairie. He made his home with Alvah and Amy Larrabee who had a family of four sons and two charming daughters.

In 1871, Lemuel Came to Cottonwood County and took a claim on the SW1 of Section 8, Selma Township, where he homesteaded 80 acres and used 80 acres as a tree claim on which he planted 15 acres of trees. He was six miles from his nearest neighbor, surrounded by waving prairie grass, not a tree in sight. He built a claim shanty and dug a well by hand.

In March 1876, he married Edna Larrabee, daughter of Alvah and Amy (Humphry) Larrabee, natives of New York and Vermont. Edna was born in Winnebago County, Wisconsin, in April 1857. She came to Minnesota at the age of four with her parents who homesteaded near Sleepy Eye.

The Richardsons had five children. Myrtle married Oscar Bean of Maine. They lived on various farms in Minnesota, but because of Oscar's failing health, they and their four children moved to California in 1926. Both are deceased.

Grace taught school six years in three districts in Selma Township. She was one of Comfrey's first teachers. In 1909 she became executive secretary for the Y. W. C. A. in St. Paul and worked for that organization in various towns for 30 years. She died in Claremont, California, in 1966.

Bert became a minister and was ordained in the Congregational denomination. He spent nearly 50 years ministering to northern Minnesota churches. He married Eva Klein. They had four children. She passed away in 1933. Bert died in Baudette, Minnesota in 1962.

Celia Married Rev. Frank Atkinson, a native of England, who for several years ministered to Congregational churches in several states. They retired in West Palm Beach, Florida, where Celia still lives. Frank died September 19, 1972.

Mark grew to manhood on the Richardson homestead and worked on the farm with his father. They had Holstein cows and taised Chester White hogs, raised chickens, and worked an apple orchard of 200 trees. The Comfrey Times of 1903 states: "It is something out of the ordinary to see a farmer in this part of the state selling apples, but last Saturday, L. P. Richardson was distributing apples grown on his own farm to merchants in Comfrey. The apples are large and sound. Mr. Richardson states that the trees are yielding largely this season of fruit that a few years ago people thought could not be grown on the prairies of Minnesota."

They raised grains--wheat, oats, flax, barley, and later on, Corn.

Mark married Ruth Burger, daughter of Frank and Parthenia (Kesth) Keith

Burger, in Delton Township, May 1917. Both attended the Selma Congregational church. For two years they lived with Mark's folks. Lemuel

and Edna retired to Long Beach, California, in 1919, leaving Mark

and Ruth to manage and work the farm.

They recall the dry years of 1926, 1934, and 1936 with scarcely any crops, and the 1929 depression. Soon things changed for the better. They were able to tile a part of the low places and build more buildings including a second house. In 1926 Mr. and Mrs. Lemuel Richardson came from California to celebrate their 50th anniversary with old home friends, children and grandchildren. Edna died in California in 1930. Their daughter Myrtle and family came to live and care for her father during the last years of his life. He died December 27 1948, age 100 years.

Mark and Ruth had four children--Eugene, Elaine, Rolland, and Helen, who died of pneumonia at age eight months. The children graduated from Comfrey High School.

Eugene served nearly five years in World War ITarmy and came home to help on the farm. He married Norma Esau of Mt. Lake, and they lived in the second house. Eugene had his back hurt while in the service and became unable to do farm work, so he left the farm for other jobs. He died of a heart attack at the age of 54 in 1973. Eugene and Norma had two children—Kathleen, who marriedLlewellyn Brown of Algona, Iowa. (they have two children, Kevin and Jeffrey), and Mark Allen who enlisted in the air force in Oct. 20, 1972. He is in Charles Ton AFB. S.C.

Elaine attended Mankato Normal school and became a grade school teacher in Mt. Lake and Northfield for ten years. In September 1952, she married a Nebraska farmer, Frank Sabacky. In 1954 they purchased a home and land near Litchfield, Minnesota, where they live. They have three children--Dean, married to Debbie Birch, June 1975- Diane and Julie. Elaine has been teaching school in Dassel, Minnesota for the last eleven years.

Rolland enlisted in the navy for two years. After his discharge in November, 1947, he enrolled at Hamline University. In 1949 he married Paulina Peterson. They graduated from Hamline in 1950. They went to Southern California where they still live. Polly is a kindergarten teacher. Rolland is Regional Commercial Manager for Farmers Insurance Group. They have three children-Debra, Jerald, and Douglas.

Mark and Ruth have eight grandchildren whom they enjoyed as they grew up. Now they are being educated and preparing to take their place in the world.

In 1939, Mark and Ruth purchased the Richardson homestead, the SW_{4}^{1} of section 8. Later they acquired the S_{2}^{1} of the NW_{4}^{1} . Because of Mark's health they retired from farming in 1959 and rented out the land, though for some years Mark helped with light field work. In the late 30's he and Ruth had planted a twenty five tree orchard which needed care along with a garden, flower borders and lawn.

They purchased a camper and did some travelling--thru northern Minnesota, to California, Florida, National Parks, and sights along the way.

They enjoyed living on the farm in the house built in 1897. The same plaster is on the walls though they have been papered and painted

many times. The roof has been shingled twice. It has been remodelled by making two rooms where there were porches, a bath room, running water, and cupboards. Electricity came in 1946.

They hope to celebrate their 60th anniversary in the spring of 1977.
