eran faith and teachings, Rev. Hocanson had met one of the settlers from this region and had learned from him that there was a settlement of Swedish Americans here and that they deeply longed for spiritual food and nourishment. It was in accordance with this need that he traveled to this locality by ox team and by foot and held the first divine services in

the humble sod-house home of Nels Miller, located on what is now the home of Mrs. Nels Miller, his widow, and Fred Miller, his youngest son.

It was here, on April 27, 1873, amid these humble surroundings that was born the Ev. Lutheran Sillerud Church. Rev. Hocanson presided at the meeting that was held after the services and the constitution which was drawn for the church was signed by the following family heads and single persons:

Nels J. Miller and family; C. F. Green and family; Johan Nilson and family; John Swenson and family; P. N. Ostrom and family; A. R. Lagerwall and family; N. Trucdson and family; Jens Olson and family; Olof Olson and family; E. Erickson and family; Mrs. Anna Johnson, a

widow, and children; Jens Anderson, single; John Billberg, single; Carl Bergstrom, single; Carl Haldin, single; O. J. Miller, single; C. M. Hommerberg, single; C. J. Anderson, single; Aug. Green, single; Andrew Borg, single; N. A. Hommerberg, single; A. J. Reinholdt, single; Jens Larson, single.

The above members organized by electing as deacons C. F. Green, C. M. Hommerberg, and N. J. Miller. As trustees they elected Carl Bergstrom, P. N. Ostrom and A. R. Lagerwall. Nels J. Miller was elected president and P. N. Ostrom secretary. Resolutions were adopted as follows: that the church apply for admission into the Augustana Synod of the Lutheran Church which would hold its annual meeting at Paxton, Illinois, in June of that year, and that the trustees be instructed to proceed with incorporation proceedings for the congregation at once.

Another resolution adopted at this meeting which was, and is of historical value, was the instructing of the officers of the new church to procure at once, "a piece of ground that could be dedicated as a burial ground for our dead." This resolution was carried out at once, and today we find that many of those who were present at this meeting and

Ole Olson homestead - Lake Wilson Robert + Blanche Stoffel - owners Lismaie Mrs. It is believed that ale alson homesteaded this property in the early 1860's My grandmother Ellen Reisdorfer related this story about the Swing Uprising of 1862 Previous to this time there were several bands of Scary Indians that made campe in the tree claim in the north-west corner of the property. These Indian remained camped in the tree claim leaving only to get water from the form well. They never caused any trauble to the Olsan's and their friendship was strengthened when the Olean's gave them baked goods, mille, paultry and fresh meats. The Indiana recipiocated by leaving macrosine, build work and fresh versien,

The Indiana layalty and friendship was tested by the Stairy Uprising of 1862 at this time maranding bands of Irain Indiana including the ones campedan this hamestead swept through southwest Mr. raiding and killing as they went.

To insure the safety of the Olsan homestead the Indians marked the trees to indicate that this hamestead was to be hypassed and left unharmed. The Olsan's heard the passage of the Indians as they traveled east on their murderous rampage.
