PETER BINGER

Peter Binger was born in Brinn, Saxony, November 6, 1840. He came to America in 1866, and married Sophia Hasemen, who came a year later, in New York September 21, 1867. He worked in New York as a cabinet maker, the trade which he learned in Bremen and Berlin. Pay was by the piece completed and security uncertain, so it was the lope that the prairie land and the homestead grant offerred with it would give greater security that brought him and his wife to Minnesota.

They came from New York by rail with five other families, and arrived in St. Peter in the spring of 1868. There they acquired an ox-driven prairie schooner, and arrived in Flora Township April 19, 1868. They settled on the claim they had filed, with five years to prove it, and homesteaded 80 acres, described as the North $\frac{1}{2}$ of Northwest $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 20, Township 114, Range 36, which lay north of the Minnesota River. This homestead was known as No. 541 application Number 3990 at Redwood Falls, Minnesota, May 20, 1862. This grant was signed by President Ulysses S. Grant on January 15 in the 99th year of the Independence of the United States. It was on this homestead that their ten children were born.

Upon arrival in 1868, a sod house was built—a dug out in the ground with sod walls. A little sod was broken by hand, the first corn was planted by poking a stick in the ground and dropping in the seed, and a little garden crop was planted. Then Peter walked to Mankato, did carpenter work in the summer, coming back in the fall when the carpenter season was over, first walking to St. Peter for what flour and groceries he could carry to bring with him. In 1869 he worked on the homestead in the winter building a log house about 12 by 14 feet, going to the river bottom to cut wood for fuel and logs for the cabin. That summer he again walked to Mankato to do carpenter work, returning to St. Peter for groceries in the fall and then home again.

In 1869 or 1870, he got an ox team, and between the neighbors, they did their own sod-breaking. They used a plow to break the sod, and seeding was done by hand. They leveled the sod as best they could by hitching the oxen to a tree bough and went over the ground until it was somewhat level. When the grain was ripe, at first it was harvested with a cradle, and later the reaper. The bundles were tied with straw bands. It was threshed by horse power. The wheat was hauled to St. Peter by ox team. (It was difficult to cross the Minnesota River unless it was frozen, which led them to the closest town on the north, Willmar.)

In 1872, the Great Northern Railroad came to Willmar. This was a forty mile trip from the homestead and took three days. The grain was loaded the evening before the trip, and they started early the next morning. They would drive until close to Willmar, and then stop for the night. (There were farm homes at which to stay.) The next day they would go to Willmar, unload the grain and shop, and go back to their stopping place, stay there overnight, and go home the third day.

The county court house, where the first county business was done, was built in Beaver Falls in 1871.

In all, five living abodes were constructed by Peter Binger for his family...the sod house, two log houses with thatched roofs (later used to store grain), one frame house 16 by 24 feet, two stories high with an 8 foot lean-to, (later also used as a granary) and with 2 apple trees and 15 plum trees close to the frame house, and in 1887, a frame house which stands there now. There was a barm built sometime in the 1880's.

On January 7, 1873, a great blizzard struck the county and many settlers perished. Later in 1873, the great grasshopper plague came, and in two hours all the crop was gone. The grasshoppers were so thick they darkened the sun. It took until 1877 for the settlers to recover from the grasshopper damage.

Peter Binger, who built a half mile from the woods, was the first on the prairie, where there was no protection from the then prevailing northwest wind. The Larkins were the first people out of the woods, but very close to it. Conrad Becker, who, because he was a soldier, got 160 acres, had come earlier to Section 18, but had settled right in the woods. After Peter came, settlers picked up land fast. Peter increased his land holdings, keeping 240 acres in what was known as the homeplace. This was later deeded to his youngest son, Herman. Three of his sons, William, Bernhard, and August each owned 160 acre farms near their father.

The first school was a mile from the homestend, but burned. A second school was built much closer. It was known as the Binger School for four Binger farms were located near it. Peter built some of the furniture for the school and served as school board clerk.

For church, the people first met in the homes. The Baptist had the first church close to the first school. The Lutherans, Methodist and Evangelicals met in houses and built their churches before or around 1890. Peter finished building St. Matthew's Lutheran Church of Flora township when the original contractor died before the job was completed. This was the church of which he was a member.

A little post office town called Vicksburg, where mail came once a week, was built ½ mile west and 1 mile south of the homestead. This disappeared when the town of Renville was established in 1878. The post office of Vicksburg was moved and existed for a bit 1½ miles north and 1 mile west of the homestead.

Notes on history of this area: The Indians gave up the 10 mile strip on the north side of the Minnesota River to the Yellow Medicine Agency in a treaty between the Sioux and the whites in 1858. These Indians and Whites received their money and supplies from the government through the Redwood Agency. The Indians had kept the 10 mile wide strip on the south side of the Minnesota River. When money and supplies didn't get t rough in time, there was a lot of suffering among both Whites and Indians. The Indians blamed the Whites,

so decided to drive them out in 1862. The Whites were either killed or driven out, so didn't try to settle on this north strip until about 1866. (The brutal Kitzman Massacres took place in this area in August, 1862, and are described in the book Minnesota, Forgotten River. When Peter homesteaded, he found a grave in the wooded area of his land, but knowledge of its location has been lost.)

Additional family information:

In March, 1898, the farmers in Flora Township organized the Flora Farmers' Cooperative Creamery Association. Peter Binger was one of its three trustees.

The Peter Binger family (with their first children) would sometimes visit the Andrew Binger family in Mankato, driving there with horses. After Andrew's death, the families each went its own way.

Peter, Sophia, their sons Louis, Edward, August, Bernhard, and daughter Dora, are buried in the cemetary of St. Matthew's Church of Flora.

Peter Binger died April 28, 1924.

HISTORY OF RENVILLE COUNTY

PETER BINGER, a thrifty and industrious farmer of Flora township, was born in Germany, Nov. 6, 1840, son of Valentine and Dorethea (Laubel) Binger. There were three children in the family: Adam, Andrew and Peter. Andrew and Peter left Germany in 1866 and reached New York after a nine days' voyage. They remained in New York until 1868, when they went to Minnesota. Peter had learned the trade of a cabinetmaker in Germany and had followed that trade in New York. He located a homestead of 80 acres in section 20, Flora township, in 1868, where his home now stands. The land had been broken and there had been an old shanty on it, but it was burned at the time of the Indian uprising in 1862. He made a rude barn by driving stakes into the ground and covering the roof with straw. He had one ox team and at first borrowed a government wagon at St. Peter, but finally made one with wooden wheels. Beaver Falls was the nearest market and the grain was taken there to be ground. He now has three 80-acre tracts and has erected new buildings and raises good stock. He is a member of the school board and of the German Lutheran church. He helped build the church and was one of its trustees for several years.

Mr. Binger was married to Sophia Masemann in New York, and they have had ten children, eight of whom are living: Louis (deceased); Edward (deceased); William, a farmer of Emmett township; August, a farmer of Flora township; Dora, now Mrs. Gustave Mack, of Flora township: Bernard, a farmer of Flora township; Henry, of Spokane, Wash.; Pauline, now Mrs. Thos. Zapf, of Spokane, Wash.; Herman, at home, farming with his father; and Marie, at home.

Kronin Family History
FIRST CENTURY
1873 - 1973

On or about May 17, 1873, a boat docked on New York City. It was carrying a six-year old boy named Frederick, his father Frederick A. Kramin, Sr., and his mother Caroline from their home in Kries Flatow, West Prussia. Here they had owned two and one-half morgans. This would equal five acres in America.

Apparently they knew almost exactly where they were going and had very good transportation connections because only eighteen days later, on June 4, the first homestead application was made. Two days later, before H. D. Baldwin, Clerk of District Court at Redwood Falls, one Frederick A. Kramin, Sr. registered his Declaration of intention to become a citizen of the United States of America.

My great-uncle can remember his father telling of the journey from New Ulm to what was to become the family home in Renville County. The trip was made in an ox-drawn, two-wheeled cart which was carrying all their earthly possesions. This meant a few crude tools and cooking utinsels, a change of clothes, some seed, fifty pounds of flour, a little sugar and salt, and fifty cents.

Actually they had left New Ulm with a dollar more, but they stopped and spent the night in an abandoned building near Beaver Falls. The hextmorning a not so friendly Irishman had greeted them with the announcement that this was his building and that they owed him a dollar for the night's lodging. There went two-thirds of their cash!

No one has really figured out how the family survived the first year. They arrived in June, which would be quite late in the season for breaking ground and planting crops. We do know that they built a sod shanty with rush shingles and a lean-to on the side for the animals. This shanty was west across the road and a little south of our present house.

On May 10, 1882, they received their Land Patent and Homestead Certificate which was signed by President Chester A. Arthur.

Every summer they plowed a fire-break but, even with this, they were burned out by a prairie fire one of the first years they were here.

Other dangers and problems came in the forms of drouth and grasshoppers.

In 1875 a log cabin was built a short distance west of where our house now stands. While leveling rocks for the foundation with blasting powder, the elder Fred Kramin was blinded. This left his wife and eight-year old son in charge.

The logs for the cabin came from along the minnesota River. For later buildings, up to the 1910's and 1920's, lumber was hauled by horse team from northern Minnesota near present day Pontoria which is about twenty miles south of Leech Lake.

• Each summer and fall firewood was hauled to the farm and piled for the winter. This was used in the fireplace and later in the wood-burning furnace. A five acre wooded lot was bought in 1883 to supply this wood.

The two nearest large towns were Redwood Falls and Willmar. Late each fall a trip was made to Willmar for the winter supplies. One year the trip was later in the fall than usual and on the way home the family was caught in a bad snowstorm. The only thing they could do was unhitch the horses and unpack the wagon. Then the wagon was tipped over for protection from the cold wind and snow and shelter for the night.

On May 25, 1888, Fred, Jr. was married to Anna Gens, daughter of No.

Three days before the wedding the elder Kramins signed the farm over to Fred, Jr. in a combination lease-mortgage. Provision made for the elder couple was very specific: Annual rent of \$250 and all taxes paid, one fattened hog of about 300 pounds, one fat sheep, fif-ty pounds of dressed beef, fifty pounds of butter, two eggs on every day he may have them, ample supply of good dry stovewhod prepared and ready for the stove, good and comportable clothing for both parents, one room in the family dwelling, or should they ever disagree, a good comfortable home with stable within six miles, use of horse and buggy, to go for the doctor when needed, do the washing, furnish dishes and furnature, guarentee freedom of the premises, and two more hand-written pages of specifications. Every imaginable situation and need was

provided for by these thorough people.

Perhaps one reason for this document was a step-son Gustav Rieck. He and a brother, August, had come from Prüssia a few years after the rest of the family, August had been buried September 16, 1880 at the age of twenty-five. Gustav had a habit of returning yearly from his new home in South Dakota, telling of crop failures and hard times. Come spring, he'd leave again for South Dakota with seed, livestock and other provisions generously given by his mother and step-father. On January 2, 1886, this must have come to a halt, as we have a document granting \$500 cash (quite a lot of money in those days) and "other personal property" in final settlement to Gustav Rieck (incidentally, Gustav's wife was also named Caroline!). After being "fleeced" by a step-son, the parents now protected both their own and their son's welfare in black and white, leaving nothing to chance.

Eighteen ninety-one was an importand year for the homesteaders.

A large new house was built on a three foot wide fieldstone and mortar foundation. It had eight spacious rooms, a basement and attic, a balcony on the west side, and a porch all the way around. What a change from a one or two room log cabin!

Frederick A. Keamin, Sr. died may 7, 1898.

Fred and Anna Kramin raised five children: Johanna, August, Fredrick G., Louis (my grandfather), and Hertha. Little is known about the first twenty years of their mairrage, except for what is found in church records of baptisms and burials. We have records that show they must have prospered as land was added to the farm until it totaled 440 adjoining acres which were divided between Fred G. and Louis, plus the already mentioned woodlot, and a farm for each of the other three children.

Anna Gens Kramin, Wife of Frederick A., Jr., died in 1922.

My grandparents, Louis Kramin and Erma Kremin, were married in a double wedding ceremony on February 14, 1926. The other couple was their sister and brother, Hertha Kramin and Elmer Kremin. What a confusing bunch of names to a stranger!

Not many years after my grandparents were married, the depression

hit. These were hard times when, as my great-uncle Fred G. says, yellow corn sold for 2 cents a bushel and white corn sold for 2 cents less. One load of corn hauled to town sold for \$1.40. The barber was paid with eggs because very few people had the twenty-five cents in cash. Staple groceries were paid for with eggs, cream, and butter. In the middle of such times, on May 8, 1931, my dad was born.

My grandparents, with their son Galen and foster daughter Jean, lived on the home farm until December 1944 when they moved to Olivia.

On July 24, 1955, my dad married Eunice Myra Honebrink whom he met in Manksto where they were both attending State Teacher's College. That fall, winter, and next spring they lived in Northern Minnesota where Bad taught school in BallClub and Mom taught at Deer River. After this they moved to Olivia and in 1957 my parents moved back to the family farm. I was one and a half years old and my sister was five and a half months old. Since then, a boy and three more girls have been added to the family.

Some changes have been made on our farm since the early 1900's but since 1925, everything has stayed pretty much the same. Two more rooms downstairs and one room upstairswere added to our house in about 1912 and the porch and balcony were taken off. In 1960 four rooms downstairs were remodeled. The other seven rooms are the same as they were when the house was built in 1891 except that on the walls there are a few extra layers of paint and wallpaper.

The granery, built in 1894, is still in use, even though the elevator (it has a small pit and elevator just like the elevators in town) sometimes doesn't work very well. The wooden windmill was replaced by a metal one which has since been replaced by an electric pump.


In 1921 a huge new 44' x 96' barn was built. It had a cement floor and ten inch thick cement walls eight feet high above the ground. These walls also extended into the ground about 4 feet to serve as a foundation. To the peak of the roof, the building was forty feet high. The lumber from the old barn was used to build a shed.

A galvanized tin shed for machinery and grain storage was put up in 1962 and two round corncribs were built in the late forty's or early fifty's.

The icehouse, woodshed, outhouse, and smokehouse have all been taken down.

This year (1973) marks 100 years of progress for our family and farm. It surely would be great to have a big family gathering and bring back everyone who has ever lived on our farm or been associated with the place.

I wonder what the next hundred years have in store for our family and farm?

Dear Sir:

Enclosed is a history of the Gens family. The first portion was taken from a history book of Renville County. It was taken from a book which was copyright'd 1916.

"John Gens was born in Germany and there married Caroline Rhofult. They came to America in 1869, the voyage taking 13 weeks, and landed at New York. Then they traveled on to New Ulm where they located for a time, Mr. Gens finding work in the lime kiln. In 1871 they came to Renville County and secured a homestead in section 34 of Emmet township, of 80 acres of prairie land. There were no buildings and no roads. A sod hut was built and money was borrowed to buy a cow and a steer. A piece of wagon was also obtained and breaking of the land was begun.

" Mr. Gens gradually prospered so that in time he was owner of 620 acres and was able to erect new and modern buildings on his farm.

"Mr. Gens held several township offices, served on the school board and helped start the first school. He was also a member of the Lutheran church and held the position of trustee. He was also instrumental in helping build a new church building.

"Mr. Gens, as noted, was married in Germany to Carolina Rhofult and one child, Amelia, was born in Germany; Anna was born in New Ulm and the following in Renville County: Ida, August, John and Henry. Mr. Gens died in 1896 at the age of 60 years and his wife died in 1906 at the age of 60 years."

Henry Gens youngest son of John Gens acquired the original 80 acreshomestead plus 40 acres. Also he purchased another 60 acres of John's estate. In 1907 Henry married Ida Wagner. Seven children were born, their names being: Viola, 1908; Evelyn, 1910; Alton, 1911; Ruth, 1913; Elfrieda, 1917; Marcella, 1921; and Gilman, 1925.

Henry added 40 acres to the farm in 1907 by buying 40 acres from John and Mary Branick. In 1920 he added another 40 acres bought from Albert Zaske.

In 1942 Alton Gens bought 40 acres leaving 220 acres in the farm. In 1953 Gilman and Marvel Gens bought the 160 acres which contained the homestead and the remaining 60 acres a few years later.

Gilman Gens married Marvel Olson in December 1946. They have four children: Douglas, 1949; Diane, 1951; Bonita, 1955; and Brian, 1959.

Elias M. Lindquist, a pioneer, was born in Dalsland, Sweden, Jan.3,1841, there grew to manhood and married Sara Jonasdaughter who was born September 7, 1842. He came to the United States in 1869, and lived for a short time in Wisconsin, then locating in Minnesota and working on farms near St. Peter. In 1870 he was joined by his wife and his daughter, Laura. That year he secured the rights of Christopher Anderson Setra to a homestead of eighty acres in section six(6) Hawk Creek township. He perfected the title to this property and there farmed for many years. Like the other pioneers they lived first in a dugeut and later in a more pretensious dwelling. They underwent all the privations of pioner life and in time were enabled to see all their children well established in life.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindquist have had eight children: Laura, Josephine, John, Evelina (deceased), Mary, Anna (deceased). Ida and Samuel.

Josephine Lindquist Wellermae was the mother of Elmer, Joseph, Esther and Gladys N. Wellermoe.

After homesteading the S_2^1 of the SE_4^1 of Sec. 22 in I876 my Grandfather purchased 200 acres more near by making a total of 280 acres. The price ranged from \$6.00 to \$14.00 per acre as there was a great deal of water on this land that cut down on the number of acres that could be farmed. The township roads did not follow section lines but would wind around the sloughs. My father who grew up on this farm often told about how you could go by boat from the Minnesota Riverthrough this area to north west of Sacred *Heart without getting out of the boat which was great sport especially when muskrats were plentyful.

Then in I906 or 07 a ditch was dug through here that followed the sloughs and drained into a ravine that went to the river some four miles distant. This ditch was dug with horse power and a winch that pulled a V plow somewhat like our present day snowplow. This ditch gradually filled upand in I955 Oliver Francis myself and heirs of Clausen farms redug the upper part of this ditchand received some benifit but could not tile all our wetlands into it. I worked with my neighbors for the construction of adeeper ditch untill I974 when we all entered into an agreement to get a surveyor and a dragline operator and redig the entire ditch and have drained this land comprising a water shed of over 600 acres and have gotten rid of the catails and black birds for good. I have installed some IO,000 feet of tile which has put every acre of my farm under cultivation.

I purchased this farm in September of 1938 and have added another eighty acres. My three children have grown up here and attended the Renville Public School.

I retired from farming in I965 and my son, Kenneth, is running the farm now.

As their means increased after a few years they built a large one room house with ah upstairs and a small shartly entrance. Some years later more rooms were added. Thes became Their home where they continued to live the rest of their lives. after their deaths my mother become the owner and now as an their Jam the present owner of this farm. Late to these brane pioneers who while having so very lettle which to work still managed to mold a solid family life and eventually
