### EARLY AUGST HISTORY

as told to Susan and Arthur Augst by Uncle August Augst (August Augst was born Sept. 21, 1877 and died March 8, 1976 at the age of 98. He was the son of Karl Augst and grandson of Gottlieb Augst.)

The Augst's of Germany in the 1850's lived at Trasten, Wehrsdorf, Germany, then the Railroad Capitol in Saxony. They were weavers of cloth, using flax. They lived in over-crowded conditions, probably were dissatisfied with their government and felt they would have betteropportunities in America. In 1856, Traugott Richter, his daughter, Caroline and grandson Karl Augst, age 10, emigrated to America, leaving Germany in April and reaching New Prague in October. The journey by sailboat took from 7 to 9 weeks. To travel by sailboat was cheaper than by steam boat. All of the food supply on the boat, except sauerkraut was used up and the dringing water was rationed.

When they arrived here, they felt they wanted to live in a wooded area because there had been a shortage of wood for fuel, etc., back in Germany. They could have settled at Shakopee but said the trees were not as high as in Lebueur County, so they came here.

The next year in 1857, Karl's father, Gottlieb Augst, his wife and three children, August, Christine and Minnie came.

Traugett and Henriette Richter were the parents of three daughters; Hannah, Caroline and CBristena. It was their wish to claim four 80 acre plots, one for themselves, and one each for the daughters and their families. Hannah's husband Gottlieb Augst homesteaded on what is now the St. John Lutheran Cemetery, and Traugett and grandson Karl remained in the hut on the land north of there. It seems that if they built a hut on the land and lived there for five years, they could then claim the land as theirs. Also to become a citizen, the needed to stay in one place for five years.

To Gottlieb and Hannah Augst was born their fifth child, Mary, who was one of the first white babkes born in Montgomery township. (Mary Augst Miller lived to be 102 years old, passing away in 1959). Three more children (eight in all) Herman C., William and Gustav, were born to the Gottlieb Augst's.

Caroline Richter was married to a Mr. Logofeil and their daughter, Clara was married to John Gutenberg, descendent of Gutenberg the printer.

Christena Richter was married to Adolph Kauffer, a man who had been a school teacher in the old country. Because he could read and write he became a postmaster of Montgomery out in the country. He played the melodian and read the church services in the first Lutheran church building which was about two miles west of the present town of Montgomery. He taught others how to play musical instruments and organized a band. Kauffer died in 1894 at the age of 68 of old age infirmities and is buried in St. John's Lutheran Cemetery.

Other buildings, including a trading post and meeting hall were a part of the settlement west of Montgomery. The railroad was built as far as Pippin Lake in 1871 and through the present site of Montgomery in 1877 and so the business places were also built there.

The new immigrants had to struggle for their lives the first years while here. For several years they lived on rutabagas, cornbread and woldlife. Karl is claimed to have daid they had no salt to eat with the rutabagas because they didn't have the money to buy it. After they had other food, he could and would no longer eat the rutabagas. They couldn't raise much the first years because they had to clear the land of the trees and brush.

Birds threatened to eat the growing corn and the people had to stand guard to keep it safe. In fall, when the corn was harvested, the ears were counted and so many were set aside for each days' use so that they would have some until the next crop. At one point when they felt they would surely starve, a man came through the woods. He told them to pick the ginseng in the woods and he would buy it. The roots of ginseng have a medicinal value. This brought them money and they managed to buy a cow.

One evening Karl was to go through the woods to bring the cow home for milking. He was encountered by an Indian and in fright he ran all the way home. The cow came home by herself.

Trips were made by foot to Shakopee for bags of flour, which were carried on the back. A plow was also bought and brought here, carried on the back.

The first buts were small, covered with bark and usually with only a small window. There had been a but in the New Prague vicinity, 163 by 18' in size, in which a man and his son lived. The man wrote back to Germany that his brother should come too. When his brother came, nineteen others also came to live in that small but. There had been a forest fire, so it was very hard to find small game to eat. Once one of them caught a bear. They cooked the meat all day, but it still was tough.

Karl Augst tried to enlist in the Army when he was 16 years old, hoping to get more food and to earn money. He was rejected because of undernourishment. He and August Logo-feil went to Mendots one fall to sell furs and to buy supplies and a plow. On the way home they crossed the Minnesota River and the mules and wagon broke throught the ice, and were lost. Then they went to Fort Snelling to buy another team. For some time, Karl worked on the barges on the river. Later he became a butcher in Montgomery.

There was a cranberry bog west of the cemetery. The kids had to pick the berries, coming home after a long day, with cold wet feet, their leather shoes brittle and hard.

In 1867 Kauffer sold 80 acres land to Gottlieb Augst Bor 100.00. Gottlieb walked to LeSueur to borrow the money for which he paid 20% interest. He became one of the township's first tax-payers, paying 1.62 in 1863. (He paid taxes before actually owning land)

In 1872 the people became ill with the black small pox. Gottlieb's wife went to the neighbor's to nurse the sick and do the necessary work. She too got the small pox and became very ill. Her daughter Minnie was working in the Cities doing housework. Minnie heard of her mother's illness and she wanted to see her so she came home. While walking through Heidelberg, she was stopped and told not to go home, that she too would get sick. Minnie was determined to see her mother, she went none, she got the small pox and both she and her mother died. Both were buried in the garden, by the window of their hut. These were the first burials of what is now St. John's Lutheran Cemetery.

Two years later the father, Gottlieb got blood poisoning and died. Gustav, the youngest was only four years old. The children then went to live with the Traugott Richter's, their grandparents. At twelve years of age, Gustav already was on his own, making his own living. He worked for the railroad. He was at Hinckley, at the time of the big fire.

THE THILDHOOD OF NELS BRECK AS TOLD BY HIMSELF by norine B

The black measels had taken my mother away. There had been a long siege in Norway. We children had very little care during the illness and it left my eyes impaired from that time.

My father, Ole, had had an older brother, A ndrew, who had gone several years before and taken up a claim somewhere near Fair built, Minnesota. He was called into service for the North. He had written my father a letter telling him about the claim, if ever he should come to America, and that he, himself, might never return.

My father saw a future in America. In March 1864, he had engaged passage on a sail boat owned by the Kuller Co. It was a small boat which held some one hundred people. I believe its name was "Habbe".

There were four off us children, Ole 11, Berthas8, I was 6, and the baby, Andrew, was 4. I was born in 1858.

Most of the men in the boat were single, though, there were women and children. I rememberplaying with a boy of my own age one evening, and the following morning he was dead. Noone knew the cause of his death for there was not any doctor on board. The child was buried in the sea.

We had only been out to sea for a week, when the boat sprang a leak. The crew had to take their turn at pumping. Each stood his turn until he was tired. It meant continual pumping for night and day.

June 27,1976 Dear Sir; We would like some information about this. Is there going to be a day at the State Fair in Konor of the Century Farms? We had a picture of our barn on the first page of the Waseca Daily Journal a few weeks ago. The barn was built by the father of the E. F. Johnson radio company of abseca. ## CHAPTER XIX.

#### BLOOMING GROVE TOWNSHIP.



HE town of Blooming Grove comprises all of congressional township 108 north, range 22 west. It is bounded on the north by Rice County, on the east by Steele County, and on the south and west by the townships of Woodville and Iosco. Some of the finest portions of the county are included in its limits. It is well drained by the small creeks and streams that flow into its several

lakes; mention is made of these latter in the former part of this history. The east half of the township is almost level, gently undulating, but as it approaches the west line the "rolls" become more abrupt and knolly. Nearly one half of the town is covered with timber, alike valuable for fuel and for protection from the searching winds of winter.

The first settlers in what is now Blooming Grove Township were Michael Johnson, Jonathan Howell, A. J. Bell and S. F. Wyman. These young men, in the spring of 1855, built a log cabin on section 4. There they kept "bach," being all single men, for about two years, when Wyman and Bell quit. The others kept right along, and for even years longer lived the life of "single blessedness," doing their own cooking, part of the time without a stove. At the expiration of that period Mr. Johnson married, but Mr. Howell remained single until the day of his death. Mr. Johnson is still a resident of the township; Mr. Howell, who was a native of England, died here in 1880 as sated; Mr. Bell removed to Faribault, and Mr. Wyman is a resident of the city of Waseca.

In June, 1855, Christian Remund with his family made a settlement in this subdivision of the county, on sections 8 and 9, where they still reside.

Christian Remund, proprietor of the Blooming Grove Stock Farm, is a native of Switzerland, born November 21, 1830. He resided in his native country until about twenty years of age, when, in March, 1850, he, in company with Jacob Bumgerdner, sailed for the shores of America, and landed in New York. From there they went to Joliet, Ill., by way of Chicago, where they worked out in that vicinity for about one year. Then, still in company, they rented a farm and raised and harvested one crop. Mr. Remund then left this place and rented another near by. October 21, 1851, he married his partner's sister, Anna Bumgerdner, who was also a native of Switzerland, and had come to America a year earlier. After their marriage he remained on the place he had rented one year, then rented another in same neighborhood, where he lived until the spring of 1855, when he started for Minnesota, arriving in Waseca County, June 28, 1855. He immediately located a claim on section 9, Blooming Grove Township, the site of his present home. The first summer they lived in their covered wagon until October, when they moved into the cabin which he had built. At this time the country was full of Indians, and only one cabin was near where Mr. Remund erected his. When he came to this county his property invoiced as follows: one ox-team, two yoke of threeyear-old steers and a span of yearling colts, a few cows, and not one dollar in money. He now has 370 acres of land in a high state

of cultivation, a nice residence and good barns, and a large quantity of stock about him; is a breeder of thoroughbred short-horn cattle, and also owns the two noted horses, Amateur No. 10 and Bruno No. 2101. When his son Lewis was married he gave him 160 acres of land, and about \$1,500 in money and personal property. Mr. and Mrs. Christian Remund are the parents of seven children, three of whom are living, four dying in infancy. Those living are: Lewis C., born April 18, 1858, now in Minneapolis studying for a veterinary surgeon; Carrie A., born December 3, 1861; George H., March 8, The last two still remain at home 1866. with their parents.

W. M. Gray with his family also settled here in 1855. He was a native of Allegany County, N. Y. This was his residence until about 1872, when he died. His settlement was on section 33.

J. M. Blivens, after whom one of the settlements in this township was called, came here with his family in 1855. He lived here for many years, finally emigrating to Missouri, where he is still living. His settlement was upon the west part of section 32.

In June, 1855, Ole Knutson made a settlement here, and remained many years. He is now a resident of Renville County, this State.

Samuel and Luther Dickenson made a settlement during the fall of 1855 in the northwestern part of Blooming Grove. About 1858, Luther growing tired of pioneer life returned to Vermont, their native State. Samuel remained here until 1860, when he moved to Le Sueur County.

Curtis Hatch, a blind man, with his family settled in this precinct in 1855. He died in Moody County, D. T., in 1884.

M. P. Ide settled here in the same year.

Simeon Smith, who came from Fayette County, Iowa, with his family, made a claim just west of the lake on sections 31 and 32 in June, 1855. He lived on this place many years and died there in November, 1872.

With him came Alfred C. Smith, his son, who lived with his father until the following year, when he removed to Woodville Township, where he resided until sometime after his father's death, when he returned to the elder Smith's farm, where he now lives.

The year 1856 witnessed everywhere an immense tide of immigration setting westward, and the county of Waseca received many new settlers. Among those who located in this township during that year were: E. R. Conner, George Dean, John and James Walker, William Donaldson, Patrick Healy, Lewis McKune, John L. Saufferer, Cornelius Hand and his sons, J. N. Powers, Philo Woodruff, John Gibson, Daniel Riegle, Patrick Murphy, Andrew Nelson, Joshua, Josiah, Henry and Samuel Smith, Jacob Oory, William H. Young, B. Sharp and Joseph Churchill.

E. R. Conner was a native of Indian, from whence he came to Minnesota with James and John Walker, all bringing families. Mr. Conner settled on eighty acres of land in the northwest quarter of section 10, to which he laid claim on the 11th of June. He lived on this place until 1883, when he removed to Faulk County, D. T., where he is still living.

John Walker enlisted during the war in the Third Minnesota Infantry, and died at Pine Bluff, Ark., in September, 1864.

William Donaldson died here in 1860.

Capt. Lewis McKune was quite prominent, politically, in the early days of the county's history, representing this district in the constitutional convention and in the senate. He was afterward killed, at the head of his company, at the battle of Bull Run. A detailed sketch of him is given in the chapter entitled State and County Representation.

J. N. Powers lived here but a short time, removing to Wilton, where he practiced law. He afterward moved to Rice County, and represented that district in the State Legislature.

## CHAPTER XI, 1855.

DEATH OF HENRY HOWELL—FIRST SETTLERS IN BLOOMING GROVE, JANESVILLE, AND BYRON.

Samuel F. Wyman, Michael Johnson, Jonathan Howell, and A. J. Bell took their claims in Blooming Grove early in the spring of 1855. They were all then single men. They built a little log but on Bell's claim, and commenced batching. At the end of bout two years Messrs. Wyman and Bell tired of that kind of angle blessedness and quit, leaving Johnson and Howell to go it alone. These two bachelors lived together as such about seven years more, when Mr. Johnson married and became a permanent resident. Mr. Howell remained single to the time of his death, which occurred in 1880. Bell afterwards became a resident of Faribault, and Mr. Wyman, who will be noticed more fully in biographical sketches, became a resident of Waseca.

The same season, in the month of June, Christian Remund, with his family, made his claim on sections 8 and 9, where he has since made his home. He was born in Switzerland November 21st, 1830, came to America in March, 1850, lived five years in Illinois, and there married, October 21st, 1851, Anna Bumgerdner, who was also a native of Switzerland. They arrived at their Minnesota home June 28, 1855, and lived in their covered wagon until October of that fall. (See biographical sketch.)

Wm. M. Gray and family settled on section 33, in this township, in June, 1855. Mr. Gray was born in Genesee county, New York in 1806. In 1836 he married Miss Lucina Fuller, who was also a native of the same state. They came to this place from

Paul O. Querna came to New Richland on June 15, 1867, at the age of 16, from Sandaver, Norway. He left Haksund, Norway on April 2nd and traveled for seven weeks and three days to reach Quebec, Canada. From there he traveled by cattle car to Sarenia, Canada, and there on to Milwaukee by cattle boat. From there he went by train to La Crosse, by steamship to Winona, and by train to Owatonna - which was as far as the train went in those days.

He stayed with relatives at St. Olaf Lake until the spring of 1868, when he went to Rochester and worked for four years with a tilework company. He then came back to New Richland and bought the present farm which he enlarged and improved from time to time - eventually ending up with 200 acres.

Child's History of Waseca County states that he bought the farm in 1871. The abstract shows a School Land Patent dated May 21, 1875, and actual assignment of certificate to be dated June 5, 1876.

The original 200 acres have been kept in the family for three generations. Paul's son, Rudolph, bought it in 1920, and Rudolph's son, Paul S., bought the farm in 1959.
