



Marshall Starts New Win Streak; Face Canby Here

After a week's layoff following the Redwood Falls game, Marshall's Tigers started another win streak here Friday night when they downed the Minneota Vikings 69-53.

This brought their season's record to 9-2.

This also sets the stage for Tuesday's intra-district game with Canby here. The first time the Tigers met the Lancers, a month ago, Marshall made easy work of the game winning 71-60.

But Canby teams have a habit of building toward a district tournament climax and the Tigers do not expect an easy game here.

Against Minneota, Marshall took a first-quarter lead of 21-13 and never was headed by the Vikings. Codge Johnson, Marshall's main scoring threat, nailed down 15 of his 19 points during the first period.

Marshall continued to roll in the second frame and by intermission led 39-26. Barry Pomrantz hit three quick buckets in this period and was helped by Les Jacobson and Bob Dowma with two field goals each.

In the third period the Tigers played tough defensive ball, limited Minnesota to six points on three field goals, before the free throw match which was held in the final quarter.

Dick Culshaw, Viking forward, led Minneota in their big fourth quarter with 13 of his 18 points. He connected for four field goals and five free throws.

During that final quarter Marshall got 14 free throws as Minneota tried desperately to get the ball and keep their rally going. Meanwhile the Tigers got only a pair of field goals in the fourth frame.

In addition to Culshaw, the Vikings got 17 points from Gary Buysse and 12 from Les Josephson.

Central, Tigers Play Here Tonight In Key Contests

With a high district seeding probably in the offing, the Marshall Tigers are taking great pains in preparing for tonight's contest against the Canby Lancers.

The Bengals now stand with a five win, zero loss record against District Nine competition and two triumphs this week would undoubtedly mean the number one pairing.

Canby, on the other hand, desperately needs this win or they could conceivably wind up in one of the sub-district tourneys. The Lancer's schedule contains only four district opponents because of their conference affiliation. Thus far the Canby club has sustained three losses at the hands of District Nine ball clubs, and a victory over Marshall is their last chance for a decent rating.

Couch Matke and his squad are expecting what could turn out to be one of the year's roughest battles. The first game between the two teams at Canby saw a total of 62 fouls, and seven players, including all of Canby's first five fouled out.

A victory tonight would leave the Tigers still undefeated district-wide, and Tracy would remain the lone obstacle in the way of the top seeding.

Matke's starting lineup of Johnson, Pomranitz, Dowma, Weidauer and Lanoue will probably stay intact.

Should the Tigers take this contest they would undoubtedly receive the first seeding for the upcoming district tourney with only Lake Benton to stand in the way of an undefeated campaign against district clubs.

A Tracy win, however, would once again throw the ratings into a turmoil since every team but Marshall has lost to district foes.

Little guard Dick Bosacker proved to give the Tigers the most trouble in the first tussle between the squads, although Roger Platequal kept their attack moving during the opening minutes of play.

The Scrappers hold a slight height advantage to the center position because of big Donn Ravers (6-5), but the Matkemen are taller overall.

The present starting quintet of Johnson, Pomranitz, Dowma, Weidauer, and Lanoue will probably stand pat for the Tracy contest.

Marshall Fights Off Canby Rally To Win 74-70

They lost their District 9 record unbeaten here last night, but a last quarter rally by the Canby Lancers gave the Marshall Tigers a case of theitters as the Bengals won a narrow 74-70 victory.

Scoring six points in the closing seconds of the contest, Canby moved from a 10-point deficit to a narrow four-point margin as the final buzzer sounded.

Marshall won the game at the free throw line as Canby outscored the Tigers from the field 48-46.

The game started with Canby taking the lead on a jump shot by Tom Olson. The Tigers came back to gain the lead and through the rest of the first quarter the score was tied three times. Marshall led three times and Canby led twice.

The Tigers held a scant 13-12 lead as the period ended.

In the second frame, Marshall maintained a scant lead until the halfway point when Tom Sniegowski's drive-in and Ron DeBettignies' put shot gave the Lancers a 23-21 lead. Successive free throws by Bob Dowma put the Tigers back in the lead 26-25 and Marshall continued to lead through the rest of the game.

After the intermission, at which time the Tigers led 32-27, Marshall rolled to big third-quarter margins. At one time the Tigers led by 15 when Bob Weidauer hit a jump shot. Barry Pomrantz hit four free throws and Codge Johnson nailed a hook shot while holding the Lancers scoreless.

The third period ended with Marshall out front 57-46.

During the first half of the fourth quarter the Tigers maintained edges of from 9-11 points. Then Canby's Olson and Steve Voigt started hitting consistently to reduce Marshall's margin.


In that period Olson and Voigt got 10 and 6 points respectively as Canby outscored Marshall 24-17.

Canby's Olson took scoring honors for the night as he got 22 points. Voigt, DeBettignies and Lowell Nomeland also were in double figures with 15, 11 and 10 respectively.

For Marshall, Johnson and Weidauer paced the Tigers with 20 and 19 respectively. Pomrantz hit 15 and Dowma 12.

Tracy Evens Record With Marshall 64-54

2nd Quarter Binge Puts Tracy Ahead

TRACY — For three quarters here Friday the Marshall Tigers played Tracy's Scrappers on fairly even terms. But in the fateful second period Tracy overwhelmed Marshall, outscoring them by nine, and eventually winning the game 64-54.

This victory for Tracy evened the season's record with Marshall. Earlier this season the Tigers thumped 52-43.

Everyone got into the act for Tracy in the second period, but Dick Bosacker did the greatest damage as he hit a pair of field goals and three free throws for seven points. In addition to his scoring, his ball-hawking tactics almost drove the Tigers crazy.

Logically enough, it was Bosacker who scored the first points of the game when he hit a long shot seconds after the opening tipoff. During the first frame the score was tied five times with Tracy holding the edge 15-13.


Marshall went ahead early in the second period on a pair of free throws by Codge Johnson. When Bob Dowma completed a beautiful followup tipin the Tigers led 18-17 and Dowma increased the lead to 20-17 seconds later on a pair of free throws.

The Tigers led until midway through the second quarter when Russ Shoeman connected with a field goal putting Tracy ahead 25-23. From this point until the end of the half the Scrappers were off to the races.

Bosacker made a three-point play, then hit a pair of field goals. A hook shot by 6-5 Donn Ravers and a little jump shot by Doug Sanders ended the spree. During this burst the Tigers scored one bucket on a neat layup by Codge Johnson.

The Tigers came back strong after the rest period and successive baskets by Bob Weidauer, Dowma and Johnson put the Marshall club a scant four points behind Tracy.

Then Shoeman and Flatequal teamed up to increase the Scrappers' lead again. Marshall did out-score Tracy by two points in this period.

Mohawks Take Tigers, Big Games To Come

Tigers Seeded First For District Tourney

MONTEVIDEO — Behind the 24-point shooting of Merl McClung, the Mohawks' junior center, Montevideo defeated Marshall's Tigers 65-51 here Friday night.

After being held to six points in the first half, McClung broke loose for seven field goals and four free throws in the second half.

Montevideo took a 14-9 first-quarter lead and remained in command throughout the game. Marshall played the Mohawks on fairly even terms in the second frame, but after the intermission Montevideo started moving farther out front.

In the third quarter they outscored Marshall 20-10.

Paul Thomson, a reserve Tiger forward, was one of Marshall's top scorers as he got 11 points. Bob Dowma, center, actually took scoring honors with 13 while Codge Johnson got 11.

This game marked Marshall's fourth loss of the season against 10 victories, but three of the losses have been in the past five games.

The Tigers, with four games remaining, still have their work cut out for them as they approach the district basketball tournament. All four of the games are against tough competition.

Tuesday the Tigers meet the improving Lake Benton Bobcats and then play, in order, Pipestone, Walnut Grove and Clarkfield. The Tigers defeated Pipestone 61-58 early in the season. The Walnut Grove Loggers lost their first game of the season Friday against Sanborn (63-56), but still remain one of the top teams in this part of the state.

Clarkfield is in second place in the Little Sioux conference. Marshall has been seeded first in the district (a complete story of the drawings will be published tomorrow, with Tracy, Minnesota, Canby and Hendricks following in that order.

\$5,000 Donation Made For Weiner Scholarship Fund

A gift of \$5,000 from the Weiner Memorial Foundation has been accepted by the Marshall Board of Education to be held in trust for the Weiner Scholarship Fund.

MHS Band To Give Winter Concert Next Sunday

Two major works by Kalinnikov and Gliere will be presented by the Marshall high school band in a mid-winter concert Sunday at 3 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Basile Kalinnikov, a contemporary of Tschaitkovsky, was an unusually brilliant composer. His works are characterized by great artistic refinement and it has been said that, but for his premature death at the age of 35, he would have won a place in the top rank of Russian composers.

His first symphony in G minor is an inspired work, national in style. The band will perform the Finale from this symphony.

The second major work to be performed will be the first movement of Symphony No. 3, B minor, Opus 42, Ilya Mourometz by Reinhold Gliere.

Gliere's colossal symphony is based on the legendary tales of Ilya Mourometz, a hero of the Russian folk epic whose escapades are very similar to those of our own Paul Bunyan.

Tigers Play Benton Tonight

The Marshall Tigers will attempt to break their current two game loss string tonight when they travel to Lake Benton to take on the Bobcats. An-

gered by a pair of consecutive losses, the Bengals will be looking for a win as they close out their District Nine season.

The Bobcats, a team which

in recent years has toughened around tournament time, has had a winning year and will be hungry for an impressive victory prior to district play.

Jim Krause (6-1) has paced Benton's offensive show throughout most of the present campaign and will undoubtedly give the Tigers some measure of grief. Although the Bobcats have a 6-3 center in Jim Christenson and several others hovering around the six-foot mark, the Tigers topped by Bob Dowma (6-4) will have about a one inch edge in height all the way around.

Glenn Mattke's starting quintet will probably remain stationary with Dowma, Johnson, Pomrantz, Weidauer, and Lanoue in the regular spots.

Schoolboard OK's Bid For School Bond

A Minneapolis company was the lowest of six bidders for \$560,000 of school bonds for Marshall public school expansion.

J. M. Dain and Co. was awarded the contract for the bonds by the Marshall Board of Education at a meeting last night. The company's bid was 3.8019 per cent net rate of interest for the entire bond redemption period which is 22 years.

The bonds will cover the cost of building an addition onto the present high school, an addition onto the West Side grade school and remodeling in the present high school.

The interest rate on the bonds ranged from Dain Company's low to 3.8719. Supt. L. M. Frey commented that it is the lowest rate for a school bond issue in the state during the past year.

Supt. Frey said that bids for the construction of the additions will be taken on March 17 at 8 p.m. in the Little Theater.

In other business at the schoolboard meeting last night, the board:

- Accepted the application of Miss Jean Anderson, presently teaching at Arlington, to teach grade school next September. Miss Anderson, a native of Ruth-ton, is expected to teach the 5th grade. She is a four-year graduate of Mankato State College and has 5 years of experience in teaching.

- Accepted the resignation of Miss Mary Eikonger and Miss Nona Taylor. Both teachers instruct the kindergarten classes at East Side grade school.






SUB-DISTRICT NO. 1 AT MINNEOTA

LAKE BENTON — Marshall's first-seeded Tigers defeated the Lake Benton Bobcats here Tuesday night, but the improved Cats gave Marshall a few anxious moments during a fourth-quarter rally.

Marshall won 71 to 58 over the sixth-seeded Bobcats.

The Tigers took an early lead 15-10 by the end of the first quarter, and expanded it to 35-26 by halftime. Barry Pomrantz and Bob Weidauer each connected with three field goals during this second frame.

But the third quarter was the big one for Marshall as the Tigers scored 23 while holding Lake Benton to 11. Codge Johnson scored six as the Tiger offense clicked well.

In the final stanza the Bobcats came back to score 21 while Marshall meshed only 13. Bob Dowma, with three field goals, helped hold off the Cats during this fourth period rally.

Jim Krause of Lake Benton took scoring honors for the evening with 21.

Johnson led the Tiger pack with 20, and Dowma and Pomrantz got 14 and 13 each.

While a game is never a "warmup" when playing Lake Benton, Tuesday night's tilt with the Bobcats is the first of a stretch drive in which Marshall has four tough season-ending games.

The Tigers face a tough Pipestone club here this weekend and then meet Walnut Grove there next Friday.

These contests may tell whether or not the Tigers should have been seeded first in the district tournament.

Tigers, Tracy Get Top Seedings For Tourney; Sub-District Starts Mar. 1

The Marshall Tigers and Tracy Scrappers, both undefeated in district play discounting a loss apiece to each other, came off with the number one and two seedings for District Nine play last Thursday night.

Glenn Mattke's club garnered the top spot despite a loss to the Scrappers just six days before the seeding took place. The Tracy squad, under John Garret, lost their chance for the number one rating when they fell to the Bengals earlier in the year.

Other clubs that were seeded directly into the district tourney include the Minneota Vikings, the Canby Lancers, and the "cinderella" club, Hendricks' Huskies.

In first round competition, Marshall will meet the Sub-District One champ while Minneota will tangle with the winner of the second preliminary tournament on March 7.

On the eighth the Scrappers will lock horns with the Sub-District Three title-holder, and Canby and Hendricks will tussle.

Respective sites for the quarter-final games are Canby, Cottonwood, Lake Benton, and Minneota.

Winners of the quarters will meet March 9 and 10 at the Tracy Armory and finals will be March 12, again at Tracy.

The twelve clubs who did not receive top ratings will compete in three sub-district tourneys on March 1 and 4 for the right to enter actual district play.



Future Farmers Observe National Week, Feb. 20-27

Tuesday morning, in the ag room at the public high school, the Future Farmers of America raised nine Greenhands to the Chapter degree.

The boys raised are Michael Trei, Wayne Babcock, William Sandberg, Gordon Van Overbek, Lyle Moseng, Cliff Miller, Gary Wyffels, Wayne Van Lerberghe and Ronald St. Aubin.

This program is one of many scheduled by FFA members, throughout the nation, to focus public attention on the work of this organization during national FFA week, Feb. 20-27. This week is chosen because George Washington's birthday comes during it. Besides being a general in the Revolutionary war and the first president of the country, his ambition had to do with the farm he called Mount Vernon. We was one of the first in the nation to practice contour farming, crop rotation, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods. It was more than a century after his death before general use was made of many of the sound agricultural practices he advocated.

Members of the FFA are farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming. They accept various agricultural projects and enterprises including the care of livestock.

To the question "Why are we here?" they give answer, "To practice brotherhood, honor ru-

ral opportunities and responsibilities and develop those qualities of leadership that a future farmer should possess."

Their motto is "Learning to do; doing to learn; earning to live; living to serve."

Never in the history of this district has the No. 1 seeded team won the district crown.

So goes the record, but Marshall's No. 1 seeded Tigers will be out to break this jinx when they play the winner of the sub-district No. 1 at Canby March 7.

Their opponent will be one of the following: Lake Benton, Hanley Falls, Wood Lake or Ivanhoe.

But before the district tournament starts, the Tigers still have two games to go and these are against tough opponents. They play at Walnut Grove Friday and meet Clarkfield here the following Monday night.

To date the Tigers are sporting a 11-5 won-loss record, with only one loss to district competition. This loss was to Tracy late in the season after the Tigers had defeated the Scrappers here earlier in the season.

Not touted as a strong team before the season started, Coach Glenn Mattke's Tigers started the year with a 59-41 win over the 1959 champs, Tyler.

Tiger fans sat up and took notice when their favorites defeated the highly-regarded Redwood Falls cagers on the Redwood court 54-49. Then edged the Tigers 54-52 to break the bubble temporarily.

After the Luverne game, the Tigers went on to win in consecutive contests from Pipestone, Fulda, Canby, Slayton, Tracy and Ivanhoe. The won-loss record stood at a surprisingly good 8-1.

From that point on the Tigers had troubles. They ran into a red-hot Redwood Falls team and lost 65-54. The Mattkemen recovered to beat Minneota and Canby before losing two games in succession to Tracy and Montevideo.

Feb. 16 the Tigers downed Lake Benton 71-58 and then last week lost a thriller in overtime to the Pipestone Arrows.

Oddly enough, the Tigers during their losing streak probably were playing better ball than they did in some of the early-season games when they won almost every contest.

As the Tigers prepare for the district tournament the lineup Coach Mattke uses is changed slightly from his early-season team. The major change is Bob Dowma's move into the starting lineup.

A substitute until the first Pipestone game, when he scored 15, Dowma was used sparingly in the first few games. From that point on he kept improving until he was in double figures consistently.

He hit his peak against Pipestone when he snagged 25 points.

No comment from Steve. Mark Bussa, 6, son of the Al Bussas, says he lives in Marshall on a farm in town. The dark haired little gentleman says he'd like to be a doctor so he could make people well. His second choice — farming.

Kenny, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Finger is 7 years old and lives on a farm near Marshall. What would he like to be? A fireman. Why? Just cuz.

Donald Fuhrman is the only boy I talked to who chose the most obvious of hero professions — he wants to be a cowboy. And his reason is, logically, so he can chase cattle.

I asked these three men if they planned to marry when they grew up. Mark promptly said yes, and then all three broke into bodyshaking giggles which were broken up only by their return to the classroom.

Greg, age 6 and son of the Newell Rees, wants to be "what-do-you-call-it-veterinarian" because he likes to watch them work. He figures the work might be kind of hard, but he's willing to risk it.

Elizabeth Petersen — her friends called her Beth — stated in a very wordy voice that she'd like to be a ballet dancer. She says "I think it might be fun." Marshall's Tigers lost a heart-breaker here Saturday night when the Pipestone Arrows took an overtime victory 87-86. This came after a heroic rally by the Tigers in the fourth quarter erased a 12-point deficit to knot the score at the end of regulation play.

Pipestone's one-man-gang, big Sid Bostic, scored 45 points.

The Arrows jumped to an early lead in the first frame, but shortly before that period ended the Tigers closed the gap, then went ahead 20-19. Bob Dowma, Tiger center, pumped in four quick field goals in this period when the Pipestone defense left him unguarded.


In the second quarter Marshall expanded this lead to eight as Dowma pumped in 10 more points and Bob Weidauer hit six, but Bostic, swishing the nets for 19 points, helped cut that margin to 46-44 just as the half ended.

The Arrows moved out front after the intermission largely on the 13-point effort of Bostic, and led 72-64 as the final period began. Pipestone lengthened that lead to 12, at one point, before the Tigers put on their game-tying rally.

Codge Johnson hit seven points in this splurge, but it was a tough defense that helped the Tiger cause most. Bostic was held to one field goal in the final quarter.

Marshall had four players scoring in double figures with Dowma and Johnson leading with identical totals of 25. Dan Lanoue got 11 and Bob Weidauer hit 10.

The first time the Tigers met Pipestone this year Marshall won 61-58 while holding Bostic to 29. The improved Pipestone club defeated a tough Luverne club 72-60 the night before coming to Marshall.



Marshall and Lake Benton were locked in a see-saw battle during the first period, but after that time the outcome of the game was never in doubt as the Tigers poured 34 second quarter markers through the 18 inch circle to demoralize Lake Benton, 80-66.

The final score was the closest the Bobcats came after Marshall waved goodbye to them in the second period. Marshall's biggest lead was 54-32 with 4:55 left in the third.

Both teams used zone defenses. Coach Glenn Mattke's strategy was to pass the Bobcats dizzy and try to spring a man into the open, either Codge Johnson or Barry Pomrantz. 

Lions To Honor High School Cage Players





TRACY — How do you snatch victory from a team hitting 70 per cent during the first half?

Marshall coach Glenn Mattke probably asked that as he saw Minneota's Vikings upset his top-seeded Tigers, 90-72, here Wednesday night to keep alive the old jinx that the No. One seeded team has never captured the District Nine crown.

The Tigers played a very good game, but were victims of the kind shooting they used in subduing Lake Benton in the opening round of district play. The other game of the semi-final round will be played tonight at 8 p.m., also at Tracy between Canby and Tracy.

Coach Mel Anderson of Minneota appeared to be walking on Cloud Nine after the game. He used only five players last night; all five landing in double figures.

Les Josephson, who did little casting in the first half, ripped the cords from the basket during the final two periods for 18 markers. He was followed by Dick Culshaw, with sprained ankle and all, who tallied 18.

Top point-maker for the Vikings was Don Richards, an uncanny shot, who hit 25, 14 in the first half. He couldn't have been better from the free throw line, taking a bead at the ring 11 times without a miss. Culshaw hit ten straight for the Vikings from the charity line.

John Allen left handed in 14 and Tom Tillmans 13, most of them in the torrid first half, to complete the scoring.

Minneota possessed the amazing record of making 34 of 40 attempts from the free throw line. They didn't miss a single attempt until mid-way in the fourth stanza.

Marshall was charged with 22 misdeeds during the course of the game. The Vikings were continually at the free throw line shooting the one-and-one. As Marshall tried to get back into the game during the final eight minutes by trying to press Min-

neota, referee's whistles were tooting constantly enabling Minneota to make 18 of 24 gift tosses in fourth period alone. Culshaw was eight for eight during this span.

The Tigers were just as effective from the free throw line, making 14 of 17, but they didn't go to the black line as often. Marshall actually out scored the Vikings from the field, 29-28.

Marshall took an early lead of 5-4 at the 6:11 first period mark on three free throws by Bob Dowma and Codge Johnson and an opening layup by Barry Pomrantz. They stretched this to 12-8 mid-way in the period, their biggest margin, but saw the Vikings roll out in front on Richards' jumper, 13-12, with 3:10 left.

The Tigers tied the score with a minute and a half left on a Bob Weidauer set shot, 17-17, but that tie was short-lived at the 48 second mark when Richards jumped in two more, giving Minneota a 19-17 margin at the quarter.

Marshall recaptured the lead, 33-32, with 3:47 left in the second period on another jumper by Weidauer, but this was evaporated by Allen's pot shot.

Dowma gave the Tigers their last margin, 39-38, with 2:17 left on a follow-up. Richards and Allen canned a set shot apiece and Culshaw a pair of charity tosses to enable Minneota to leave at the half with a 44-39 margin.

The Vikings were expected to cool off a little during the final 16 minutes, but picked up where they left off. Josephson, a two point contributor in the first half, dropped in 12 markers in the third period on some beautiful hooks and being on the

scoring end of two fast breaks.

The closest Marshall came was 47-42 after two minutes had been played when Pomrantz hit a three-pointer. The Tigers had to foul to get possession of the ball as Minneota continued to pour coal on the fire during the rest of the game.

With their deadly free throw accuracy the Vikings steadily increased their lead until it was 77-57, the biggest spread, at the 4:44 mark in the fourth quarter. Marshall got within 13, but that was the best they could do.

Marshall placed four men in double figures. Codge Johnson paced the attack with 19, 10 in the fourth period. Dowma had 15 and Pomrantz and Weidauer 12 apiece for their evening's output.



Radio Comes To Public School

Radio has come to the Marshall public schools and it's in the form of a mouse-powered radio station called KMHS.

The operation is housed in the top floor of the junior high school building, right above Principal Norm Olson's office.

Although the listening audience is limited (the students can only broadcast within the junior high school building) the station's popularity is beginning to take hold on the students.

"Why only yesterday," said Bill Ramige, a student disc-jockey peeking above his microphone, "we had our first request." A girl listening to the broadcast in the lunchroom during lunch time sent up the request.

Music is furnished through records "loaned," one student emphasized, to the station.

The operation consists of: a less-than-one-watt-transmitter, a microphone, one 45-rpm turntable, and a collection of assorted records with a heavy accent on rock 'n roll.

The students broadcast three times a day, 15 minutes in the morning, 15 during noon and 30 minutes after school is dismissed. In addition, a program log is kept.

The radio operation is surrounded by a room-full of other

radio equipment and electrical gadgets which students work on. The equipment has been donated by individuals in Marshall.

Principal Norm Olson says that a number of students have used the "laboratory" to work on equipment.

Also located in the room is a 500-watt transmitter donated to the school from the Jack Leddom estate. Presently, the Marshall Radio Club, made up of students and grown ups will use the transmitter, is seeking a club license to operate it. When the transmitter is launched into operation it is expected that radio hams all over the world can be contacted.






In Public Schools —

Class Will Instruct Exceptional Child

The problem of educating the exceptional child who cannot adapt himself to doing regular schoolwork will be tackled by the Marshall public school system next fall.

A special class will be offered to emphasize individual attention for youths who have academic, emotional, and physical problems.

The class, the first of its type in the school system, will include those who will mainly fall in the 6 to 12 year range although no specific age limits have been put

on the class. It will enroll about 10 to 12 students.

The instruction will be handled by a specialized teacher, trained in the field, who will be assisted by the State Dept. of Education. The state will also provide additional aid for financing a class of this type which will be held in the West Side grade school.

Supt. of Schools L. M. Frey commented that the class will handle mainly those who cannot be admitted into the public school system today because of

their inability to grasp school work. However, he said, a few of the students presently enrolled in school will be moved into the class.

Instruction will emphasize individual attention with an attempt to solve the various individual problems of the youths. The size of the class is being kept at a minimum so that this could be attained. Most of the students will remain the entire school day, depending upon what is needed.

Enrollment in the class will be

made through assignment from the school administration.

A battery of tests, consultation with parents, teachers, principals, and other help will be used to determine if the youth should be admitted.

Classes of these types are being undertaken in schools throughout the state and nation to handle the growing problem of the exceptional child. Other schools in the area, including Tracy and Pipestone, have such programs.



Tigers Squeeze By Hendricks To Cop District Nine Title; Josephson Sets Meet Record

"I was about ready to scratch my boys in the mile relay but they came to me and told me they wanted to run so I let them."

This was coach Larry Kienholz of Marshall high school whose mile relay team won the District Nine track meet by taking a third in this event to ease by second place Hendricks 33 and three fifths to 33.

The team totals were Marshall 33 and three fifths; Hendricks 33; Canby 31; Tracy 25 3/5; Balaton 21 1/2; Lake Benton 19 and one fifth; Minneota 18; Cottonwood 14; Tyler 6 1/2; Ivanhoe 4 and three fifths; and Russell 3.

Dave Tjaden of Hendricks was the meet's top point getter getting

ing three firsts. Tjaden took honors in the 120-yard high hurdles (:16.4), the 180-yard low hurdles (:22.5) and the broad jump with a leap of 21'2".

Les Josephson of Minneota broke the only record yesterday eclipsing the high jumping mark by a quarter of an inch. His winning jump was 5' 11". The old record was set by Stanley of Marshall in 1950.

Josephson also won the shotput with a heave of 51' 1/2" and also grabbed a second in the discus for 14 of the 18 points the Vikings scored.

Barry McKeown of the second place Huskies and the other half of coach Eddie Bye's thinclad squad had a first in the 220-yard dash and seconds in the 440 and 100-yard dashes. His clocking in the 220 was :23.6.

Marshall's Jeff Addison won his specialty, the 880, in 2:08.5. He also picked up points with a second in the broad jump and tied for fourth in the high jump.

The Tigers only other first was taken by Barry Pomrantz who threw the discus 142'7". Pomrantz picked up seven points for the day with a third in the shot.

Hendricks had a total of five firsts while Marshall, Minneota and Lake Benton had two firsts apiece.



The Tigers will meet Canby at Minneota tonight at 8 p.m. to determine who will represent this district in the regional tournament.

Marshall won behind the stout hurling of Barry Pomrantz and some timely hitting by Bob Dowma. Pomrantz mowed down 13 Scrapper hitters via the strike-out route and allowed just six blows, most of which were of the pop fly variety.







New High School Students Must Register By Aug. 18

All new students, those attending Marshall High school for the first time, must register before Aug. 18, it has been announced by school officials.

Physicals To Be Given Tuesday At High School

Letters have gone out to all parents of boys in the Marshall area reminding them that Tuesday, Aug. 16, at 7 p.m. is the time and date set for physical examinations for all prospective athletes at both city high schools.

The physicals will be given at the high school offices and every boy, who intends to participate in any school athletic activity during the school year, must be examined before any athletic equipment will be issued.

Boys from Central Catholic high school are reminded that they must take these physicals at the high school at this time also as will the boys from the public school.

Every boy will be asked to pay \$2 to become a member of the Minnesota Athletic Benefit Plan and the athletic fund at the school will contribute the other \$2. In case of an injury, the boy will receive a definite stated amount with 14 days hospitalization provided.

An auxiliary injury fund is maintained by the high school to help take care of injuries received and not cared for by the benefit plan.

To get this insurance or take part in any athletic activity, boys must have a doctor's examination. Doctors, who will examine the boys next Tuesday evening are Dr. Phillip Hedenstrom, Dr. J. E. Murphy, Dr. R. W. Taintor, Dr. K. A. Peterson, Dr. B. C. Ford, Dr. J. E. Eckdale and Dr. Robert Phelps.

The doctors will be on hand to examine all boys in grades seven through 12 out for athletics or who want insurance only at the high school. No charge is made for this examination and it may be made by one's family doctor. A charge will be made for examinations at any other time than next Tuesday evening.

Schoolboard Votes To Hire Married Women Instructors

Because of a teacher shortage, a long-standing policy of the Marshall Board of Education was broken last night as the board approved hiring married women teachers.

Supt. of Schools L. M. Frey

said the move was taken as an "emergency measure" to provide teachers for the 1960-61 school year.

"It has been the policy of the board," said Frey, "not to hire married teachers but because

of the shortage of four grade school instructors, it was the only step to be taken."

Frey said that 27 colleges and the Bureau of Teacher Personnel of the State Department of Education were corresponded with only two possibilities were found. A check further revealed that neither could work here.

Frey said the lack of teachers on the grade level is a problem throughout the nation. He said last night's decision by the board was an "emergency" measure. The board has at other times, hired married teachers in times of need.

In view of the shortage the board offered contracts to the following women for the 1960-61 school year

- Mrs. Leroy Affolter to teach kindergarten at East Side grade school. Mrs. Affolter has been teaching for the past five years, the last two at Ivanhoe. She is the former Carol Rohlin of Marshall.

- Mrs. Matt Sokolik to teach first grade at East Side grade school. Mrs. Sokolik, the former Margaret Sisterman of Marshall, taught here from 1951 to 1956.

- Mrs. Bob Manke to instruct in kindergarten at East Side grade school. Mrs. Manke has taught at Pipestone and Tracy.

- Mrs. Warner Christeson, West Side grade school first grade teacher. Mrs. Christeson has taught for the past seven years at McIntosh.

- Decided to make sidewalk improvement on the junior high school property located on N. 5th St.




**MHS Faculty Will
 Report Aug. 29;
 School Opens Soon**

Plans are completed for the Marshall Public School to open with the faculty reporting back on Monday Aug. 29, for a week's orientation and preparation for the school year 1960-61.

Guidance records for each student are complete and available in the files in the main office. The individual files are completely checked during the summer months. As a result, it is much easier to counsel and guide students.

Students are asked to pay their registration and activity fee Tuesday, Sept. 6 in their home rooms. The complete deposit and activity fee is \$4.50 for grades 7-12. This payment takes care of all football, basketball games, lyceums, movies, and the Tiger Herald during the year. A towel service is maintained for high school and grade students taking part in physical education and athletics. Freshly laundered towels are issued for each shower. This service replaced the old procedure of bringing towels and taking them home for laundry.

Fifty cents remains of the fee is placed to the student's credit. Fines may be paid with this amount. If it is left to accumulate, and if none is used for fines, this amounts to \$3 by the time students are seniors and is then used to pay cap and gown rental upon graduation. If the student drops out of school or moves to another school at any time, the refund is made in full.

No refunds will be made at the end of the school year, the total remaining to the student's credit until graduation or leaving school.

The Marshall public schools open school Tuesday, Sept. 6, with a full day of school, Supt. L. M. Frey, announced today.

High school opens at 8:25 a.m. with dismissal at 3:30 p.m. Due to the number of youngsters eating in the lunch room there will be two lunch periods—the one for junior high at 11:23 to 11:58 and the senior high from 12:05 to 12:40.

Students will note that this period is only 35 minutes in length and that the junior high and senior high are not at the same time. Between four and five hundred youngsters eat their lunch at school, and it is impossible to take care of them all at one time, Frey said.

Another regulation made necessary by this short noon hour is that no junior high student eating lunch at school may leave the school grounds during the lunch hour. Double serving lines have been arranged, and more time will be spent in trying to have students eat slowly and well. Just enough time for students to wash and eat lunch has been allowed.

The senior high is still in session while the junior high is having lunch, and the junior high will be in session while the senior high is having lunch.

Dismissal time remains the same, 3:30 p.m., making it possible to operate and complete activities between 3:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. The time schedule has been a great aid to bus students.

In the grades the opening session starts at 8:40 and 8:45 a.m. with dismissal time for the grades varying. The afternoon session begins at 12:35 and 12:45 p.m. Parents should acquaint themselves with the opening and closing of the school day which follows in detail:

Junior high students will find their lists posted on the bulletin board in the lower hall of the


junior high building. Senior high students will follow lists posted in the lower hall of the senior high building.

School Registration Here Seen At 2,640 As Students Return

As both public and Catholic schools in Marshall open their doors today for the first time in the 1960-1961 year, an estimated 2,640 children, unofficially one of the largest enrollments, are expected to attend school.

In the public schools, it is estimated that the enrollment figure will be about 1,570 or

about the same as last year. Enrollment estimates in both Holy Redeemer grade school and Central Catholic high school anticipate a larger number of students compared with last year. This year's enrollment in both Catholic schools is about 1,070 or about 70 more than last year. Public school superintendent

L. M. Frey commented this morning that accurate or official enrollment figures in the public schools would not be available probably until Friday. He said, however, that it was expected that the enrollment would be about the same as last year.

Frey noted that a small decrease was expected in both kindergarten and 1st grade. He said that about 10 less children were expected in each of the classes.

Public high school enrollment was expected to rise slightly, he commented.

At Central Catholic high school, an enrollment of 320 was expected. This is slightly higher than last year's figure which was about 300. At the Holy Redeemer grade school 750 students were expected to register at the school.

The biggest increase at the Catholic grade school, a spokesman said, was in the 1st grade where 120 students are registered. This is an increase from last year's 84.



Tigers, Clarkfield Tie;

Both Teams Play Different Games In Second Half

CLARKFIELD — The Marshall high school Tigers of coach George Rindelaub and the Clarkfield Cardinals played two different halves of football here Friday evening which resulted in a 7-7 tie.

The Tigers completely dominated play in the first half when they scored their lone touchdown and didn't permit the Cards any scoring threats while holding them without a first down.

But in the second half it was a different story. Clarkfield, under their new coach Paul Driscoll, took the play away from Marshall and scored the tying touchdown midway in the final period.

"Injuries hurt us in that second half," Rindelaub stated after the contest with most of his starting quartet in the backfield sustaining some kind of mishap.

Dan Miller, who scored the Tigers' touchdown, was hurt as was halfback, Jeff Addison, who has a boil on his ankle which sidelined him in the fourth period.

Barry Pomrantz, who started this game at fullback instead of his usual tackle position, injured his knee again; the same knee which has plagued him throughout his athletic career.

Barry, who plays defensive end, couldn't quite catch up to Dennis Larson of the Cards who went around right end for 16 yards and the tying touchdown in the final stanza.

Marshall started their touchdown drive in the first period when Darv Ekness recovered a loose Clarkfield ball on the Card 32. Six plays later they were over.

Jeff Addison carried twice to pick up 12 yards and a first down on the 20. Pomrantz went five yards on a straight ahead plunge to the 15.

Addison picked up one more and then Pomrantz made a first down on the 10. Then Danny Miller went around the left side for the six points. Barry's kick was perfect.

The new single wing attack, which Clarkfield used plus some crisp Marshall tackling, forced the Cardinals to fumble four times nipping any drive they attempted to start.

The Tigers threatened to score again in the second quarter but were stymied at the Clarkfield 25. An offside penalty aided the Cards in stopping the drive and Marshall lost the ball on downs.

Clarkfield used a couple of quick kicks of more than 40 yards to get them out of danger in the first half and put Marshall back on their heels.

However, Clarkfield, behind the running of Jim Dotseth and Larson, moved for the tying touchdown after both teams could not get any sustained drive going in the third quarter.

Fullback John Forbes kicked out of Marshall territory just as the quarter ended with Larson returning the ball to the mid-field stripe. From there Clarkfield moved for the equalizer.

The tailback Larson got them a first down on a couple of carries to the Marshall 38. A couple more short gainers pre-

ceded a 15 yard walkoff which gave Clarkfield a first down on the 15.

Cal Peterson passed to Lyndy West for five yards, but the Cards were guilty of a forward lateral when West shuffled the ball off to Dotseth coming around. That cost them a five yard penalty, but Larson went into the end zone on the next play.

Dotseth bucked straight ahead for the tying point. Neither team, however, came within the other's 40 yard stripe later in the quarter.

Barry Pomrantz completed a 17 yard toss to Gary Sponaugle after the Tigers had received the kickoff, but a pair of passes fell incomplete and Marshall was forced to kick.

Addison and Pomrantz, when they were healthy, played good games particularly on offense and gained the most yardage for the Tigers. Dan Miller, although outweighed by nearly everyone on the field, was also a tough runner until the pounding he took began to tell in the second half.

The Tigers will be home next Friday evening entertaining a tough Pipestone outfit. Clarkfield plays at Canby.

Barry Pomrantz, Applen Doubtful For Arrow Tilt

"We're going to have a real tough battle on our hands Friday evening when we meet Pipestone," George Rindelaub said yesterday afternoon as rain was washing out a workout for his team.

"Pipestone has always been tough for us to beat, certainly when we have them scheduled in the first part of the year. Last year they looked real good against us but faltered near the end of the campaign."

"The outcome of the game will depend somewhat on our injured boys and if they will be in shape to play. As of this moment we are hurting on defense with Barry Pomrantz's injured leg leaving us without a defensive end," he added.

Pomrantz sustained a bruised bone injury in the Clarkfield tie last week in the first half. Because he is still hobbling on the injured pin, he may be available for only limited action Friday. If he isn't healthy, his place in the lineup will be taken by fullback John Forbes, the team's punter.

The boil which Jeff Addison had on his ankle, has responded to treatment and the swelling has gone down. Another halfback, Danny Miller, is ready to go after getting roughed up against Clarkfield. He weighs only 135 pounds.

Tim Applen, a starter and letterman in the Granite Falls contest, will probably miss his second straight contest due to a boil on his wrist. Monday the boil and cut and drained but Rindelaub says he is a doubtful starter.

There will be few changes in the line starters this week with Dick Belmont and Cliff Miller at the ends, Larry Pomrantz and Dick Ottum at tackles, guards Darv Ekness and Louie Sonstegard while the center will be Bill Mielke.

Coach Earle Teas of Pipestone has 17 lettermen back in which to work with this year but few were starters last year.

"Last year was supposed to have been our big year, but a fatal accident and boys moving out of town hurt us badly and it carries over this year.

The Arrows are unscored upon in their first two contests as they blanked both Canby and Ortonville. Tom Musser, the B-Squad coach who scouted the Arrows against Ortonville last week said they have a good passing attack.

"They have four big ends who can catch the ball," Musser said at the regular meeting of the Downtown Quarterback club, Tuesday evening, "and a little quarterback who can throw the ball to them."

Teas says of his new quarterback, Doug Hart, "He can handle the ball pretty well on the Split-T and can pass some. He has looked pretty good for us in the first two games."

"Verlyn Rysdam at center gives us good balance and a spot in which we built our team around. We also have converted tackle Dick Woelber, a 200-pounder, to fullback although he still plays in the line on defense."

Teas starting lineup will include Gary Fryer and Jim Stout at the ends, John Pierson and John Amdahl at the tackle posts, Denny Dahl and Dave Carstensen at guards and Rysdam at the pivot. The backfield will include Hart and Woelber at quarterback and fullback respectively while the halfbacks are Dale Winter and Arlen Buffington.

Rindelaub remembers Winter as a fast, tricky back who gave the Tigers trouble last year and he has run well so far this year again.

"We will be definite underdogs for this one, but will be in there fighting all the way," Rindelaub stated.

Tim Applen Scores On Opening Kickoff But Tigers Bow, 32-6

The Marshall high school Tigers of coach George Rindelaub clicked on the opening kick off of their 32-6 loss at the hands of the visiting Pipestone Arrows here Friday evening but did little threatening afterwards.

Fullback John Forbes received the opening boot near the right sideline on his own 27, cut to the center of the field where he handed the pigskin to Tim Applen who cut straight up the middle the remaining distance for the only Marshall score of the game.

Barry Pomrantz, attempting to kick the extra point, had to pass the ball instead because of a high pass from center. It failed.

Then the speedy Arrows of coach Earle Teas took complete control of the game spearheaded by their 200-lb fullback Dick Woelber and halfback Arlen Buffington mixed in with short passes thrown by little Doug Hart.

Forbes, who did a great job of punting for the Tigers during the evening, quick kicked late in the first period to the Pipestone 25. Four plays later Pipestone had its first score.

Woelber went 25 yards off tackle to the Tigers' 46 followed by a 17-yard slant by Buffington to the Marshall 26. Woelber moved straight ahead for 12 more to the 14 and Buffington and he carried down to the five where the halfback tallied with just 24 seconds to go in the quarter.

Woelber boomed straight ahead for the extra point to move the Arrows in front by one. Marshall's Roger Else received a shoulder injury during the drive which sidelined him.

Another lengthy drive by Pipestone followed after the Tigers couldn't move the ball and Forbes had to kick to the Pipestone 41. This drive took 18 plays before the Arrows scored. Woelber's 11-yard blast through the center of the Tigers' defense was the longest run during this span which payed off for the Arrow when Hart, throwing his first pass of the drive hit halfback Dale Winter, another sterling ball carrier for Pipestone, with a 17-yard toss for the score. Their extra point attempt was blocked.

Pipestone continued their scoring ways when they recovered a fumble by Jeff Addison on the Tigers' 35 and scored six plays later. Woelber went in from six yards out. Buffington added the extra point from placement.

The Arrows scored for the fourth time just as the fourth period was starting and it was Woelber again. Hart tried to pass for the extra point but it was no good.

With 6:28 remaining Dave Dries intercepted a pass by Dave Webb, who completed five of 12 for six yards, on the Pipestone 38 and went the rest of the distance untouched.

Even in the adverse playing conditions, the game was played in a fine mist, the Arrows had too much speed for the Tigers and Woelber and Buffington continually punched the center of the Marshall line for good gains.

In the first half Pipestone had 14 first downs to only one for the Tigers while gaining 221 yards on the grounds. Marshall had only 135 for the game.

The Tigers have this Friday off, but will resume play at Luverne, Oct. 7.



Tigers Have Good 2nd Half But Lose to Luverne

LUVERNE — "We played probably our best half of football tonight against Luverne," George Rindelaub, head football coach at Marshall high school said Friday night after his team's 25-0 loss to Luverne Friday evening.

Rindelaub had the game pegged right when he stated before the encounter began that his Tigers would probably be hurt by the smaller penalties of backfield in motion or offside. Marshall was nailed for 45 yards in penalties, all for five yards which stymied any offense threats they tried to launch save one.

With about seven minutes left in the contest the Tigers launched a ten play drive from their own 38 after Luverne had tallied their third touchdown to give them a 19-0 margin.

Applen burst through the left side for another first on the 14 after a measurement. Addison had a good gain going down to the six, but he fumbled with the home team Cardinals recovering. This was the furthest penetration by the Tigers.

During most of the games, however, the Tigers were on defense. The coach decided to rest four of his offensive linemen and replace them with some talent that looked good in the B-squad win over Montevideo Monday including John Nefstead, Dick Ottum and Terry Paul.

Luverne practiced ball control throughout most of the game throwing a pass only when it was necessitated. Still they picked up 48 yards on four completions.

The coaching staff hopes to pick up some more help from the B-Squad which seeks to keep its record unblemished when they meet Redwood Falls on Legion Field at 7 p.m. tonight.

Mike Wells, who formerly was a star halfback for coach Duane Ryhkus at Balaton, did a fine job of ball carrying for the Cards and he also scored the second Luverne touchdown near the end of the first half.

Wells scored after another Marshall fumble, there were six of them during the game. After Marshall stopped a play for no gain, Wells took a pitchout from quarterback Andy Hagemann and sped 27 yards into the end zone with less than two minutes before intermission.

The Tigers had a hard time containing the two Luverne halfbacks who would continually go off tackle or around the ends for some sizeable gains. Most of the time the Tigers defense was tough but then the Cardinals would break someone loose for a long gainer.

Luverne scored the first time they got their hands on the ball after the Tigers were forced into a punting situation. A third down pass play from Hagemann to end Jim Getman covering 26 yards to the 22, set up the score. Wayne Emery went through tackle for the six-pointer.

Both teams could do little until the Wells episode near the end of the first half. Neither team scored in the third period although Luverne was on its way to its third TD as time was running out in the stanza.

Substitute signal caller Lynn Geving sneaked for the score on the opening play of the final stanza. Little Tom Serie, a thrower in the sides of the Tigers all through this homecoming contest, tallied the final Luverne TD with just 1:39 left in the game from one yard out.

Schoolboard To Levy \$520,000 For Schools

Big Slice Will Be Used To Pay Addition Bonds

A levy of \$520,000 for operating the public schools in Marshall for the 1960 - 1961 school year was passed last night by the Marshall Board of Education.

The figure, the highest levy set for the schools, is \$80,000 more than last year.

The increase was due primarily to an addition of \$45,000 to the school budget which will be used in retiring the \$560,000 bonds passed by the voters in December for the high school school and grade school additions.

An increase was also noted in teachers' salaries due primarily to the addition of three faculty members. A general salary increase was also made.

Teacher salaries, amounting to \$410,000 this year, is the largest expense item on the budget.

The levy passed last night also includes an additional \$5,000 to be paid in retiring old school building bonds. Last year \$15,000 was used to retire the bonds compared with this year's \$20,000.

Supt. L. M. Frey said that disregarding the \$45,000 addition to the budget for the new bonds, the overall operation of the school showed a slight increase. "Operating" cost increases were brought about chiefly by the new teacher salaries and pay increases which amounted to about \$25,000.

This year's mill rate, although it hasn't been determined, is expected to be about 105.73 mills, depending upon the assessed valuation of the district. Last year the school mill rate in Marshall was 94.73. The assessed valuation will be determined in December.

With the local levy added to state aid, the total 1960 - 1961 school income here will be about \$720,000.

Tigers Face Unbeaten Olivia Friday Evening

"Olivia is one of the toughest teams in the area and their squad will outweigh ours by about ten pounds per man," George Rindelaub, head coach of the Marshall Tigers said yesterday.

"They average about 170 pounds per man in the backfield including their 200-pound fullback and about 185 pounds per man in the line."

"This is one of the best teams we will face all year although our scouting reports say we can pass against them and we have been working on that phase of our game in practice," the coach stated.

Rindelaub said he won't

make any changes in his starting offense lineup although he would like to find a spot for Danny Miller.

"He's just too good a boy to play just a few times on our defensive unit and I would like to work him into the offensive backfield some way," Rindelaub said.

"We'll again use some different players on our defensive line including John Nefstead backing up the line along with Terry Paul and Butch Otten. This will give us an opportunity to rest some of our offensive linemen. This worked pretty well for us last week," Rindelaub related.

Dick Belmont, who sat out most of the Luverne game with

an injured leg, and Cliff Miller will start at the ends, Barry and Larry Pomrantz at tackles, Lou Sonstegard, who made 14 tackles in the Luverne game, and Darv Ekness again will man the guard posts with Bill Mielke at center.

The backfield won't change with Dave Webb calling the signals, Jeff Addison and Tim Appen at halfbacks and John Forbes at fullback. Rindelaub hopes for some more excellent punting from his talented fullback.

Coach Ron Stave of Olivia has, what is termed, the "best backfield seen in Olivia in many years." There is a passing threat at every position including their great running ability.

The line lost some key men through graduation but has more than lived up to expectations. Olivia bombed Walnut Grove last week, 41-14, as halfbacks Dick Jansen and Pat O'Halloran each tallied two TD's. One of O'Halloran's was a 65-yard punt return.

Redwood Falls, 13-7

Tally Tiger Touchdowns

"For once everything worked right. Our backs cut at just the right time and we were trapping their linemen," an elated George Rindelaub stated after his Tigers had Redwood Falls shut out as time was running out in the fourth quarter to win, 13-7.

Tim Applen and Dave Webb scored the two Marshall touchdowns, the first the team had scored in twelve quarters of football or since Applen ran back the opening kickoff in the Pipestone contest four weeks ago.

Rindelaub figured his only chance for a victory was to skirt the Cardinal flanks which his team did beautifully. The Bengals rolled up 226 yards net on the ground, almost 50 more than Redwood.

Marshall had other opportunities to score and even had one touchdown called back early in the second quarter when Danny Miller fumbled as he was crossed the goal line from about seven yards out.

However, the official ruled that he had fumbled before he had crossed the double chalk mark and Redwood took over on their own 20 after recovering in the end zone.

The Tigers defense was real tough and time and time again the charge, led by Barry Pomrantz dumped a Redwood ball carrier for a loss or no gain.

After the Tigers had scored again late in the final period with a drive that ate up almost

six minutes on the clock, Rindelaub put in his reserves for the ensuing kickoff.

Pomrantz booted the ball deep into Redwood territory to the 18. Dave Patterson fielded the ball and high stepped down the left sidelines into the promised land as time ran out on the clock. Bill Cole plowed over for the extra point.

Meat Judges —

Marshall FFA'ers Win Gold Rating In Nat'l FFA Contest

Minnesota's meat identification team, composed of Robert Weidauer, Pat Brosseau and Elmer Green, all from Marshall won a

gold (first) rating in the national Future Farmers of America contests, held at Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 14.

This was a meat judging contest in which 32 teams from as many states participated. Each had won a district, regional and then state rating.

Identification had to be made of a possible 125 retail cuts taken from veal, lamb, beef and pork. Twenty-five were used at the contest. The contestant had to tell from what animal each came and the wholesale cut. In the case of beef, four butchered and hanging carcasses had to be rated 1, 2, 3, or 4.

There were also four each of beef ribs, rounds and chucks, wholesale cuts, to be judged.

Likewise there were four pork carcasses to be judged as

the beef. Also judgement had to be passed on four hams, four sides or bacons and four loins. These were wholesale cuts.

Four lamb carcasses were also to be judged as the beef and pork carcasses.

Ten other beef carcasses, graded according to United States meat grading standards, required of the contestant decisions as to high or low prime, choice, good, standard, commercial or utility grades as well as the part of the animal.

Weidauer and Brosseau also won individual gold medal emblems, while Green received a bronze (third) place medal.

Jim Doty and Tom Lanoue were official delegates to the contest from the local FFA group. L. J. McCann is FFA advisor and coach.

New High School Here In Ten Years?

In the future, about ten years from now, the Marshall public schools could be faced with a building program which may call for a new high school.

An interview with Supt. of Schools L. M. Frey yesterday discussing the future building plans of the public schools revealed that if projected enrollment estimates become a reality, the schools expansion will be undertaken.

The where, when, what and hows of the schools are unanswered at this early stage but these interesting facts must be considered:

- The new high school would probably cost in the neighborhood of \$1,250,000 to \$1,500,000. It may contain a new and large gymnasium - auditorium.
- A site for the new high school could very likely be located on the present high school grounds.

- The present junior high school building constructed in 1899, will have to be vacated in about ten years. The present senior high school may be turned over to a junior high and the old one torn down and a new senior high school built on the site.
- A new grade school might also be needed in 10 or 15 years and would cost about \$500,000. Its location may be on the southern end of town although Frey hesitates to mention location.

Most individuals are unaware that a "building program" set up by colleges, schools, hospitals etc. is usually a continuous project (as it is in Marshall) that involves looking ahead and planning needs. Frey commented, "As our present building program calls for, we estimated that in about 10 years we may need a new high school and shortly after, a new grade school.

In the public school system to-

day in Marshall, there are 1,569 enrolled. Figures compiled on projected enrollments estimate 30 per cent more students in school by 1968-69. Today there are 170 more students in the first through sixth grades than there are in the seventh through twelfth.

One important factor must be kept in mind when speaking of building the new schools, said Frey. "We will only build them," he pointed out, "if there is the demand and need for them. And we think there may be."

The questions of finances of course will enter the picture and it will be finally left up to the voters if the schools should be built.

By the 1970 date the bonds on the East Side grade school will be practically paid up, the West Side grade school bonds two-thirds paid, and the bonds for the addition on the high school, passed last December, will be half paid.

Excluding the fact that a good share of the bonds for the recent school building (East Side, 1952; West Side, 1956; Senior high addition, 1960) will be retired by 1970, the tax pinch on taxpayers still probably won't be greater than it presently is when a new high school and grade school are built.

Frey points out that the percent of bonded indebtedness in relation to the assessed valuation of the school district has never varied more than three per cent either way. In 1947, the district was indebted 20 per cent of its assessed valuation. Today it's 23 per cent.

The reason for the stable indebtedness is attributed to the district's fine "financial base" due to 1) a growing assessed valuation 2) more taxable land coming into the district.

Whatever the outcome of the building program in 1970 Marshallites can be assured of maintaining on the finest school systems in the state.

"That win last week was a big help for us and we hope to continue winning against Tracy Friday evening," George Rindelaub, head football coach at Marshall high school stated yesterday.

"Tracy has been one of our biggest rivals over the years and the boys are really pointing for this one especially since it is homecoming," the coach continued.

The homecoming contest will start at 7:30 p.m. Friday evening on Legion Field, one half an hour earlier because of the festivities and the lateness of the season.

Coach Leo Sebastian lost most of his regular from last season including his whole starting backfield. He felt, before the campaign started, he had a big rebuilding job to do this fall.

His record has proven that he has rebuilt his Scrapper eleven as his crew won its first three contests to extend its winning streak to nine over two seasons. However, the Scappers dropped their next pair and more recently have taken their two contests preceeding their date with Marshall.

The two Tracy losses were to Olivia and Slayton, both unbeaten so far in high school play. The Scappers topped Clarkfield and Canby during the past two weeks, both by shut out scores.

Taking the two teams' opponents by comparative scores, which means little, Olivia beat the Scappers 13-6 while topping the Tigers, 25-0. Both teams beat

Redwood Falls, Marshall by six points and Tracy by four.

Rindelaub will use about the same starting lineup although injuries to a couple of boys may limit their use. The backfield remains the same with Dave Webb calling signals, Jeff Addison and Tim Applen at the halves and John Forb's doing the fullbacking.

The changes will be in the line with John Nefstead replacing the injured Louie Sonstegard at guard. Sonstegard was injured in the Olivia contest, suffering a hemorrhage in his arm. Although the swelling has gone down some what, Rindelaub intends to hold him out of the contest.

The other change will be at one of the end posts because Cliff Miller has water on the knee. "We won't use Cliff unless it is absolutely necessary. We don't want to risk permanent injury to his knee," the coach stated. The rest of the line has Barry and Larry Pomrantz at the tackle posts, Dary Ekness at the other guard position and Bill Mielke at center.

The Tigers proved against Redwood Falls that they could sweep the ends or cut in through the tackle slots. They will be facing a team which is about the same size as they are for the first time this campaign.

The team is quarterbacked by John Vahle, an honor student, who performs just as well on the playing field. He has been hitting his two end targets, Dave Mielke and especially Dennis Menk, all season long.

The very able running attack will be spearheaded by Roger Stevens and fullback Roger Johnson, who saw plenty of action last year. Jim Keul is the running mate with Stevens at halfback.

One man the Tigers will stay away from in the line is tackle Don Smith, a senior playing his last game. Smith is one of the few linemen who saw considerable action last fall.

Tracy Spoils MHS Homecoming Contest With Ground Attack

"It was kind of a wishy-washy affair out there tonight," coach Leo Sebastian of Tracy said as his Scrappers scored three first half touchdowns and went on to dump Marshall high school in the locals homecoming game, 26-6, Friday.

Breaks are part of the game and the Tigers gave many to Tracy such as five fumbles, many on their inability to field punts, while the Scrappers were penalized over 144 yards which didn't seem to aid Marshall's cause too much.

Tracy had a great inside-outside punch of fullback Roger Johnson and right halfback Rogers Stevens. The two split the four Tracy touchdowns while Stevens gained over 170 yards rushing, more than the entire Marshall total.

The Bengals were shut out until the third quarter when they scored the first touchdown that has been tallied against Tracy in three games. The drive took six plays after Dick Seifert had recovered a Tracy bobble on the Scrappers' 11-yard marker.

Quarterback John Vahle was the victim of the loose ball as he was about to set out on another of his excursions around the right side. However, Vahle was a master at running the well-oiled Tracy attack which ran with precision-smoothness most of the evening.

Tracy had just stopped a drive Marshall had started after recovering a fumble on the Tracy 33. The Tigers had moved the pigskin down to the Scrappers' 5 before the visitors held. Marshall wasn't to be denied after Vahle fumbled on the first Tracy play, though.

A beautifully executed statue of liberty play where Dave Webb faded as if to pass with Tim Appen taking the ball from his grasp, moved the ball 14 yards to the Tracy 15. But they were less than a yard short of getting the necessary first down and the Scrappers took over only to see Marshall cross their goal after six plays.

John Forbes — Fullback


John has been a good defensive linebacker and an above average kicker. His offensive running and blocking have improved with each game. We will miss his clutch punting next season.

Bill Mielke — Center



wood, model clay, finger-paint, blow horns, beat drums, squoosh their toes in the mud pan, or kick around, "The Boss" life-sized dummy. In an adjoining Mad Room, they can shoot off guns, break vases, and set fire to drapes.

Among the students are Velvet Skinner, a chorus girl who eats too much and loses her job; John Bedford Judson, a banker who shouts at everyone but his wife; Greta Jones, a spinster who can't stop traveling; "Beaver" Williams, frustrated artist who draws feet all

Using freely the techniques of group dynamics and psychodrama, Dr. Bell helps his students to talk over and act out their frustrations and daily disappointments. Together they stage two "psychomotor dramas": an airplane trip to Nicaragua and the "Sheet of the Subconscious," in which they improvise their roles and reactions.





LUVERNE — The Marshall high school Tigers experienced their bleakest night of the season here Friday evening, did very little right, while falling to a potent Luverne crew, 72-48. Glenn Matke's Bengals could get only 48 shots at the hoop at Luverne and very few of these were within ten feet of the iron circle. In fact Marshall got only 19 tries in the first 16 minutes as Luverne forced them into numerous mistakes.





Supt. of Schools, L. M. Frey commented that it would probably take at least two months before a replacement is named.

Frey said that he had no idea as to who will replace Rindelaub, whether it would be a member of the present faculty or an outsider.

Rindelaub will remain on the faculty as a social science instructor.

The schoolboard also announced that John Henderson was the student selected from Marshall high school to speak before the annual state schoolboard convention in St. Paul, Jan. 17.

last night. Rindelaub will continue as a social studies instructor at the high school, however, and remain on the coaching staff.

"It's as much physical as anything. You get to eating meals irregularly and you continue to play the game even after its over," Rindelaub stated.

"Now I'd like to watch the games from the stands with the pressure off. The people of Marshall have been wonderful to my family and myself. Very few people have ever said anything about the coaching to me.

"I would have liked leaving a good nucleus for the coach who will take my place as I had when I first came here.

"I've been deliberating for the past two years to get out of coaching. We've had some rough years but we feel the boys have always gotten something good out of football.

"Football is a fine game and I certainly hope my boys will want to be players also. There are many things that a boy can derive from the game that can make him a better citizen in our society.

"Kids of high school age will make many mistakes but we hope they can learn from them. We've had numerous boys with fine ability but you need desire, also, to be a good football player.

"Desire is the most important quality, I believe, in football. Desire can make up for the lack of physical equipment some players have," Rindelaub related.

The coach said he submitted his resignation about a month ago but it wasn't until last night that the school board acted upon it. No successor has been named yet.

"I would like to wish my successor and the squad of 1961 the utmost success. I feel that under the leadership of Jeff Addison and Tim Appen they can have a fine year. Both boys are hard working, aggressive and command the respect of their teammates," Rindelaub concluded.

The Tigers ran the lead up to three at 14-11 with 4:22 left on a jumper from the side by Furan and a pair of charity tosses by Dave Webb but baskets by Dan Carpenter, Barnes and Peters quickly wiped out the margin. Peters, on the payoff end of a fast break, gave the Bobcats this lead once again with a little over two minutes left before the break.

Barry and Krause exchanged buckets at the outset of the third stanza and a swishing set shot from the corner by Barry along with a 20-ft. jumper executed by Furan, the Tigers got their last lead of the game 6:41 left in the period at 26-25.





Marshall's Strength In Middle Quarters Turns Back Lancer

Before the Marshall - Canby encounter at the high school gymnasium last night, George Potter, the Lancers' head cage coach, stated to the Tigers' coach, Glenn Mattke, "We're just a 40-point ball club."

Potter proved to be somewhat of a prophet as his Lancers tallied one less than the aforementioned 40 in dropping their second straight encounter, 50-39.

A rejuvenated Danny Lanoue hit double figures for the first time since the Redwood Falls game here on Dec. 2. Lanoue teamed with Barry Pomrantz and the two centers, Gary Sponaule and Larry Pomrantz, to control the boards in the contest.








The 6-4 coach said he probably wouldn't change Rindelaub's multiple type offense too much next fall although he would like to go with one basic formation, the basic "T".

The first half, however, was, again, a different story. The lead see-sawed back and forth nine times with the two clubs knotted up on four occasions.



The Marshall "B" team, coached by Stan Kroon, didn't have it quite so easy as they edged the junior Scrappers, 39-35. This win gave Kroon's squad eight consecutive victories.

Danny Lanoue came through with the kind of game coach Glenn Mattke knew he had in him Friday with fine floor play, good rebounding as well as leading the scorers on both squads with 17 markers.

The first period found Marshall hitting the baskets while all Tracy could keep down were free throws. The Tigers led after this eight minute stretch, 10-3.

In fact it wasn't until Bruce Drackley, the Tracy pivotman, tallied on a layup with 6:37 gone in the second quarter that the Scrappers finally changed the scoreboard by "two's" instead of just one number at a time.

While the Scrappers were hitting eight for 11 from the heavy black line, Marshall couldn't hit from that area, until Larry Pomrantz dropped one midway in the third stanza.

But Marshall could hit a few buckets. During the first half they connected 11 times, five of them by Lanoue. Tracy did have a little more success during the rest of the game but their coldness couldn't pull them within striking distance even if they did outscore the Tigers the remainder of the contest except for the last period.

After Larry Pomrantz had put in three straight points at the outset of the second half, the Scrappers started to find themselves with buckets by Dave Bosacker, Wolfe and Gary Eilefson narrowing the Marshall lead to 27-24 with 4:13 left. But this was as close as Tracy could get.

Lanoue hit a corner jumper and a drive in while Bruce Knigge potted a 15 foot jumper to push the Tigers out of reach. This outburst more than offset a layup by Mielke. John Forbes' setter gave the Tigers a 35-27 lead at the quarter.

Wolfe, the Scrappers' top scorer with only one in double figures with 16, got eight of his evening's total in the last stanza but Tracy couldn't quite get enough points to erase the Marshall margin. Outside of Mielke's five points, no other Scrapper tallied in the frame.

The setback marked the sixth in eight starts for the Scrappers who play at Lake Benton Saturday.

Marshall never did lead in the


ball game. Redwood's Bill Patterson hit a followup shot with just 24 seconds gone after the opening tipoff and the Tigers were behind six counters before they knew it.



Last Friday they moved on the road again but were swamped by Springfield, 83-55, for their third loss in a row.




