Sarah wants a tomb stone bought and placed on her grave when she dies. Has about \$20.00 in the safe which can probably be used for this purpose.

Later - She has taken the money.

Silas has no known relatives, & H. C.

Ray should not be allowed to  
go home unless father requests

Mother wants to know in

front teeth. Want gold filling.



Nina Elliott -  
Nina has no home to go home -  
has been living with uncles  
who have been "bitching" it.  
She should not be permitted

Ave. No. Mpls. is interested in  
her. - is a good woman.

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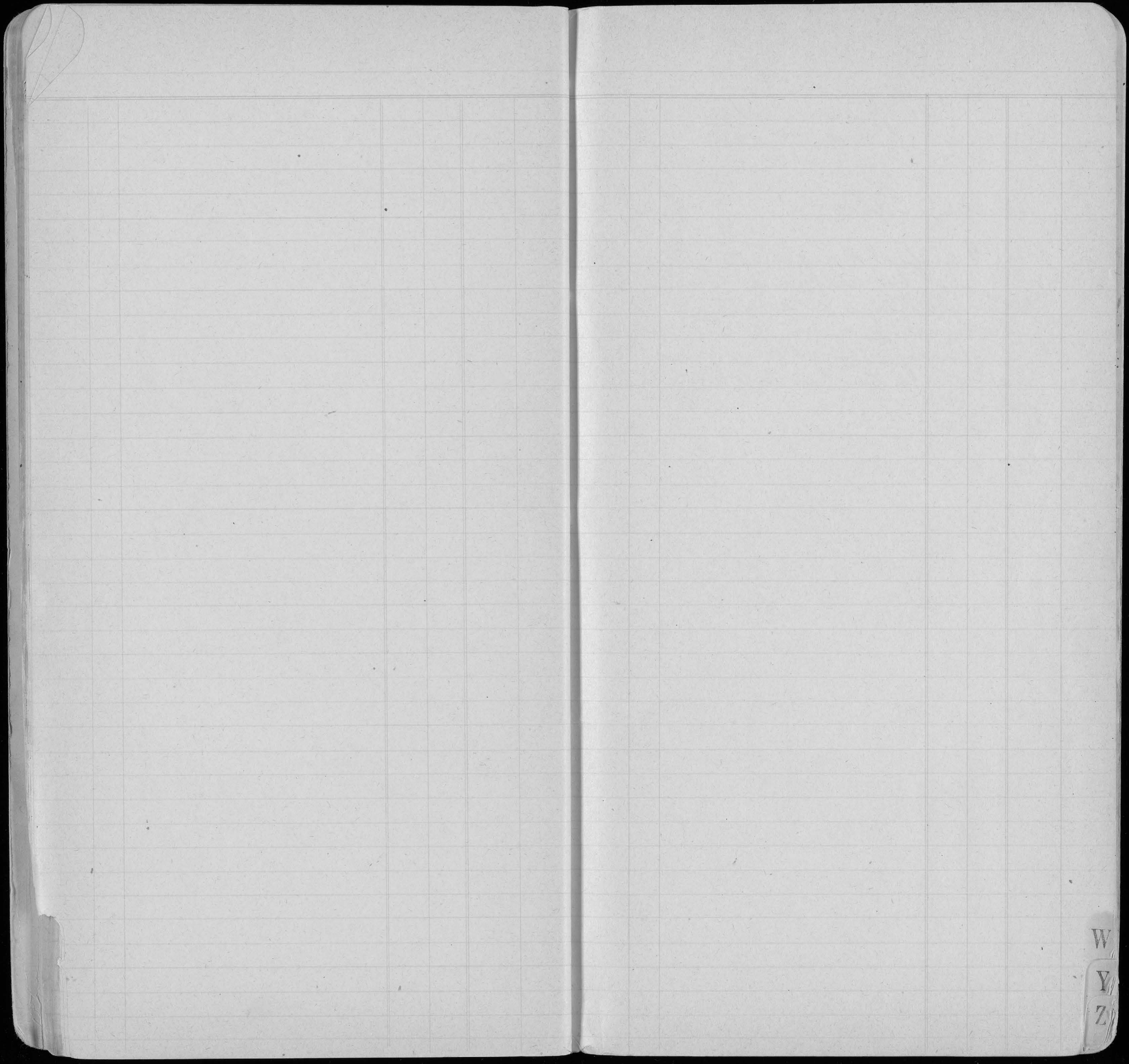
