Dean Guida and Mike Hulett volunteered to be members from the Board.

Jeanne Seigel moved, seconded by Mike Hulett, to approve the Boundary Configuration Committee document. Motion carried.

DILWORTH LAND ANNEXATION - Discussion was held on the question of Lot one, Block one, not being included in the annexation petition presented to the Board at the September 23 meeting.

Wayne Alexander moved, seconded by Dean Guida, to take the tabled motion off the table. Motion carried by roll call vote: Seigel - yes, Guida - yes, Borgen - yes, Fagerlie - yes, Hulett - yes, Alexander - yes, Hastad - yes.

Doug Fagerlie moved to accept the petition for detachment of land from the Independent School District #152 and annexation to Independent School District #147 pursuant to M.S. 5122.21. Motion failed by roll call vote: Guida - aye, Borgen - no, Seigel - no, Fagerlie - abstain, Hulett - no, Alexander - no, Hastad - no.

Anton Hastad moved to offer a resolution whereas the district inform the concerned parties that we are interested in pursuing the annexation agreement and direct the administration to work towards that end. Motion died for lack of second.

Ben Trochlil will write a letter to Don Vellenga, Dilworth Schools, informing him that the Board has voted not to accept the petition for detachment of land and has directed the administration to work with him and bring it back for their consideration when all parcels of the land including Lot 1, Block 1, are part of the annexation proposal.

TRUST INVESTMENT - Anton Hastad moved, seconded by Jeanne Seigel, to approve the resolution to use Norwest Capital Management & Trust Co. with our deposits at Norwest Bank Moorhead.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

1. CCCPP - The Clay County Coordinated Preschool Program is receiving approximately \$14,000 for the period July 1, 1986, to December 31, 1986 and \$29,000 for the period January 1, 1987 to December 31, 1987 from Clay County Social Services.

The funds received will help cover costs of providing an early intervention program for handicapped children ages birth through three years and for their parents in Clay County. Since about 90% of students receiving services are residents of the Moorhead Schools, a special thank you will be sent to Clay County Social Services and the Clay County Welfare Board.

RE: CEt-off for Chapter I Eligibility; Number being served in program

If it appears that fewer children are being served in Chapter I in your building, that may well be true. This year we have five and one half teachers teaching and six buildings to cover in our five hour work day. Of the 278 children that were assessed as needing Chapter I by their classroom teachers in mid-September, we are serving approximately 127 children. It was necessary to use a cut-off of the 22nd percentile on the Stanford Acheivement Test given in early October. (This is down from the cut-off of the 29th percentile that we used last year. Information regarding your particular building will be given later in this letter.)

Each Chapter I teacher has an average of 24.4 students, but 35.7 student contacts, because some children need help in both reading and math. Some classroom teachers are already asking to have other students in the program. We must put them on a waiting list because we are serving the "most needy"-educationally, right now.

ASSURANCE OF MASTERY POLICY

Independent School District #152 Board of Education is dedicated to the assurance of student mastery in the areas of reading and mathematics. The district supports the need for each student to achieve minimal competency in these basic skills before high school graduation and provides the student with the opportunity to gain the necessary knowledge and concepts in reading and mathematics. This policy excludes Special Education and English as a Second Language students.

This policy assures that each student's progress toward mastery in these curriculum areas will be evaluated at least once during grades K-3, once during grades 4-6, once during grades 7-8, and once during grades 9-12. When a student is not making sufficient progress toward mastery in either reading or mathematics, the district will be responsible for holding a parent conference to establish a special learning plan (SLP). The student will then be given alternative opportunities for remediation as outlined in the SLP.

Competency tests in the areas of reading and mathematics will be given in grade 10. Students failing to pass the tests will be provided with mastery objectives and given remediation. Students who do not pass after repeated opportunities will be given a certificate of attendance rather than a diploma upon the completion of minimum course requirements. Students new to the district for whom this policy applies will be required to pass the appropriate test prior to receiving a diploma.

The responsibility for mastery is shared by the teacher, the student, the parent/guardian, the administration, and the Board of Education.

Building principals, assisted by the Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, will provide the leadership and support needed to bring about successful implementation of the assurance of skill mastery process.

Independent School District #152 will include its Assurance of Mastery procedure in the PER report biennially beginning in 1986-87.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR PHYSICAL DISABILITIES CONSULTANT SERVICES

This contract, entered into this 9th day of December 1986 by and between Moorhead Public Schools, Independent School District #152, and Dr. David J. Seyfried, Physical Disabilities Consultant.

This letter address two instances regarding additional construction surveying that we performed on the above referenced project that we feel exceeds our original intent for construction surveying.

The first is the softball diamonds at Probstfield School. As you know after we had staked the fields in their original planned location we were instructed to move them to the east side of the school playground which we did and were instructed later to move them back to their original location.

The second is the additional fencing of the schools property that was done by Dakota Fence Company by a purchase order from the school. In order for Dakota Fence to install the fence it was necessary to locate the schools property lines so the fence could be located on school property and not on adjacent property, this was to be accomplished by the owner as per note no. 6 on the plan we prepared for the project. We located the schools property lines and staked the center line of the fence so that it could be built.

We feel that in both instances the construction surveying we did was in addition to the construction surveying we intended to do as both instances occured after our lump sum proposal for construction surveying was accepted by the school.

We feel that we are entitled to additional compensation of \$945.75 for services performed as follows:
