Public Hearing:

Item 1: Continuance of public hearing on NSP Franchise Agreement. In your packet you'll find a letter from Dave Kennedy and a copy of the franchise agreement along with a short memo from Bill Monk. Bill has been involved with this along with Dave and myself. Many of the provisions have to do with location of utilities and street right-of-ways, etc. As Bill points out in his memo, NSP would like further amendment to Section 3.4 and 9.1, however, I don't agree with this. I think they have very little basis for their argument. Their argument with Section 3.4 is that the liquidated damage is something that they don't want to get involved with or don't agree with. However, in questioning them you'll find that they have never ever paid liquidated damages to anybody, they just like to object on principle to this provision. In 9.1 they object to the 5%, however, I find it amusing that they do. They indicate that they only agree to the 5% with the Suburban Rate Authority cause it was an organization representing a lot of people when it really should be only 4%. There are already 20 some communities that have the 5%.

As Dave explains in his letter, more than likely we'll never ever impose a franchise fee anyway but I think we ought to leave the 5% in there. If it's good enough for all the SRA members I think it should be good enough for the City of Crystal too. I'm sure NSP will probably raise other questions, but I think the legal people who will be there don't really have the backing of the rest of the management necessarily. From what I know, not whole-heartily anyway. I think that if the Council just adopts the franchise there won't be any lessening in our relationship with NSP or anything else, which is very good. They are a good company but I think we should have a franchise fee and we shouldn't make these changes just because they complain about them.

Regular Agenda:

1. Appearance by Patty Wilder, Executive Director of the Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council, regarding their program and budget. Enclosed you'll find a booklet from

Northwest Hennepin Human Services relative to their program in the area. I serve on their board and I think they are doing an extremely good job in the area with very limited resources. Patty will bring you up-to-date on some of programs that they are working with. We have budgeted for Northwest again for 1990 and I think it is probably one of the best deals we get for our buck. Residents from the area I believe will be present to discuss this with the Council. There are some violations occurring at that site. We've had conversations with the owner but apparently to no avail and we may have to take additional action to try to get the owner to clean the property up as much as our ordinance covers. Consideration of First Reading of an Ordinance amendment to the Charitable Gambling Ordinance. Between now and the Second Reading would be the time to make any changes if the Council desires them. I think the ordinance will do the job though the way Dave has proposed to changing it. Consideration of change to approved sign criteria for Pier I Imports at 5590 West Broadway. When the Gallery was built the City had a signage agreement on the whole complex and approved the sign for the complex. Part of that agreement was that we had to approve any change in the signing. I don't personally find the canopy type sign that Pier I is proposing as objectionable. However, the Council should realize that it probably will bring requests for other changes in the signing from the center. It seems to me that one of our major considerations should be that if it helps them do business and to prosper in our community, does not materially detract from the appearance of the center or cause deterioration in the center, I don't know why we shouldn't approve the change. 7b. Reconsideration of a variance of 2' of the required 3' side yard setback for construction of a 20' x 20' detached garage at 5408 Angeline Avenue North. The applicant is asking the Council to reconsider this. Frankly, I don't think there is any new information and I think we shouldn't change our vote on this. 11. Consideration of conditional use permit to allow an auto service center in a B-3 Auto-Oriented Commercial District at 6800 - 56th Avenue North. The applicant is Firestone. They are not requesting any variances, deviations or whatever from our ordinance, the zoning is correct, and it would be my recommendation that we approve the conditional use permit with the conditions the Council deems appropriate. Consideration of renewal of contract between Metropolitan Clinic of Counseling (Employee Assistance Program) and the City of Crystal. I believe the Employee Assistance Program is a very valuable program to the City. While there is a small cost here,

the cost of one employee having a major problem that affects the job site, their performance, operation of equipment, etc., could cost the City a lot more. I think it is a very good investment for the City. Consideration of an appropriation of \$1147 for maintenance and support of the Animal Humane Society. I frankly don't think the City should be contributing for the support of the Animal Humane Society. If the legislature thinks they are such a useful organization that they need taxpayers support, I think they ought to give them the authority to levy taxes, not ask them to go around trying to piggyback on the cities and hide where the money is coming from. They provide no direct services to the City and have refused to provide pound service for the City. I really don't think we should be supporting them. They ought to develop their own financial support system. 15. Consideration of the designation of voting and alternate voting delegates, Annual Congress of Cities, November 25-29, 1989, Atlanta, Georgia. I recommend that the Council select one of its members to be the voter and alternate for the conference so that when or if there is a check of credentials, we have authorization for somebody to be doing the voting. Consideration of First Reading of an Ordinance relating to compensation of members of the City Council. You'll have a copy of the ordinance and a survey of Metropolitan Councils' salaries in your packet. You'll note that your present salary is pretty much right on the average of the cities our size in the metropolitan area. There is a blank in the ordinance for the Council to make any changes that you want to make. Consideration of CDBG Third Party Agreement with the Greater Minneapolis Day Care Association. This is a sliding scale-type arrangement for day care that we support through our Community Development Block Grant. I recommend that we approve it again for 1990. Item #18 is a matter of setting a date for a joint work session. I would recommend that the Council all bring their calendars so that we can pick a date in November when we can meet. 19. Discussion regarding the Long-Range Planning Commission. The Mayor requested that I put this on the agenda for discussion both on a staff level and with Councilmembers. I've had some questions asked of me and some discussion about the real need for the Long-Range Planning Commission. What they do is not harmful but I think in a lot of cases it's repetitious. Everything we discuss and do there is repeated and redone with other boards or commissions or before the Council. I really question somewhat the need for it. We are stretching the staff thinner all the time to have people go to all the board and commission meetings. I really wonder if there is a need to continue this group.

- 20. Discussion regarding the Civil Service Commission. Art Cunningham sent the letter attached relative to the Civil Service Commission. As long as we have a Civil Service law and must operate under that system, I think we should have a commission although there is nothing they have to do at any given time unless there is a complaint or something that comes before them. I did have an individual contact me who has a degree in industrial relations, very familiar with this kind of work and systems, has done some training for the same in fact, and who is very capable and is interested in joining. I sent him an application but I don't believe we have received that back. I can contact him again though and see if he has interest if the Council wants to have the Mayor make more appointments.
- 21. Discussion of budget public hearing. Attending the League of Minnesota Cities Regional meeting this week, they were advising that the cities try to hold these meetings as close to the end of October as possible because of the uncertainty of what and when the legislature is going to do anything. Our hearing right now is set for October 10th with the 17th being an alternate date for continuation. Based on the advice of the league and the seemingly lack of movement by the governor or the legislature, I wonder if we should reconsider and set those dates for the 24th and 31st of October.
- 22. Consideration of property at 5201 Maryland Avenue North. Dave Kennedy will have some paperwork available for the Council to make some findings relative to this house which is full of debris and somewhat in a state of disrepair. Dave will advise on the action the Council should take to implement the clean up of the property.
- 23. Discussion of Light Rail Transit stations. Enclosed please find information from Robbinsdale relative to their contingent approval of the light rail system. I believe the long and short of it is that Robbinsdale feels there should be at least one station in Golden Valley to spread out the traffic that will be moving to the light rail and using the light rail, etc. I tend to agree with Robbinsdale. I think too many stations is not good but on the other hand if there is not enough ridership the light rail system is not going to work either. I think we should encourage our neighbors to the south to have a station in their city somewhere.





- If the lease is cancelled prior to the termination date of this lease, each party agrees to notify the Gambling Control Board explaining the reasons for the cancellation. Dear Jerry:

Enclosed you will find the draft of a proposed franchise between the City and Northern States Power Company. As you know, the existing franchise with the company expired a few years back and the Company has been in contact with you about getting a new franchise in place. As we discussed the other day, the enclosed franchise is a model franchise prepared by the Suburban Rate Authority (SRA) after extensive negotiations with NSP. NSP is not completely happy with the form of the franchise, but it has been adopted in a number of municipalities and the attorneys in our office (who represent the SRA) are quite confident of the adequacy of the model ordinance and its protection for the City. I recommend that it be adopted.

The primary concern that the company has is with Section 9 which provides that the City can by separate ordinance at some later date impose a franchise fee on the company as permitted by law. Few cities have done this, but I think it desirable to have the ability to impose the fee specifically mentioned in the franchise Section 9.4 of the ordinance, recommended by the company, provides that if such a franchise fee is imposed on the company that an identical fee be imposed on all other energy suppliers in the City. It is not necessary to include this provision, but I see no reason why it should not be included. In practical terms, it is most unlikely that the City of Crystal would wish to impose such a fee since the fee is simply passed on to consumers by the company and the company would make it very clear at any hearing on a franchise fee ordinance that such a pass-through is possible and its intent. This usually raises enough objections in citizens' minds to defeat any such proposal.

Under the City Charter the ordinance adoption must be preceded by a public hearing after ten days' published notice, and the cost of publication under the terms of the ordinance must be paid by the company. The previous City Charter required a deposit of the publication fee prior to the enactment of the ordinance. That section was removed in the recent revisions of the City Charter on the theory that the company would simply be told that the ordinance would not be published until those costs were covered.

I suspect at the public hearing the company will be represented and may have something to say about the franchise. I would recommend that an attorney from our office familiar with the franchise provisions be present to respond to any company comments.

By the way, the uniform franchise was developed by the SRA which is a joint powers organization of a number of metropolitan municipalities. The SRA is quite active in the matters of utility rate regulations and has, we think, had a significant impact on rate determinations made by the Public Service Commission in matters involving gas and electric utilities. The City of Crystal withdrew from the SRA several years ago, but I do think it might be in the interest of the City to consider rejoining, and if there is any interest in that I am sure that we can supply some informational materials for the Council's deliberations on the matter. Having worked with the SRA for many years myself, I do know that the cooperative efforts of that organization have been of significant benefit to municipalities in the metropolitan area, both members and non-members alike.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO NORTHERN STATES POWER COMPANY, A MINNESOTA CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, PERMISSION TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE, REPAIR AND MAINTAIN IN THE CITY OF CRYSTAL, MINNESOTA AN ELECTRIC DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM AND TRANSMISSION LINES, INCLUDING NECESSARY POLES, LINES, FIXTURES AND APPURTENANCES, FOR THE FURNISHING OF ELECTRIC ENERGY TO THE CITY, ITS INHABITANTS, AND OTHERS, AND TO USE PUBLIC WAYS AND PUBLIC GROUNDS OF THE CITY FOR SUCH PURPOSES.

THE CITY OF CRYSTAL ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 "City" In this Ordinance, "City" means the City of Crystal, County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota.
- 1.2 "City Utility System" means the facilities used for providing sewer, water, or any other public utility service owned or operated by City or agency thereof.
- 1.3 "Company" means Northern States Power Company, a Minnesota corporation, its successors and assigns.
- 1.4 "Notice" means a writing served by any party or parties on any other party or parties. Notice to Company shall be mailed to the Area Office Manager thereof at Brooklyn Center, Minnesota. Notice to City shall be mailed to the City Clerk.
- 1.5 "Public Way" means any street, alley, or other public right-of-way within the City.
- 1.6 "Public Ground" means land owned by the City for park, open space or similar purpose, which is held for use in common by the public.
- 1.7 "Electric Facilities" means electric transmission and distribution towers, poles, lines, guys, anchors, ducts, fixtures, and necessary appurtenances owned or operated by the Company for the purpose of providing electric energy for public use.

SECTION 2. FRANCHISE

- 2.1 Grant of Franchise. City hereby grants Company, for a period of twenty years from September 19, 1989, the right to transmit and furnish electric energy for light, heat, power and other purposes for public and private use within and through the limits of the City as its boundaries now exist or as they may be extended in the future. For these purposes, Company may construct, operate, repair and maintain Electric Facilities in, on, over, under and across the Public Ways and Public Grounds of City subject to the provisions of this ordinance. Company may do all reasonable things necessary or customary to accomplish these purposes, subject, however, to zoning ordinances, other applicable ordinances, permit procedures, and to the further provisions of this franchise.
- 2.2 Effective Date; Written Acceptance. This franchise shall be in force and effect from and after its passage and its acceptance by the Company, and its publication as required by law and the City Charter. An acceptance by the Company must be filed with the City Clerk within 90 days after publication.
- 2.3 Service Rates and Area. The service to be provided and the rates to be charged by Company for electric service in City currently are subject to the jurisdiction of the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission. The area within the City in which the Company may provide electric service currently is subject to the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 216B.40.
- 2.4 <u>Publication Expense</u>. The expense of publication of this ordinance shall be paid by the Company.
- 2.5 <u>Default</u>. If either party asserts that the other party is in default in the performance of any obligation hereunder, the complaining party shall notify the other party of the default and the desired remedy. The notification shall be written. If the dispute is not resolved within 30 days of the written notice, either party may commence an action in District Court to interpret and enforce this franchise or for such other relief as may be permitted by law or equity for breach of contract, or either party may take any other action permitted by law.

SECTION 3. LOCATION, OTHER REGULATIONS

3.1 Location of Facilities. Electric Facilities shall be located and constructed so as not to interfere with the safety and convenience of ordinary travel along and over Public Ways and they shall be located on Public Grounds as determined by the City. The Company's construction, reconstruction, operation, repair, maintenance and location of Electric Facilities shall be subject to other reasonable regulations of the City.

- 3.2 <u>Field Locations</u>. The Company shall provide field locations for any of its underground Electric Facilities within a reasonable period of time on request by the City. The period of time will be considered reasonable if it compares favorably with the average time required by the cities in the same county to locate municipal underground facilities for the Company.
- 3.3 Street Openings. The Company shall not open or disturb the paved surface of any Public Way or Public Ground for any purpose without first having obtained permission from the City, for which the City may impose a reasonable fee. Permit conditions imposed on the Company shall not be more burdensome than those imposed on other utilities for similar facilities or work. The Company may, however, open and disturb the paved surface of any Public Way or Public Ground without permission from the City where an emergency exists requiring the immediate repair of Electric Facilities. In such event the Company shall notify the City by telephone to the office designated by the City before opening or distributing a paved surface of a Public Way or Public Ground. Not later than the second working day thereafter, the Company shall obtain any required permits and pay any required fees.
- After undertaking any work requiring the 3.4 Restoration. opening of any Public Way or Public Ground, the Company shall restore the same, including paving and its foundation, to as good condition as formerly existed, and shall maintain the same in good condition for two years thereafter. The work shall be completed as promptly as weather permits, and if the Company shall not promptly perform and complete the work, remove all dirt, rubbish, equipment and material, and put the Public Way or Public Ground in the said condition, the City shall have, after demand to the Company to cure and the passage of a reasonable period of time following the demand, but not to exceed five days, the right to make the restoration at the expense of the Company. The Company shall pay to the City the cost of such work done for or performed by the City, including its administrative expense and overhead, plus ten percent additional as liquidated damages. This remedy shall be in addition to any other remedy available to the City.
- 3.5 Shared Use of Poles. The Company shall make space available on its poles or towers for City fire, water utility, police or other City facilities whenever such use will not interfere with the use of such poles or towers by the Company, by another electric utility, by a telephone utility, or by any cable television company or other form of communication company. In addition, the City shall pay for any added cost incurred by the Company because of such use by City.

SECTION 4. RELOCATIONS

- 4.1 Relocation of Electric Facilities in Public Ways. Except as provided in Section 4.3, if the City determines to vacate for a City improvement project, or to grade, regrade, or change the line of any Public Way, or construct or reconstruct any City Utility System in any Public Way, it may order the Company to relocate its Electric Facilities located therein. Company shall relocate its Electric Facilities at its own expense. The City shall give the Company reasonable notice of plans to vacate for a City improvement project, or to grade, regrade, or change the line of any Public Way or to construct or reconstruct any City Utility System. If a relocation is ordered within five years of a prior relocation of the same Electrical Facilities, which was made at Company expense, the City shall reimburse Company for non-betterment expenses on a time and material basis, provided that if a subsequent relocation is required because of the extension of a City Utility System to a previously unserved area, Company may be required to make the subsequent relocation at its expense. Nothing in this Ordinance requires Company to relocate, remove, replace or reconnect at its own expense its facilities where such relocation, removal, replacement or reconstruction is solely for the convenience of the City and is not reasonably necessary for the construction or reconstruction of a Public Way or City Utility System or other City improvement.
- 4.2 Relocation of Electric Facilities in Public Ground. Except as may be provided in Section 4.3, City may require the Company to relocate or remove its Electric Facilities from Public Ground upon a finding by City that the Electric Facilities have become or will become a substantial impairment of the public use to which the Public Ground is or will be put. The relocation or removal shall be at the Company's expense. The provisions of 4.2 apply only to Electric Facilities constructed in reliance on a franchise and the Company does not waive its rights under an easement or prescriptive right.
- 4.3 Projects with State or Federal Funding. Relocation, removal, or rearrangement of any Company facilities made necessary because of the extension into or through City of a federally-aided highway project shall be governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 161.46 as supplemented or amended. It is understood that the right herein granted to Company is a valuable right. City shall not order Company to remove, or relocate its facilities when a Public Way is vacated, improved or realigned because of a renewal or a redevelopment plan which is financially subsidized in whole or in part by the Federal Government or any agency thereof, unless the reasonable non-betterment costs of such relocation and the loss and expense resulting therefrom are first paid to Company, but the City need not pay those portions of such for which reimbursement to it is not available.

4.4 <u>Liability</u>. Nothing in the Ordinance relieves any person from liability arising out of the failure to exercise reasonable care to avoid damaging Electric Facilities while performing any activity.

SECTION 5. TREE TRIMMING

The Company may trim all trees and shrubs in the Public Ways and Public Grounds of City interfering with the proper construction, operation, repair and maintenance of any Electric Facilities installed hereunder, provided that the Company shall save the City harmless from any liability arising therefrom, and subject to permit or other reasonable regulation by the City.

SECTION 6. INDEMNIFICATION

- free and harmless from any and all liability on account of injury to persons or damage to property occasioned by the construction, maintenance, repair, inspection, the issuance of permits, or the operation of the Electric Facilities located in the City. The City shall not be indemnified for losses or claims occasioned through its own negligence except for losses or claims arising out of or alleging the City's negligence as to the issuance of permits for, or inspection of, the Company's plans or work. The City shall not be indemnified if the injury or damage results from the performance in a proper manner of acts reasonably deemed hazardous by Company, and such performance is nevertheless ordered or directed by City after notice of Company's determination.
- 6.2 In the event a suit is brought against the City under circumstances where this agreement to indemnify applies, the Company at its sole cost and expense shall defend the City in such suit if written notice thereof is promptly given to the Company within a period wherein the Company is not prejudiced by lack of such notice. If the Company is required to indemnify and defend, it will thereafter have control of such litigation, but the Company may not settle such litigation without the consent of the City, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. This section is not, as to third parties, a waiver of any defense or immunity otherwise available to the City; and the Company, in defending any action on behalf of the City shall be entitled to assert in any action every defense or immunity that the City could assert in its own behalf.

SECTION 7. VACATION OF PUBLIC WAYS

The City shall give the Company at least two weeks' prior written notice of a proposed vacation of a Public Way. Except where required for a City street or other improvement project, the vacation of any Public Way, after the installation of Electric Facilities, shall not operate to deprive Company of its rights to operate and maintain such Electrical Facilities,

until the reasonable cost of relocating the same and the loss and expense resulting from such relocation are first paid to Company. In no case, however, shall City be liable to the Company for failure to specifically preserve a right-of-way, under Minnesota Statutes, Section 160.29.

SECTION 8. CHANGE IN FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Any change in the form of government of the City shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance. Any governmental unit succeeding the City shall, without the consent of the Company, succeed to all of the rights and obligations of the City provided in this Ordinance.

SECTION 9. FRANCHISE FEE

- 9.1 Separate Ordinance. During the term of the franchise hereby granted, and in lieu of any permit or other fees being imposed on the Company, the City may impose on the Company a franchise fee of not more than five percent of the Company's gross revenues as hereinafter defined. The franchise fee shall be imposed by a separate ordinance duly adopted by the City Council, which ordinance shall not be adopted until at least 60 days after written notice enclosing such proposed ordinance has been served upon the Company by certified mail. The fee shall not become effective until at least 60 days after written notice enclosing such adopted ordinance has been served upon the Company by certified mail.
- 9.2 Terms Defined. The term "gross revenues" means all sums, excluding any surcharge or similar addition to the Company's charges to customers for the purpose of reimbursing the Company for the cost resulting from the franchise fee, received by the Company from the sale of electricity to its retail customers within the corporate limits of the City.
- 9.3 Collection of the Fee. The franchise fee shall be payable not less often than quarterly, and shall be based on the gross revenues of the Company during complete billing months during the period for which payment is to be made. The percent fee may be changed by ordinance from time to time; however, each change shall meet the same notice requirements and the percentage may not be changed more often than annually. Such fee shall not exceed any amount which the Company may legally charge to its customers prior to payment to the City by imposing a surcharge equivalent to such fee in its rates for electric service. Company may pay the City the fee based upon the surcharge billed subject to subsequent reductions to account for uncollectibles or customer refunds. The time and manner of collecting the franchise fee is subject to the approval of the Public Utilities Commission, which the Company agrees to use best efforts to obtain. The Company agrees to make its gross revenues records available for inspection by the City at reasonable times.

9.4 Conditions on the Fee. The separate ordinance imposing the fee shall not be effective against the Company unless it lawfully imposes and the City quarterly or more often collects a fee or tax of the same or greater percentage on the receipts from sales of energy within the City by any other energy supplier, provided that, as to such a supplier, the City has the authority to require a franchise fee or to impose a tax. The franchise fee or tax shall be applicable to energy sales for any energy use related to heating, cooling, or lighting, as well as to the supply of energy needed to run machinery and appliances on premises located within or adjacent to the City, but shall not apply to energy sales for the purpose of providing fuel for vehicles.

SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY

If any portion of this franchise is found to be invalid for any reason whatsoever, the validity of the remainder shall not be affected.

SECTION 11. AMENDMENT

This ordinance may be amended at any time by the City passing a subsequent ordinance declaring the provisions of the amendment, which amendatory ordinance shall become effective upon the filing of the Company's written consent thereto with the City Clerk within 90 days after the effective date of the amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 12. PREVIOUS FRANCHISES SUPERSEDED

This franchise supersedes any previous electric franchise granted to the Company or its predecessor.

CRYSTAL DATA PROFILE

- * Crystal has experienced a decline in population from the 1980 figure of 25,543 to an estimated 24,900 in 1988. However, the total number of households has increased from 8,977 households in 1980 to 9,389 in 1988.
- * In 1980, the number of children ages 0-14 in Crystal numbered 5,260 or 20% of the total population.
- * In 1980, Crystal's 55 and older population comprised almost 17% of the total population, at 4,521 senior residents.
- * The number of single-parent households with own children under 18 years of age in Crystal in 1980 was 587 or 7% of total households. Of these households, 510 were headed by women.
- * In 1980, a total of 748 persons lived below the poverty level in Crystal representing 3.0% of the total population.
- * A total of 1,218 Crystal residents were classified as "near poor", living at 125% of the poverty level, in 1980.
- * Only 1.9% of the total population aged 60 and over lived below the poverty in 1980. In comparison, the northwest suburban rate in 1980 was 5.2% of all persons 60 years and older.
- * In 1986, 14.6% of all births in Crystal were to single women and 4.1% of all mothers were ages 19 and under.
- * Of the total 8,977 occupied housing units in Crystal in 1980, 7,000 were or 78% were owner occupied. The total renter occupied units in 1980 were 1,977 or 22% of the housing stock.
- * As of May 1989, Crystal had 10 residential beds possible.
- * Crystal has 192 nursing home beds and 159 market rate rental units possible for its senior population.
- * In 1986, Crystal reported 87 runaway youth. In 1987, 97 Crystal residents were runaways, representing an estimated 2.6% of the total adolescent population.
- * Crystal currently has 77 home-based day care providers and 5 day care centers.
- * In 1988, 1,210 Crystal residents received surplus commodities at an estimated value of \$31,072.91.

- o a way to communicate the concerns of the municipalities regarding human service issues to the providers and involved citizens or the area




SUBURBAN HENNEPIN COUNTY "WORKING POOR" BY COUNCIL PLANNING AREAS

WHAT IS THE NORTHWEST HENNEPIN HUMAN SERVICES COUNCIL?

The Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council is the planning, research and coordinating agency responsible for assessing human service needs in northwest suburban Hennepin County since 1972.

The Council works in the following areas of human services:

- o mental health o chemical abuse o mental retardation
- o child care o domestic abuse o senior services
- o developmental o youth issues o emergency services
 - disabilities o family issues

and other areas related to service delivery such as housing and transportation.

Because of its role in the community, and its relationship with governmental entities, private agencies, and non-profit organizations, the Council is in a unique position to provide broad-based planning and research assistance in the area of human services to organizations, businesses, and municipalities.

PLANNING

Planning services available to municipalities include:

- o Consultation and Technical Assistance
- o Service System Analysis
- o Needs Assessment Research
- o Demographic/Feasibility Research
- o Program Utilization Data
- o Focus Groups

Past projects which the Council has assisted in the planning phases have encompassed a variety of human services. While all the projects would be too numerous to mention, several are worth particular notice: Home Free Shelter for Women and Children, the Northwest Mental Health Center, Emergency Services program for northwest Hennepin County residents, the Food Co-op in Brooklyn Park, and most recently, the Northwest Hennepin County Community Support Program in Crystal.

Through the coordination of area human service networks, the Council is able to create effective communication links among northwest area human service professionals. The following lists a few of the networks sponsored or co-sponsored by the Council:

Child and Family Abuse network, Senior Services Network, Suburban Mental Health Aftercare Providers network, Emergency Assistance Providers Network, and the Northwest Network.

RESEARCH

Research services available to municipalities include:

- o Mail/Telephone Surveys
- o Questionnaire Design
- o Interviewing
- o Data Analysis
- o Program Evaluation
- o Human Service Related Reports

Research is a crucial element in planning and coordinating effective human services delivery in the northwest Hennepin County area. Through numerous internal and external surveys and reports, the Council is able to disseminate vital information to consumers, residents, businesses and municipalities. The Council is also able to assist in survey design and implementation when needed.

COMMUNITY ORGANIZING

Community organizing activities for 1989 include the planning for the development of a runaway youth program located in the northwest Hennepin County area. Runaway statistics indicated a great need for a localized program to assist in addressing the needs of youth and families in crisis. The Council is facilitating a public/private collaborative planning process. The impetus for this planning process came from the community itself and has become an example of the way in which area human service professionals, municipalities, and organizations can work together to address human service issues.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Community outreach is achieved by several methods; through information dissemination, community organizing, and direct services. The Council handles over 1,500 calls for information specific to the northwest suburban planning area. The Council has also promoted community awareness and education through the publication and dissemination of over 75,000 comprehensive human service directories, and over 7,500 specific needs directories, i.e., family violence, chemical dependency, mental retardation, housing resources, and physical disabilities. An estimated 600 annual CSSA Human Service Priority Reports are distributed each year which assist in the planning and coordination efforts of area human service providers. Over 110,000 telephone resource cards were mailed to every household in the northwest area in 1987 and 50,000 updated cards will be distributed during 1989.

In 1987-1988, with a one year grant from Community Action for Suburban Hennepin, the Council sponsored forums for low income residents on food options, renter's rights and responsibilities, and educational opportunities for low income individuals. In 1988-1989, with a special 3 year McKnight grant, two forums will be held; a second free or reduced price food options forum and a forum on child care options.

DIRECT SERVICES ADMINISTRATION

The Council is in an unique position as the planning and coordinating agency for the northwest area. It can recognize unmet needs in the area, as well as provide services to facilitate effective access to residents. Currently, the Council administers two direct services programs, Surplus Commodities Program/Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and Emergency Services Program.

SURPLUS COMMODITIES PROGRAM (TEFAP)

The U.S.D.A. Surplus Commodity Distribution Program is a federally funded program geared to serve lower income residents by providing surplus products, canned and dry goods, on a regular basis throughout the year. While distributions have diminished from 6 a year (1987-1988) to 3 this year (1988-1989), overall participation has not. Approximately 10,000 households in the northwest area receive commodities either directly through the distribution sites and deliveries to homebound people, or indirectly, through the food shelves. Program eligibility is based on income guidelines determined by the State of Minnesota. The Council is responsible for program registration, volunteer coordination, and bookkeeping for northwest Hennepin County.

EMERGENCY SERVICES PROGRAM

The Emergency Services Program is a Hennepin County-funded program designed to assist northwest suburban area residents who are in a short-term financial crisis situation. One-time financial assistance is available through vouchers and through vendor agreements for rent, food, clothing, transportation, short-term shelter, and some for limited utility assistance. An increase in the need for emergency loans for working poor adults has been evident during the past few years as economic conditions have fluctuated. As a result, the Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council sought and received a \$15,000 increase in emergency loan funding for the 1989 fiscal year.

Participating direct service agencies assess the financial requests of northwest residents through their own intake services. These agencies are currently People Responding in Social Ministry (PRISM) (Robbinsdale), Christians Reaching Out in Social Services (CROSS) (Maple Grove), Community Emergency Assistance Program (CEAP) (Brooklyn Center), HomeFree Shelter for Women and Children (Plymouth), and North Suburban Emergency Assistance Response (NEAR) (Crystal). The Council maintains financial records, prepares a variety of service use reports, and meets on a regular basis with direct service agency representatives to maintain service coordination. In 1989, the Council reviewed and updated the procedures manual making it clearer and more informative for use by direct service professionals.

COMMUNITY SOCIAL SERVICES ACT AND NWHHSC

The Community Social Services Act (CSSA) was passed by the State Legislature in 1979, and makes the County Board the responsible agent for ensuring that the necessary human services are provided and that State funds for this purpose are effectively distributed.

The CSSA legislation also requires that the County provide for citizen input into the planning and budget process of the county involving human service programs. Hennepin County has opted to secure citizen input through the eight (8) Human Service Councils in Hennepin County. The Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council is contracted to provide for citizen participation in the Community Social Services Act process for our area.

The role of the Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council in this process is to review data, solicit input from citizens, and through the prioritizing process of the Advisory Commission, make recommendations regarding the planning, development, and delivery of human services in the northwest area.



Out of the above listed administrative dollars, the Council pays for the staff time necessary to administer the programs as well as all other administrative costs such as printing, office supplies, postage, insurance, rent, etc. Over \$55,000 was utilized for one time crisis loans through the Emergency Services Program.

Survey Identifies Need for More Counseling Services

The Northwest Human Services Council is the planning, research and coordinating agency responsible for assessing human service needs in the 15 municipalities of northwest suburban Hennepin County, including Maple Grove.

With the passage of the Community Social Services Act in 1978, citizen input and participation in the Hennepin County budget process became the responsibility of the Hennepin County Human Services Councils.

Because of this legislation, and because one of the Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council's planning responsibilities is to assess area human service needs, an extensive telephone survey was conducted in 1984/85 and again in 1987/88.

As in the 1984/85 survey, results of the current survey indicate a high recognition of parent, child and family issues facing new residents. Levels of support for programs and actual reported incidents problems are consistent with the 1984/85 survey as well

Suburban Head Start task force is formed

For many years, there has been concern among Hennepin County suburban legislators about the availability of Head Start for eligible suburban children.

At a meeting at Plymouth City Hall Aug. 2, a formal Suburban Hennepin Head Start Access Task Force was formed. County Commissioner Tad Jude was elected chair.

"I am enthused that there are so many interested citizens from all corners of suburban Hennepin County who are determined to bring Head Start to assist needy children and families in our area," Jude said.

Head Start is a national child and family development program for low-income preschool children.

"The evidence is clear that money designated to serve our area has been diverted elsewhere," Jude said.

During the past legislative session, efforts were made to raise the issue of the need for more accessible services to rural and suburban children. The task force will look at those efforts and develop strategies.

The task force meeting attracted dozens of concerned citizens and elected officials. Among those present were Sen. Jim Ramstad, Rep. Ann Rest, Mayor Mary Anderson of Golden Valley, Mayor Dean Nyquist of Brooklyn Center and Councilmember Bob Zitur of Plymouth.

Planning begins on Leadership Academy

Patty Wilder considers them an avenue for "breaking down barriers." She's speaking of leadership academies.

Wilder is among a core group organizing the North Hennepin Leadership Academy, which will be offered in the fall. The North Hennepin and Brooklyn Center Chambers of Commerce and North Hennepin Community College are sponsoring the seminars.

Wilder, executive director for the Northwest Human Services Council in Brooklyn Park, and Ron Meyer, general manager of the Promeon Division of Medtronics in Brooklyn Center, are two members of the organizing cabinet that have participated in other leadership academies.

Meyer agrees that the leadership forums offer participants an opportunity to look at issues from a much broader perspective.

"You realize that there are so many important things going on around you that you just don't see," said Meyer, who attended the leadership seminars offered by the Greater Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce two years ago.

Wilder attended leadership acadamies offered by the Humphrey Institute in 1986, and the city of St. Paul in 1981. She says the programs offer a chance to look at others' frame of reference.

"You know there are issues out there," she said, "but they're often hard to understand. These programs allow you to take time out. They take you away from your own worries and make you think

more 'wholistically'. You can't help but become aware of more issues."

Meyer said his program experience included visits with city councils, boards of education, judges, and those involved in the criminal juvenile system, to name a few.

They said the programs offer those who might be leaders some direction for pursuing their civic interests. They said by looking at a variety of issues, the participants can get an idea of causes they might like to get involved with.

The organizing cabinet is in the process of formulating the eight day-long seminars that will be offered once a month through next spring. The topics, so far, include education and the distribution of funding; social issues, like aging and baby-boom trends; justice, concerning crime and safety; and others like transportation, economic development and community financing.

Runaway Youth Initiative program starts with community support

Each year over 800 teenagers are reported runaways from northwest Hennepin County. The average age is 14.

This includes teens from Maple Grove, Osseo, Champlin, Dayton, Rogers, Corcoran, Hassan and other communities.

Questions such as where do these teens go and what kind of community support is first of all available, and secondly needed, are being asked by 36 organizations and 52 members on a planning committee that held its kick off meeting Friday, May 19 at the Sheraton Inn Northwest.

The meeting was attended by 38 representatives from churches, government, corporations, human service agencies, foundations, police departments and schools.

The Runaway Youth Initiative's objective is to explore needed services for runaway youth and ways the community can collaborate in order to provide a runaway youth program in this area.

"Collaboration is no longer a choice in meeting the needs of our communities, it is a necessity for making things happen," Patricia Wilder, executive director of the Northwest Hennepin Human Services Council, host organization of the Initiative, said. She said the planning process is crucial in determining what sort of runaway youth program is needed in the northwest area.

"A program that works in Iowa, or even downtown Minneapolis, may not work here. And without community support it is bound to fail, " she said.

Initiative facilitator Kevin Ander-

son recently completed a study on the needs of runaway youth from the area. The study reveals that there are a number of excellent youth programs in the northwest area, but none of them are designed to assist runaway youth. Currently, there is no sheiter for runaway youth, nor any program that looks at the unique intervention needs of runaway youth, such as conflict resolution and family crisis intervention on a 24 hour basis. Transportation to and from counseling is also currently not being addressed.

MAPLE GROVE POLICE

Maple Grove Police Chief Bob Burlingame spoke of the need for the community to become aware of the runaway youth problem and take action.

He said that juvenile runaways aren't helped by the juvenile justice system since they are classified as a status offense. "These runaways very much need assistance and it's currently not available in our community where we need it."

Deacon of St. Gerard's Church, Del Wilkinson, has had first hand experience in facing the problems of run-a-ways. A girl, who was kicked out of her house by her parents, showed up on his doorstep on Christmas Eve a few years ago. She ended up moving in and living with his family and eventually attending college. Her brother, who was not so lucky, lived in empty garbage cans on his own and eventually ended up in the juvenile justice system.


INVOLVEMENT NEEDED



ORDINANCE NO. 89-

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CHARITABLE GAMBLING: REPEALING CRYSTAL CITY CODE, SUBSECTION 1100.19, SUBDIVISION 11; AMENDING CRYSTAL CITY CODE, SUBSECTION 1100 BY ADDING A SUBDIVISION

THE CITY OF CRYSTAL ORDAINS:

Section 1. Crystal City Code, Subsection 1100.19, Subdivision 11, is repealed.

Sec. 2. Crystal City Code, Section 1100 is amended by adding a subdivision to read as follows:

"Subd. 12. Investigation fees. An organization applying for or renewing a license to conduct lawful gambling in the City must pay an investigation fee of \$250 to the City Clerk. If the fee is not paid the Council will not approve the license under Subdivision 2."

Sec. 3. A tax that has been paid to the City pursuant to Subsection 1100.19, Subdivision 11, repealed hereby, must be refunded by the City Manager to any organization that is in compliance with Subsection 1100.19, Subdivision 8.

Sec. 4. This ordinance is effective in accordance with Crystal City Code, Subsection 110.11.






I have included in the packet, a plan of what they want, copy of part of the sign criteria and letters from Lincoln Properties. I will try to answer any questions on Tuesday night.



SPECIFICATIONS

- Exterior tenant signage at the Crystal Gallery shall consist of store identification only and copy shall be restricted to the Tenant's proper name and major product or service offered. Corporate logos, emblems, shields and similar identifying devices shall be permitted provided they are confined within the signage panel.
- The signs shall be located in the designated sign band area found on elevation drawings attached. Any deviations from these drawings must be upon approval of the building owner and the City of Crystal.
- 3. Tenants are allowed use of individual illuminated letters only. These must follow the detail on construction, 1/004. The special Nu-Lite type illuminated letter can be obtained through the fabricator recommended by the sign consultant. Tenants A, X¹ & Y are allowed the option of typical neon-illuminated letters in place of the Nu-Lite illumination.
- 4. The faces of the letters must all be 3/16" Plexiglas. Color choices must be Rohm & Haas Red #2662, Blue #2114, Orange #2564, Yellow #2037, Green #2030 or White #7328.
- 5. Aluminum sides, top and bottom of letters must be painted white semigloss (Matthews Aryclic Polyurethane SOA-245 or equal). Signage for Tenant A will be an exception with a dark bronze return instead of white.

- 6. Maximum letter height is 24", descenders may drop below letter plane by 4" maximum. An 18" margin must be maintained on both sides of the tenant signage. This margin is already deducted from measurements on the enclosed elevations. All letters must be on a plane that is 9" from the base of the sign band.
- 7. Electrical connection and transformers will be located in the tenant space. Access panels will be provided on the back side of the signage panel and a 3/4" conduit will carry electrical service along the cylindrical window mullions to the transformer.
- 8. Tenant spaces G, H & I shall also have signage areas designated at the Bass Lake Road entrance of the center. Specifications for these illuminated sign cabinets are shown in the detail on Sheet 7 of this document. Cabinets will be provided by Management with graphic costs by the Tenant.
 Backgrounds will be translucent rust vinyl (3M-AGT 409) with cut out letters applied on white plexiglas panels.
