# Public Hearings:

1. Public hearing to consider variance for a detached garage which will encroach into the required 25' side street side yard setback at 4501 Yates Avenue North. I have reviewed this variance request at length with the Building Inspector. It appears there really is no reason why there should be a variance granted on this property. Apparently the older gentleman who is requesting it made a good sell to the Planning Commission and they felt sympathy or empathy for him and agreed to vote for the variance but it is not required to build a garage. I would recommend that we reject the variance.

2. Continuance of public hearing for non-conformity and parking variances for an outside cafe at Steve O's, 4900 West Broadway. I would like to begin by saying that I like sidewalk cafes. I think they are neat. I wish we had one in Crystal but at the same time I think to grant this particular application virtually renders our parking ordinance unenforceable if somebody else wants to challenge us. I don't know how we can require other people to provide adequate parking, etcetera, when we don't require it in a case like this. I think in spite of whatever Steve says there is going to be additional customers otherwise I'd like to have him explain to me why he is going to spend all the money and effort to do this if he is not going to attract additional customers. I'd recommend that the Council deny the request.

#### Regular Agenda:

2. Consideration of appointments to the Economic Development Advisory Commission. Council should be aware that if the appointments that the Mayor is recommending are made that some of the appointees, by ordinance, will have to resign from the commissions they are on. I don't believe some of them are prepared to do that. It seems to me that we need to clarify that issue with those people and in Council's own minds before we go ahead with these appointments. We've talked to Dave about it and he feels that the ordinance applies in this case as it does with any other advisory commission. It doesn't apply with some statutory commissions but the EDA Advisory Commission is not a

statutory commission, it is an advisory commission created by ordinance.

- 3. Consideration of stop sign petition for intersections at 45th and Adair and 45th and Brunswick. I'd recommend that the Council refer this to the Public Works Director for recommendation.
- 4. Consideration of a petition from residents regarding rental property at 4501 Adair Avenue North. The Police Department, Building, Health, etcetera, are already looking at the property for possible violations and will take corrective action if there are violations. Painting and some of the other things mentioned in the petition, we have no ordinance or regulation on. We can't enforce something that is not covered by ordinance, code, etcetera.
- 5. Consideration of a resolution recommending continued support of West Hennepin Community Center. This again is part of the County's budget shuffle in the Human Services Department and I would recommend that we adopt the resolution so they really have to take a tough look at their budget and not just abolish all the contract services that they have.
- 6. Consideration of S.A.F.E. Award Program for employees in street, park, water/sewer, maintenance, police, and volunteer firefighters. Nancy Gohman, Administrative Assistant, who handles our safety program and the safety committee has designed this program to reward employees for their safe work for the City. Savings to the City in the form of reduced workers' comp premiums will more than offset any rewards that we pay. I would recommend that we approve the program. Nancy will be present to discuss it with the Council.
- 7. Consideration of a resolution on easement acquisition for Medicine Lake Road improvement. Mark Hanson, Engineer from New Hope, will be present to discuss the easements and the whole project in general with the Council so if you have any questions be prepared to ask them of Mark.
- 10. Discussion of request from the Fire Department for an increase in pension and salary. Attached find a memo from myself, a memo from Miles Johnson, and several other attachments relative to the request for pension and salary increases. I realize that the amounts I am recommending are substantially less than what is being requested but I believe they are fair and reasonable based on comparisons with numerous other organizations. I think we have to look at the good of the whole City here, not just individuals on the Fire Department who we might know and like. They're all good people but we're here to run a business, not give away taxpayers funds. I think we are being fair with the recommendation that I make and I would like to have the Council approve it.

- 12. Consideration of Exclusive Negotiations Agreement between the Crystal Economic Development Authority and the Anthony Center Partnership. You have a copy of the agreement in your agenda packet. We are reviewing that and we will have a recommendation for you at the meeting.
- 14. Consideration of a resolution convassing the vote and declaring the results of the General Municipal Election. State law requires that the Council convass the vote within a certain time period after the election. This meeting falls within that time period and we would recommend that the Council approve the resolution canvassing the vote.
- 15. Consideration of Resolution #4246 of the Robbinsdale City Council regarding light rail transit station in Golden Valley. I really think that Robbinsdale is over reacting to this but at the same time I can understand their point. I guess without spending a lot of time and effort getting into the fray between Golden Valley and Minneapolis or Golden Valley, Robbinsdale, and the County, I would recommend that we pass a simple action supporting Robbinsdale.
- 16. Discussion on the 1990 Proposed Legislative Polices and Priorities of League of Minnesota Cities. I would like the Council to appoint a delegate and an alternate amongst the people going to the League's meeting to adopt the legislative policies. I plan to go to that. I don't know who else is going but I think we should have a delegate and an alternate so that there are two people who are authorized to vote for the City.
- 17. Consideration of an interim appointment of Holmes and Graven and the continuance of David J. Kennedy as the City Attorney for the City of Crystal. I recommend that we approve the interim appointment of Homes and Graven and Dave as the City Attorney until such time that we finish going through the RFP's and deciding on a City Attorney on a permanent basis.
- 18. Discussion of increase in health and life insurance contribution for non-union employees. You have a memo from myself relative to this along with information on the increase. I would recommend that we go ahead and approve this so that we can begin giving this to the non-union employees effective on January 1. I think it will be a help to us in our negotiations with the unions to already have the non-union people contribution taken care of.

Mr. Anthony Piasecki is requesting a variance of 5' to the required 25' setback of a detached garage from a side street side yard. The original 14'x20' garage was setback at 20' but both the garage and slab are being removed.

The lot is non-conforming due to lot depth being below minimum and total lot area being 1027 square feet short of 7500 square feet required. In 1980 Mr. Piasecki requested a variance for the nonconforming lot to build a 8'x16' three season porch. That was granted July, 1980.

In checking the site today, I found there to be no reason why the building couldn't be moved back 5'. I also found that there is a 5' drainage and utility easement along the rear line so the proposed garage will need to be at least 5' from rear property line to any portion of structure. By moving the garage back to the 25' setback it would line up the end of the original house and front of the garage.

November 1, 1989

UPDATE: This request was discussed at length at the Planning Commission and passed on a 6-3 vote. The Planning Commission findings were that the variance was minimal, it is where the existing garage was, and others are the same. I still maintain that since the old garage is gone, the old slab is being removed, and a totally new garage and slab is to be installed, there is really no reason for a variance. The existing garage slab is already sitting on the drainage and utility easement so the new slab will need to be moved 3 feet east. This building as proposed would then clear the existing hedge and could be moved back 5 feet to give 25' off south side street side yard property line.

Dear Mayor Herbes and Council members:

On Wednesday, November 8, 1989, I will ask for your final approval of the variances and license modifications permitting me to operate an outdoor cafe at Steve - O's, 4900 West Broadway in Crystal. Your action will conclude a lengthy process that has resolved the issues pertaining to the safe operation of the outdoor cafe. In this process, I have met with you, your staff, and with Hennepin County officials, to answer the questions you have raised. I will be present at your meeting to answer any questions you may have. In the paragraphs that follow, I have addressed the primary concerns raised during this process.

Expansion of a non-conforming use. At your request, I have reduced the number of tables from 25 to 15. Further, I have obtained the consent of the adjacent liquor store business for my patrons to freely use its parking areas during its non-business hours. Because I have always experienced a seasonal drop in patronage in the Summer during the hours the outdoor cafe will operate, my present parking capacity will adequately handle any additional business attracted by the outdoor cafe.

Encroachment and liability issues re private use of a public sidewalk. Your staff raised a number of questions about our proposal to place tables on a portion of the public sidewalk, primarily concerning the convenience and safety of the patrons and pedestrians who use the sidewalk. Because Mr. Monk informed me that he was concerned about Hennepin County approval of the proposal, I contacted the County and obtained the Board of Commissioners' approval for the use of the sidewalk. (Letter attached) Further, by agreeing not to place tables on either side of the building beyond the parking entrances, I have eliminated the need for my serving staff to cross the driveways to deliver food and beverages. This change significantly reduced the length of the public sidewalk upon which we will place tables. I will also, at my cost, widen the sidewalk by 5 feet on either end of the building between the building and the driveways. This area is presently sloped and blacktopped. This expansion not only provides more room for pedestrians, but also insures that a service area can be located near the tables without taking any existing parking space. I will provide liability insurance as required by law including general liability limits of \$300,000.

Health issues. All food will continue to be prepared in the kitchen and bussed to the cafe areas. Dirty dishes and food waste will be promptly collected and bussed to the dish-washing area inside the restaurant. Servers will continuously monitor the outside areas including the sidewalk, street and parking lot to insure that any litter is promptly collected and removed. I believe that we will utilize nonbreakable dishes and glassware in the outdoor cafe operation.

Noise and litter (neighborhood concerns). During the first year (1990) of operation, the cafe will close outside service and consumption of food and beverage at 9:00 p.m. Beginning in the second year (1991) of operation, closing time will be extended to 11:30 p.m. on a probationary basis with a careful watch for noise and litter problems that might occur. My maintenance employees are in the restaurant each night from 12:30 a.m. until 7:00 a.m. and will routinely check and police the outside area. I want to stay in communication with the nearby residents who have expressed concerns about the cafe's operation. I intend to be a good neighbor. If there are no unresolved complaints or problems during this second year, the later closing time will be adopted.

**Lighting.** New floodlights will be installed on each end of the building adding illumination to the table and bar service areas as well as the parking lot. This will increase the level of safety for both patrons and the occasional passerby.

I believe I have addressed each of the concerns which you and your staff have raised. I appreciate your assistance in revising this proposal and your support for the outdoor cafe.

SUBJECT: Outside Cafe at SteveO's at 4900 West Broadway

The owner of SteveO's lounge has applied for variances associated with establishment of an outside cafe as noted on the attached site plan and discussed in the staff memorandum dated June 16. Specifically the variances are as follows:

- Variance to expand a non-conforming use (bar/restaurant in an industrial area) and structure (insufficient setback) pursuant to Section 515.05 of the Zoning Code.
- 2) Variance of 24 parking stalls (approximately one per table) pursuant to Section 515.09, Subd. 8 v) of the Zoning Code. This would be in addition to the 28 stall variance previously approved in 1984 and currently in effect.

I will be prepared to review existing conditions as well as details of the cafe proposal with the Commission on Monday night. A representative of the owner will also be attendance.

#### 9/12/89 UPDATE

On September 11 the Planning Commission recommended denial of the above-described variances. While the Commission noted the outside cafe was a novel concept for Crystal, numerous concerns were voiced regarding the use of limited public right-of-way for such a purpose. In their findings on the variances the Commission noted hardship was all related to the site's non-conformity and that economic gain was not proper justification to allow the proposed expanded use.

#### 11/1/89 UPDATE

If the City Council is inclined to approve the non-conformity expansion and parking variances described above and represented on the site plan of October 19, 1989, with 15 tables, the following conditions are recommended at a minimum:

 Both variances be issued for a one-year time period with renewal required to continue the use. Approval Page 2

shall include issuance of a permit to use a portion of the public sidewalk for operation of a cafe.

- 2) An insurance certificate covering public liability in the amount of \$1,000,000 be filed with the City naming Crystal as additionally insured.
- 3) The owner/operator furnish Crystal with a waiver of liability to indemnify the City in relation to operation of the cafe.
- 4) The cafe be prohibited from operating after 9 p.m.
- 5) Usage of the cafe shall be associated with dining and not an extension of the bar for drinking only.
- 6) Owner/operator shall secure approval from Hennepin County to use the right-of-way of West Broadway for the cafe operation.
- 7) Owner/operator shall apply for an amended liquor license covering the outside cafe area.
- 8) City maintains the right to review the cafe use if upgrade of West Broadway is pursued by Hennepin County.
- 9) Tables 1, 2, 13, 14 and 15 be moved back onto the new proposed concrete walk to minimize use of public sidewalk.
- 10) Outside lighting be arranged to minimize impact on passing traffic and be turned off when cafe is closed.
- 11) Owner/operator be charged with litter patrol of area on a daily basis.
- 12) Tables and chairs to be removed from site during offseason periods.

Crystal is reviewing a proposal for an outside cafe at SteveO's located at 4900 West Broadway (County Road 8). As noted on the attached site plan, the proposal involves placement of tables that will straddle the sidewalk which is in Hennepin County right-of-way. Prior to Crystal taking final action on this item from a land use perspective, the following questions must be answered by Hennepin County:

- 1) Is use of public right-of-way by a private interest acceptable to the County in this situation? If so, is some type of formal approval (including any conditions) required?
- 2) If the use is acceptable, do future plans for the upgrading of County Road 8 in this area impact the proposed use?

I am not sure if Hennepin County has set policies in terms of right-of-way use as related to public safety, liability, and/or improvement projects. Your response to the questions posed above at your earliest convenience is appreciated.

SUBJECT: Steve O's Proposal for an Outside Cafe

A proposal has been submitted by Steve O's at 4900 West Broadway to establish an outside cafe consisting of approximately 12 to 14 tables. Due to the proximity of the building to the property line along West Broadway, the tables are proposed to be located on the public sidewalk.

Based on a quick review of the proposal, the following issues have been identified:

- The seasonal increase in seating capacity is an expansion of a non-conforming use (I-2 Zoning) and structure (setbacks). A variance to expand a non-conforming situation is required by Section 515.05 of the Zoning Code. Further, a parking variance is also required although the seasonal nature makes the situation difficult in establishing the actual number of spaces needed.
- Hennepin County will be required to approve the use of their right-of-way for this private purpose. Safety and liability will be major concerns.
- Crystal will need to approve use of the public sidewalk for this purpose as the sidewalk is maintained and regulated by the City. In dealing with similar situations in the past, the City has not allowed use of public or private sidewalks for extended business use based on safety concerns given the narrow (5') width of most sidewalk sections.
- Crystal will be required to modify Steve O's liquor license to include the cafe area and portions of public right-of-way impacted by the operation.
- Liability issues related to use of public property for a private use and modification of the liquor license to include right-of-way need to be closely scrutinized prior to any final approval.
- Although I have not had an opportunity to discuss the proposal with members of the Health Department, I believe health-related issues would revolve around food preparation and service.

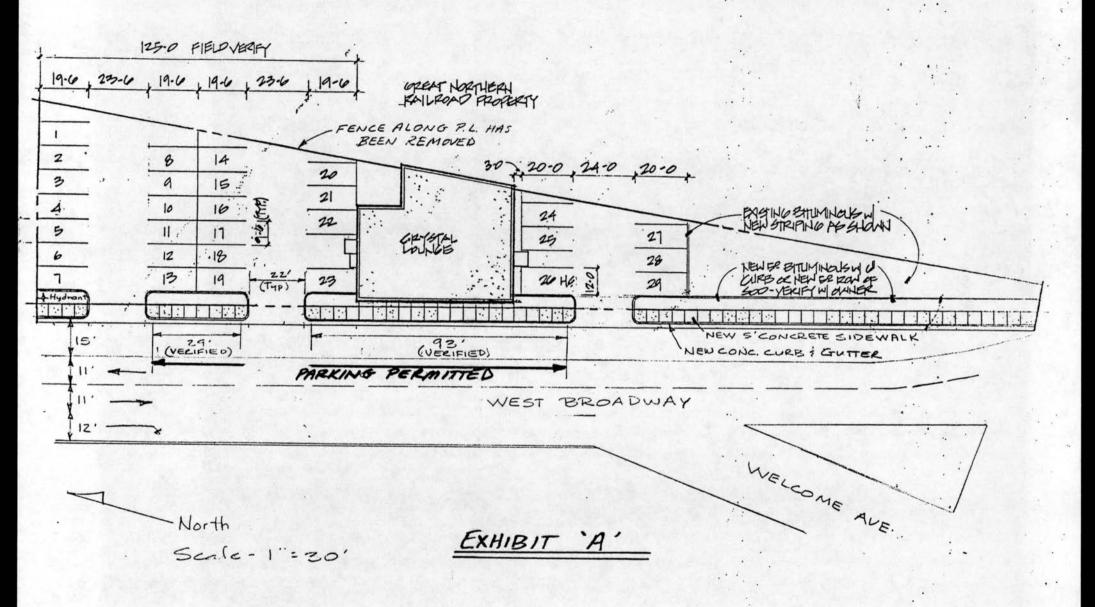

As we discussed, the City Council is not in a position to approve the cafe proposal on Tuesday night. Ordinance provisions require Planning Commission review and public hearings on the variances related to the non-conformity and parking.

The issues associated with use of the sidewalk and modification of the liquor license, however, go well beyond the Planning Commission's review authority. I recommend the Council discuss the proposal in terms of these City issues at this time. If past policy is maintained, there is then little reason to pursue the planning-related issues.

RE: EDA Advisory Commission appointments

On October 17, 1989 the Mayor continued the EDA Advisory Commission appointments to the November 8, 1989 meeting. Since that time I have received Art Cunningham's application and an application has gone out to a resident of Ward 3, but has not yet been returned.

Some of the applicants are members of a City commission at the present time, which means if they are appointed to the EDA Advisory Commission, vacancies would be created on those commissions. I suggest the portion of the ordinance regarding Membership and Terms of Office for Boards and Commissions and the portion addressing the Economic Development Advisory Commission be included in the Council packets for their assistance in making these decisions. I will also include a copy of each application received to date.

Please advise if you want it handled differently.

### Section 305 - Administrative Code; Boards and Commissions

- 305.01. Charter Authority. Section 2.02 of the Charter of the City of Crystal authorizes the City Council to create such advisory boards and commissions as it deems necessary. The boards and commissions set forth in this Section are created pursuant to that authority and pursuant to applicable state law. (Amended Ord. No. 76.2, Sec. 1)
- 305.03. Advisory Nature. Except as otherwise provided by law or charter, the boards and commissions created by this Section are advisory to the Council, and to the City Manager, in all matters pertinent to the duties of the Council and the Manager, but the boards and commissions have no other official status or independent authority. All such boards and commissions are referred to in this Section as "Advisory Commissions." (Amended Ord. No. 76.2, Sec. 2)
- 305.05. Compensation. Unless otherwise provided by law or charter, members of advisory commissions serve without compensation, but they may be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses if funds for that purpose are identified in the adopted City budget. (Amended Ord. No. 76.2, Sec. 3)
- 305.06-.43. (Repealed, Ord. No. 76.2, Sec. 3)
- 305.45. Membership and Terms of Office. Subdivision 1. Eligibility. Members of Advisory Commissions must be residents of the City. Except as otherwise expressly provided in this Section, a person serving on an advisory commission may apply for and be appointed to another advisory commission, but on the effective date of the appointment to the second commission, the office of the member on the first commission is vacant. (Amended, Ord. No. 76.4, Sec. 1; Ord. No. 86-17, Sec. 1)
- Subd. 2. <u>Terms</u>. Members of the advisory commissions are appointed for a term of three years. (Amended, Ord. No. 86-17, Sec. 1)

Terms of members commence on January 1 of the year in which they are appointed and continue until a successor is appointed and qualified. (Amended, Ord. No. 77-1, Sec. 1; Ord. No. 85-17, Sec. 1; Ord. No. 86-17, Sec. 1)

- Subd. 3. (Repealed, Ord. No. 77-1, Sec. 3)
- 305.47. Appointment, Application, Reappointment, Notification. Subdivision 1. Appointment. Members of advisory commissions are appointed by the City Council.
- Subd. 2. Applications. Applications for appointment to an advisory commission shall be submitted in writing to the City Manager, who shall arrange for the applicant's appearance before the City Council if a vacancy on that particular commission is to be filled. The City Manager shall forward a copy of all applications to the Chairperson of the respective commission.
- Subd. 3. Reappointment. A member of an advisory commission desiring reappointment upon expiration of his or her term shall notify the City Council of such intention at least 30 days prior to the expiration date of such term.

shall cause all Statutes of the State of Minnesota, Regulations of the Board of Health, and Ordinances of the City of Crystal, relating to public health to be obeyed and enforced. Although it shall be the duty of the Board of Health and the Health Officer to see that all Statutes of the State of Minnesota, Regulations of the State Board of Health, and Ordinances of the City of Crystal are obeyed and enforced, the actual enforcement of these laws, regulations, and ordinances shall be the duty and responsibility of the City Manager or his duly authorized representative.

- Subd. 2. Duties of the Board. The duties of the Board of Health and the Health Officer shall be as defined in the Statutes of the State of Minnesota and the Regulations of the State Board of Health. The Board of Health shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Health Officer and the City Manager in making recommendations concerning the general health program within the City. The Board shall have no authority to incur any obligations or make any expenditures without the approval of the City Council.
- Subd. 3. Membership. The Board of Health for the City consists of eight members. Seven members shall be the members of the City Council. One member shall be a physician, licensed to practice in the State of Minnesota, who shall be appointed by the City Council and who shall serve as the City Health Officer and executive officer of the Board of Health. The Health Officer shall serve until his resignation or until a successor is appointed.
- Subd. 4. Meetings of the Board. The Board of Health shall meet at such times as it may deem necessary. A majority of the members constitutes a quorum. The Health Officer shall act as the executive officer of the Board. The Board shall make such regulations as they deem necessary for their meetings and for the conduct of their business.
- Subd. 5. Administration. The City Manager, or his duly authorized representative, shall make such investigations and reports, and obey such directions concerning communicable diseases as the Board of Health may require or give; and, under the general supervision of the Board of Health, they shall cause all Statutes of the State of Minnesota, Regulations of the State Board of Health, Ordinances of the City of Crystal, relating to public health, and all lawful orders of the City Council to be obeyed and enforced.
- Subd. 6. Right of Entry. For the purposes of performing their official duties, all members, officers, and employees of the Board of Health, the Health Officer and their duly authorized representatives shall have the right to enter any building, conveyance, or place where contagion, infection, filth, nuisance, or source or cause of preventable disease exists or is reasonably suspected. (Ord. No. 76.2, Sec. 4)
- 305.75. Economic Development Advisory Commission. Subdivision 1. Purpose. The Economic Development Advisory commission is established to assist and advise the City Council and the Economic Development Authority of the City of Crystal in matters relating to the economic development and redevelopment of the City.

- Subd. 2. Membership. The Commission consists of ten members as follows:
- a) two members who own businesses in the City (these members need not be residents of the City);
- two members who are also members of the planning advisory commission (if either of these members terminate their membership on the planning commission, their membership on this commission ceases);
- c) one member over the age of 55;
- d) one member from each of the four wards of the City; and
- e) one member at large.

Subd. 3. Appointments. In making appointments to the Commission the City Council must give consideration to the special qualifications of members who have experience and expertise in the areas of business, finance, economics and other fields related to the subject of economic development and redevelopment. (Amended, Ord. No. 89-17, Sec. 1)

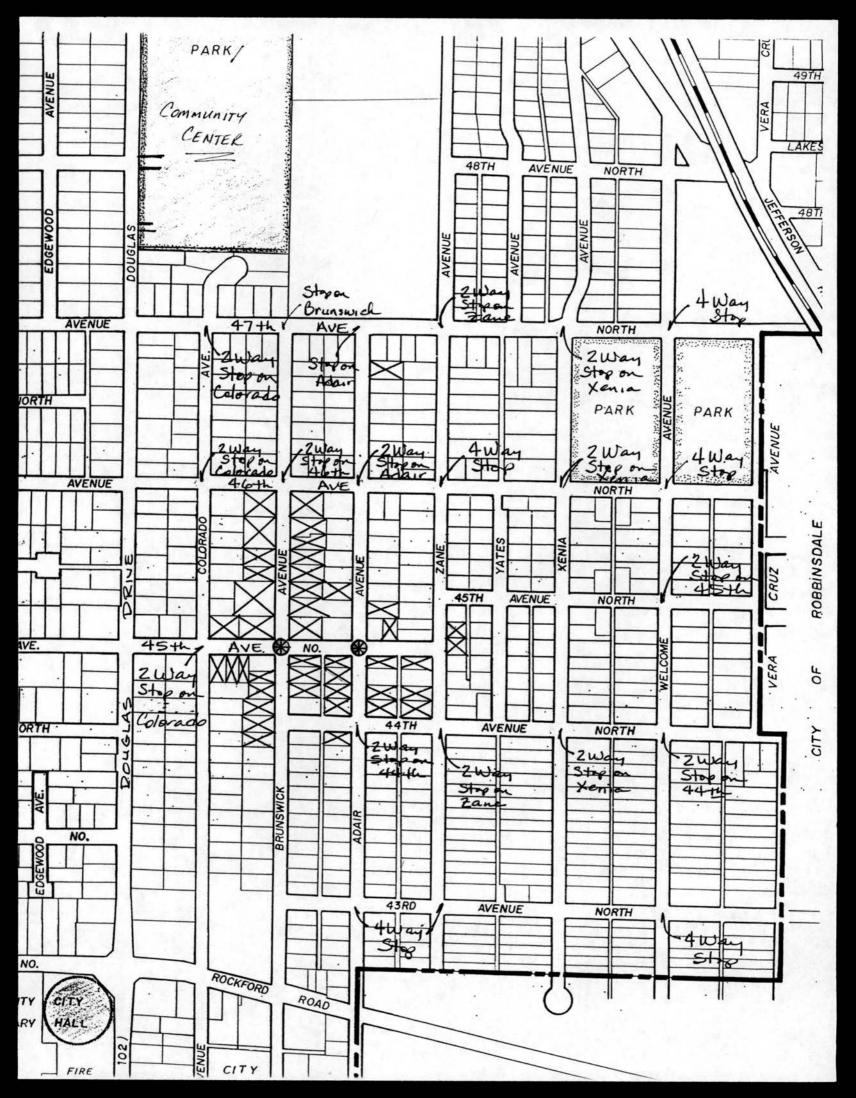
SUBJECT: Stop Sign Petition

In reviewing the situations described on the attached petition, it is evident Brunswick Avenue North is used as a cutthrough route between 42nd and 47th Avenues. Additionally, sight restrictions do impact the intersection at Adair and 45th Avenues. However, as I have stated in the past, fourway stop situations should be used sparingly and only in instances where the number of vehicular/pedestrian conflicts meet State warrants. Motorists will routinely disregard stop signs where conflicts are not anticipated.

It is my recommendation that a two-way stop be installed on Brunswick Avenue at 45th Avenue and on 45th Avenue at Adair Avenue. I believe these installations will have an impact on controlling the traffic movements without causing a new set of problems.

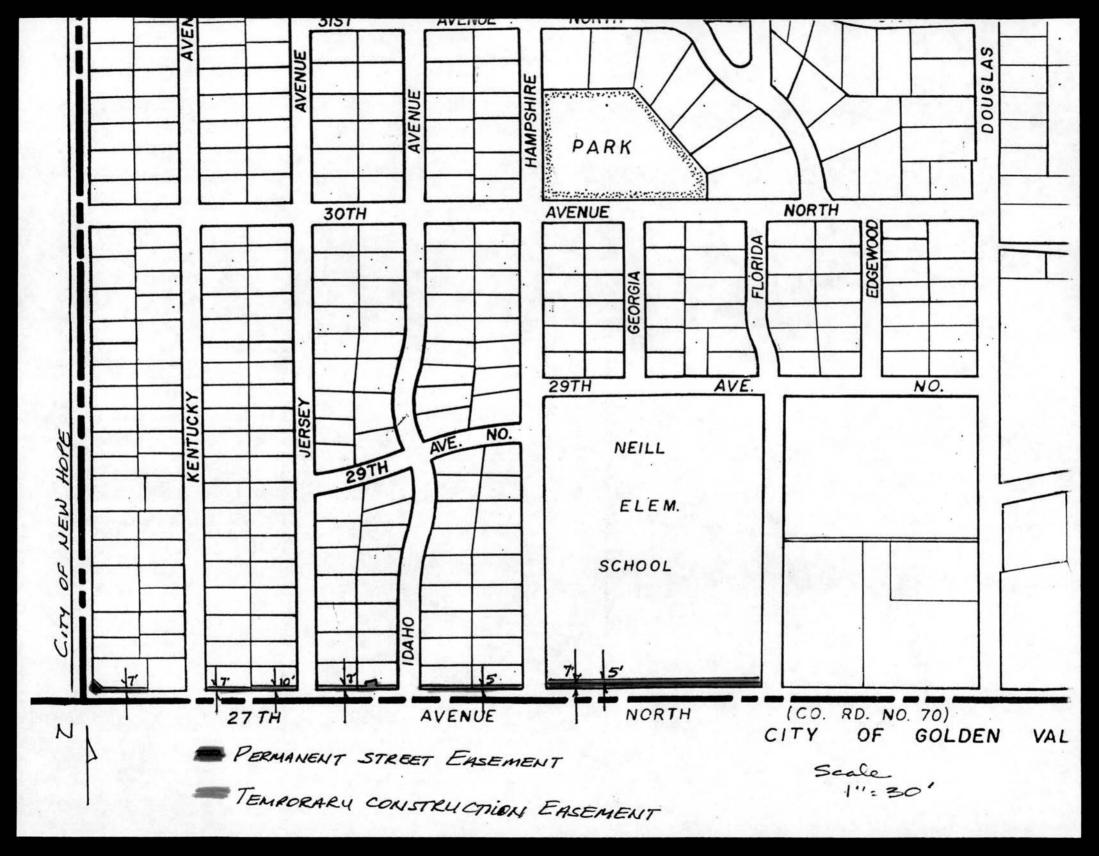

WHEREAS, the City of Crystal (hereafter City) in conjunction with the County of Hennepin and the Cities of New Hope and Golden Valley pursuant to a Joint Powers Agreement propose to construct and improve State Aid Highway No. 70, commonly known as Medicine Lake Road, and

WHEREAS, the City has identified this project as Crystal Street Improvement Project No. 89-1, and

WHEREAS, Bonestroo, Rosene, Anderlik and Associates, acting as the lead engineers for the joint project have prepared a September 26, 1988 feasibility report indicating that the project is feasible from an engineering standpoint, and

WHEREAS, the feasibility report was duly presented and accepted by the Crystal City Council, and

WHEREAS, the project provides for the reconstruction of Medicine Lake Road between State Highway 169 (Old County Road 18) and Douglas Avenue North. The reconstruction includes upgrading said road from an existing two lane roadway to a 48 foot wide four lane roadway pursuant to plans and specifications prepared in accordance with State Aid Standards. The project will also include the following improvements:

- A 5' wide concrete sidewalk along each side of the roadway constructed within the existing right-of-way or easements acquired as part of the project.
- The removal of the temporary signals at Hillsboro Avenue and Nevada Avenue and upgraded to permanent signals.
- The removal of the existing bridge over the Soo Line Railroad and constructing an at grade crossing with signals and gates, and

WHEREAS, said improvements as herein described are hereby determined as necessary to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the traveling public, and

WHEREAS, temporary construction easements and permanent right—of—way or street easements described in the attached Exhibit A are required to provide for said construction and are hereby determined as reasonably necessary and convenient to the furtherance of the project, and

WHEREAS, it is further determined that the acquisition of said easements will provide for and promote the health, safety and welfare of the traveling public, and

WHEREAS, the City has the authority to acquire private property for right-of-way or street easements pursuant to Minn. Stat. §412.221, and

WHEREAS, the City has the authority to acquire the right-of-way or street easements prior to the filing of an award by the court appointed commissioners, pursuant to Minn. Stat. \$117.011 and 117.042, and

WHEREAS, Federal Aid Urban Funding (FAU) has been authorized for this project and that the use of said funding requires the City to make a direct offer of purchase for the acquisition of the described easements prior to acquisition by eminent domain proceedings, and

WHEREAS, appraisals have been or will be completed by an independent fee appraiser and review appraiser to determine the fair market value of the required easements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Crystal as follows:

- 1. That the City Manager or any person designated by the City Manager is hereby directed to make direct offers of purchase to all owners of the property for acquisition of temporary construction and permanent right-of-way or street easements described in the attached Exhibit A in the amounts determined by the fee appraiser as the fair market value of said easements.
- 2. In the event the acquisition of said easements by direct purchase are not successfully completed within 30 days of the date said offers are made, the City Manager or his designated representatives are hereby authorized to acquire the easements described in the attached Exhibit A by the power of eminent domain in the manner provided by Minn. Stat. Chapter 117, as amended.
- 3. The City Council does hereby determine it necessary to proceed without delay to take title and possession of the property described in attached Exhibit A prior to the filing of an award by court appointed commissioners pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§412.221, 117.011 and 117.042.

Department

Based on comparison and analysis the information available I recommend that we make some adjustments in the pension and salary of the part-time firefighters.

#### Monthly Benefit

If you look at Attachment Two, columns 6 - 8, you see that the department is now at \$15/month/year of service and they are requesting an increase to \$17.00. However, if you look at Attachments Four and Five you note two things:

First of all, if you look at column four of Attachment Four, you find that the average per month per year of service benefit is only \$16.25 for the local communities. If you average the total survey group the per month per year of service is \$16.38.

If you further examine Attachment Five you note that in most cases if a city of fire organization offers high monthly benefits then don't offer lump sum payouts or the are generally lower. Conversely you'll note that if the organization provides for a large lump sum the monthly benefit isn't allowed or is lower. If you look at Attachment Four again you will note also that Brooklyn Center doesn't pay any call pay but has higher benefits. In effect they use the money they save on call pay, drill pay, etc. to increase benefits. Bloomington does the same things and in some other communities do likewise. My point being that a city typically can only afford to pay high benefits or salaries but can't afford to be high in both salary and pension benefit.

### Lump Sum Benefit

Again, please look at Attachment Four. Column Five of Attachment Four shows the average of the local communities and for the total survey group.

If you take the average of the local communities and the average of the total survey group you come up with approximately \$40,000 for 20 years and \$60,000 for 30 years.

## Compensation or Salary Increase Request, Duty Pay

Please refer to Attachments Two and Four. On Attachment Two you can see what the local communities average paying for salary for

firefighters and officers for fires and drills. Attachment Four indicates that the average pay per call is \$7.27 for firefighters, \$7.67 for officers and drill pay is \$6.45 for firefighters and \$6.53 for officers. Duty pay for local communities is on Attachment Two and the average is on Attachment Four. The average is \$22.20 per shift.

#### Conclusions and Recommendations

Based on the information attachment and the analysis of that information I'm recommending to the Council that we make changes in the part time firefighters pension and salary as follows:

I would further recommend that the Council not consider another increase that would become effective before 1992.

I realize the increases are somewhat less that the part-time firefighters have requested but on the other hand I think they are substantial increases and are more in line with what the City can afford and with what the average community pays, not what the highest community around pays.

Proposed Pension Increases

I have reviewed the proposals for retirement increases for the Crystal Fire Relief Association. In conjunction with those proposals, I have also reviewed the results of the survey originally prepared by the City of Columbia Heights and updated to include cities in the general vicinity of Crystal. The following is my analysis of each.

#### Current Plan Benefits Compared to Proposed

Attachment 1 is a summary of the current benefit plan and the proposed benefit plans for the Fire Relief Association. This summary breaks down the monthly benefit, lump-sum benefit, and the survivors benefits for 20 and 30 years of service separately.

In the past, increases have always included retirees, as do the current proposed plans. The increases in the monthly benefits would effect only those retirees who had elected the monthly benefit upon retirement. Retirees who chose the lump-sum settlement at retirement would receive no benefit from the proposed plans.

Based on age and years of service as of December 31, 1989, there is one fire relief member eligible to retire in 1990, one in 1991 and three in 1992.

If each of the individuals eligible for retirement, retire and elect a lump-sum settlement at retirement, there would be a liquidation of the associations assets totaling \$360,000 over the next three years. If these individuals take that settlement and invest it at 10% (rates currently being obtained on certain investments), the individual would earn interest at a rate where the interest could be withdrawn monthly, without ever touching the principle portion. (See interest only line on Attachment 1).

If each of the retirees elected the monthly benefit at retirement, the cost on an annual basis would be minimal compared to lump-sum settlements. In addition, the association would not have to liquidate assets that are earning interest and accumulating over time to make large lump-sum payments. With the monthly benefit, the retirees would still be eligible for future increases or escalations in the monthly settlement, whereas those who selected the lump-sum would not.

#### Summary of Fire Relief Association Survey

Out of the survey prepared by the City of Columbia Heights and updated by Crystal, I have extracted the information contained in attachment 2, for the cities in the vicinity for direct comparison purposes. The intent is to maintain comparability with surrounding communities.

In addition to the information that can be found on the final survey, I have included a number of factors that I feel are necessary to review when comparing the relief associations of surrounding communities. These additional factors such as payments made to firemen on a quarterly basis for call pay, drill pay and duty pay which some communities pay for all duty and others pay for only a portion of the time put in.

I have also accumulated information on the average dollars a firefighter receives on a quarterly basis from call pay as well as duty pay. I have compiled this information for the last seven fiscal quarters. As Attachment 3 indicates, over the last seven quarters, a firefighter receives and average of \$243.41 per quarter for call pay and an additional \$35.83 for duty pay.

THIS AGREEMENT, dated this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_,
1989 by and between The Economic Development Authority of the
City of Crystal, MN (EDA), a Minnesota public body corporate
and politic, and the Anthony Shopping Center Partnership (The
Developer) and the City of Crystal, Minnesota, a Minnesota
municipal corporation (City):

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the EDA desires to promote development and redevelopment in the 36th and 100 area of the City (Project Area) in accordance with a Redevelopment Plan and Tax Increment Financing Plan all in accordance with appropriate Minnesota statutes, and

WHEREAS, a preliminary area has been identified by the Developer proposing the construction (development) of a shopping complex in the Project Area, and

WHEREAS, the City has reviewed proposals in the past for the redevelopment of the site, and

WHEREAS, the City has conducted preliminary studies on the desirability of redevelopment of the Project Area and has determined to proceed to establish the Project Area in accordance with applicable State laws, and

WHEREAS, the EDA and the City have determined that it is in the best interests of the City, the EDA and the redevelopment of the Project Area that the Developer be designated sole developer of the Project Area during the term of this Agreement, and

WHEREAS, the EDA and the Developer are willing and desirous to undertake the redevelopment of the Project Area if: (1) the Anthony Shopping Center Partnership add an experienced financially capable commercial development partner(s). This development partner will be subject to approval by the City, (2) a satisfactory agreement can be reached for the EDA and City's commitment for the public improvements necessary in the Project Area, (3) satisfactory mortgage and equity financing for the Development can be secured by the Developer, and (4) the economic feasibility and soundness of the Project and other necessary preconditions have been determined to the satisfaction of the parties:

NOW, THEREFORE in consideration of the mutual covenants of the parties hereto, each agrees as follows:

Page Two Negotiation Agreement

- Negotiations among the parties shall proceed in an attempt to formulate a definitive development contract (Contract) based on the following:
  - a. The developer add an experienced and financially capable commercial development partner(s). This partnership shall be subject to approval by the City of Crystal.
  - b. A proposal (plan) which shows the scope of the proposed Development be submitted within the term of this agreement.
  - c. A mutually satisfactory Contract be negotiated and agreed upon in accordance with negotiations contemplated by this Agreement.
  - d. Such documentation regarding economic feasibility of the Project as the EDA may wish to undertake during the term of this Agreement.
  - e. Other terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 2. It is the intention of the parties that this Agreement:
  (a) documents the present understanding and commitments of
  the parties and (b) will lead to negotiation and execution of
  a mutually satisfactory Contract for the Project prior to the
  termination date of this Agreement. The Contract (together
  with any other agreements entered into between the parties
  hereto contemporaneously therewith) when executed, will
  supersede all obligations of the parties hereunder.
- 3. This Agreement is for a term ending one year from its date, unless extended by mutual agreement of the parties. If a Contract is not negotiated and executed within that term or any extension, no party shall have incurred any obligation or liability to any other party hereunder.
- 4. During the term of this Agreement, (conditioned upon the addition of a commercial development partner) the Developer agrees to:
  - a. Submit to the EDA a design proposal to be approved by the EDA showing the location, size and nature of of the proposed Development, including floor layouts, renderings, elevations and other graphic or written explanations of the Development. The design proposal shall be accompanied by a proposed schedule for the starting and completion of all phases of development. The Development shall be designed to accomodate

- public facilities to be constructed adjacent to, or as part, of the Project, including the public facilities contained in the Redevelopment Plan for the Project Area.
- b. Submit an overall cost estimate for the design and construction of the Development.
- c. Submit a time schedule for all phases of the Development.
- d. Undertake and obtain such other preliminary economic information as the Developer may desire to further confirm the economic feasibility and soundness of the Development.
- e. Submit to EDA the Developer's financing plan showing that the proposed Development is financially feasible.
- f. Furnish satisfactory financial data to EDA evidencing Developer's ability to undertake the Development.
- 5. During the term of this Agreement, the EDA and City agree to:
- 1. Create or expand an existing Tax Increment Redevelopment District to encompass the Project Area. The process of including the Project Area into a new or existing Tax Increment Financing District will begin prior to the end of the year.
- 2. Work with the MN Department of Transportation to ensure that the planned improvements to Highway 100 and 36th Avenue are designed taking this project into consideration.
- 3. Proceed to seek all necessary information with regard to the anticipated public costs within the Project Area.
- 4. Estimate the Authority's level and method of financial participation in the project and develop a financial plan for the Authority's participation.
- 5. Work with the Developer and School Board on matters regarding the School-owned property.
- 6. It is expressly understood that execution and implementation of a Contract shall be subject to:
  - a. A determination by the EDA and City that its undertakings are feasible based on (i) the projected tax increment revenues and other revenues from the Project Area, (ii) the purposes and objectives of the Redevelopment Plan, and (iii) the best interest of the City and the EDA.

Page Four Negotiation Agreement

- b. A determination by the Developer that the Development is feasible and in the best interests of the Developer.
- c. Execution of the Contract by the Parties.
- 7. This Agreement may be terminated upon 30 days written notice by either party if:
  - a. An essential precondition to the execution of a contract cannot be met.
  - b. An impasse has been reached in the negotiation of any material term or condition of this Agreement.
- 8. The Developer is hereby designed sole developer in the Project Area during the term of this Agreement.

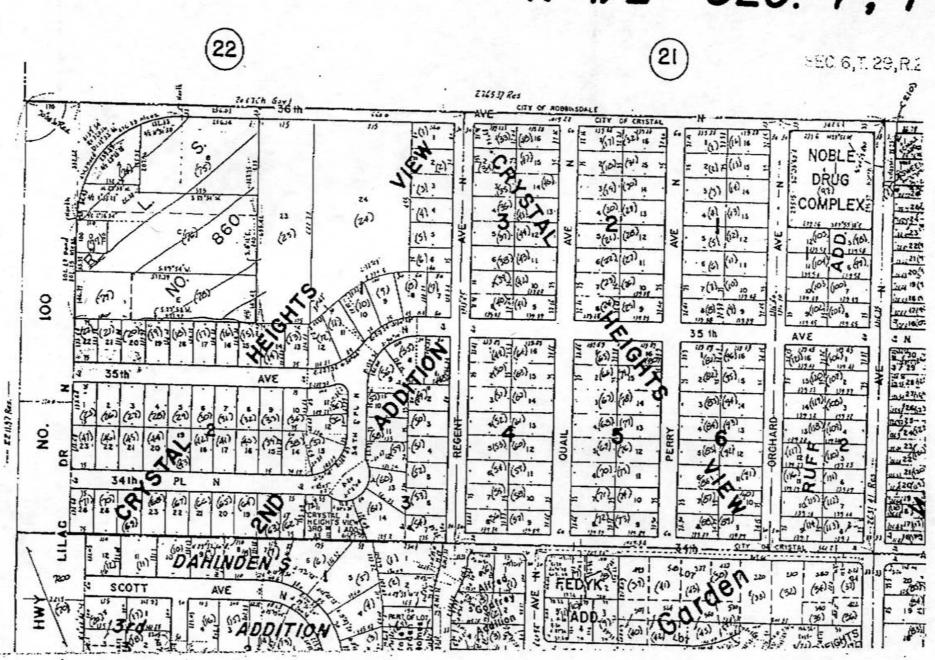

The attached agreement guarantees construction of site improvements for the convenience food establishment proposed at the Crystal Shopping Center. All improvements are consistent with the site plan reviewed for the recent conditional use permit and building permit authorization. A financial surety in the amount of \$33,000 is included as part of the agreement.

It should be noted that landscaping is included in the agreement as a lump sum estimate. Details of the landscape plan will be worked out with the owner as final building plans are submitted. Sign construction is not covered by the agreement but is included in a separate permit process.

A full-sized site plan will be available at the meeting if questions arise.

#### EXHIBIT "A"

#### AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, second party has requested that the City Council approve the issuance of a building permit.

WHEREAS, as a prerequisite to the approval of said permit, the City Council requires the construction of certain improvements for the orderly development of property known as <a href="Crystal Shopping Center">Crystal Shopping Center</a>, 5557 West Broadway.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the granting of said permit, said second party agrees and covenants as follows:

- Close 2 driveway openings in curb and repair street adjacent.

- Remove existing concrete barrier curb as necessary.

- Construct V6 (minimum section) cast-in-place concrete barrier curb.
- Construct parking area, access aisles and drives with a minimum of 6" Class 5 base and 2" bituminous surface.

- Stripe parking stalls with white paint.

- Erect handicap parking stall sign.

- Construct storm sewer and appurtenances to collect and dispose of all surface water on the site.
- Erect stop signs at exits from parking area.

- Erect traffic directional signs.

- Prepare and submit "as built" utility plans.

- Designate and sign fire lanes.

- Landscape all open and disturbed areas.

- Provide all lot irons in place and to grade at the time of final acceptance.

That the second party warrants and guarantees all work done under the agreement against any defect in workmanship, materials, or otherwise that may occur within one year from the date of final acceptance by the City of all said work and other requirements.

That construction work be completed prior to issuance of the occupancy permit but not later than one year from issuance of building permit.

To hold the City harmless from any and all claims which may arise from third parties for any loss or damage sustained resulting from pursuance of the above-described work.

That all just claims incurred in the completion of aforementioned work requirements shall be paid in full by said second party to all persons doing work or furnishing skill, tools, machinery, services, materials, equipment, supplies or insurance.

All work pursuant hereto shall be in compliance with existing laws, ordinances, pertinent regulations, standards, specifications of the City of Crystal, and subject to approval of the City Engineer.

In the event that said second party has not completed any or all of the aforementioned work and requirements on the completion date as set forth herein, then in that event said second party shall be considered in default. THIS AGREEMENT made by and between the City of Crystal, a municipal corporation in the State of Minnesota, hereinafter called the City, the first party, and hereinafter called the second party,

WHEREAS, second party has requested that the City Council approve the issuance of a building permit.

WHEREAS, as a prerequisite to the approval of said permit, the City Council requires the construction of certain improvements for the orderly development of property known as Firestone Mastercare Service Center, 6800 - 56th Avenue North.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the granting of said permit, said second party agrees and covenants as follows:

- Remove existing concrete barrier curb as necessary.
- Construct V6 (minimum section) cast-in-place concrete barrier curb.
- Construct parking area, access aisles and drives with a minimum of 6" Class 5 base and 2" bituminous surface.
- Stripe parking stalls with white paint.
- Erect handicap parking stall sign.
- Construct storm sewer and appurtenances to collect and dispose of all surface water on the site.
- Erect stop signs at exits from parking area. - Prepare and submit "as built" utility plans.
- Landscape all open and disturbed areas.
- Provide all lot irons in place and to grade at the time of final acceptance.

That the second party warrants and guarantees all work done under the agreement against any defect in workmanship, materials, or otherwise that may occur within one year from the date of final acceptance by the City of all said work and other requirements.

That construction work be completed prior to issuance of the occupancy permit but not later than one year from issuance of building permit.

To hold the City harmless from any and all claims which may arise from third parties for any loss or damage sustained resulting from pursuance of the above-described work.

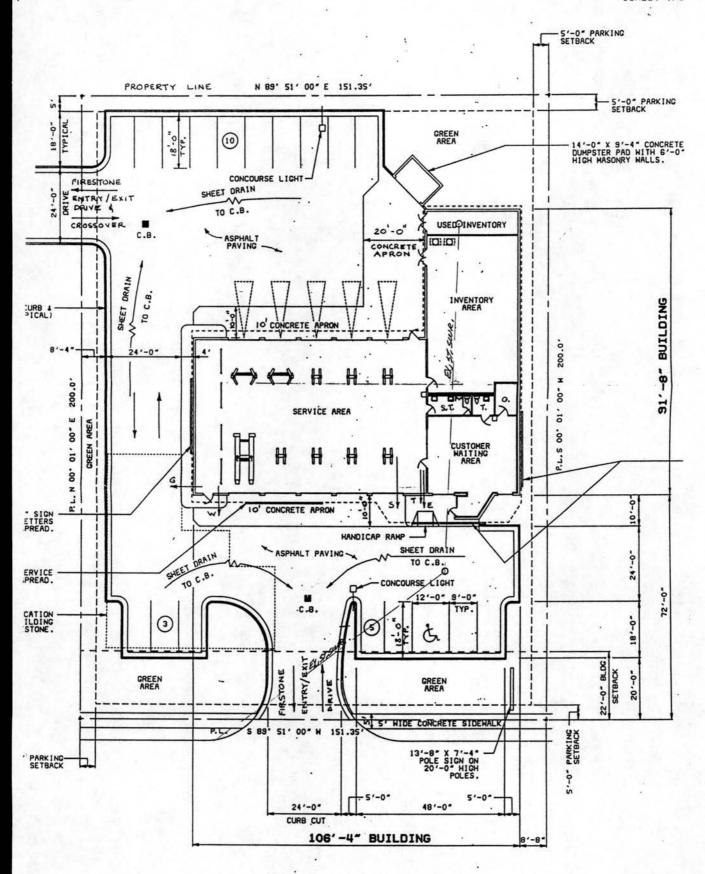

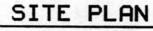

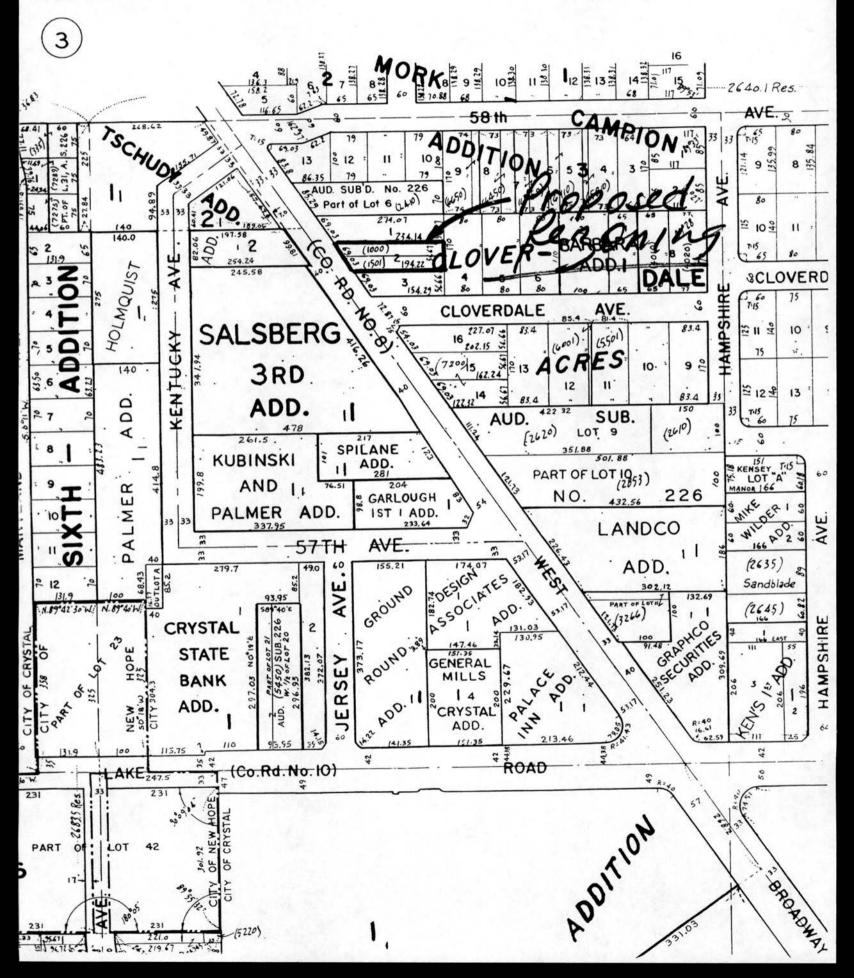

Enclosed please find a resolution of the Robbinsdale City Council which was passed on October 17, 1989, regarding Light Rail Transit. This action was taken by the Council after consideration of the item at three separate council meetings and notification to neighboring cities, the county and the rail authority. In effect, the resolution states that the City of Robbinsdale is concerned about action taken by a party or parties controlling design and implementation of Light Rail Transit in Hennepin County which would or could negatively impact the City of Robbinsdale and the residents of our community. Most recently, two light rail transit stations which have been previously approved in the City of Golden Valley by the Golden Valley Council were removed from consideration in the preliminary design. This action has the effect of placing additional burden on the station area proposed in Robbinsdale at 42nd Avenue North and upon our roadways and neighborhoods in the immediate vicinity. Hence, the Robbinsdale City Council has determined that such amendments to the preliminary design will not be taken lightly and will result in negative motions by the City of Robbinsdale on future approvals which are asked of it.

The City Council of the City of Robbinsdale has been generally supportive of the concept of Light Rail Transit and of a Light Rail Transit line running through the community of Robbinsdale. This support has remained even though large groups of citizens have expressed disapproval of light rail coming through our neighborhoods. Continued support, however, can no longer be assumed, given recent actions which have negatively impacted this community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Robbinsdale that Resolution No. 4168 be amended by the addition of condition number 8 as follows:

8. That a light rail transit station be reinstated in the Golden Valley Road and Plymouth Ave. N. vicinity which provides at least the following parking capacity:

440 park and ride spaces
47 rider drop-off/pick-up spaces
7 bus loading spaces

- 9. If the City of Robbinsdale determines a negative impact on the 42nd Ave N Station by station design changes in Golden Valley from the plan approved in Resolution No. 4168 (which approved 268 park and ride and 27 rider drop-off/pick-up spaces at 42nd Ave. N.), then the 42nd Ave. N. Station shall be limited to a drop-off/pick-up station.
- 10. The 42nd Avenue station be designed to be compatible with the City's downtown redevelopment plan including the securing of additional approval from the City of Robbinsdale if the City deems the amendment from the original HCRRA plan as negatively impacting the 42nd Avenue station.

The question was on adoption of the resolution and upon a vote being taken thereon, the following voted in favor thereof: Blonigan, Holtz, Mayor Robb; and the following voted against the same: None. ABSTAIN: Ruffenach.

LEAGUE OF MINNESOTA CITIES POLICY ADOPTION MEETING RULES

### 1. Registration.

Registration shall remain open from the previously announced opening of conference registration until completion of policy adoption.

### 2. Voting Privileges

Only one delegate per city shall be permitted to vote on policy proposals, priorities, or motions. Each current LMC member city shall designate one official as delegate (and may select another city official as an alternate) for voting purposes.

Only those officials with voting cards for their cities shall be eligible to vote. Possession of the voting card of the city and the signed voting card register shall be evidence that the holder of the voting card is the city's delegate for purposes of voting.

### 3. Committee Reports

The chair or vice chair of each committee shall present the committee report and move adoption of the policy statements. After adoption of policy language, the chair or vice chair shall move adoption of priority rankings.

The chair shall place on the agenda for discussion, a proposal to make a substantive change in the language of a proposed policy, change a priority, or to take a position which the appropriate policy committee chair or representative states was not considered by the committee.

The text of nonprocedural motions and amendments, other than changes in policy priorities, must be submitted in writing to the chair prior to debate.

### 4. Disputes

Disputes regarding eligibility to vote shall be referred to the LMC General Counsel and may be appealed to the conference. Such reports or appeals shall be a special order of business and may be taken up at any time a new question (main motion) is in order.

### 5. Limits on Debate

Each speaker shall be limited to three minutes on any debatable question. The chair may extend the debate limits in order to consider an issue if numerous delegates request to be heard on the issue.

### Policy Adoption Meeting Rules (cont'd)

### 5. Limits on Debate (cont'd)

The chair may reduce the time allotted for debate in order to complete policy adoption, but in no case shall the length of time be reduced to less than three minutes per side.

### 6. Parliamentary Procedure

Precedence. The policy adoption process shall be governed by the LMC Constitution, these rules, and Roberts Rules of Order, Revised. The conference shall be its own judge of these rules and Roberts Rules of Order.

Appeal of the Chair. Debate of the motion "appeal of the ruling of the chair", rule #6 notwithstanding, shall be limited to two minutes by the appealer and two minutes by the chair. Either may designate another eligible voting delegate (or LMC officer or board member) to speak in his/her place.

Changes. Motions to "rescind" and "reconsider" shall require a two-thirds vote of delegates present and voting.

### 7. Number of "A" Priorities

A motion to change a proposed policy's priority to an "A" priority must also propose another "A" proposed policy, within that same section, to be reduced below an "A" priority. The final number of "A" priority policies shall not exceed the number proposed to the conference by the Legislative Committee.

I think that action should be taken at the next Council meeting on the 8th, unless there is a budget meeting scheduled in between. Please be assured that all of Crystal's matters will be handled without interruption during the transition of our merger with Holmes & Graven.

Also, as the covering letter on the Holmes & Graven proposal indicated, there may be some reassignment of duties under that proposal once the merger has taken place, and I would like to request that the firm be able to supplement the proposal with additional material describing the background and experience that our group will be taking to Holmes & Graven. We will try to get that material to you just as soon as the merger takes place.

One technical point. I am assuming that the appointment of Holmes & Graven as interim attorney will in effect continue my personal designation as City Attorney since that is the way that the contract with the firm is now written, and it will enable me to continue my membership in PERA up to the point when a final decision is made by the Council. I would think a simple appointment by the Council would take care of this point.

SUBJECT: City Contribution for Health & Life Insurance for

Non-union Employees for 1990

Attached is a memo from Finance Department to all employees informing them of the health care cost increases for 1990. Also attached is a copy of pages from the DCA Stanton Salary and Benefit Survey of governmental units contribution towards cost of health insurance.

The increase cost for single coverage averages \$13.14. The increase cost for family coverage averages \$34.81.

The City policy has been, and I don't propose to change it, that the City pay the cost of single health coverage and \$10,000 life insurance on each single employee or \$195 of the cost of health insurance for families plus \$10,000 life insurance on the employee.

If you look at the fifth page of the survey you will note that the average contribution for cities in group 6 is \$212 per month in 1989.

Based on the continued escalation of health care costs and because we are somewhat behind other comparable cities, my recommendation is that we continue to cover the entire cost of single participants for health care and increase the contribution for family coverage by \$25 per month. There's sufficient money in the budget to cover the additional cost to the City.

# MINUTES OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY COMMISSION OF CRYSTAL, MINNESOTA SEPTEMBER 21, 1989 7:00 P.M. SOUTH CONFERENCE ROOM

The Chair called the meeting to order at 7:36 p.m., recognizing a quorum. Those members present were: Beth Jarvis, Mary Pat Hanauska, Lerry Teslow, Jerry Farrell, Pauline Langsdorf (council liaison, arrived 9:03 p.m.), Diane Christopher (arrived 7:42 p.m), Julie Jones (staff liaison), and Ryan Schroeder.

Those members absent were: Gail Gove, Phyllis Isaacson, Larry Lemanski and Gerald Schultz.

The Chair asked for consideration of a motion on the August 31, 1989 meeting minutes. Jerry Farrell moved to approve the minutes as written. Mary Pat Hanauska seconded the motion.

Motion Carried.

The main topic of discussion was the Housing Maintenance Code. Julie Jones explained that it may be best to use the wording from a 1986 draft of a Crystal Rental Property Licensing Code instead of the New Hope Registration Code. The Commission agreed that it was their intent to install licensing rather than registration requirements on rental properties.

Buyer/Seller requirements were also discussed. Mary Pat Hanauska moved to add a six month time limit to Section 425.21, Subd. 5. Lerry Teslow seconded the motion. Upon roll call vote, those members voting aye were: Diane Christopher, Mary Pat Hanauska, Beth Jarvis, Ryan Schroeder, and Lerry Teslow. Members voting nay were: Jerry Farrell. Motion Carried.

Several other changes and additions to the code were discussed. It was recommended that a section be added addressing a policy of how to phase in the licensing requirements since every building could not be licensed immediately. The Commission also talked about Home Improvement Loan Programs that might be available for low income residents during the onset of this code.

The question was raised and debated as to whether or not the Commission should recommend that the City Council pass the rental portion of the housing code first before passing the Point of Sale Inspections section. Diane Christopher moved to present the entire housing code to the Crystal City Council and recommend that they approve the licensing portion of the draft housing code first. Lerry Teslow seconded the motion. Upon roll call vote those members voting aye were: Diane Christopher, Jerry Farrell, Beth Jarvis, Ryan Schroeder, and Lerry Teslow. One member abstained: Mary Pat Hanauska.

Motion Carried.

Many members of the Environmental Quality Commission had conflicts with the November 20 work session date, which the City Council had established at their last meeting. Therefore, the Commission made a request that the City Council be asked to change the date to November

16 if possible, and if not possible, to November 11.

The Commission members then discussed fees and staff requirements relating to the new Housing Maintenance Code. The Commission requested that Julie Jones present a report on fee recommendations at the next meeting.

Under other business Julie Jones was asked to give a brief update on the recycling program.

Mary Pat Hanauska then moved to adjourn the meeting. Lerry Teslow seconded the motion. The meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

The last eight years of change on the federal level have left an indelible mark on states and local governments. Of course, the "New Federalism" has meant that the federal government continues to mandate programs while simultaneously demanding state and local governments assume greater financial responsibilities.

While state government has had to meet its share of the demand caused by the loss of federal dollars, I am pleased with the Legislature's commitment to local units of government in 1989.

You may already be aware of some of the positive aspects of our Property Tax Relief and Reform Act of 1989 as they affect small businesses in our community. We provided approximately \$110 million for the reduction of taxes on commercial and industrial property, and provided for future rate reductions in a way that reflects responsible fiscal policy. We also heard from many business owners that they wanted to expand operations, but would need some relief from the state to assist them; in response, we were able to exempt new and expanding business capital equipment purchases from the sales tax.

For homeowners, the new bill provides over \$127 million in property tax relief, meaning that on a statewide average, property tax increases will be held to about two per cent. The state-paid Homestead Credit and Agricultural Aid package has been continued and expanded as well. And, the Property Tax Refund Program, commonly referred to as the "Circuit Breaker", has been expanded to include more middle income families. Now, those households with combined incomes of up to \$60,000 are eligible to receive a tax refund on their property tax bill.

We both know that good roads are the lifeline of daily commerce for and positive changes have been made in this area. Currently, 30 percent of the Motor Vehicle Excise Tax (MVET) is dedicated to transportation. Legislative changes increase that amount by 5 percent for both 1990 and 1991. This additional 5 percent is equal to nearly \$13 million.

Until July 1, 1991, 30 percent of the funds must be transferred to the Highway User Tax Distribution Fund and the Transit Assistance Fund. From June 30, 1989 to July 1, 1991, 5 percent of the MVET will be transferred to the Trunk Highway Fund (receiving 3/4 of the total amount) and the Transit Assistance Fund (receiving the remaining 1/4). After June 30, 1991, the amount transferred to these accounts will increase to 35 percent of the MVET and ratios will remain the same. The effect of this distribution is that for the next two years, local units will continue to receive their share of 30 percent of the MVET.

Beginning in 1992, however, MVET will go only to trunk highways and transit. Local units of government can expect to receive additional amounts from changes in the automobile registration schedule. In addition, you will be interested to know that the state park road account has been expanded to include city streets and town roads providing access to public lakes, rivers, state parks, and state campgrounds.

- \* Starting this year, the state will begin a gradual takeover of the costs of operating the district court system. Four and one-half million dollars was appropriated to meet the costs of salaries for law clerks and some district court administrative personnel. The Eighth Judicial District will serve as a pilot project for a complete takeover of the trial court system.
- \* Tougher driving-while-intoxicated (DWI) laws have placed a strain on county and municipal jail facilities. And, passage of a new crime-prevention law in 1989 promises to have an effect as well. In order to help meet these demands, the Legislature increased corrections funding by 21% over the biennium. In addition, there will be no "chargebacks" for prisoners placed in state facilities. And, beginning on July 1, 1990, the state will assume public defender costs for persons charged with felonies and gross misdemeanors.
- \* Implementation of the DNR's shoreland regulations will require a local government commitment. To assist in meeting this responsibility, the Legislature authorized \$2 million in new money.
- \* With respect to human services that counties are obligated to provide, I am pleased to report that we were able to make some gains in this area. In particular, the state will take over certain county income maintenance costs. Equalization aid is continued for those distressed counties with high income maintenance costs and low-valued property tax bases. Funding was increased for the PATHS program for a total \$30 million in combined federal and state funding. Minnesota will take over the county cost of operating the state-wide automated human services eligibility (MAXIS).

In a session that was dominated by austere budgets for many worthwhile programs, I believe what I have discussed above is representative of a state government that is sensitive to the needs of your constituents. I look forward to working with you again in the future. Please let me know whenever I can be of service to you.

Dear Mr. Menzies:

At the City Council meeting of October 17, you cited traffic problems on 47th Avenue North between CR 81 and West Broadway related to vehicle speed, truck usage, noise levels and street surface deterioration. In an effort to fully respond to your concerns, I have contacted officials from Robbinsdale, due to the street's joint status, as well as other Crystal operating departments.

Crystal's latest traffic counts show 47th Avenue averages 1,440 vehicle trips per day. This number is significantly in excess of the trips carried by a normal residential street and undoubtedly stems from the roadway's location as a local connector between two heavily traveled County roads.

Vehicle speed on such connector roads is always a problem and 47th Avenue is no exception. Restriction of specific traffic movements and enforcement of speed limits are the only options to realistically affect speeding. In this instance, I do not believe Robbinsdale or Hennepin County would agree to prohibiting turning movements. Additionally, I am concerned that restrictions on traffic will just redirect the through routes to other streets such as 49th Avenue and Vera Cruz which already carry a fair amount of through traffic. In the final analysis, enforcement of the speed limit represents the only viable action.

Truck traffic which was a concern could also be handled by enforcement since both ends of the streets are signed to prohibit trucks. However, Robbinsdale has no plans to formally approve such a restriction. This means truck restrictions on eastbound traffic cannot be enforced by the police.

Reduction in general noise levels is an issue in many residential neighborhoods. While Crystal has established noise standards, those standards are very difficult to apply to moving vehicles. The only real impact the City can have on vehicle noise is through enforcement of speed limits and truck restrictions such as have been discussed previously.

In an effort to address the street surface deterioration issue, Crystal has designated 47th as a State Aid Street. This allows Crystal to use State vehicle and gas tax revenue, a portion of which is allocated for City improvements, to rebuild streets that carry heavier than normal traffic volumes. This means overlay (not seal coat) and reconstruction of these deteriorated streets can be performed without large assessments being levied against abutting property owners, such as yourself.

While the above responses may not address your concerns as fully as you might have hoped, I believe you understand the difficulties involved. Crystal will do what it can to affect the situation. Should you wish to discuss the situation further, please let me know.

This letter is to express my disappointment in the enactment of the above stated code. We have been living in Crystal for 26 years. The first five years we were able to park on Winnetka Ave. After that, the road was improved and the option to park on Winnetka Avenue was taken away. Since we have had up to eight people in the household (not including guests) we have in the last 22 years provided side of driveway parking for our family and friends. Our present driveway is constructed of half of the length is concrete and the other half being crushed rock. The present side of driveway parking area, which we received the violation notice for is constructed of crushed rock.

I believe under the circumstances stated above that if the City wants concrete or bituminous material in the side portion, the City

of Crystal should provide funds for said work.

As far as the police department is concerned, I would think that they could find mor practical use of their time. For instance, they could issue more speeding violations along Winnetka Avenue. I believe it is kind of petty to be issuing this kind of violation notice which we have received when everyday there are numerous speeders on Winnetka Avenue.

Furthermore, about 75% of the houses in this block have been burglarized within the last 5-7 years. Why aren't the police patrolling the area then instead of driving aroung enforcing a petty code. I believe the reason our home has not been burglarized is the fact we always have cars in our driveway.

I understand why this code is necessary, to keep junkers and numerous cars etc. from piling up in front yards, but I do believe that the police chief and officers should be required to use some

adult descretion when enforcing an ordinance of this type.

My family and friends are going to continue parking in this parking space or wherever necessary in order to be convenient to our house. If this is not possible, you will have to issue your ticket but I will not pay a fine.

I hope to receive an answer regarding this situation very soon.

I am in receipt of the letter you sent expressing concerns you had in several areas of our enforcement of the zoning ordinances. I will try to answer these questions and deal with these concerns as they were presented in your letter.

First the disappointment you expressed regarding section 515.09 of the Crystal Zoning Code was noted, and I must admit I am a bit confused as your letters states that you are disappointed in the enactment of the above stated code. In fact, the zoning code for the City of Crystal as it is now written has been in effect since February 15, 1976. specific wording is, 'In the case of single family, two family and townhouse dwellings, parking shall be prohibited in any portion of the front yard except designated driveways leading directly into a garage or one open, surfaced space located on the side of a driveway, away from the principal use. Said extra space shall be surfaced with concrete or bituminous material.' It is our job to see that this ordinance is complied with by all households in the city, which is the reason for your Notice of Violation. Although I don't know for sure, I do not believe the City Council will provide you with the funds to have this area surfaced to comply with the building code.

Secondly, I would like to assure you that in addition to our efforts in the area of code enforcement we are in fact citing the speeding violators throughout the city as it's one of our constant and ongoing problems. We do not believe that any of the city codes are petty and therefore try to divide our time among all those things that would ordinarily come under the purview of the police department. This

includes checking the residences for burglaries as well as establishing neighborhood watch groups to teach the citizens to help us help them.

This particular part of your letter references 75% of the homes in your block have been burglarized in the last 5 to 7 years. This may be true but when I ran a computer check of the burglaries that have occurred on your block since December 1, 1982, I find there has been one reported to the police department. That was in April of this year. Obviously we cannot address answers to problems for which we have not been made aware. I would urge that if your neighbors have reported burglaries to you and not to us that you encourage them to call us immediately.

In your letter you address your understanding of the need for this type of ordinance which keeps junkers and other numerous inoperable vehicles and waste matter from accumulating on property in the City, which in turn subsequently lowers the property value. And you are right, we do use discretion when enforcing ordinances, but this discretion is usually in the amount of time we have to spend on a particular ordinance versus second-guessing the Council's intent when they passed the ordinance. This we do not do. If an ordinance is to be enforced fairly and impartially, we must enforce it as written. We cannot deviate from this process lest we be accused of discriminatory enforcement practices.

It is unfortunate that your attitude about our efforts in the code enforcement area is less than cooperative. Your statement about continuing to use the property as you have and to ignore citations will not solve our problem and it certainty will not solve yours. It is our hope that all citizens of Crystal join in an effort to make this a better place to live by cooperating with your elected officials in adhering to the decisions they have made regarding what is perceived by them to be the best for the majority of the citizens of this community. I hope you will view this effort by us in that spirit and conform to the code which you were notified you had violated.

Thank you for your patience in this matter and I hope that we can come to a satisfactory solution to this problem.

# CRYSTAL PARK AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION Minutes October 4, 1989

The regular meeting of the Crystal Park and Recreation Advisory Commission was called to order at 7:03 p.m. by Chairperson Mark Hoffmann. Members present were:

Ms. Reid, Ms. Spaulding, Mr. Theisen, and Ms. Moucha.
Also present were: Mr. Smothers, Council liaison, Mr.
Rygg, Council member, and Mr. Brandeen and Ms. Hackett from the department staff.

The minutes were approved as sent.

Ms. Hackett reviewed the monthly report, the summer program summary and the 3rd quarter report.

Mr. Brandeen reviewed the 1990 budget requests for Recreation, Parks, Forestry, Pool and Community Center divisions.

The Commission reviewed the summer park meetings. It was thought that the meetings went well. The Commission felt having a police officer at the last meeting was beneficial and would like to request an officer to attend each outdoor meeting. Mr. O'Reilly suggested that since dog problems appeared to be a major complaint, that this issue be addressed at the next regular meeting. Possible sites for 1990 include: MAC Park and Kentucky Park. The Commission felt additional publicity is needed and suggested CATV, Post, Star Tribune Community Section.

Mr. O'Reilly updated the Commission on the proposed Bike Race for the 1990 Crystal Frolics. A possible site is the Lions Valley Place Park area. Mr. O'Reilly felt that this event could be organized and conducted in conjunction with the Frolics.

Moved by Ms. Saunders and seconded by Mr. Gentry to recommend to the Crystal Frolics that a bike race be included as a 1990 Crystal Frolics event.

Motion carried-unanimous.

Mr. Theisen reviewed the proposed changes for the 1990 Frolics Run. More divisions will be added including one for elite runners.

Mr. Brandeen reviewed the 1989 pool report. Ms. Spaulding asked about doming the pool. Mr. Brandeen reported that a feasibility study is included in the 1993 5-Year Plan, but could be re-considered.

Moved by Ms. Spaulding and seconded by Ms. Reid to recommend moving up the feasibility study on doming the pool when the 5-year Plan is discussed by the Commission.

Motion carried-unanimous.

Commission organized a sub-committee to discuss the property Contar routal rates.

The Commission organized a sub-committee to discuss the Community Center rental rates. The sub-committee members are: Ms. Spaulding, Mr. O'Reilly, Mr. Gentry and Ms. Reid. The committee will meet Wednesday, October 18 at 7 p.m. at City Hall. Mr. Smothers asked that the Crystal Lions be granted 5 free events per year for 10 years in lieu of their contributions to the kitchen equipment. The sub-committee will discuss the Lions proposal and other rental aspects at their meeting. The Grand Opening Celebration Sub-Committee will meet October 25 at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

Mr. Brandeen reviewed the Becker Park concert series evaluation. Mr. Rygg suggested holding some kids' events (races, treasure hunts, balloons, etc.) prior to some of the concerts in order to attract more people. Mr. Theisen offered to help staff with this.

The Commission reviewed the results of a golf course survey. The trend is in increased usage and 2 local courses are at their maximum capacity.

Mr. Brandeen reminded Commissioners that the water slide will be discussed at the first Council meeting in November.

Mr. Theisen reported that a new youth football program is organizing. He will bring more information as it becomes available.

Ms. Moucha informed the Commission that she talked with the Adventure Club at Cavanagh and was told that the locked fence on the west end of Cavanagh is to keep the children in. Mr. Brandeen wondered why it is not opened after Adventure Club is done. The Council is requesting this information from the school district at the next Council meeting.

Mr. Hoffmann distributed copies of a questionnaire from Councilmembers Moravec and Langsdorf. There were three questions regarding Park & Recreation issues. Mr. Hoffmann will contact Mr. Moravec regarding obtaining survey results.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:03 p.m.
