SUBJECT: Preliminary Agenda for the May 15, 1990 Council Meeting

There are no public hearings for the Council to consider at this meeting. We have two items on the Consent Agenda and twelve items on the regular agenda.

Item #2: Please review the Police Department report on this item because they are recommending denial of this request.

Item #3: Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has still refused to pay the amount required by ordinance. I believe the City has given them reasonable time to comply with the ordinance. I recommend denial of this renewal.

Item #4: In February the City Council was asked to review the Mission Statement which is included in this packet. We had not received any comments from Councilmembers and therefore we are placing this item on the agenda for your consideration and comment. If it is possible and you have time, please review this statement and bring comments to the meeting Tuesday night.

Item #5: There have been some changes in the Flexible Benefit Account Plan which Miles Johnson has detailed in his memo. Please review these in detail because they make a difference in how we pay non-reimbursed health costs for employees.

Item #8: The recommendation for a consultant to rewrite the Comprehensive Plan may require some detailed discussion. A representative of the company, recommended by the staff, will be at the meeting.

Item #11: Bill Monk will be discussing his memo regarding this subject on Tuesday night. Please review his material so that if you have questions, you will be able to address them at the meeting.

Item #12: The company requesting the modification of site improvements has made several changes regarding site in the past and is now asking that a further change in site improvement agreement to eliminate necessary curbing along Hanson Court. Council should take a close look at making exceptions to site improvement agreements as they may become a precedence for other developers or firms in the future.

REMINDER: The regular Council meeting starts at 8 p.m. because of the School Board Election, however, the EDA has set up a tour of the City which starts at 6 o'clock. Therefore, if you wish to go on the tour, you must arrive shortly before 6. The EDA Advisory Commission has also been invited to go on this tour and a bus and box supper will be provided.



A trained fire fighter and life saver, John instinctively knew that the summons was an urgent, non-work related call. He was informed that there was a man in the parking lot who wasn't breathing. John immediately attended to the victim, administering CPR while awaiting the arrival of the paramedics who had been contacted. Shortly thereafter, he was assisted in the life saving effort by Jill Lester, a co-worker and a summer life guard at the Crystal swimming pool. Emergency paramedics arrived on the scene at 1:04 p.m.

According to Greg Bodin, also a Robbinsdale Volunteer Fire Fighter and a Chaplain at NMMC, the family of the victim feels that he is alive today due to John Olson's efforts.

John has been a fire fighter with the City since April 25, 1983, has served as a Lieutenant in that department and now shares the City's fire inspection responsibilities with Greg Bodin.

As most of us are aware, every second of life saving effort counts in emergencies such as this. We recognize that John's immediate, unselfish response to the situation certainly played a major role in saving a citizen's life on April 28, 1990.

Ms. Lester will be receiving a similar recognition from the City of Crystal and the City of Robbinsdale extends its commendations to Ms. Lester also.

- 815.07. Enforcement. This Section shall be enforced by the City Manager. It is unlawful for any person to disobey an order given pursuant to this Section. The Manager may prepare and publicize further regulations not inconsistent with this Section for conduct within parks.
- 815.09. Park Closing. The Chief of Police may close any public park, parkway, beach or drive, and for such period as deemed necessary, in order to protect or restore order or terminate or prevent breaches of the peace and order of the City. No person having been informed of such an order closing any such area shall remain in the area longer than is necessary to leave the closed area.
- 815.11. Other Regulations. All other provisions of the City Code governing conduct in public places within the City apply to parks.
- 815.13. <u>Liquor and Beer in Parks</u>. Subdivision 1. <u>General Rule</u>. - Subd. 4. <u>Duration</u>. The special permit allows the presence of liquor and beer in the park or related facility only during the time specified in the permit which time may not exceed 12 consecutive hours in one calendar day.
- Subd. 5. Rules and Regulations. The City Manager is directed to prepare further regulations for the conduct in parks of a person issued a special permit under this subsection.
- Subd. 6. Application. The application for a special permit is prepared by the City Clerk. The application must specify the purpose of the social event, the nature of the activity proposed, the hours during which it is to be conducted, the maximum number of persons expected to attend, and such other information as the Clerk reasonably requests. The application must be accompanied by a bond or other undertaking in form and substance satisfactory to the City Manager and City Attorney, holding the City and its officers, employees, and agents from liability of any kind arising out of the permitted activity. If the applicant is a business partnership, club, corporation or non-profit association the application must be accompanied by a certificate of insurance showing current liability insurance naming the City as an additional insured party under the insurance policy.

Subd. 7. Fee. There is no fee for a special permit issued under this subsection.

Subd. 8. Special Condition. The use, consumption, display and presence of liquor and beer in parks and related park facilities is a matter of special concern to the City as such activity relates to the peace and good order of the City. For that reason the issuance of a special permit under this subsection is determined to be a matter within the sole discretion of the City Council, and its determination to issue or not to issue a special permit is final. The Council may impose additional conditions in the granting of a special permit. The application for the special permit must be accompanied by (i) a copy of this subsection, (ii) an acknowledgement by the applicant that the subsection has been read and is understood by the applicant, and (iii) that applicant agrees not to challenge or in any way contest the determination of the City Council with regard to the issuance of the special permit. Per your request we have conducted an investigation into whether the Robbinsdale Lions Gambling License at Burlings Tally Ho should be renewed. These are the results of that investigation.

On 03/23/90, Case No. 90002170, there was an allegation of theft from the pulltabs. This allegation was turned over to the State Gambling Enforcement. Since that time the Robbinsdale Lions have retained a new Gambling Manager and have been audited and have retained an accountant. The new Gambling Manager is a Jerome Peter Omernik, DOB 06/25/36. Mr. Omernik has been checked and is clear on all checks we can make.

The Secretary of State's Office shows Robbinsdale Lions as a non-profit corporation incorporated 09/24/57. The Attorney General's Consumer Division have no reports on the Robbinsdale Lions. The Attorney General's Charities Division does not have it registered. The Minnesota Charities Review Board does not report for fraternal organizations.

We contacted the Gaming Commission and at this point there is no license renewal in progress and they have no information on a loss of receipts. We spoke to a Mike Cummings of the Department of Revenue. He advised us that there had been a complaint registered about possible violation of the tip boards for taping the cards. That violation would be for altered or repaired cards which can't be in use and defective cards should not be offered for sale. Mr. Cummings advised us that he did not feel that the card they were using met the criteria for a tip board but he further stated that at this point and time they were not in violation.

Lastly, we spoke to Norm Pint of Gambling Enforcement and he advised us that there was a great variance in the records for the Robbinsdale Lions that they showed poor bookkeeping and they could not find where the money had gone, however Mr. Pint advised us that these are not sufficient reasons for not re-licensing them at this point.

The information we have received from the people we have contacted would show no reason, at this point, not to renew the gambling license for the Robbinsdale Lions based on the criteria established above by the Gambling Enforcement Department of State Government.

- The organization will be responsible for ensuring that the lessor's business activities are not conducted on the leased premises.
- If the lease is cancelled prior to the termination date of this lease, each party agrees to notify the Gambling Control Board explaining the reasons for the cancellation. The lease shall be terminated immediately for any gambling, liquor, prostitution or tax evasion violations occurring on the premises.
- •The lessor/sublessor of the premises shall provide the lessee access to the licensed premises during any time reasonable and necessary to conduct lawful gambling on the premises and as agreed upon in this lease.

Teens Against Drugs

The subject applying for the permit, Omar Anis Ibrahim, DOB 06/19/61, is clear on all checks that we could run. Teens Against Drugs is registered with the Secretary of States Office as a non-profit corporation. They were registered on 12/22/89. The Attorney General's Charities Division have no record on the Teens Against Drugs. The Attorney General's Consumer Division have no complaints against them. Minnesota Charities Review advised us that this agency has no financial accountability and they are not a registered charity.

On 05/03/90 we contacted Ken Ziegler, Minneapolis Business License Inspector, and asked him about Teens Against Drugs. Minneapolis has refused them a solicitor's license until they have had their books open for one year. Ziegler was asked about John Benner who is the signer on the check we have received. Ziegler advised us that Benner has been involved in two other organizations, Junior Careers and Institute for Career Development and there may have been problems with those companies.

Delbert Corey of the Minnesota Department of Labor Standards stated that there was a complaint on Benner in 1987 about violation of child labor laws. He was ordered to comply with those laws and stated he would at that time. The last person we contacted was a Jody Wahl at the Attorney General's Office and she advised us that Teens Against Drugs are not in compliance with state statute 309.52 and they are not registered with the Attorney General's Office to solicit.

Due to the fact that they are not in compliance with state statute or registered to solicit, I would recommend turning down the solicitor's permit for this organization.



- The lessor or sublessor of the premises will allow the Board or agents of the Board, the Commissioner of Public Safety or agents of the commissioner, or the Commissioner of Revenue or agents of the commissioner, and law enforcement personnel to inspect the premises at any reasonable time, and permit the organization to conduct lawful gambling at the premises according to the terms of this lease. The lessor may not impose any conditions on the organization regarding distributors of gambling equipment, services, or the use of profits.
- The organization must obtain a license from the Gambling Control Board. The organization will be responsible for complying with the laws and rules of lawful gambling.
- The organization must have at the gambling premises a current inventory of gambling equipment, a sketch with dimensions of the premises available for review, and a clear physical separation or divider between the lessee's gambling equipment and the lessor's business equipment.
- The organization will be responsible for ensuring that the lessor's business activities are not conducted on the leased premises.
- If the lease is cancelled prior to the termination date of this lease, each party agrees to notify the Gambling Control Board explaining the reasons for the cancellation. The lease shall be terminated immediately for any gamoling, liquor, prostitution or tax evasion violations occurring on the premises.
- •The lessor/sublessor of the premises shall provide the lessee access to the licensed premises during any time reasonable and necessary to conduct lawful gambling on the premises and as agreed upon in this lease.



In your letter of February 22, 1990 you requested the City Council of the City of Crystal, Minnesota, to consider the Foundation's request that it be exempt from the City's requirement that 10% of net profits derived from charitable gambling in the City be contributed to the City for lawful purposes as defined by state law and City ordinance. The Foundation's position, as we understand it, is that by funding research grants to the University of Minnesota, the Foundation has met the 10% requirements of the ordinance since the benefit of that research inures directly or indirectly to the citizens of Crystal.

The City Council, at its March 27th meeting, considered your request with care, and although the Council found the work of the Foundation commendable, it did not find that the funding you have described constitutes expenditures in the City within the meaning of the City ordinance. The Council by formal action directed me to so inform you and to request that contributions due and owing be paid promptly.

Dear Jerry:

Enclosed is a letter I received from Tom Dougherty, the attorney for Cystic Fibrosis Foundation (CFF) raising some arguments about the validity of Crystal's ordinance requiring 10% contributions to the City. In summary the letter seems to indicate that CFF is willing to make future contributions but is unwilling to make payment of the amounts previously due.

I do not agree with the positions taken by Mr. Dougherty. I believe our ordinance was and is valid and that the sums in question which the City has formally requested are due and owing from CFF. I'm enclosing a summary of the Rice Street VFW case, cited in the letter. I think the case clearly validates our ordinance.

You should note, however, that the <u>Rice Street VFW</u> case holds that the required contributions are not a tax and that the proper enforcement mechanism is permit revocation (in effect, the City's failure to approve the state license). CFF's permit has been approved by the Council conditioned upon its payment of sums due, and approval or rejection by the City is due May 25. Unless the Council wishes to take some other action I think it would be appropriate for the Council to clearly indicate at its meeting on May 14 that the required payments have not been made and that for that reason the state license is not approved. I can prepare the necessary resolution.

I do want to point out, also, that if the City's demand for payment includes any sums resulting from CFF's activities prior to February 11, 1988, the effective date of our ordinance, the demand should be adjusted to eliminate those amounts. I understand that the demand has already been adjusted to reflect the return of the 3% tax repealed by Ordinance No. 89-21, but by its terms that ordinance permits return of the tax only to an organization that is in compliance with the 10% contribution section of the City Code.

As you are aware, on April 2, 1990, Terry Dulgar, City Manage of the City of Crystal ("Crystal"), informed the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation ("CFF") of the Crystal City Council's decision not to grant CFF an exemption from technical compliance with Crystal City Code Section 1100.19, Subd. 8 ("Subdivision 8"). Accordingly, Crystal renewed its request of December 4, 1989, that CFF promptly pay the 10% net profit contribution amounts from its lawful gambling operation totalling \$26,937.21 allegedly due and owing pursuant to Subdivision 8 for the period of of January 1988 to September 1989. This letter constitutes CFF's reply to the renewed payment request.

It is our view that: (i) the amount is uncollectible because prior to July 1, 1989, Subdivision 8 was an unauthorized tax on local gambling in violation of Minn. Stat., Section 349.212, Subd. 5 ("Section 349.212"); (ii) the amount is uncollectible because Crystal has failed to comply with Minn. Stat., Section 349.213 ("Section 349.213"); and (iii) the amount contains uncollectible retroactive contributions. These points will be addressed in order.

- 1. Prior to July 1, 1989, Subdivision 8 was an Unauthorized Tax in Violation of Section 349.212. Enacted in July 1987, Section 349.212, imposes a 3% of gross receipts tax limitation on all local lawful gambling. Nonetheless, on March 10, 1988, Crystal enacted Subdivision 8 which imposed the disputed 10%-of-net-profit contribution requirement on local lawful gambling. However, the Minnesota legislature did not carve out the 10% contribution exception to Section 349.213 until at least July 1, 1989. See Laws 1989, c. 335, art. 1, section 220. Accordingly, prior to July 1989, Subdivision 8 was an unauthorized tax on local lawful gambling in violation of Section 349.212. Therefore, CFF is not obligated to pay to Crystal any 10% contributions assessed prior to July 1, 1989. CFF can be alleged to owe Crystal, at most, only \$4,561.33 for the months of July, August and September, 1989.
- 2. Crystal has Failed to Comply with Section 349.213. Crystal cannot collect the identified remaining amount, (i.e., \$4,561.33). Section 349.213 requires Crystal to create a specific fund administered and regulated for the sole purpose of collecting the 10% contributions. Crystal failed to create the specific fund pursuant to Section 349.213. Accordingly, Crystal is without authority to collect, even to assess, the 10% contribution pursuant to Subdivision 8 unless and until it complies fully with Section 349.213. Crystal's prior practice of commingling the lawful gambling contribution with general city revenue does not satisfy its statutory obligation under Section 349.213.

It is our position that the Crystal City Council expressly recognized the merit of this argument by its recent action to amend Subdivision 8 in order to create the necessary separate fund. This action was undertaken in direct response to CFF's prior discussions with Crystal concerning the statutory requirements. Accordingly, because Crystal thus far has failed to comply with Section 349.213, its attempt to collect the remaining disputed amount constitutes an impermissible tax on local lawful gambling in violation of Section 349.212.

Of course, in the cooperative spirit which has characterized CFF throughout our discussions on this matter, CFF will pay all 10% contributions to Crystal as they become due following the creation of the statutorily required fund. Please keep me informed of the disposition and/or effective date of the proposed amendment.

3. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Crystal may not collect contributions for the period of January 1, 1988 through March 9, 1988. Even if you reject the two preceding arguments, Crystal

may not collect the full disputed amount from CFF. Subdivision 8 became effective on March 10, 1988. Pursuant to the recent Minnesota Court of Appeals' decision in Rice Street V.F.W., Post No. 3877 v. The City of St. Paul, Court File No. C1-89-1685, March 11, 1990, Crystal may not collect any 10% contribution for any period prior to that effective date. Nonetheless, Crystal seeks to collect such contributions from CFF for the period of January 1, 1988 through March 9, 1988, totalling \$4,281.95. CFF has no obligation to pay this amount.

Dave, please contact me after you have reviewed this letter so that we may resolve this matter. We appreciate the courtesies you and the Crystal City Council have extended.

SUBJECT: Cystic Fibrosis Charitable Contributions

Attached are the schedules for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation on their gambling activity within the City of Crystal. These schedules breakdown, by month, the net profit of the site(s) located within the City as well as donations made within the City and what dollar amount is due to the City based on Section 1100.9, Subd. 8 of the Charitable Gambling Ordinance.

I have indicated, in pencil, on the statement for the period ended September 30, 1988, the dollar amount due when we take off January, February and half of March 1988. This is being done due to the fact that the 10% contribution requirement in Section 1100.9, Subd. 8 in the ordinance was not published until February 11, 1988 and did not take effect until March 11, 1988. (Prior to this date the requirement was 25 cents on each dollar.)

The new total due for the two periods in question would be \$21,067.83, which would bring them into compliance with the City ordinance and make them eligible for their license renewal in the City.

In response to our phone conversation this morning I am writing you to clarify the laws governing rental payments to lessors of charitable gambling sites. It is with much embarassment that I must admit my comments before your city council were in error.

While it is currently legal to supplement rent by making payments out of an organization's general fund, this is a practice that will be not allowed as of August 1, 1990. At your council meeting I made the statment that this was an issue being addressed soley by the rules committee of the Lawful Gambling Control Board: this was not correct. Unknown to me at the time, a provision existed in the recently passed gambling bill which prohibits such payments effective August 1, 1990.

Rest assured that the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has always and will always operate within the guidelines of the law. Effective August 1, we will begin paying Nicklows the legal limit of \$600 per month.

Please extend my apologies to the council for my incorrect statement. I pride myself on being knowledgable in my field, but in this instance I obviously was wrong.

Dear Mr. Dulgar:

As you know, this law firm represents the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation ("CFF") with regard to the City of Crystal's ("Crystal") request of December 4, 1989, that CFF pay Crystal the sum of \$26,937.21, representing a 10% contribution of net lawful gambling profits pursuant to Crystal City Code Section 1100.19, Subd. 8 ("Subdivision 8"), for the period of January 1, 1988, through September 30, 1990. Under separate letters from Robert K. Dresing, President of CFF, and from me, CFF expressed its opposition to paying such contributions.

By letter dated May 7, 1990, David Kennedy, Crystal City Attorney, indicated his disagreement with CFF's position, except that Subdivision 8 cannot be applied retroactively pursuant to Rice Street V.F.W. v. City of St. Paul. Mr. Kennedy recommended that unless CFF pays the requested amount, less any portion attributable to the retroactive application of Subdivision 8, the Crystal City Council should not approve CFF's lawful qambling license.

CFF still disagrees with the position of Crystal regarding the propriety of collecting the subject 10% contributions. However, CFF desires to resolve this matter amicably in the cooperative spirit which has characterized its relationship with Crystal throughout our communications.

Accordingly, please find enclosed CFF's check No. 105079 payable to City of Crystal in the amount of \$21,067.83, representing full payment of the 10% contributions, \$26,937.21, less the uncollectible retroactive amount for the period of January 1, 1988, through March 11, 1988, the effective date of Subdivision 8. I trust that this satisfactorily resolves the amounts in issue.

Please note that this payment is consistent with Mr. Kennedy's letter to you of May 7, 1990, except that Mr. Kennedy incorrectly identified February 11, 1988, as the effective date of Subdivision 8. In fact, February 11 was the date of enactment, not the effective date.

By reason of the enclosed payment, CFF respectfully requests that Crystal finalize its approval of CFF's lawful gambling license.

Thank you for your attention to this matter. CFF will continue to comply fully with all applicable lawful gambling statutes and regulations. Please contact me if you have any questions concerning the foregoing.

SUBJECT: Site Improvements at 5241 Hanson Court

In July of 1988, Beaver Machine relocated its business from 5249 to 5241 Hanson Court. Building modifications were performed at that time which required site improvements consistent with City policy. Originally, storm sewer and concrete were proposed in the rear parking area; however, this work was deleted by the Council given the possibility of future alley construction. Additionally, the proposed fence relocation could not be completed as the fence was installed and is maintained by Dumarks which abuts this property to the west.

The parking related improvements have been completed. The owner is at this time requesting the boulevard curbing be deleted from the improvement agreement. This curbing was intended as a means to prohibit parking on the boulevard. This practice is a problem with several of the businesses along Hanson Court in that the area between the street curb and the buildings is completely hard-surfaced with bituminous material. As I recall, sodding of the boulevard area was discussed previously but not pursued because of maintenance.

While I do not view this issue as critical to the operation of business, it does impact vehicular traffic in terms of sight distance and the proximity to access drives. For that reason I cannot recommend this item be dismissed without some resolution of the boulevard parking issue.

The owner, Jim Haberle, will be in attendance on Tuesday night to discuss this matter.

That the second party warrants and guarantees all work done under the agreement against any defect in workmanship, materials, or otherwise that may occur within one year from the date of final acceptance by the City of all said work and other requirements.

To hold the City harmless from any and all claims which may arise from third parties for any loss or damage sustained resulting from pursuance of the above-described work.

That all just claims incurred in the completion of aforementioned work requirements shall be paid in full by said second party to all persons doing work or furnishing skill, tools, machinery, services, materials, equipment, supplies or insurance.

All work pursuant hereto shall be in compliance with existing laws, ordinances, pertinent regulations, standards, specifications of the City of Crystal, and subject to approval of the City Engineer.

In the event that said second party has not completed any or all of the aforementioned work and requirements on the completion date as set forth herein, then in that event said second party shall be considered in default. Should said second party be in default, then said second party authorizes said City, its officers, its employees or its authorized agents to enter upon said second party's property and to complete any or all such uncompleted or improperly performed work or other requirements in conformity with this agreement.

That surety be deposited with the City in the amount of \$1,950 to insure the faithful performance of the above construction work and requirements, said surety to be in the form and manner as prescribed by law.





for Updating the Comprehensive Plan

After receiving seven proposals and interviewing four planning consultants, I am recommending the selection of The Hoisington Group, Inc., to update the City Comprehensive Plan.

This recommendation is based on the discussion of a four member staff selection committee comprised of The Public Works Director, The City Manager, The Redevelopment Coordinator and myself. We reviewed the seven proposals and selected four firms to be interviewed.

Two of the firms had submitted the lowest cost proposals and the other two firms were in the midrange cost, but were considered to present better proposals.

The staff was looking for a plan which can be used as an action plan for future development in the City and provide guidelines for planning decisions. We anticipate this document to be used, not only by the City Council, but also by the Planning Commission in their decisions. The firm selected had to not only provide us with background information, interpretation of that information, but also specific planning goals and the methods to achieve those goals.

The Hoisington proposal includes three firms which would provide us with background information. The general Hoisington group of planners, Dorton, Poquette Associates, to provide the demographic information and LSA Design, Inc. to provide some image concepts about the City.

The Selection Committee felt that it is time for the City to decide what its future is to be, what direction it wishes to go and then proceed to go that direction. Therefore, a full and comprehensive study of the City must be undertaken and the City must be willing to spend the money to accomplish this study.

We must be in a position to coordinate the activities of all City departments and commissions towards one goal. At this time, there is no coordinated department planning for looking into the future. This plan is proposed to do that.

The City is facing numerous challenges in terms of housing, redevelopment of commercial areas, the prevention of slum and blight, upgrading of streets and other public facilities and the focusing of City programs to meet the needs of the changing population. Such challenges require a multi-faceted comprehensive plan. These are the reasons why we selected Hoisington to update the City's plan.

Their proposal includes the basic planning services necessary to accomplish a basic document, but in addition, provides us with demographic materials, action steps, an attitudinal survey, City image concepts and neighborhood plans.

I recommend that the City Council hire The Hoisington Group at a fee not to exceed \$60,000 for an update of the Crystal Comprehensive Plan.

Even though the City of Crystal currently has an Agreement in place between NSP, West Hennepin Human Services (WHHS), and the City, NSP is requiring that the Agreement be updated to reflect changes in funding reimbursements to WHHS. Those changes are reflected in paragraphs 4, 5, and 6 of the Agreement. These funding reimbursement changes do not delete the City's State Grant funds since these are payments made directly by NSP.

The only significant change to the Program Agreement is that participants in the Energy Audit Program are no longer required to pay \$10.00 for the audit. The audit is now free to all participants. This is certainly a positive change for the program.

I recommend that the City Council approve the revised Agreement so that this program may continue through the end of the year as scheduled. As with the previously signed Agreement, this Agreement may continue past the end of the year providing funds are still available to support the program.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms and conditions stated herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Publicity</u>: The WHHS shall develop a program to stimulate interest and publicize the availability of the HEC in order to sign up households for the service. Promotions will be done with advertising, mailings and other direct communications. Upon request by the City or the WHHS, NSP will assist with publicity by providing mailing labels and offering advertising assistance at the option of NSP.
- 2. <u>Selection of Participants:</u> Any NSP residential customer qualifies for the HEC. The WHHS is responsible for encouraging senior citizens, handicapped persons, low income individuals and renters to receive a HEC.
- 3. <u>Customer Release Form:</u> The WHHS will obtain signed authorization from each participant in the HEC allowing NSP to release consumption data to the auditor. This release form, a sample of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as "Attachment A", shall be signed by each such participant prior to the release of the consumption data.
- 4. <u>Audits:</u> NSP shall reimburse the WHHS \$95 for each approved HEC completed through July 1, 1990 by a WHHS auditor. NSP shall reimburse the WHHS \$90 for each approved HEC completed from July 1 through December 31, 1990 by a WHHS auditor.
- 5. <u>Auditor Training:</u> NSP shall pay the tuition for the local training for up to two auditors, not to exceed a total of \$700, who will perform audits for a City sponsored CEC.

- 6. Energy Conservation Materials: As part of the reimbursement for each HEC, NSP shall require the WHHS to provide between \$20-\$25 worth of energy conservation materials for each home receiving the HEC, with \$5 of energy conservation materials specifically directed to electric conservation. A WHHS AUDITOR WILL IDENTIFY AND DEMONSTRATE THE INSTALLATION OF THE MATERIALS TO THE PARTICIPANTS, ANSWER QUESTIONS AND PROVIDE SPECIAL ASSISTANCE TO SENIOR CITIZENS, HANDICAPPED PERSONS, LOW INCOME INDIVIDUALS AND RENTERS.
- 7. <u>Literature:</u> NSP will provide information publications for the WHHS to offer to program participants.
- 8. <u>Referral and Assistance</u>: The WHHS auditors will inform participants of applicable energy assistance programs offered by the Energy Division of the Minnesota Department of Public Service, Minnesota Department of Economic Security, the City and other local agencies.
- 9. <u>Equipment</u>: NSP will assist the WHHS in obtaining the necessary equipment required to perform the HEC's.
- 10. Reporting Requirements: Each month, the WHHS shall submit an invoice to the NSP Regional Office Representative, in accordance with Section 15 of this Agreement, along with a list of participant names, addresses, account numbers and the number of renter and low income participants (hereafter called the Audit Summary) and a copy of the Audit signed by the customer. The NSP Regional Office will enter the data and forward the invoice to the NSP General Office for reimbursement to the WHHS. The audits, invoice and Audit Summary should be numbered consecutively from program start to finish for each calendar year.

The WHHS is responsible for recording the number of renters and low income individuals, a sample of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as "Attachment B", on each invoice.

In addition, the WHHS shall adhere to these and other NSP recordkeeping procedures as agreed when the program is initiated.

The WHHS shall grant NSP reasonable access to any books and records concerning the CEC and any of the funds and activities specified herein. The WHHS shall cooperate with NSP to respond to any requests for information or other relevant orders of the MPUC.

- 11. Reimbursement Procedure: If audit expenses satisfy the criteria stated herein, NSP shall send a check to the WHHS within 30 days after receipt of the itemized statement.
- 12. <u>Goodwill:</u> The City agrees that each employee, independent contractor, or other person performing any duties required of the City under this agreement shall be instructed to refrain from taking any action that will damage or injure the

reputation or goodwill of NSP. Should an event occur that violates this provision, the City and NSP will mutually agree as to the appropriate measures to be taken.

- 13. <u>Idemnity:</u> The City shall defend and hold NSP harmless against any claim, loss, judgment or liability, whether based on contract or tort liability, arising out of the performance or failure to perform under this Agreement, or any claimed defect in supplies or materials provided. This section shall survive the completion of, or termination of, this Agreement or any breach thereof.
- 13a The WHHS shall defend and hold NSP and the City harmless against any claim, loss, judgement or liability, whether based on contract or tort liability, arising out of the performance or failure to perform under this Agreement, or any claimed defect in supplies or materials provided. This section shall survive the completion of, or termination of this Agreement or any breach thereof.

WHHS shall have the following insurance: (1) Comprehensive General Liability Insurance policy (including owned and hired vehicles) with a \$600,000.00 combined single limit policy which includes protection against personal injury and property damage; (2) Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance policy (including owned and hired vehicles) with a \$600,000.00 combined single limit policy which includes protection against personal injury and property damage; (3) Workers' Compensation Insurance in accordance with Minnesota laws; and (4) In such insurance policy shall name NSP as an additional insured. A certificate of insurance shall be forwarded to NSP. This section shall survive the completion of, or termination of this Agreement or any breach thereof.

- 14. Term: The term of this Agreement shall commence may 1, 90 and shall continue through December 31, 1990 and then shall continue for successive periods of one year, provided, however, that either party may, for its sole convenience, terminate this Agreement upon thirty days written notice to the other party. In the event that NSP terminates this contract, the City and the WHHS shall be entitled to recover for all services performed prior to receipt of a notice for termination, but no amount shall be allowed on unperformed services.
- 15. All information should be sent by United States mail, postage thereon prepaid.

The WHHS shall direct information to the appropriate NSP representative as discussed in the Reporting Requirements section. The correct addresses and telephone numbers are as follows:

Establishment of City Paper Procurement

Policies

There is one item that was on the May 3rd HRG agenda which needs to be handled by June 1, 1990. This item is establishment of the City Paper Procurement Policies. Hennepin County Resolution #89-12-962 dictates that Cities must establish Paper Procurement Policies similar to the County Policy by June 1, 1990, in order to continue receiving County recycling funding reimbursement.

I have drafted the attached Paper Procurement Policy for each of the three HRG cities. The policy is based on the County Paper Procurement Policy but is somewhat more specific then the County policy. I have also added a paragraph to the end of the policy stating that the cities will pursue purchase of other types of recycled materials. This could be applied in the purchase of park equipment, street equipment, etc. Many new products made from recyclable plastic are now available at competitive prices, which should be pursued.

Please place this resolution as an item on your next Council agenda as it needs to be approved by June 1, 1990, to meet the County requirements.

#### RESOLUTION 90 -

WHEREAS, the Crystal City Council wishes to promote recycling through the purchasing and use of recycled materials, which is important to the creation of markets for recycled materials; and

WHEREAS, the Crystal City Council wishes to complete the recycling loop wherever possible in City operations; and

WHEREAS, paper is the single largest component of the Cities' office waste produced in daily operations;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the following paper procurement policy be adopted by the City Council of the City of Crystal and used by all City departments no later than June 1, 1990:

- The policy of the City will be to purchase recycled paper containing at least 50% recycled fiber whenever the cost of recycled paper does not exceed 25% more than the cost of virgin stock.
- Recycled content paper will be used in all convenience copiers throughout City offices.
- All paper used in computer printers will be recycled paper, including form-fed and laser printers.
- 4. All one-time-use-only paper (such as memo paper, note pads, telephone message pads, and notebook paper) will be recycled paper.
- All stationery and business cards will be printed on recycled paper.
- 6. All professional printing ordered by any department will be requested on recycled paper stock of at least 50% recycled content.
- 7. The use of minimum impact paper (paper made without deinking and bleaching throughout a process which uses less water and chemicals) will be applied when possible.
- 8. Any new service contracts for convenience copiers should require the capability of handling two-sided copying on recycled paper.
- Any new duplicating machines purchased or leased by the City must be capable of handling recycled paper.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that City staff members are hereby directed to pursue other opportunities to buy recycled masterials other than paper products where possible in City operations, including but not limited to, recycled plastics and rubber.

Reconstruction Project

Consultant proposals for the 36th Avenue Reconstruction Project were requested from four area engineering firms. All four firms are known to possess the capabilities to handle this type and size project based on their experience with other clients in the public sector. In an effort to ensure consistency, general information to all the firms regarding the scope of Crystal's project was provided during a single meeting with the Engineering Department.

Copies of the consultant proposals for 36th Avenue are attached. You will find that the four documents are all very similar in that the basic format for this type of proposal is rather standard. While all four firms are well represented, the proposal from Rieke Carroll Muller Associates, Inc. (RCM) is especially noteworthy in its outline of the Project Approach starting on page 4. The identification of the issues and how those issues would be addressed in the feasibility, design and construction phases is quite comprehensive.

In terms of cost, three of the four firms outline the same approach based on a percentage of project costs. The costs range from 14 to 16 percent of the final construction cost. One firm is more detailed in its cost data but in so doing is committing to a specific design (staff's proposal) which at this time needs further study.

Based on my past dealings with RCM on similar projects and the proposal they have submitted on this project, I recommend RCM be designated as engineer for the 36th Avenue Reconstruction Project. Further, that staff be authorized to prepare the necessary contract for consideration on a future agenda.

At this time I am also recommending the Council reaffirm its action of March 13, 1990, authorizing preparation of the feasibility study. This action is requested only so the authorization can be put in the form of a resolution.

- Maryland Avenue/Dale Street -- Design of approximately 2.5 miles of new storm sewer, detention pond siting study/design, paving for about 2.3 miles of streets, and conversion of existing combined sewers into storm sewers. The project includes a sophisticated public information program. The siting of the storm water detention pond will include a study of possible treatment methods to mitigate the impact of non-direct storm water discharges to Loeb Lake and the Willow Reserve Bird Sanctuary and Wildlife Area. The project evaluated options for CSAH and MSAS designations and funding.
- Jackson Street/Magnolia Avenue -- Designed 1.7 miles of new storm sewer, storm
  water detention pond, conversion of existing combined sewer into sanitary sewer,
  and paving for 1.8 miles of streets; including evaluation of two alternate alignments,



### ESTIMATED PROJECT FEE

For purposes of this proposal the project fee is based on the \$700,000 Construction Cost as shown in your Request for Proposal. Engineering fees for each Phase, with the exception of Phase I, Feasibility Study, are identified as a percent of Construction Cost.

At this time it is not possible to accurately define the project scope for phases II-VI. Following completion of the Feasibility Study (Phase I), it will be possible for the City and HNTB to mutually negotiate the type of fee agreement (lump sum, hourly, not-to-exceed, etc.) and amount of fee associated with each phase when the exact scope of services is known. The ranges of engineering fees shown are consistent with other projects of this nature that we have completed. We believe this approach is fairest to both the City and HNTB. Please note that no project phase will be initiated without prior authorization by the City.
