SUBJECT: Preliminary Agenda for the August 7, 1990 Council

Meeting

Under the Consent Agenda:

Item 1: Consideration of an itinerant food establishment license for Annies Candy at the Crystal Frolics for July 27 through July 29, 1990. The Health Department, upon inspecting the establishment at the Frolics and carnival, determined that one of the applicants had no license whatsoever. The establishment was Annies Candy and they were required to buy a license. Although it is after the fact I would recommend approval of that license.

Regular Agenda:

Item 1: Continued consideration of a charitable gambling license application for 494 Ministry. Attached is the police department's investigation and recommendation. Relative to this I would concur with their recommendation that we not grant the license.

Item 2: Consideration of a lawful gambling license application from Hartinger Foundation, 6101 Dupont Avenue North. Again, the police department's report is attached. I again concur with their recommendation that we not grant the license.

Item 3: Consideration of grading permit application and easement acquisition approval for property at 6427 - 41st Avenue North. I believe Bill is bringing this application to the Council more out of frustration than anything. He has been unable over a long period of time to be able to get the applicant to properly grade the existing front yard and to cooperate with the City in acquiring easements. From the plans that we have we really don't know what the individual wants to do and I think there is concern on the part of several staff and I'm sure neighbors that the yard will stay in the condition of the existing yard rather than be restored if grading is allowed.

Item 4: Reconsideration of rezoning at 6048 and 6058 Lakeland Avenue North. Dan Pearson, the applicant in this particular case, has approached the City with a revised site plan and requests that the Council not wait until the comprehensive plan is completed but rezone his property and allow him to build his used car lot at this time. The first action that the Council would have to take is to decide whether to reconsider the matter and the second action, if the Council does decide to reconsider,

would be the rezoning. I still don't think that it is a bad idea to wait and see what is recommended for that whole area but I realize this could be a financial hardship on the applicant. However, in talking to the present owner of the property, he indicated to me that the deal is not a firm deal or that the applicant does not have to go through with the deal unless he gets the rezoning. So, I think he does have an out according to the person selling him the property.

Item 5: Ed has installed a sign over the Entertainment Center at Becker. The sign does not meet certain City requirements regarding combustibility, etc. I should also mention that the Council did not approve the sign when it was requested back a couple of years ago before a change in the Council. Ed has indicated that he will be there to discuss the matter with the Council.

Item 7: Consideration of Subrecipient Agreement with Hennepin County for administration of Community Development Block Grant Program. This is one of several agreements we have with the county to administer the Community Development Block Grant Program. It is a routine matter that we approve every year and I would recommend the Council's approval.

Item 9: Consideration of approving a feasibility study for a golf course. The Council discussed this sometime back and decided to table it to see how the budget and City finances were looking for this year. I believe we also talked about the possibility that we would be doing a survey of residents' feelings. It might be good to get that done before we do this. We are in the process right now of working up the questions which are later on the agenda Tuesday night. There are questions and they are relative to a golf course. The funding source for this was suppose to be the PIR. I frankly would recommend that we not go ahead with this until after we do the survey and really take a good look at where we are financially and the other request for funding from the PIR that will be coming forward. My recommendation would be the same for item #10, the Nature Interpretative Center. I think the Park & Recreation Department has probably more than it can handle right now with the new Community Center without trying to do more new things. I guess another consideration you might give to the Nature Interpretative Center, we don't have budget money enough to properly run the facilities we have now. I don't know why we are studying building more facilities.

Item 13: Review of community survey questions. The staff and consultants for the Comprehensive Plan have been working with Decision Resources to develop a survey for the community. These are the proposed questions. We would like your input and suggestions for additions, deletions, or whatever and we will get that back to the consultant.

Item 14: We would like to set the date for a work session for the City Council to talk about the housing code and some other miscellaneous matters. We will give the Council notice on an agenda before then and will discuss any other items that the Council might want to bring up.

Item 15: Discussion of improvement proposals within Memory Lane Pond Watershed. Attached is information from the Public Works Director Bill Monk on this. I would recommend that we go ahead and work with New Hope on this as this and future improvements to the pumping system out of Gaulke Pond are necessary if we are going to improve the drainage down through this particular system.



Per the request July 5, we have conducted an investigation into the 494 Ministry's request for a charitable gambling permit.

The 494 Ministry was set up to offer spiritual guidance to the hospitality industry on the 494 strip. The gambling manager for the 494 Ministry is Herbert Duane Howard, DOB 3/14/14. Mr. Howard is clear of warrants and has no identifiable criminal record.

We next checked with different agencies to find their experience with the 494 Ministry. The Better Business Bureau has no information on 494. The Minnesota Charity Review Council has had no contact with them within the last year. The Attorney General Charity Unit advised us they are not required to file.

In checking with the Attorney General's Charitable Gambling Unit, we found that the 494 Ministry raises most of its money through charitable gambling.

We then checked with Gambling Enforcement and the Gambling Control Board. They have looked at how much operating money is raised from charitable gambling, and if all funds are from charitable gambling, that is a violation.

The major concern of the Gambling Enforcement and Gambling Control Board was with Stanley Babel, the accountant for 494 Ministry. Babel has been involved in gambling enterprises which have been questionable in the past. All these groups have had gambling managers in their 60's and 70's and the same is now true with the 494 Ministry. Babel has had control of the monies, not just books. Investigators have found his accounting practices to be of concern and have looked at them. Specifically, Babel was involved in the

Guadalupe Mexican Education Fund, which had numerous money problems. Babel wrote a check on the Guadalupe account on 8/22/88 to the 494 Ministry for \$14,000. Babel allegedly did not have the authority to issue checks at this time and it is unknown if those monies were ever repaid. Babel is also involved in a bingo hall operation in Arden Hills, where allegations of skimming have arisen.

Due to this investigation and the facts garnered from other agencies, I would recommend a denial of this application.

In response to your memorandum dated 07/24/90, we have completed the background investigation for the application of the Hartinger Foundation prior to them being issued a gambling license.

We ran the usual checks with the Attorney General's Office, the Charitable Gambling Division and found no outstanding complaints against the Hartinger Foundation. Criminal history checks were run on the parties involved and they did not have any outstanding criminal history. The Better Business Bureau was checked and there were no outstanding complaints. In addition, there are no current jail records with any of the participants of this foundation in the City of Crystal.

It appears that the parties involved in The Church of All Saints Gambling Application and the Hartinger Foundation Gambling Application are the same with the exception of the Paddock owner, Joseph Hartinger.

In checking with the Gambling Enforcement Division of the State of Minnesota, they told us that there are no outstanding complaints or investigations pending with The Church of All Saints or the Hartinger Foundation. We then called the Gambling Control Board at the State of Minnesota and it appears there is a problem as they have not completed their investigation of the Hartinger Foundation and have found that the Officers of the Hartinger Foundation are the same named persons that are the Officers in The Church of All Saints License Application. The State is unclear as to why there are two organizations applying for gambling licenses and stated they would be checking further and letting us know what they find.

I am recommending that a license <u>not</u> be issued to the Hartinger Foundation until the question of dual officer and memberships in these two organizations is cleared up. It is unclear why they are establishing two separate charitable gambling operations but we hope to discover that reason in the near future. In the mean time I would recommend that a license <u>not</u> be issued.







- The organization must have at the gambling premises a current inventory of gambling equipment, a sketch with dimensions of the premises available for review, and a clear physical separation or divider between the lessee's gambling equipment and the lessor's business equipment.
- The organization will be responsible for ensuring that the lessor's business activities are not conducted on the leased premises.
- If the lease is cancelled prior to the termination date of this lease, each party agrees to notify the Gambling Control Board explaining the reasons for the cancellation. The lease shall be terminated immediately for any gambling, liquor, prostitution or tax evasion violations occurring on the premises.



In reference to the sanitary sewer easement, City records show a utility easement was acquired across the west edge of this property by condemnation in 1955. A sanitary sewer was constructed through the area soon afterwards. When this property was registered in 1978, the City did not register its claim to this utility easement, for whatever reason, and thereby forfeited its claim. At this point, Crystal has a sanitary sewer crossing private property without an easement.

Although a formal appraisal has not been prepared, the value of the easement is estimated between \$500 and \$2,000 depending on whether credit is given for use of the easement/pipe from 1978 to today. The owner is asking for a monetary settlement of \$3,862.50 for the easement and \$300 for fence replacement.

While staff has indicated a settlement on the easement is possible as an alternative to condemnation which carries a high administrative process price tag, no action has been finalized given the status of the front yard situation. Based on the Council's reaction on the grading permit issue, staff will initiate final action on the easement.



Mr. Ed Brandeen of the City Park Department recently had installed a very attractive sign over the arch way of the Becker Park Shelter stage. I became aware of this sign after the fact and find it to be in violation of the City Sign Ordinance relative to combustible materials.

The sign is an integral sign. These types of signs are allowed without a permit or annual sign license but shall comply with all other provisions of the sign code, Section 406.15. The Ordinance specifies that certain types of signs shall be constructed of noncombustible materials. This sign is solid wood.

I receive requests constantly from business owners and sign companies requesting approval for signs to be wood. I have to say no per the Ordinance. These are certain circumstances depending on type of construction when appendages must be noncombustible. This includes signs.

I would suggest that if this is granted that we amend the current Ordinance and let the Building Code determine if the signs need to be noncombustible or not.

SUBJECT: Subrecipient Agreements/Year XVI CDBG Program

The attached agreement is a regulatory requirement of the CDBG Program. Before disbursement of any Year XVI CDBG funds can be made, the Agreement must be signed between Hennepin County and the City of Crystal.

The City of Crystal will also be required to sign a Third Party Agreement with the Crystal Economic Development Authority regarding the implementation of the Home Improvement Deferred Loan Program. A Third Party Agreement will also have to be approved by the City of Crystal and the Greater Minneapolis Daycare Association regarding implementation of the Daycare Program. Those agreements will be placed on the City Council Agenda after they are received from Hennepin County.

I have reviewed the attached Subrecipient Agreement and have found the only change from the previous year's agreement to be the addition of items 25-28.

It should also be noted that the City of Crystal's Year XVI CDBG allotment has been reduced by \$1,139.00 from the amount previously allotted by the County. All Hennepin County Cities had their allotments reduced since Hennepin County exceeded HUD's minimum requirement for quantity of funding going to public service activities. I have requested that the reduction in funding be deducted from the Scattered Site Acquisition Fund.

The attached executed agreement must be returned to Hennepin County by no later than Friday, August 24, 1990.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Recipient has received a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) entitlement allocation under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, to carry out various community development activities in cooperation with Subrecipient; and

WHEREAS, \$ 11,800 from Federal Fiscal Year 1990 CDBG funds has been approved by Recipient for use by Subrecipient for the implementation of eligible and fundable community development activity/ies as included in and a part of the 1990 Statement of Objectives and Projected Use of Funds, Urban Hennepin County Community Development Block Grant program and as set forth in the Statement of Work described in Exhibit 1 to this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Subrecipient agrees to assume certain responsibilities for the implementation of the approved activities described in Exhibit 1, said responsibilities being specified in part in the Joint Cooperation Agreement executed between Recipient and Subrecipient and in the 1990 Statement of Objectives and Projected Use of Funds, Urban Hennepin County CDBG program and the Certifications contained therein.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereunto do hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The Subrecipient shall expend all or any part of its CDBG allocation only on those activities identified in Exhibit 1.
- The Uniform Administrative Requirements, as promulgated in 24 CFR 570.502, shall apply to all activities undertaken by the Subrecipient provided for in this Agreement or by any program income generated therefrom.
- 3. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for procurement of all supplies, equipment, services, and construction necessary for implementation of its activity/ies. Procurement shall be carried out in accordance with the "Common Rule" provisions (24 CFR 85) (which replace OMB Circular A-102 for the purposes of this Agreement), the procurement requirements of the Subrecipient, and all provisions of the Community Development Block Grant Regulations, 24 CFR 570 (the most restrictive of which will take precedence). The Subrecipient shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, all advertise-

ments, negotiations, notices, and documents; enter into all contracts; and conduct all meetings, conferences, and interviews as necessary to insure compliance with the above described procurement requirements. The Recipient shall provide advise and staff assistance to the Subrecipient to carry out its CDBG-funded activity/ies.

- 4. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for carrying out all acquisitions of real property necessary for implementation of the activity/ies. The Subrecipient shall conduct all such acquisitions in its name and shall hold title to all properties purchased. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for preparation of all notices, appraisals, and documentation required in conducting acquisition under the latest applicable regulations of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970 and of the CDBG Program. The Subrecipient shall also be responsible for providing all relocation notices, counseling, and services required by said regulations. The Recipient shall provide advice and staff assistance to the Subrecipient to carry out its CDBG-funded activity/ies.
- 5. The Subrecipient shall comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 as required under 24 CFR 570.606(a) and HUD implementing regulations at 24 CFR 42; the requirements in 24 CFR 570.606(b) governing the residential antidisplacement and relocation assistance plan under section 104(d) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (the Act); the relocation requirements of 24 CFR 570.606(c) governing displacement subject to section 104(k) of the Act; and the requirements of 24 CFR 570.606(d) governing optional relocation assistance under section 105(a)(11) of the Act.
- CDBG funds it receives, such records to be maintained in accordance with OMB Circulars A-87 and the "Common Rule" provisions (24 CFR 85) and in accordance with OMB Circular A-110 and A-122, as applicable. All records shall be made available, upon request of the Recipient, for inspection/s and audit/s by the Recipient or its representatives. If a financial audit/s determines that the Subrecipient has improperly expended CDBG funds, resulting in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development disallowing such expenditures, the Recipient reserves the right to recover from the Subrecipient such disallowed expenditures from non-CDBG sources. Audit procedures are specified below in Section 22 of this Agreement.
- 7. The Subrecipient shall take all necessary actions, not only to comply with the stipulations as set out in Exhibit 1, but to comply with any requests by the Recipient in that connection; it being understood that the Recipient has responsibility to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for insuring compliance with such requirements. The Subrecipient also will promptly notify the Recipient of any changes in the scope or character of the activity/ies which it is implementing.

- 8. a. The Subrecipient does hereby agree to release, indemnify, and hold harmless the Recipient from and against all costs, expenses, claims, suits or judgments arising from or growing out of any injuries, loss or damage sustained by any person or corporation, including employees of Subrecipient and property of Subrecipient, which are caused by or sustained in connection with the tasks carried out by the Subrecipient under this Agreement.
 - b. The Subrecipient does further agree that in order to protect itself as well as the Recipient under the indemnity agreement provisions hereinabove set forth it will at all times during the term of this Agreement and any renewal thereof, have and keep in force: a single limit or combined limit or excess umbrella commercial and general liability insurance policy of an amount of not less than \$600,000 for property damage arising from one occurrence, \$600,000 for damages arising from death and/or total bodily injuries arising from one occurrence, and \$600,000 for total personal injuries arising from one occurrence. Such policy shall also include contractual liability coverage protecting the Recipient, its officers, agents and employees by a certificate acknowledging this Agreement between the Subrecipient and the Recipient.
- 9. The Recipient agrees to provide the Subrecipient with Community Development Block Grant funds in such amounts as agreed upon in this Agreement to enable the Subrecipient to carry out its CDBG-eligible activity/ies as described in Exhibit 1. It is understood that the Recipient shall be held accountable to HUD for the lawful expenditure of CDBG funds under this Agreement. The Recipient shall therefore make no payment of CDBG funds to the Subrecipient and draw no funds from HUD/U.S. Treasury on behalf of a Subrecipient activity/ies, prior to having received a proper Hennepin County Warrant Request form from the Subrecipient for the expenses incurred, as well as copies of all documents and records needed to insure that the Subrecipient has complied with the appropriate regulations and requirements.
- 10. The Recipient shall maintain the environmental review record on all activities. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for providing necessary information to the Recipient to accomplish this task.
- 11. The Recipient shall be responsible for the preparation of all requests for HUD for wage rate determinations on CDBG activities undertaken by the Subrecipient. The Subrecipient shall notify the Recipient prior to initiating any activity, including advertising for contractual services which will include costs likely to be subject to the provisions on Federal Labor Standards and Equal Employment Opportunity and related implementing regulations. The Recipient will provide technical assistance to the Subrecipient to insure compliance with these requirements.
- 12. The Recipient agrees to provide technical assistance to the Subrecipient in the form of oral and/or written guidance and on-site

assistance regarding Community Development Block Grant procedures and project management. This assistance will be provided as requested by the Subrecipient, and at other times, at the initiative of the Recipient, when new or updated information concerning the CDBG Program is received by the Recipient and deemed necessary to be provided to the Subrecipient.

- 13. The Recipient shall have authority to review any and all procedures and all materials, notices, documents, etc., prepared by the Subrecipient in implementation of this Agreement, and the Subrecipient agrees to provide all information required by any person authorized by the Recipient to request such information from the Subrecipient for the purpose of reviewing the same.
- 14. In accordance with the provisions of 24 CFR 85.43, suspension or termination of this Agreement may occur if the Subrecipient materially fails to comply with any term of this Agreement. This Agreement may be terminated for convenience in accordance with 24 CFR 85.44. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause by either party hereto by giving thirty (30) days written notice of such termination. CDBG funds allocated to the Subrecipient under this Agreement may not be obligated or expended by the Subrecipient following such date of termination. Any funds allocated to the Subrecipient under this Agreement which remain unobligated or unspent following such date of termination shall automatically revert to the Recipient.
- 15. Any material alterations, variations, modifications or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an Amendment to this Agreement signed and approved by the respective parties, governing bodies and properly executed by the authorized representatives of the parties. All Amendments to this Agreement shall be made a part of this Agreement by inclusion in Exhibit 2 which shall be attached at the time of any Amendment.
- 16. All data collected, created, received, maintained or disseminated for any purposes by the activities of the Subrecipient in the performance of this Agreement is governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, and all other statutory provisions governing data privacy, the Minnesota Rules implementing such act now in force or hereafter adopted, as well as Federal regulations on data privacy.
- 17. During the performance of this Agreement, the Subrecipient agrees to the following: In accordance with the Hennepin County Affirmative Action Policy and the County Commissioners' Policies Against Discrimination, no person shall be excluded from full employment rights or participation in, or the benefits of, any program, service or activity on the grounds of race, color, creed, religion, age, sex, disability, marital status, affectional/sexual preference, public assistance status, ex-offender status, or national origin; and no person who is protected by applicable federal or state laws against discrimination shall be otherwise subjected to discrimination.

- 18. The effective date of this Agreement is July 1, 1990. The termination date of this Agreement is December 31, 1991, or at such time as the activity/ies constituting part of this Agreement are satisfactorily completed prior thereto. Upon expiration, the Subrecipient shall relinquish to the Recipient all program funds unexpended or uncommitted for the activities described in Exhibit 1.
- 19. If the Subrecipient generated any program income as a result of the expenditure of CDBG funds, the provisions of 24 CFR 570.504 shall apply, as well as the following specific stipulations:
 - a. The Subrecipient recognizes that it must notify the Recipient of any program income within ten (10) days of the date that such program income is generated. When program income is generated by an activity that is only partially assisted with CDBG funds, the income shall be prorated to reflect the percentage of CDBG funds used.
 - b. That any such program income must be paid to the Recipient by the Subrecipient as soon as practicable after such program income is generated or may be retained by the Subrecipient, as specifically identified in Exhibit 1.
 - c. The Subrecipient further recognizes that the Recipient has the responsibility for monitoring and reporting to HUD on the use of any such program income. The responsibility for appropriate recordkeeping by the Subrecipient and reporting to the Recipient by the Subrecipient on the use of such program income is hereby recognized by the Subrecipient. The Recipient agrees to provide technical assistance to the Subrecipient in establishing an appropriate and proper recordkeeping and reporting system, as required by HUD.
 - d. That in the event of close-out or change in status of the Subrecipient, any program income that is on hand or received subsequent to the close-out or change in status shall be paid to Recipient as soon as practicable after the income is received. The Recipient agrees to notify the Subrecipient, should close-out or change in status of the Subrecipient occur.
- 20. Any real property under the control of the Subrecipient that was acquired or improved, in whole or in part, using CDBG funds in excess of \$25,000 shall either be:
 - a. Used to meet one of the national objectives in 24 CFR 570.208 until five years after expiration of this Agreement; or
 - b. Disposed of in a manner that results in the Recipient's being reimbursed in the amount of the current fair market value of the property less any portion of the value attributable to expenditures of non-CDBG funds for acquisition of, or improvement to, the property.

- 21. The following standards shall apply to real property under the control of the Subrecipient that was acquired or improved, in whole or in part, using CDBG funds:
 - a. The Subrecipient shall inform the Recipient at least thirty (30) days prior to any modification or change in the use of the real property from that planned at the time of acquisition or improvements including disposition.
 - b. The Subrecipient shall reimburse the Recipient in an amount equal to the current fair market value (less any portion thereof attributable to expenditures of non-CDBG funds) of property acquired or improved with CDBG funds that is sold or transferred for a use which does not qualify under the CDBG regulations. Said reimbursement shall be provided to the Recipient at the time of sale or transfer of the property referenced herein.
 - c. Any program income generated from the disposition or transfer of property prior to or subsequent to the close-out, change of status or termination of the Joint Cooperation Agreement between the Recipient and the Subrecipient shall be repaid to the Recipient at the time of disposition or transfer of the property.
- 22. The Subrecipient agrees to provide Recipient with an annual audit consistent with the Single Audit Act of 1984, (U.S. Public Law 98-502) and the implementing requirements of OMB Circular A-128, Audits of State and Local Governments, and, as applicable, OMB Circular A-110, Uniform Requirements for Grants to Universities, Hospitals and Non-Profit Organizations.
 - a. The audit is to be provided to Recipient on July 1 of each year this Agreement is in effect and any findings of noncompliance affecting the use of CDBG funds shall be satisfied by Subrecipient within six (6) months of the provision date.
 - b. The audit is not required, however, in those instances where less than \$25,000 in assistance is received from all Federal sources in any one fiscal year.
 - c. The audit may not be paid from CDBG funds.
 - d. The Recipient reserves the right to recover, from non-CDBG sources, any CDBG expenses which are disallowed by the audit.
- 23. The Subrecipient shall comply with the applicable section of 24 CFR 570.200, particularly sections (b) (Special Policies Governing Facilities); (c) (Special Assessments); (f) (Means of Carrying Out Eligible Activities); and (j) (Constitutional prohibitions Concerning Church/State Activities).

- 24. The Subrecipient shall comply with the Lead-Based Paint notification, inspection, testing and abatement procedures established in 24 CFR 570.608.
- 25. The Subrecipient shall be prohibited from receiving CDBG funds for activity/ies subject to this Agreement should it not affirmatively further fair housing within its own jurisdiction or impedes action taken by Recipient to comply with the fair housing certification.
- 26. No federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Subrecipient, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal Grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 27. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," will be completed and submitted in accordance with its instructions.
- 28. The use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies against any individuals engaged in nonviolent civil rights demonstrations within the jurisdiction of the Subrecipient is prohibited.

Crystal Community Center

For the past two months Crystal has enjoyed their new "focal point" the Crystal Communi-

ty Center.

The Community Center was formerly located in the Thorson School building. They closed their doors in June of 1988 due to excessive maintenance costs. "The costs were projected to reach one million dollars within: a 3 year period," explained Ed Brandeen, Crystal Park & Recreation Director.

After the Crystal Community Center Referendum Committee was formed, planning began for a new recreational facility. Members of the committee consisted of people from a variety of community organizations. By having this diversity of people, the committee was able to bring everyone's needs

to the drawing table.

In the fall of 1987 Anderson Dale Architects, Inc. conducted a space needs analysis to determine how much space was necessary to meet the Park & Recreation programming requirements. Results from this study indicated that the space needed would exceed the space that was available at the Thorson School building.

Based on these results the committee developed a preliminary design for the Community Center. A public information program presented everyone with models, costs and a

variety of visual aids.

In November 1988 the referendum was met and the bid was "on budget." The construction began last July and was finished this past

The center is approximately 34,700 square feet and offers facilities for all ages. The Park & Recreation Department is located in the center and has a variety of rooms available for use.

The gymnasium provides facilities for one full court or three cross-court basketball courts and 2 shuffleboard areas. Their stage is available for performances ranging from recitals to concerts, and plays. The seating capacity is 1,962.

Another room that is available for a wide variety of activities is the Minnesota Room. Since one end of the room is linked to the kitchen, it makes it nice for a meeting or a reception, and has a seating capacity of 205

people.

A child care area is available. The cost is \$1.00 per child, per hour. This area holds up to 12 people.

If you like exercise or art they have the



room to meet your needs. Their crafts activity room has a capacity for 50 people and is designed to meet the needs of arts, crafts & exercises.

Besides their pool tables, the center offers a game room with ping pong tables & video games. This room is also available for midsize group meetings.

Two meeting rooms are also available and can be combined into one large meeting area that joins the kitchen. These rooms are ideal for catered banquets or receptions.

Anyone who wants to be part of the Jet Scream must be at least 42" tall to slide alone. When children age 5 and under are accompanied by a paying adult they slide for free.

Life guards will be on hand to watch behavior on the slides as well as punching tickets. Up to the minute reports are available on'the slide line at 531-0353.

Swimmers are able to purchase packages of 4 rides, 12 rides or unlimited rides and prices will vary depending on the package purchased. The slide is also available to rent for birthday parties, from 8-20 people. Call 531-0052 for further details or if you would like to make a reservation.

If you haven't had the chance, do stop by and take a tour of the beautiful facilities or slide down the Jet Scream. Then you'll understand why Brandeen considers it "the focal point" of the city.



GOLF COURSE FEASIBILITY STUDY

To determine the need for constucting a golf course in the City of Crystal.

Estimated Cost of Study: \$11,000

Rationale: Crystal residents have inquired into the feasibility of locating a par-3 golf course in the City of Crystal. Several golf courses located in close proximity to our city are very busy with leagues, open golf, etc. and it is difficult to find an opening to play. Currently, over 35,000 rounds per year are being played at the New Hope and Brooklyn Center courses. These courses will not allow additional leagues to use their facilities. The Park and Recreation Advisory Commission held a golf informational meeting in 1988 at the Bassett Creek shelter. Residents attending his meeting seemed to be in favor of a golf course in the city.

Study Format/Information: The feasibility study for this type of facility would include but not be limited to the following:

- 1. List of special site considerations terrain, soil, trees, etc.
- Financing costs
 - a. construction costs
 - b. start-up costs including equipment and personnel
 - c. annual cost of operation of course
 - d. method of financing
- 3. Recommendations on size of proposed course
 - a. land needed for acquisition and cost

- Identify market for golf course 4.
 - a. potential clienteleb. future clientele
- 5. Provide net income potential estimation for a five-year period.
- List any alternative forms of ownership and 6. operation/leasing
- 7. Outlining methods of blending/complementing nearby community park
- 8. Outline and identify future steps for implementation

ENVIRONMENTAL INTERPRETATIVE CENTER/PARK FEASIBILITY STUDY

Purpose: To determine need the need for construction of a Environmental Interpretative Center in the City of Crystal

Established Cost of study: - \$6,500

Rationale: The City of Crystal has leased the MAC land east of the Crystal airport for the past 20+ years. This land supports many species of wildlife habitat, with wetlands and treed areas. There presently are trailway/walkways which are very suitable for a nature Interpretative Area. This site is very similar to the interpretative areas of Roseville, St. Louis Park and Woodlake,

Why an Interpretative Area? To provide within a metropolitan area, a unique opportunity to enjoy the complex relationships of man and his natural environment.

Study Formal/Information: The feasibility study for this type of facility would include but would not be limited to the following:

- Develop a needs assessment for this facility as well as program for the City of Crystal.
- Outline the following costs for this facility.
 - a. costs for development of the proposed site.
 - b. identify structure needs and costs.
 - c. costs for operation/maintenance of the site.
 - d. identify all income sources.
- Outline of an activities program for the proposed Environmental Center as well as costs associated with such a program.
- 4. Identify present and potential clientele.
- Develop plan whereby this park would complement proposed trailway around Twin Lake.
- 6. Methods of co-operation by adjoining suburbs to finance and operate area.
- Identify future steps for implementation of facility/site.
