

SUBJECT: Civil Service/Personnel System

As you may have heard, the City Council is considering eliminating the Civil Service Commission and establishing a personnel ordinance and an independent review board to deal with non-union employee grievances after normal grievance procedures have been exhausted. The City Council will meet again on August 21, 1990 to further discuss this matter.

For the past year the Crystal Charter Commission has been studying the role of Crystal Civil Service Commission and

For the past year the Crystal Charter Commission has been studying the role of Crystal Civil Service Commission and personnel administration system of the City. The consensus of the Charter Commission and the Civil Service Commission members is that the City would be better served by a personnel system set up by ordinance (similar to many other Twin Cities metro area personnel ordinances) combined with an independent review board to deal with non-union employee grievances.

In general this means abolishing the Civil Service Commission and establishing an Employee Review Board by City ordinance. The proposal also means that the City would adopt a comprehensive personnel system governing all matters of personnel administration including hiring, position classification, discipline, grievance procedures and benefits.

The sole function of the Employee Review Board (board members established by City Council) would be to provide an independent review of non-union employee grievances that had proceeded through the complete grievance procedures set up by the personnel ordinance. The board's review of grievances would be discretionary, but if undertaken the board's order either confirming the City Manager's final disposition of the grievance or modifying it would be final.

As with any personnel ordinance or system within the State of Minnesota, the City will be required to continue to follow guidelines set out by the State in regards to labor relations, affirmative action, EEO, wage laws, veterans' preference, etc. Changing from a Civil Service type system to a personnel ordinance should help to update the hiring process for the City of Crystal. Union employees still have

the opportunity to grieve through their union contract procedures.

If all goes as planned, a personnel ordinance and Employee Review Board will be developed and in place in early 1991.

Your questions or comments regarding a switch from a Civil Service System to a Personnel System should be directed to Nancy Gohman, Assistant Manager. Nancy will try to handle your questions regarding this matter.

CHARTER COMMISSION

Mayor Herbes and Members of the City Council 4141 Douglas Drive North Crystal, Minnesota 55422

Dear Mayor Herbes and Councilmembers:

For the past year the Crystal Charter Commission has been studying the role of the Crystal Civil Service Commission in the personnel administration system of the City. The Commission has heard testimony from the Civil Service Commission (Art Cunningham and Marty Gates) and City staff on the matter and has reviewed the practice in other cities.

The consensus of the Commission and the Civil Service Commission members is that the City would be better served by a personnel merit system set up by ordinance combined with an independent review board to deal with non-union employee grievances after normal grievance procedures had been exhausted. This can be accomplished by a charter amendment and the enactment of the necessary ordinances establishing the merit system and the Employee Review Board.

The Commission recommends the adoption of the Charter Amendment Ordinance and submits the draft Employee Review Board Ordinance for your consideration recognizing that its final content is a matter of Council judgment. I should point out, too, that if the transition from Civil Service to Merit System is to take place a comprehensive Merit System Ordinance covering all matters of personnel administration must be adopted. The Charter Commission would be pleased to participate in the preparation of that ordinance in any way the Council wishes.

I. General Comments.

In general, the Commission proposes (i) amendment of the City Charter by deleting all references to the Civil Service Commission, (ii) abolishing the Civil Service Commission, (iii) requiring the establishment of an Employee Review Board by ordinance, and (iv) the adoption by the City Council of an ordinance establishing the Board and prescribing its membership and power and duties. The proposal also contemplates that the City would by ordinance adopt a comprehensive personnel merit system governing all matters of personnel administration including hiring, position classification, discipline, grievance procedures and benefits.

The sole function of the Employee Review Board would be to provide an independent review of non-union employee grievances that had proceeded through the complete grievance procedure set up by the merit system ordinance. The Board's review would be discretionary, but if undertaken the Board's order either confirming the City Manager's final disposition of the grievance or modifying it would be final.

Also present Section 310 of the Crystal City Code relating to Civil Service would be repealed.

The timing of the entire transaction would be as follows:

- 1. Charter Commission submits proposed amendment to City Council with recommendations for adoption by ordinance together with recommendation for makeup of Employee Review Board in the form of an ordinance.
- 2. If Council concurs, Council sets public hearing on Charter amendment ordinance (two week's published notice).
- 3. Public hearing and adoption of Charter amendment ordinance.
- 4. First reading of Personnel ordinance.
- 5. First reading of Employee Review Board ordinance.
- 6. If no referendum requested on Charter amendment ordinance within 60 days of publication, ordinance becomes effective 90 days after publication.
- 7. Charter amendment, Personnel ordinance and Employee Review Board ordinance all become effective on the same day (i.e., 90 days after publication of Charter amendment ordinance).

II. Comments on Charter Amendment. (Exhibit I)

The Charter amendment (i) removes the references to the Civil Service Commission in Sections 2.02 and 6.02, Subdivision 3, (ii) abolishes the Civil Service Commission, and (iii) adds a section to the Charter requiring the Council to establish an employee review board by ordinance. The Charter would merely require the board's creation, specify its function (i.e., to hear and rule on non-union employee grievances after exhaustion of normal grievance procedures), and specify the appointment procedure for board members. Everything else is left to Council ordinance.

The Civil Service Commission was established pursuant to state law and can be abolished by Charter amendment. Minnesota Statutes, Section 44.16, Subdivision 2.

III. Comments on Employee Review Board Ordinance. (Exhibit II)

- 312.01. Name. The Commission considered a wide variety of names, but the "Employee Review Board" seemed most accurately to reflect its function.
- 312.02. The reference to Section 2.02 of the Charter is significant. The Charter provides that there be no independent boards and commissions except "... to perform quasi-judicial functions". The new Board would be exercising such functions.

312.03. Definitions.

- Subd. 3. "Grievance" is defined in the same way as in the law, Minnesota Statutes, 179A.21, Subdivision 1 and in most labor contracts. (The reference to Section is to the appropriate section in the Personnel Merit System Ordinance to be adopted.) It is probably best to leave the term this general because (i) it is a term of art in labor relations having widely understood meaning and, (ii) the only grievances that will reach the Board are those that have been determined to be appropriate under the Personnel Merit System Ordinance.
- Subd. 4. "Employee" is defined to exclude the Manager, Assistant Manager and department heads, typically treated as supervisory personnel not covered by grievance procedure provisions in contract or ordinance.

312.05. Board Make-up.

Subdivision 1. The draft calls for three regular members and two alternate members of a five member board before the Charter Commission. The Manager recommends names to the Council for appointment.

- Subd. 2. Appointments of regular members are for three year staggered terms. There is no limitation on reappointment. Terms are for calendar years. The alternate members are designed to cover the situation where a member may have a disqualifying interest. The by-laws of the Board should contain procedures for allowing members to voluntarily excuse themselves or for parties to raise the issue of a disqualifying interest (e.g. family relationship, business association, etc.)
- Subd. 3. (i) The draft requires the Manager and the Council to try to appoint someone with dispute resolution experience. All current City officers and employees and those having left City service within one year are excluded.
- 312.07. The by-laws of such a Board are most important since they will in effect be the rules under which it operates, and a legally sufficient record is essential. The Council approves by-laws of all other boards and commissions.
- 312.09. The staff support should be a minimal expense. A tape recorded record of a hearing should be adequate. The risk of having to bear the expense of the procedure if a decision is adverse should deter both the City and the employee from incurring unnecessary expense. There will be some legal costs, since it is advisable to have an attorney present at hearings to insure a proper record.

312.11. The procedure of this section is self-explanatory. It should be noted that:

- a) The Board may decline to review a grievance. If after review of the grievance procedure followed under the Personnel ordinance the Board is convinced that the employee received full and fair treatment there seems to be no reason for further review.
- b) The board either confirms the City Manager's disposition of the matter or modifies it in whole or in part.
- c) The decision of the Board is final.

There was discussion in the Commission about appeal of the order to the District Court, but it is doubtful that such jurisdiction can be conferred either by Charter of ordinance. Judicial review is probably possible under a number of theories, but is should be kept in mind that courts would (absent some constitutional issue) review the Board's decision under a procedure called "certiorari" which in simple terms is a review of the record only to see if some basic right of the employee or the employer had been violated. A court would not substitute its judgment for the administrative body and at most would send the matter back for rehearing. Thus, it is probably not necessary to say anything in the ordinance about the matter. In any event, after both a grievance procedure under the ordinance and independent review by the Board it seems highly unlikely that either the City or the employee could successfully contend that the matter had not been given a full and fair hearing and review.

312.13. These publication requirements were suggested by the Civil Service Commission.

We hope that the Council will give favorable consideration to our recommendations. I hope you will contact me if you have any questions.

THE CITY OF CRYSTAL ORDAINS:

Section 1. Crystal City Charter, Section 2.02 is amended to read as follows:

Section 2.02. Boards and Commissions. There are no separate administrative boards or commissions except the civil service commission, if a civil service commission exists pursuant to law, and boards and commissions established for the administration of a municipal function jointly with another political subdivision. The council performs the duties and exercises the powers of administrative boards or commissions. The council may by ordinance boards or commissions to advise the council with respect to any municipal function or activity, to investigate any subject of interest to the city or to perform quasi-judicial functions.

- Sec. 2. Crystal City Charter, Section 6.02, Subd. 3, is amended to read:
- Subd. 3. The manager appoints on the basis of merit and fitness and subject to applicable civil service regulations, if any, officers and employees of the city except the city attorney who is appointed and removed by the city council. The manager may remove or suspend, subject to applicable civil service regulations, if any, officers and employees without the consent of the council.
 - Sec. 3. The Crystal City Charter is amended by adding a section to read:
- Sec. 6.07. Review Board. The city council must by ordinance establish a review board to hear and rule on non-organized employee grievances as defined by the ordinance after normal grievance procedures have been completed. The membership, terms, qualifications, powers, duties and procedures of the review board must be fixed by the ordinance. Members of the board are recommended by the manager and appointed by the city council.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CITY GOVERNMENT: ESTABLISHING AN EMPLOYEE REVIEW BOARD: AMENDING CRYSTAL CITY CODE BY ADDING A SECTION.

THE CITY OF CRYSTAL ORDAINS:

Section 1. Crystal City Code is amended by adding a section to read:

Section 312 - Employee Review Board

- 312.01. <u>Board Established</u>. The Employee Review Board is established. The Board has the powers and duties set out in this section. The Board is established pursuant to Sections 2.02 and 6.07 of the Charter.
- 312.03. <u>Definitions</u>. Subdivision 1. For purposes of this Section the terms defined in this Subsection have the meanings given them.
 - Subd. 2. "Board" means the Employee Review Board.
- Subd. 3. "Grievance" means a dispute or disagreement as to the interpretation or application of any term or terms of Section ____.
- Subd. 4. "Employee" means a City employee other than the City Manager, the Assistant City Manager, or a department head: the term does not include an employee who is a member of a certified appropriate bargaining unit that has entered into a collective bargaining agreement with an employee organization pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 179A.
- 312.05. Board: Membership. Subdivision 1. Appointment. The Board consists of three regular members and two alternate members. Members are appointed by the Council from a list of names recommended by the City Manager.
- Subd. 2. Terms. Members of the Board serve for a term of three years and until their respective successors are appointed and qualify for office. Of the regular members initially appointed one is appointed for a term of one year, one is appointed for a term of two years, and one is appointed for a term of three years. Alternate members are appointed for three year terms. The term of a member expires on December 31 of the final year of a term. Vacancies on the Board are filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as original appointments are made. Members may be appointed for consecutive terms.

- Subd. 3. Qualifications. Members of the Board must be residents of the City. In making appointments the Manager and the Council must give consideration to persons who are knowledgeable and experienced in the field of dispute resolution including arbitration and mediation. An officer or employee of the City may not be appointed to the Board or serve on the Board. A person who has been an elected or appointed officer or employee of the City may not be appointed to the Board until one year has elapsed since termination of that service or employment.
- 312.07. Organization: Meetings. The Board must adopt by-laws governing the conduct of its meetings, specifying its officers, and setting its meeting schedule. The by-laws of the Board are not effective until approved by the City Council.
- 312.09. Staffing: Financing. The City Manager must provide appropriate staff support including legal assistance to the Board from existing City personnel. Members of the Board serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses in accordance with normal City policy regarding such reimbursement for other boards and commissions of the City.
- 312.11. Grievances: Procedures. Subdivision 1. Submission. An employee may submit a grievance to the Board subject to the provisions of this Subsection.
- Subd. 2. Exhaustion of Remedies. An employee may not submit a grievance to the Board until all steps of the grievance procedure provided by Section have been completed and within ten days of that completion. The grievance procedure provided in Section is complete on the date that the City Manager gives written notice of the Manager's final determination of the grievance. The Board must provide in its by-laws for the form and details of a grievance submission.
- Subd. 3. Review: discretion. The Board must promptly review the grievance submission. The Board may decline to review a grievance. The Board's decision not to review a grievance is final.
- Subd. 4. Hearing. If the Board decides to review a grievance it may conduct hearings on the matter in the manner set forth in its by-laws. The by-laws must provide for written notice of its hearings to the City Manager and the employee. The City Manager must supply the Board with a record of compliance with the grievance procedure set forth in Section _____, together with such other information reasonably requested by the Board. The employee submitting the grievance must supply the Board with such information as reasonably requested by the Board. The employee may be represented by counsel at a hearing. If the Manager's final determination of the grievance is not confirmed by the Board, the reasonable costs, including Attorney's fees, incurred by the employee in the proceedings must be paid by the City. If the Manager's final determination of the grievance is confirmed by the Board the employee's costs, including Attorney's fees, will not be paid by the City.
- Subd. 5. <u>Decisions</u>. Upon completion of hearings on a grievance the Board must issue a written order stating its decision, the reasons for the decision, and the findings on which the decision is based. The order may confirm the decision of the City Manager or modify it in any respect. The Board must send a copy of the order to the employee and to the City Manager. The decision of the Board is final.

312.13. Information: Publication. The City to fully inform employees of the existence and the Board and its functions must be continuously workplace. SUBJECT: Assessment Hearing for 1990 Projects

Costs associated with a number of recently completed municipal projects have been tabulated and assessments calculated based on benefit derived by abutting or serviced property. A description of each project is listed below while the approving resolution and relevant background materials are included in the attached packet. It is recommended a separate motion be made for each of the project resolutions.

A. 1990 Seal Coat Program - Project 90-1

Streets were seal coated in District 4 which covers the central sections of Crystal both north and south of 42 Avenue. Street maintenance personnel sealed cracks while patching and leveling the existing blacktop surface in preparation for the aggregate cover which is handled by contract. The street crew made an exceptional effort to correct existing street and drainage problems during this preparatory phase.

Upon tabulation of all costs associated with the seal coat program, an assessment rate of \$2.44 per front foot was calculated. This rate compares to the \$2.30 estimated in the feasibility study prepared last spring. The increased costs are directly attributable to the additional preparatory work required due to the poor clay sub-base. The poor soils and overland drainage conditions in the seal coat districts south of 42nd Avenue will continue to cause a significant increase in preparatory work as the City attempts to deal with the unlevel surfaces and accelerated breakup of the streets. It should be noted that Crystal is covering 25% of all labor, equipment and material costs as a maintenance expenditure within the Infrastructure Fund.

As a result of the increase in preparatory work in this district, the seal coat area was reduced to meet contract time constraints. The area south of 38th Avenue was deleted from the 1990 Program. Notices regarding this deletion were sent to area residents and it is anticipated that this area will be included in next year's program. No assessments to the properties in this area are proposed this year.

For the past several years, the Council opted to utilize a unit or average frontage assessment approach for single family lots. This change resulted from a staff recommendation that benefit is a factor of usage and not frontage.

However, assessment of multi-family residential, commercial, industrial and park property continues to be based on frontage due to lack of a more defined indicator of benefit. The assessment breakdown is as follows:

\$ 2.44 Per Foot Assessment Rate (\$211,304.94 \div 86,738.4LF) \$199.72 Unit Assessment for 962 Single Family Residential Lots

It is important to note in regards to the above breakdown that some lots are on the edge of two districts and are proposed to be assessed half a unit over two years. No one assessed a full unit in 1989 is proposed to be assessed this year.

If assessments for seal coat are not paid by November 15, the costs are assessed over a two-year period at a 7-1/2% interest rate.

B. 1990 Sidewalk Repair Program

City staff performs an inspection of existing sidewalk on an annual basis to identify sections that pose a hazard to pedestrian traffic. Property owners abutting these sidewalk sections are then afforded the opportunity to perform the work on their own. If the necessary repairs are not completed by the property owner, the City handles the work by contract and assessess 100% assessment of the cost. The only exception to the 100% assessment of cost regards single family residential property with abutting sidewalk on primary streets/thoroughfare walk routes. These properties are only assessed 10% of the actual costs with the City's Infratructure Fund covering the balance. Based on contract costs, the assessment rate for sidewalk repair is \$3.20 per square foot.

Maps and a proposed assessment roll are attached to the approving resolution. If not prepaid, sidewalk assessments are levied for a five-year term at a 7-1/2% interest rate.

C. 1990 Diseased Tree Removal, Weed Cutting and Debris Removal

These three programs are handled in much the same manner as the sidewalk project in terms of notification and contract. The only difference is that diseased tree removal, weed cutting and debris removal costs are performed and charged on a per job basis based on a unit bid. Assessments are levied over a one-year term for weed cutting and a five-year term for diseased tree and debris removal at a 7-1/2% interest rate.





I would like to nominate Crystal resident Donn McCoy, 3455 Georgia Avenue N., Crystal, MN 55427, for the 1990 Crystal Human Rights Award. This nomination is based on the following:

Mr. McCoy has been involved with the Native American movement for the past six or seven years. He first worked with the Big Mountain group which worked with legislative bodies to implement change regarding displacement of the Navajo people in Arizona. This involvement then led to the White Earth Native American struggle which is similar to that of the Navajo's.

About four years ago he was invited, by local Native Americans, to join the American Indian Patrol. This was a reactivation of a group which had been formed in the 1960's in response to complaints at the American Indian Center of brutality toward American Indians. The patrol sees itself as a de-victimization of violence force. It looks for people who look like they could be victims of violence in the inner-city areas of Minneapolis. People who have problems with alcohol very often are victims of violence, as are women who are alone. The patrol will often break up fights, provide support just by listening, give rides home to people who need them, stay around after bars close to insure there is no violence.

Mr. McCoy spends one night a week, from about 9:00 p.m. until 2 or 3:00 a.m. (sometimes even later) with the patrol. His reasons for getting involved are simple. One can have more of a positive affect on society by becoming involved at the local level and, if you are not part of the solution, you are part of the problem.

I believe Mr. McCoy'w contribution to human rights in this area should be recognized. Recognition of his commitment to human rights would, I hope, inspire others in this community to also work for human rights.

I am sending this letter to outline for you certain changes in the Rules of Criminal Procedure and the dramatic impact I believe they are going to have on the City of Crystal Police and Prosecution costs.

On January 1, 1991, a change in the Rules of Criminal Procedure will go into effect which will have a direct and substantial impact on the City of Crystal's budget. The Minnesota Supreme Court recently amended Rules 8.04 and 11.07 to provide that a criminal Defendant charged with a Gross Misdemeanor or Felony must have an Omnibus Hearing within fourteen days of his or her first appearance in Court. I have enclosed copies of the amended Rules. (The purpose of an Omnibus Hearing is to determine whether there is probable cause for the Gross Misdemeanor or Felony charges. They mostly commonly involve testimony from all of the involved police officers and investigating officers to establish such probable cause).

The current procedure in Hennepin County is to have the Defendant waive the Omnibus Hearing until the day of trial. Because of this reservation of the Omnibus Hearing, only a very small number of cases actually have a Omnibus Hearing. For example, of the 122 Gross Misdemeanors which our office has prosecuted for the City of Crystal in the last twelve months, only two of those Gross Misdemeanors had an Omnibus Hearing prior to trial.

However, the new Rules which are to go into effect on January 1, 1991, change all that and require the hearing to be held within fourteen days of the Defendant's first appearance. The rationale behind the Rule was to establish uniformity in the Court system statewide, even though most of the outstate counties have criminal loads and systems that significantly differ from that of Hennepin County. Apparently the Court and the Criminal Rules Advisory Committee felt that the high number of jury trial settings was as a result of Omnibus issues. However, the

overwhelming opinion of Judges and Prosecuting Attorneys in Hennepin County is that the reason for the high number of jury trial settings is due to the fact that Defense Attorneys are "Judge Shopping". Hennepin County has a dramatically wide range of potential sentences for criminal Defendants mattering on which Judge is on the bench at the time that the plea of guilty is taken. Accordingly, many Defense Attorneys spend most of their time representing a Defendant trying to get that Defendant in front of a lenient Judge.

In trying to assess the impact of this matter, we have determined that in the last twelve months, the City of Crystal has prosecuted 122 Gross Misdemeanors through our office. Further, after consulting with the Police Department, it appears that in the last twelve months there were approximately 44 Felony matters which were charged as a result of efforts by the Crystal Police Department. If the last twelve months can be used as a guideline, it appears that approximately 166 criminal Defendants will now be entitled to quick Omnibus Hearings under the Rules that will go into effect at the end of the year.

The practical result of the Rule change will be a dramatic increase in the number of Omnibus Hearings conducted. Hennepin County Public Defender's Office, as well as prominent members of the Criminal Defense Bar, have indicated that they will no longer waive the Omnibus Hearings given the change in the Rule, and will in fact go forward with the Hearings within fourteen days from the Defendant's first appearance. This is also consistent with the practice which had occurred in Hennepin County prior to the enactment of the current Rule which allows that Hearing to be waived. At a recent meeting with some of the Judges in Hennepin County and the Prosecutors for most of the suburban municipalities, it was determined that the anticipated waiver rate under the new Rule would be only about ten percent. As a practical matter that means that ninety percent of the 166 criminal Defendants entitled to Omnibus Hearings will demand one. To further complicate the matter, many Defense Attorneys are now indicating that the believe a Defense Attorney would commit malpractice not to demand the Hearing within fourteen days in order to use that Hearing as a procedural discovery devise to prepare his case for trial.

The procedure anticipated in Hennepin County is for all of these Omnibus Hearings are intended to be held downtown. The Judges have set aside eight Judges commencing the first of the year to do nothing but hear these matters. It appears at this time that they will be scheduled in a "cattle call" type of procedure where large numbers of these Hearings will be set in front of one Judge at the same time, with an eye to either resolve them, or promptly have them heard by one of the available Judges. The Court has

indicated that the Officers must be available downtown in person to wait at the Courthouse until their case is called. An Omnibus Hearing can take anywhere from two hours to a full day of testimony. Given the number of Felony and Gross Misdemeanors prosecuted by the City of Crystal, this additional step in ninety percent of the cases will have a substantial financial impact on the City.

Although it is difficult to predict exactly what the cost will be since this is an entirely new procedure to be implemented, certain conclusions can be drawn from available information. Assuming an average of two Officers for each Omnibus Hearing, and an average of four hours for each such Hearing, an additional eight man hours and at an average of \$20.00 per hour will be incurred by the City of Crystal on each of the Felony and Gross Misdemeanor cases prosecuted. The City will also incur an additional four hours of prosecution time at \$65.00 per hour. Thus, for each Omnibus Hearing scheduled or heard, the City will incur approximately \$420.00 of additional costs. This may be so even if the case does not actually go to hearing since many times the Prosecuting Attorneys and the Officers will be required to either be on call or at the Courthouse until such time as the Assuming that ninety percent of the 166 matter is resolved. cases schedule an Omnibus Hearing, the City could anticipate incurring an additional \$63,000.00 of additional costs in order to provide the Defendant with that Hearing. \$39,060.00 represent prosecution costs, and \$23,940.00 would represent additional Police Officer time. The Police Officer figures do not take into account the impact that the large number of absences would have on the Department, its need for additional Officers if any, nor on the benefits payable to these Officers which may increase as a result of additional hours expended by the Officers. Because of the large amount of additional time for both the Prosecutors and the Police Departments, our office felt it necessary to draw this matter to your attention immediately.

Both the Judges in Hennepin County and the Prosecutors in Hennepin County have expressed their concerns and objections to the Rules Advisory Committee and the Supreme Court, but have been unsuccessful in their attempt to persuade the Court to change or rescind the Rule. This Rule has now been approved, and is scheduled to become effective January 1 of next year. It is crucial that the City Council members be made aware of the Rule change and if concerned about the cost, express their concerns directly to Frank Claiborne, head of the Rules Advisory Committee, as well as to Chief Judge Peter S. Popovich of the Supreme Court. Were the City Council to draft a resolution or send letters to the Rules Committee and to the Supreme Court, they may have some effect in overturning the Rule change. Speed is absolutely necessary in order to try and have some impact

since the Rules Advisory Committee is meeting the first weekend: in October of this year and, if the outcry is great enough, may consider changing their recommendations relative to this Rule.

Our office has a proposed Resolution for your use should you so desire.

Please understand that the financial predictions contained herein are guesses at best. I have applied what are best guesses to the number of criminal cases handled by my office and Felonies charged in the last twelve months, but the actual operation of the system, the number of the cases charged, and the length of the Hearings, will ultimately determine the final cost to the City. The predictions contained herein could be high, and could also be quite low.

If there is any further information which you would like, please do not hesitate to give me a call. Your courtesies with regard to the matter are greatly appreciated. I look forward to hearing from you in the near future.

Unless the offense charged in the complaint is a homicide and the prosecuting attorney notifies the court that the case will be presented to a grand jury, or the offense

is punishable by life imprisonment, upon the defendant's initial appearance before the court under this rule following a complaint charging a felony or gross misdemeanor or a tab charge charging a gross misdemeanor under Minn.Stat. § 169.121 or Minn.Stat. § 169.129 (within 14 days after the first appearance under Rule 5), the defendant shall, upon request, be permitted to plead guilty to the complaint, tab charge or amended complaint (See Rules 3.04, subd. 2; 17.05) as provided by Rule 15. At this stage of the proceeding, the tab charge or complaint which was filed in the court, or that complaint as it may be amended (Rule 17.05) or superseded (Rule 3.04, subd. 2), takes the place of the information under existing Minnesota law (Minn.Stat. §§ 628.29-628.33 (1971)) and provides the basis for the court's jurisdiction over the prosecution and the offenses charged in the complaint or the tab charge.

If the Rasmussen hearing is demanded, the hearing shall be held as part of the Omnibus Hearing as provided by Rule 11.02.

The Omnibus Hearing shall be commenced not later than 14 days after the defendant's initial appearance in court under Rule 8 unless the time is extended for good cause related to the particular case. (Rule 8.04). If the time is extended, the Omnibus Hearing must still be completed and the issues decided within 30 days after the defendant's initial appearance before the court under Rule 8 unless extended by the Court for good cause related to the particular case. See Rules 11.04 and 11.07 and the comments to Rule 11.

Under Rule 8.01, if the offense charged in the complaint is punishable by life imprisonment, or if it is a homicide and the prosecuting attorney notifies the court the case will be presented to the grand jury, the defendant shall not be arraigned upon the complaint, and the case shall be presented to the grand jury as provided by Rule 8.01. If an indictment is returned, the Omnibus Hearing shall be held as provided by Rule 19.04, subd. 5.

 - (a) The prosecuting attorney shall disclose to defense counsel the names and addresses of the persons intended to be called as witnesses at the trial together with their prior record of convictions, if any, within the prosecuting attorney's actual knowledge. The prosecuting attorney shall permit defense counsel to inspect and reproduce such witnesses' relevant written or recorded statements and any written summaries within the prosecuting attorney's knowledge of the sub-

stance of relevant oral statements made by such witnesses to prosecution agents.

- (b) The fact that the prosecution has supplied the name of a trial witness to defense counsel shall not be commented on in the presence of the jury.
- (c) If the defendant is charged by indictment, the prosecuting attorney shall disclose to defense counsel the names and addresses of the witnesses who testified before the grand jury in the case against the defendant.
- (d) The prosecuting attorney shall disclose to defense counsel the names and the addresses of persons having information relating to the case.
- (2) Statements. The prosecuting attorney shall disclose and permit defense counsel to inspect and reproduce any relevant written or recorded statements which relate to the case within the possession or control of the prosecution, the existence of which is known by the prosecuting attorney, and shall provide defense counsel with the substance of any oral statements which relate to the case.

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(4) A prosect fense of or reportific tenection attorner able to of any Stat. experidefenchave ment.

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RULE 11.01 PLACE OF HEARING

The hearing shall be held in the district court in the judicial district wherein the alleged offense was committed.

(a) If the transcript is to be furnished to defense counsel, the costs thereof shall be prepaid except when the defendant is represented by the public defender or assigned counsel, or when the defendant makes a sufficient affidavit of inability to pay or secure the costs and the court orders that the defendant be supplied with the transcript at the expense of the appropriate governmental unit.

(b) The prosecution shall be furnished with the transcript without prepayment of costs.

(c) When a transcript is furnished to counsel, a copy shall be filed with the clerk of the court.

Subd. 3. Filing. The record and all papers and exhibits in the proceeding shall be filed or placed in the custody of the clerk of the court. Upon order of the court any exhibit may be returned to the party producing it.

RULE 11.10 PLEA; TRIAL DATE

If the defendant is not discharged the defendant shall plead to the complaint or, for gross misdemeanors under Minn.Stat. § 169.121 or Minn.Stat. § 169.121 or Minn.Stat. § 169.129, the tab charge or be given additional time within which to plead. If the defendant pleads not guilty, a trial date shall then be set. A defendant shall be tried as soon as possible after entry of a not guilty plea. RULE 11.11 EXCLUSION OF WITNESSES

Before or during any Omnibus or other pretrial hearing or proceeding, witnesses may be sequestered or excluded from the courtroom, prior to their appearance, in the discretion of the court.

Comment

If a defendant does not plead guilty at the initial appearance before the district court under Rule 8, the Onnahur Hearing provided by Rule 11 shall be held. The initial appearance may be continued, and if the defendant does not then plead guilty, the Onnibus Hearing shall be held as provided by the rule.

The Omnibus Hearing provided by this rule is divided into three parts: (1) the Rasmussen hearing (Rule 11.02); (2) the hearing of pre-trial motions of the defendant and prosecution (Rule 11.04); (3) the hearing on other pre-trial issues brought up on the court's initiative (Rule 11.04). The hearings on any of these parts may be combined and heard simultaneously (Rule 11.07).

The current statutory hearing on probable cause has been replaced under these rules by a motion to dismiss the complaint for lack of probable cause which is to be made in accordance with Rule 10 and heard at the Onnibus Hearing pursuant to Rule 11.03. If such a motion is made, the court shall base its probable cause determination upon the evidence set forth in Rule 18.06, subd. 1. In State v. Florence, 306 Minn. 442, 239 N.W.2d 892 (1976), the Supreme Court discussed the type of evidence that may be presented and considered on a motion to dismiss the complaint for lack of probable cause. Nothing in that case or in the rule prohibits a defendant from calling any witness to testify for the purpose of showing an absence of probable cause. In determining whether to dismiss a complaint under Rule 11.03 for lack of probable cause, the trial court is not simply reassessing whether or not proba-ble cause existed to warrant the arrest. Rather, under Plorence the trial court must determine based upon the facts disclosed by the record whether it is fair and reasonable to require the defendant to stand trial.

If the defendant does not plead guilty upon the initial appearance in the district court under Rule 8 following a complaint or, where permitted, a tab charge or upon arraignment in the district court under Rule 19.04, subd. 5 following an indictment, the Omnibus Hearing (See ABA Standards, Discovery and Procedure Before Trial, 1.1, 5.1-5.3 (Approved Draft, 1970).) shall be held as provided by Rule 11 not later than fourteen (14) days after the initial appearance or arraignment, unless the period is

WHEREAS, the current practice in Hennepin County is to reserve the omnibus hearing until the day of trial; and

WHEREAS, the current practice of reserving the omnibus issues until the day of trial results in an overwhelming majority of the cases being settled without the need for an omnibus hearing or trial; and

WHEREAS, in the last one and one-half years (1 1/2), the City of Crystal has had to conduct only two (2) omnibus hearings; and

WHEREAS, the defense bar and Hennepin County Public Defender's office have indicated that under the amended rules they will demand an omnibus hearing in every gross misdemeanor and felony case; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of the amendments to Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 will have a substantial and detrimental impact on the City of Crystal by:

- Causing a dramatic increase in the overtime costs of the Crystal Police Department; and
- Causing an increase in the prosecution costs to appear and conduct omnibus hearings in Division I -Minneapolis; and

WHEREAS, the amendment to Rules 8.04 and 11.07 will take effect on January 1, 1991; and

WHEREAS, the Crystal City Attorney's Office and the Crystal Police Department strongly oppose the amendment to Rules 8.04 and 11.07

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

 The Crystal City Council strongly urges the Supreme Court Advisory Committee on the Rules of Criminal Procedure to recommend that the Minnesota Supreme Court either exempt Hennepin County from the amendments to Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 or repeal the amendments entirely.



Dear Mr. Claybourne:

The change in Rule 8.04 of the Rules of Criminal Procedure due to take effect January 1, 1991, could devastate the budget and operational efficiency of the Bloomington Police Department.

Our conservative cost projections show a range from \$78,120 to \$249,984 for overtime over and above what is currently budgeted. An increase of that amount cannot be realized without the layoff of personnel in police or another department of city government.

The additional appearances will also drain investigators and officers from their primary duty assignments. In some cases, additional officers would have to be brought in at overtime pay to meet minimum numbers to staff the street.

This rule must be reconsidered and hopefully abandoned.

I earnestly implore you to move to stop its scheduled implementation.

I'm sorry for this late memo but I just received this information from Nate Sherry at approximately 10:00 a.m. today. In reviewing his estimated cost or work to be done, I have some real reservations. I would ask Council to take a good look at these figures. I really doubt that the amount of work needed to bring this structure up to code now can be done for less than \$5,400. It really seems coincidental that the total cost as submitted is exactly \$5,400. Since he does not own and occupy this structure as his homestead, Mr. Sherry will need a currently licensed plumber, gas fitter, and electrician to do the work.

The last set of figures I believe is if he were to rebuild the same structure from the foundation up. He has a \$15,500 total figure. If a 20'x24' house were built today using the cost per square foot figures that we receive from the State Building Code Division as average costs, this structure would be based on \$29,429.00. That is about double his figures.

Another comparison is the amount of work that we get done with \$10,000 plus with the grant program. There is no way we would get all of this done for \$5,400.

You should be aware also that Mr. Nate Sherry has totally removed all wall and ceiling material, plumbing, cupboards, and back porch from the building.

I hope this information will be of help to you in making your decision.

The City Council of the City of Crystal orders that within twenty (20) days of service of this order upon you, that you abate the hazardous conditions which exist on the property located at 5231 Douglas Drive North in the City of Crystal, and legally described as:

That part of Section 8, Township 118, Range 21, described as follows: Beginning at the Southeast corner of Block 1, in Whitefield; thence West along the South line thereof a distance of 130.225 feet; thence South to the North line of 52nd Avenue North; thence East along the North line of 52nd Avenue North to the West line of Douglas Drive to the point of beginning.

The City of Crystal, pursuant to <u>Minnesota Statutes</u>, Sections 463.15 to 463.261, and based on the authorization of Resolution No. ______, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, finds that the house situated on the above-referenced property is a hazardous building within the meaning of <u>Minnesota Statutes</u>, Section 463.15, subd. 3, and a public nuisance within the meaning of <u>Minnesota Statutes</u>, Section 562.02 for the following reasons:

- 1. The electrical wiring throughout the house has wires exposed, missing and broken outlet covers and fixtures and missing circuit breakers.
- 2. There is an unused well that needs to be properly sealed to avoid the possibility of contaminating the ground water.
 - 3. Drain lines are plugged and a shower drain is leaking.
 - 4. There are numerous broken windows in the house.
- 5. There is a flexible gas line supplying gas to the stove which is contrary to building code requirements.
- Inadequate foundation under the bank entry porch, which is sagging.
 - 7. There is no heating plant of any kind on the premises.
 - 8. There is an accumulation of trash on the premises.
 - 9. Asbestos siding is broken and needs replacement.
- 10. Generally, the building has been inadequately maintained, dilapidated and has been unoccupied for in excess of six months.
- 11. The residential building is a non-conforming use in that the area is zoned B-4, in which residential uses are not permitted.
- 12. Restoration of the building as a residence is not permitted under Crystal City Code, subsection 515.05, subdivisions 3 and 8, as the non-conforming residential use has been discontinued for more than six (6) months, and the cost of placing the structure in a safe condition exceeds fifty percent (50%) of the fair market value of the structure.

As a result of the foregoing, and pursuant to the abovereferenced statutes and ordinances, it is hereby ordered that you abate the above hazardous condition by razing and removing the building from the property within twenty (20) days of the date of service of this order.

You are further advised that unless such corrective action is taken or an answer served upon the City of Crystal within twenty (20) days of the date of service of this order upon you, a motion for summary judgment of this order will be made to the Hennepin County District Court.

You are further advised that if you do not comply with this order, as a part of the summary judgment, the City of Crystal will seek authority to take corrective action including razing and removing the building. All necessary costs incurred by the City of Crystal will be assessed against the property pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 463.21. In connection thereto, the City intends to recover the cost of razing and removing the building as well as all other expenses incurred in carrying out this order, including specifically, but not exclusively, filing fees, service fees, publication fees, attorneys' fees, appraisers' fees, witness fees, including expert witness fees and traveling expenses incurred by the City from the time this order was originally made pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 463.22.

THIRD PARTY AGREEMENT
URBAN HENNEPIN COUNTY
COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

This agreement made and entered into by and between the City of Crystal (City) and GMDCA (Provider).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City is a cooperating unit in the Urban Hennepin County Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) by virtue of a joint cooperation agreement executed between the City and Hennepin County pursuant to MSA 471.59, and

WHEREAS, the City has executed a Subrecipient Agreement with Hennepin County which allocates \$10,000 from the FY 1990 Urban Hennepin County CDBG program for the purpose of supporting the activities as identified in Exhibit 1, attached and a part of this agreement, hereinafter referred to as "activities."

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained in this Agreement, the parties hereto mutually agree to the following terms and conditions:

- The Uniform Administrative Requirements in 24 CFR 570.502 issued by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), shall apply to activity.
- The Provider shall be responsible for procurement of all supplies, equipment, services, and construction necessary for implementation of the activity. Procurement shall be carried out in accordance with the OMB Circular A-110. The Provider shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, all advertisements, negotiations, notices, and documents; enter into all contracts; and conduct all meetings, conferences, and interviews as necessary to insure compliance with the above described procurement requirements.
- 3. The Provider shall be responsible for carrying out any acquisitions of real property necessary for implementation of activity. The Provider shall conduct all such acquisitions in its name and shall hold title to all properties purchased. The Provider shall be responsible for preparation of all notices, appraisals, and documentation required in conducting acquisition under the latest applicable regulations of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970 and of the CDBG Program. The Provider shall also be responsible for providing all relocation notices, counseling, and services required by said regulations.
- 4. The Provider shall comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 as required under 24 CFR 570.606(a) and HUD implementing regulations at 24 CFR Part 42; the requirements in 24 CFR 570.606(b) governing the residential anti-displacement and

relocation assistance plan under section 104(d) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (the Act); the relocation requirements of 24 CFR 570.606(c) governing displacement subject to section 104(k) of the Act; and the requirements of 24 CFR 570.606(d) governing optional relocation assistance under Section 105(a)(11) of the Act, as pertaining to the activity.

- 5. The Provider shall maintain records for the expenditure of all CDBG funds it receives, such records to be maintained in accordance with OMB Circular A-110 and A-122, as applicable. All records shall be made available, upon request of the City for monitoring by the City. The City shall have authority to review any and all procedures and all materials, notices, documents, etc., prepared by the Provider in implementation of activity, and the Provider agrees to provide all information required by any person authorized by the City to request such information from the Provider for the purpose of reviewing the same.
- 6. The Provider shall take all necessary actions required to implement activity and to comply with any related requests by the City, it being understood that the City has responsibility to Hennepin County for insuring compliance with such requirements. The Provider also will promptly notify the City of any changes in the scope or character of activity.
- 7. The Provider does hereby agree to release, indemnify, and hold harmless the City from and against all costs, expenses, claims, suits, or judgments arising from or growing out of any injuries, loss or damage sustained by any person or corporation, including employees of Provider and property of Provider, which are caused by or sustained in connection with the tasks carried out by the Provider under this Agreement.
- 8. The City agrees to provide the Provider with CDBG funds in such amounts as agreed upon in this Agreement to enable the Provider to carry out activity. It is understood that the City shall be held accountable to Hennepin County for the lawful expenditure of CDBG funds under this Agreement. The City shall therefore make no payment of funds to the Provider and draw no funds from Hennepin County on behalf of a Provider, prior to having received from the Provider a request for reimbursement including copies of all documents and records needed to insure that the Provider has complied with all appropriate requirements.
- 9. The City shall be responsible for the preparation of all requests to Hennepin County for HUD wage rate determinations on activity. The Provider shall notify the City prior to initiating activity, including advertising for contractual services which will include costs likely to be subject to the provisions of Federal Labor Standards and Equal Employment Opportunity and related implementing regulations.

- 10. The City agrees to provide technical assistance to the Provider in the form of oral and/or written guidance and on-site assistance regarding CDBG procedures and project management. This assistance will be provided as requested by the Provider, and at other times, at the initiative of the City, when new or updated information concerning the CDBG Program is received by the City from Hennepin County and deemed necessary to be provided to the Provider.
- 11. In accordance with the provisions of 24 CFR 85.43, suspension or termination of this Agreement may occur if the Provider materially fails to comply with any term of this Agreement. This Agreement may be terminated for convenience in accordance with 24 CFR 85.44. The Agreement may be terminated with or without cause by either party hereto by giving thirty (30) days written notice of such termination. CDBG funds allocated to the Provider under this Agreement may not be obligated or expended by the Provider following such date of termination. Any funds allocated to the Provider under this Agreement which remain unobligated or unspent following such date of termination shall automatically revert to the City.
- 12. Any material alterations, variations, modifications or waivers of the provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment to this Agreement approved by Hennepin County through its Office of Planning and Development and properly executed by the authorized representatives of the parties. All amendments to this Agreement shall be made a part of this Agreement by inclusion in Exhibit 2 which shall be attached at the time of any amendment.
- 13. All data collected, created, received, maintained or disseminated for any purpose by the Provider in the performance of this Agreement is governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, and all other statutory provisions governing data privacy, the Minnesota Rules implementing such act now in force or hereafter adopted, as well as federal regulations on data privacy.
- 14. During the performance of this Agreement, the Provider agrees to the following: In accordance with the Hennepin County Affirmative Action Policy and the County Commissioners' Policies Against Discrimination, no person shall be excluded from full employment rights or participation in, or the benefits of, any program, service or activity on the grounds of race, color, creed, religion, age, sex, disability, marital status, affectional/sexual preference, public assistance status, ex-offender status, or national origin; and no person protected by applicable federal or state laws against discrimination shall otherwise be subjected to discrimination.
- 15. The effective date of this Agreement is July 1, 1990. The termination date of this agreement is December 31, 1991, or at such time as activity is satisfactorily completed prior thereto. Upon expiration, the Provider shall relinquish to the City all program funds unexpended or uncommitted for the activity.

- 16. Any program income as a result of the activity shall be returned immediately to the City upon receipt and the provisions of 24 CFR 570.504 shall apply.
- 17. Any real property acquired or improved as a result of activity, in whole or in part, using CDBG funds in excess of \$25,000 shall either be:
 - Used to meet one of the national objectives in 24 CFR 570.208 until five years after expiration of this Agreement;
 - b. Disposed of in a manner that results in the City being reimbursed in the amount of the current fair market value of the property less any portion of the value attributable to expenditures of non-CDBG funds for acquisition of, or improvement to, the property.
- 18. The following standards shall apply to real property acquired or improved as a result of activity, in whole or in part:
 - a. The Provider shall inform the City at least thirty (30) days prior to any modification or change in the use of the real property from that planned at the time of acquisition or improvements, including disposition.
 - b. The Provider shall reimburse the City in an amount equal to the current fair market value (less any portion thereof attributable to expenditures of non-CDBG funds) of property acquired or improved as a result of activity that is sold or transferred for a use which does not qualify under the CDBG regulations. Said reimbursement shall be provided to the City at the time of sale or transfer of the property.
- 19. The Provider agrees to provide City with an annual audit report consistent with OMB Circular A-110, Uniform Requirements for Grants to Universities, Hospitals and Non-Profit Organizations and OMB Circular A-122 Cost Principles for Non-profit organizations.
 - a. The audit report is to be provided to City on July 1 of each year this Agreement is in effect and any findings of non-compliance affecting the use of CDBG funds shall be satisfied by Provider within six (6) months of the provision date.
 - b. The audit may not be paid from CDBG funds.
 - c. City reserves the right to recover from Provider the full amount of any CDBG funds found to be improperly expended or otherwise disallowed.
- 20. The Provider shall comply with the general condition of 24 CFR 570.200, particularly sections; (f) (Means of Carrying Out Eligible Activities); and (j) (Constitutional Prohibitions Concerning Church/State Activities).

- 21. The Provider as appropriate shall comply with the Lead-Based Paint notification, inspection, testing and abatement procedures established in 24 CFR 570.608.
- 22. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Provider, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 23. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," will be completed and submitted in accordance with its instructions.

The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency is requiring that the City of Crystal execute the attached Administrative Contract for the Neighborhood Preservation Home Improvement Loan Program prior to administration of any loans. Since this program will be advertised in the October City Newsletter, it is important that the City be prepared to begin the program October 1 as noted in the contract.

The lending institution, First Minnesota, is also required to execute a loan purchase agreement with the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency. As soon as the procedural manual is developed, I will be meeting with representatives of MHFA and First Minnesota to clarify the lending procedures.

The 3% commitment fee has been waived for this program, however, a \$50 non-refundable participation fee is still required. I am in the process of requesting First Minnesota to reimburse the City for the \$50 participation fee when they process their first loan. Since the bank receives a \$200 origination fee reimbursement from MHFA for each loan, I feel this is a reasonable request.

The terms of the agreement seem reasonable, so I'm recommending that the City Council approve the Agreement by passing the attached Resolution at their October 2 meeting.

THIS AGREEMENT, is made and entered into by and between the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency, 400 Sibley Street - Suite 300, St. Paul, Minnesota 55101 (hereinafter called "the MHFA") and <u>City</u> of <u>Crystal</u>, Minnesota (hereinafter called the "City").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, MHFA, under the provisions of Chapter 462A of Minnesota Statutes, is authorized to enter into commitments for the purchase of home improvement loans (hereinafter called the "Loans") for the improvement of residential property for persons and families meeting MHFA's loan eligibility requirements; and

WHEREAS, City desires to participate in the Neighborhood Preservation Home Improvement Loan Program (hereinafter called the "Program") wherein the MHFA will commit to purchase Loans in accordance with the terms and conditions of the MHFA Neighborhood Preservation Home Improvement Loan Program Procedural Manual (hereinafter called the "Procedural Manual"), the provisions of which are hereby incorporated by reference into this instrument as if set forth in full herein; and

WHEREAS, <u>First Minnesota Savings Bank</u>, <u>FSB</u> (hereinafter referred to as "Seller") is an authorized MHFA lender and has agreed to apply to MHFA to participate in the Program and submit to MHFA Loans for purchase that are funded under the Program and made in consultation with the City; and

WHEREAS, MHFA requires the City to meet the definition of a City as defined in Chapter 462C.02, Subdivision 6 of Minnesota Statutes, and to submit an application for funding (hereinafter referred to as "Application for Funding") pursuant to Program requirements, which provides for the City to designate a geographic area wherein Loans may be made (hereinafter referred to as "Designated Neighborhood"), and further provides for the City to work with the Seller in implementing the Program; and

WHEREAS, MHFA has approved the Application for Funding of the City to become an approved participating City; and

WHEREAS, MHFA has approved the City's designation of the Designated Neighborhood commonly referred to as <u>42nd-Douglas-West Broadway</u>:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants herein contained and the mutual benefits to be derived therefrom, it is hereby agreed between the parties hereto as follows:

This Administration Contract shall consist of the terms and conditions hereof and
of the Procedural Manual as from time to time amended and supplemented, the
provisions of which are hereby incorporated by reference into this Administration
Contract.

- The City represents and warrants that it is a legally constituted City under the meaning given in Minnesota Statutes, Section 462C.02, Subdivision 6, and that it shall maintain adequate capital and personnel for the proper administration of this Administration Contract.
- 3. The City, commencing from the beginning of the Participation Term, as set forth below, shall have the responsibilities and perform services in accordance with the provisions of the Procedural Manual and the Application for Funding.
- 4. This Administration Contract shall extend for the period delineated in paragraph 13 below (hereinafter called the "Participation Term"). MHFA reserves the right to cancel this Administration Contract at any time if the City repeatedly violates any provisions of the Administration Contract. In the event of such cancellation, City agrees to perform the services provided herein for which Loans under the Program are closed by the Seller.
- 5. Commitment Amount. City hereby applies to MHFA for a commitment in the aggregate principal amount of the eligible Loans authorized for purchase by MHFA, as described in the Procedural Manual, in the amounts set forth below. City hereby specifically acknowledges that the commitment herein applied for shall be effective only upon the approval thereof by MHFA at the place provided below and the delivery of a copy of the same by MHFA to City. City's application is further subject to the reductions in dollar amounts by MHFA, if any, which may be set forth herein by MHFA prior to delivery by it to City of an approved copy of said Administration Contract.

City acknowledges and agrees that the delivery by MHFA of said Administration Contract is conditioned upon the receipt by MHFA of the fee delineated in paragraph 6 below (hereinafter called the "Commitment Fee"), in the amount and in the manner provided in such paragraph 6.

It is further specifically agreed that it is a condition of the Administration Contract that MHFA shall have the additional right, upon written notice to the City, to reduce the MHFA approved commitment amount (hereinafter called the "Commitment Amount"), at any time after the delivery of the Administration Contract, provided that if such a reduction occurs MHFA shall refund to City that portion of the Commitment Fee represented by such reduction and provided, further, that MHFA shall purchase all of Seller's eligible Loans closed during the Participation Term and prior to the effective date of MHFA's notice of Commitment Amount reduction, together with all eligible Loans for which Seller's binding commitment or approved application are issued prior to such effective date, and which are subsequently closed during the Participation Term.

6. Commitment Fee. The Commitment Fee payable hereunder shall be equal to three percent (.03) of the total Commitment Amount approved by MHFA, as set forth below, unless specifically waived in writing by MHFA. City hereby acknowledges that the receipt by MHFA of said Commitment Fee is a condition precedent to MHFA's delivery of Administration Contract provided hereunder.

Commitment Fees shall be eligible for refunding when evidence is provided, in a manner acceptable to MHFA, that the City has performed its obligations in accordance with the Administration Contract. Upon receipt of such evidence, and the purchase of the last Loan under the Purchase Agreement, MHFA shall refund

commitment fees in an amount equal to 3% of the total principal amount of eligible Loans sold to MHFA.

Commitment Fees shall not be refunded if the Administration Contract is cancelled, in accordance with paragraph 4 hereinabove.

- 7. Any notice required hereunder shall be sufficient only if in writing, and sent by pre-paid, registered, or certified mail (return receipt requested) to the business address of the other party hereto. Such business address shall be that address specified herein or such different address as may hereafter be specified by either party by written notice to the other.
- Neither party may assign its rights and obligations under this Administration Contract. No change or modification of the terms or provisions of this Administration Contract shall be binding on MHFA unless such change or modification be in writing and be signed by an authorized official of MHFA. Neither the failure by MHFA in any one or more instances to insist upon the observance or performance of any term or provision thereof, nor the failure of MHFA to exercise any right, privilege, or remedy conferred herein or afforded by law, shall be construed as waiving any breach of any term, provision; or the right to exercise such right, privilege or remedy thereafter.
- All matters, whether in tort or in contract, relating to the validity, construction, performance or enforcement of this Administration Contract shall be determined according to the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 10. If any term or provision of this Administration Contract is finally adjudged by any court to be invalid, the remaining terms and provisions shall remain in full force and effect, and they shall be interpreted, performed, and enforced as if said invalid provision did not appear herein.
- 11. City represents and warrants that it shall substantially comply with its proposed implementation of the Program, including but not limited to the required expenditure of its local contribution, as evidenced by the City's Application for Funding.
- 12. The City shall provide the following information to permit an assessment of program effectiveness within one month after the Participation Term;
 - a) an accounting of expenditures of funds identified in Exhibit 2 of the Application for Funding;
 - b) a comparison of actual program impact with expected program impact, as described in Exhibit 4 of the Application for Funding;
 - c) a description of activities that were undertaken by the City or Seller to market the program in the Designated Neighborhood; and,
 - d) such other information as may reasonably be expected to assess performance of other activities identified by the City in the Application for Funding.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 have been amended to require that the omnibus hearing in all felony and gross misdemeanor cases be held within fourteen (14) days of a defendant's first appearance in court; and

WHEREAS, the current practice in Hennepin County is to reserve the omnibus hearing until the day of trial; and

WHEREAS, the current practice of reserving the omnibus issues until the day of trial results in an overwhelming majority of the cases being settled without the need for an omnibus hearing or trial; and

WHEREAS, in the last one and one-half years (1 1/2), the City of Crystal has had to conduct only two (2) omnibus hearings; and

WHEREAS, the defense bar and Hennepin County Public Defender's office have indicated that under the amended rules they will demand an omnibus hearing in every gross misdemeanor and felony case; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of the amendments to Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 will have a substantial and detrimental impact on the City of Crystal by:

- Causing a dramatic increase in the overtime costs of the Crystal Police Department; and
- Causing an increase in the prosecution costs to appear and conduct omnibus hearings in Division I -Minneapolis; and

WHEREAS, the amendment to Rules 8.04 and 11.07 will take effect on January 1, 1991; and

WHEREAS, the Crystal City Attorney's Office and the Crystal Police Department strongly oppose the amendment to Rules 8.04 and 11.07

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

 The Crystal City Council strongly urges the Supreme Court Advisory Committee on the Rules of Criminal Procedure to recommend that the Minnesota Supreme Court either exempt Hennepin County from the amendments to Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 or repeal the amendments entirely.

- 2. The Crystal City Council strongly urges the Justices of the Minnesota Supreme Court to reconsider the amendments to Minnesota Rules of Criminal Procedure 8.04 and 11.07 and either to exempt Hennepin County from the amendments or to repeal the amendments entirely.
- The City of Crystal, by this Resolution, does not intend in any way to diminish the procedural, due process or Constitutional Rights of any accused.

Per the request September 19, 1990, I have conducted an investigation of the Lions Club of Crystal, which has applied for a site permit for a charitable gambling license. The two main parties mentioned in their permit request are Scott Martin Scheiller, DOB 12/7/64, and Wilfred George Scheiller, DOB 11/7/27. Neither party has an identifiable criminal history and both have no criminal record with the Hennepin County Sheriff's office.

In checking with the Secretary of State's office, I found that the Lions Club of Crystal, Minnesota was registered as a non-profit organization on 10/7/70. They are not registered with the Attorney General's Charities Division, as they are not required to register unless they have a professional fund raiser.

In checking with Gambling Control, I found that the Lions Club of Crystal have two other sites already in operation in the City of Crystal, and they have had no problems with them.

In checking with Norm Pint of Gambling Enforcement, I found that they have had no investigations activated into the Lions Club of Crystal, and they have had no complaints about that organization.

At this point, I see no viable reason to deny a permit.



Brooklyn Park - Mayor Krautkremer - Most improved fund raising.



Community Center Marks Dawning Of A New Era in Crystal

It's a hot June day and CITY CRYSTAL Crystal's new Community Center is hopping. The parking lot is

jammed. The outdoor pool is packed. Dozens of kids scoot up the new 30-foot-high water slide while scores of dripping-wet hopefuls wait impatiently in line.

It's a sight long overdue in Crystal, a first-ring suburb that's been searching for a new community focal point, something to set it apart from the rest of the metro area.

The \$3.8 million Center is now the pride of Crystal, as well it should be. The community pulled together to build the center, and its success signals a new era of cooperation and advancement for the city, says Mayor Betty Herbes, who took office in 1989.

Crystal is a city of 23,000 residents that, like many first-ring suburbs. faces special challenges such as an aging population and aging housing stock. But the city is beginning to take innovative steps to tackle its problems, as well as prepare for the future. Less than 15 minutes from downtown Minneapolis, Crystal has much to offer: comfortable, closeknit neighborhoods, lush parks, successful businesses, including a

robust retail sector, and many plans for redevelopment on the boards.

And if the Mayor has her way, things will only get better.

"I want the city to be a quality city," she says. "We're looking at trying to upgrade everything."

The Community Center, of course, is an example of what Crystal can do when everybody works together.

The 35,000 square-foot Center, which opened in June, offers programs for all ages, from aerobics to arts and crafts. It has three gymnasiums, a stage for theater productions and a full catering kitchen. It also has a gathering spot for seniors called the Friendship Center, which gives Crystal's 600-member senior club a place to play cards, hold dances, other special events and eat a daily noon meal. The seniors were instrumental in getting the Center built because until that time they had rented space in a local school and had no place to call their own. "It gets people out of the house," says Joe Paulaha, Chairperson of the senior group. "They spend a pleasant afternoon and evening at the center rather than sitting around and watching TV.

The Community Center offers amenities to parents as well. It has a child care center where for only \$1 per hour a parent can leave a child while he or she plays basketball or goes to a tennis clinic.

"It isn't a health club," stresses Park and Recreation Director Ed Brandeen. "It's a multi-purpose facility for all ages."

Along with the new Center, Crystal installed a \$180,000 double water slide - to the delight of local children — that feeds into the community's outdoor pool. But the slide isn't just for kids: a young married couple told the Mayor they had waited in the slide line for 20 minutes and didn't regret a minute

Although most everybody in Crystal wanted a Community Center, financing a multi-million dollar venture was another matter. The City Council agreed to pay \$1.8 million with city funds, but the remaining \$2 million had to be raised elsewhere. So the decision was put to the voters in the form of a



\$2 million bond issue.

A committee, formed to fight for the Center, was composed of various groups including civic clubs, Little League, city and park officials and members of the senior club. In the spirit of the best political campaigns, the volunteers put in an estimated 1.000 hours, dropping leaflets doorto-door, running phone banks and talking it up big.

"We talked about building a community center for 10 years because there's been no focal point for the city," recalls Liz Reid, Secretary of the Park Commission. "We finally came to the conclusion we were going to go for it."

The bond issue passed during the general election of 1988 by a comfortable margin. It surprised city officials, who say that such proposals rarely pass in general elections. The Center has been so popular with residents that some who voted against it are sheepishly admitting now they made a mistake, says Mayor Herbes.

Upgraded Housing, Redevelopment Central To Crystal's Renaissance

The Community Center is an example of Crystal's commitment to cooperation and planning. But that wasn't always the case. The city grew up somewhat haphazardly after World War II, attracting large numbers of veterans and other families. It was a popular place to settle in the 1950s and 1960s and a good place to build because the soil was sandy, according to Jack Irving, a City Council member who was Crystal's City Manger from 1963 to 1987. "It started as a farming community, then became a bedroom community and slowly became a commercial center — even before the Dales were around." says Irving.

The city didn't draw up a formal plan until 1976, and it was long overdue. says John Olson, Crystal's Assistant City Manger. A lack of formal planning created a situation where land wasn't always used productively or consistently. "What you had was a used car lot, next to a restaurant, next to a single family dwelling, next to a car wash, next to an industrial site," he says.

Today, with 98 percent of residential

and commercial areas developed, the city is trying to correct mistakes of the past and build on positive aspects of the community, Olson adds. Crystal is currently redoing its comprehensive plan, examining all areas of the community — housing, community facilities, commercial/ industrial development and infrastructure — to see what needs to be done.

The plan is scheduled for completion in March 1991, but officials aren't waiting until then to get started. Here are a few proposed ideas in the areas of housing and commercial and infrastructure development, in various stages of progress.

Since most of Crystal's residential areas were built more than 30 years ago, aggressive measures are necessary to maintain and revitalize neighborhoods. The city is considering a proposed housing code for rental property that would require rental units to meet set standards or risk being shut down. Though unpopular with developers and landlords, Mayor Herbes says it's a necessity. Crystal is also taking other steps on the housing front. With the help of federal funding, several deteriorating homes in the community are torn down each year and new homes are offered with low-cost mortgages to first-time homeowners. In addition, several designated neighborhoods are eligible for low-cost home improvement loans.

The city is planning to redevelop a five-acre piece of property on County Road 81 between Bass Lake Road and Wilshire Boulevard. There is currently a motel, restaurant and bar on the land. Some of the business owners are ready to sell, and developers have expressed interest in the property but shy away because road access is poor. To correct that, the city has hired a traffic engineer who is studying the traffic problems and will recommend corrective action to the city. Once completed, officials hope to attract some form of commercial development such as a supper club or retail strip center.


Anthony's Shopping Center, at 36th Avenue North and State Highway 100, is another site being considered for redevelopment. The shopping center, which is now

owned by Bill and Tony Nicklow, was built in the 1950s. Plans call for knocking down the building and erecting a new 120,000 to 150,000 square-foot center partially on an adjacent 14-acre football field, which has better soil for building. The land will be purchased from the school district, and the city has established the area as a tax increment financing district. The Nicklows' are close to landing a developer and major tenant for the project. Olson says.

Thirty-sixth Avenue, a major eastwest thoroughfare in Crystal, is also in need of improvements. The city has proposed to add sidewalks (36th is the only major street left in Crystal without sidewalks), and resurface and widen the street. The improvements are planned in two phases, from State Highway 100 to Douglas Drive, and from Douglas Drive to Louisiana Avenue. Medicine Lake Road, another major east-west thoroughfare, is also being reconstructed in cooperation with New Hope, Golden Valley and Hennepin County.

Business Leaders Pleased With Renovations In Crystal Businesses on Bass Lake Road. between County Road 81 and Broadway, are benefitting from infrastructure improvements done by the city in the last several years. The area is home to Crystal Shopping Center, the city's most popular retail center, which houses a Target Haugland's Kids, the County Seat and Marshall's. The busy, congested area got a face-lift in 1986 when the city widened the road, put in a median, added two public parking lots and put in decorative lighting, planters and benches.

Carolyn Carringer is owner of a 3,000 square-foot Dairy Queen in Crystal Shopping Center, which has 215,000 square feet of retail space. She says the area has treated her so well that her shop is the topperforming Dairy Queen in a fivestate region. Carringer's sales tripled when she moved in 1985 to her current sit-down restaurant from a small, walk-up stand across the street. "Overall, there has been a rapid expansion of business in Crystal Shopping Center, especially over the last 10 years," she says. " remember years ago, there used to be many vacancy signs; now there's hardly ever one." During her 18 years in business, the city has been

helpful and cooperative, Carringer says. "They are a very forwardlooking community," and have helped Bass Lake Road develop into an important commercial area. she adds.

Crystal Shopping Center has evolved beyond a neighborhood center into a regional strip mall that attracts shoppers from surrounding suburbs, says Alice Jones, Marketing Director of Paster Enterprises. which owns 10 shopping centers. including the one in Crystal.


"We notice our stores, for the most part, are showing very strong sales," savs Jones. "It's a successful center. We continue to build our stores." Currently under construction is a 2,500 square-foot building that will house Subway Sandwiches and Salads and another retail

"It's much more attractive when you drive down Bass Lake Road than it was a few years ago, and that attracts customers," says Jones. who gives high marks to the city's staff. "Crystal officials definitely want to work with you, they want improvements for the city. We have a very good relationship with city

Crystal has spawned more than one successful venture. Timesavers. Inc., Crystal's largest employer, moved from Kansas to Crystal in 1952 and began operating out of a small garage. Today the firm is a worldwide leader and manufacturer of sanding machines with specialized coated abrasive belts. Timesavers has 340 employees and collects over \$40 million in annual revenue, according to Ray Vold, President of Timesavers, Inc. The company, which is housed in a 150,000 square-foot facility, also operates a plant in Kansas and a factory in North Carolina.

"We're here, quite frankly, because we started here and we have a good working relationship with the community," says Vold. One of the company's key assets is its employees, many of which come from Crystal, he adds. "We believe our people have a good work ethic and good skills and experience." Some have been with Timesavers for 30 years. Vold adds.

The city also offers other amenities, such as good police protection and



a city staff that's "supportive of our efforts," he says. Crystal, for instance, helped finance the company's last expansion by providing industrial revenue bonds.

Crystal Airport Close In
For Business Commuters
When examining Crystal's assets,
none is more obvious than the
airport. The 400-acre regional
airport, located in the northeast
corner of the city, is the closest of all
Twin Cities secondary airports to
downtown Minneapolis. Crystal
joined Brooklyn Center and
Brooklyn Park, two cities that border
the airport, to create a Tri-City
Airport Commission, a group
responsible for promoting the
airport.

"We'd like to encourage more business travelers to come here, particularly when they want to do business in the northwestern suburbs," says Olson, a member of the commission. Through word of mouth and advertising in pilot magazines, the group hopes the word gets out that Crystal airport — which has a control tower and sophisticated guidance technology to help pilots land safely — is a convenient place to put down a plane.

Crystal is also on the proposed route for the Northwest Light Rail Transit line, and if it becomes a reality, the city would be the only metropolitan area to offer a regional airport and a straight shot into downtown on light rail. The proposed line would run from Minneapolis through Golden Valley to Crystal along the Burlington Northern railroad tracks that parallel County Road 81. Likely stops are at Corvallis and Bass Lake Road, which is just a few blocks from the airport. But Bill Monk, Public Works Director for Crystal, cautions that light rail may not come to Crystal for some time, if at all.

"We're going slowly with the planning," he says. "You don't want everybody jumping up and down. It's a little bit premature." Regional Transit Board plans call for an initial light rail line that would run between Minneapolis and St. Paul. That line would be a test run, so to speak, and its success or failure would determine the outcome of the other proposed lines, Monk says.

Crystal has 23 well-manicured parks that cover 230 acres and accommodate all kinds of outdoor enthusiasts.

Even without light rail, public transportation in Crystal is widely available. The MTC has many routes in town, and bus service may get even better if an idea being proposed by the city goes through.

"We're looking at establishing bus service between four cities Crystal, Maple Grove, Brooklyn Park and Osseo," says Olson. An engineering firm is putting together a proposal that will recommend a system for linking the communities. The most intriguing alternative is one called Dial-a-Ride that would function much like a taxi service. providing door-to-door transportation. The bus system would provide convenient access to major businesses in Maple Grove, the North Hennepin Community College and Hennepin Technical Center and large grocery stores in Brooklyn Park, Osseo's downtown district, and of course, Crystal's shopping areas, Community Center and pool. "Rather than having to depend only on MTC routes, this would be a convenient alternative," Olson adds.

For A Small City, Crystal's Parks Pack A Big Wallop Of all Crystal's amenities, the park and recreation system may be the best. The city has 23 well-manicured parks that cover 230 acres. And as part of a long-range plan, each park is getting new, modern playground equipment. The parks accommodate all kinds of outdoor enthusiasts during all seasons: walkers, picnickers, baseball and softball players (the city has 100 softball teams) cross-country skiers and much more. Outdoor festivals light up the city during the summer; Octoberfest on July 4 with fireworks, the annual Frolics Celebration in late July, a June jazz festival plus 30 outdoor concerts of all kinds at Becker Park, to name a few. As for the future, park and recreation officials are considering a par-three golf course and an interpretive nature center similar to Wood Lake in Richfield.

But the city probably wants to catch its breath before jumping into a new project. The Community Center was a major effort, and who can blame the community for reveling in its success.

"We're real proud of it," says Brandeen.

The Chair asked for approval of the July 19, 1990, meeting minutes. Phyllis Isaacson noted a typing correction needed in the first paragraph of the second page. Mary Pat Hanauska moved to approve the minutes, as corrected. Lerry Teslow seconded the motion.

The Chair asked those members who conducted telephone surveys of various lawn care companies to report on their findings. Phyllis Isaacson reported the results of her survey. Lerry Teslow also reported on her findings. Jerry Farrell, who had surveyed 20 municipalities regarding their herbicide spraying posting requirements, found that only one city, the City of Bloomington, required posting. Bloomington also requires commercial sprayers to be licensed by the City as well as by the State and also requires commercial sprayers to notify neighbors with a door hanger when spraying will occur. The Chair reported on her findings from telephoning various lawn care companies. Diane Christopher noted information from a Star Tribune newspaper article on pesticides.

The Commission members concluded that there is a debate as to which possesses more hazards to the environment:

- Improper use of herbicides and pesticides by homeowners not following instructions or
- Violations by lawn service companies.

The following educational opportunities were discussed as potential ideas for promoting proper use of lawn care chemicals to the public:

- 1. Newletter articles.
- 2. Seminar at a local nursary.
- Seminar at the Community Center.

The Commission members then discussed potential topics for future City Newsletter articles. The following suggestions were made:

1. Warning about dangers of pumping gasoline.

2. Encouraging reuse of grocery bags.

3. Notifying residents of a Legislative Hot Line regarding environmental issues.

4. Notify residents of upcoming Public Service television programs.

5. Diagram of what happens to herbicides after they run off lawn in storm water.

 Conduct a contest for the best waste reduction idea.

7. Information on the Ozone Layer.

8. Information on Nuclear energy.

 Encourage reading of directions on herbicides and pesticides.

10. Safe disposal methods of household hazardous waste.

11. Information on backflow preventors.

12. Alternative uses to chemicals.

13. Chemical name definitions.

14. Encourage safe use of chemicals.

The Commission members requested staff to start a column in the October issue of the City Newsletter, asking for new, inovative waste reduction ideas, including the ideas of recycling old window glass and reusing paper shopping bags. It was also suggested that residents be invited in the column to suggest names for the heading of the column.
