The Physical Development Planner gave a brief overview of the 1995-1999 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan.

Kristy Nelson, St. Paul Park, stated that she was opposed to construction of a new library in Oakdale. She stated she works for the Library and feels that libraries are valuable, but does not feel the County needs to spend taxpayer's money on a new building. The current library in Oakdale just moved into a bigger space, and there are five other libraries within a short radius of this same area.

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners, after public notice, conducted a public hearing on January 3, 1995, for the purpose of receiving comments on the proposed 1995-1999 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopt the 1995-1999 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorize submittal of the plan to the Community Development Division of the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development for their approval.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Engstrom stated that the County has not made a final commitment to build a new library. The County Library is continuing discussions with the school districts, Housing and Redevelopment Authority and the City of Oakdale for a joint effort.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson indicated that newly elected Representative Sharon Marko has been named the Vice-Chair of the Transportation and Transit Committee. She suggested sending her a letter of congratulations and outlining the important issues of Washington County. Commissioner Engstrom suggested sending a letter to the entire legislative delegation, and that all Washington County legislative delegates received good committee assignments.

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota, acting by and through its Board of Water and Soil Resources ("BWSR"), has authority to award Natural Resources Block Grants for purposes of implementing comprehensive local water plans, the Wetland Conservation Act, the DNR Shoreland Program, and the MPCA County Feedlot Program, to local government pursuant to Laws of Minnesota 1993, Chapter 172, sec. 6, and Laws of Minnesota 1994, Chapter 632, sec. 3; and

WHEREAS, Washington County may assess a levy under its general levy authority to match such grants by BWSR pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 103B.335; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Revenue has determined the minimum amount necessary to be raised by Washington County for the base grant portion of the grant under the formula in repealed Minn. Stat. § 275.50, subd. 5; and

WHEREAS, BWSR has determined that Washington County is eligible for a Natural Resources Block Grant of up to \$46,225 upon BWSR acceptance of the LGU's application and the execution and delivery of a Grant Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves of Washington County entering into a Grant Agreement with the State of Minnesota to receive state funds for the implementation of its comprehensive local water plans, the administration of the Wetland Conservation Act, administration of the DNR Shoreland Program, and MPCA Feedlot Permit Program, under the terms of the Grant Agreement and all statutory requirements; and

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Facilities Project Manager gave a brief overview of a project that was completed for foundation repair at the Historic Courthouse. Because of weather concerns, the project was completed before the contract was prepared. Commissioner Hauser moved to set the County Recorder's salary at \$51,000, plus a lump sum payment to be made in December 1995 equal to the average merit pay increase earned by appointed department heads. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Safety Concerns Regarding the Intersection of CSAH 10 & CSAH 15

John McPherson, Chairman, West Lakeland Town Board, stated he was concerned about the intersection at CSAH 10 and CSAH 15 near Oak-Land School. He indicated there was a fatality at that intersection on January 2, and is afraid that a school bus may be involved in the future. He wondered if a four way stop sign would be a solution. He presented a letter from the mayors of the surrounding communities.

Wyn John, Mayor, City of Lake Elmo, stated that the Lake Elmo City Council was meeting this evening to discuss this issue, so his comments regarding CSAH 10 and 15 would be personal. He stated his concerns for this intersection were the same as Chairman McPherson's. He requested that a four way stop should be erected or traffic lights.

Floyd Radinzel, West Lakeland Planning Commission, presented traffic volumes for CSAH 10 and CSAH 15. He suggested reducing the speed limits past the school. He feels that the minimum action that should be taken is a four way stop on that intersection, but that traffic signals would be better.

Captain Mike Johnson, Washington County Sheriff's Department, presented traffic accident statistics, traffic citations, and accidents on CSAH 10 for the years 1991 through 1994.

Commissioner Hauser suggested that Public Works staff and Sheriff staff suggest possible solutions to resolve the safety issue at this intersection.

Captain Johnson stated that putting up stop signs may cause a lot of rear end collisions. The Public Works Director agreed with Captain Johnson that placing four way stop signs may change the characteristic of accidents at that intersection leading to more rear end collisions. Also placing four way stop signs may not be in compliance with the State. He stated that traffic signals would be the ultimate solution, but traffic volume levels are low compared to other intersections in the County. They are anticipating that in 1995 or 1996 the volumes will be there to justify a full signal at that intersection. He suggested bringing this matter back for further discussion so their staff can gather more data. He also suggested that in the mean time, the Sheriff's Department could provide more enforcement of the speed limit for cars travelling north bound.

Commissioner Peterson asked about reducing the speed in front of the junior high school. The Public Works Director indicated that the speed was reduced from 55 to 50 miles an hour, and that he did not think MN/DOT would reduce it further. However, if the Board wished, he could make that request.

Citizen Petition - Safety Action on 10th Street Between Century Avenue and Greenway Avenue

The Public Works Director presented a petition to the Board Chairman from over 500 citizens in the City of Oakdale for safety action on 10th Street (CSAH 10) between Century Avenue and Greenway Avenue in the City of Oakdale. He presented findings and recommendations that may be forwarded to the City of Oakdale.

Commissioner Hauser moved to accept the recommendations of Public Works staff, and forward the following recommendations to the City of Oakdale:

- 1. The road be converted from four lanes to three lanes.
- 2. The intersection of Gershwin and 10th Street has been placed in our Ranking System.
- The other intersections, including Greenway, will be monitored and placed in our system when warranted.
- 4. Construction of a sidewalk is a City responsibility.
- 5. Construction of lighting is a City responsibility.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the following fee schedule shall be established effective April 1, 1995:

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Set Hearing Date for Petition for Detachment and Annexation

Commissioner Engstrom moved to set the hearing date for a petition by Thomas R. Wolf and Carla J. Wolf to detach their home from School District 622 and annex it to School District 833 for March 28, 1995. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

County Investment Policy and Guidelines

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt the County Investment Policy and Guidelines as presented. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Metropolitan Mosquito Control Board Legislative Bill

The Board discussed a bill introduced at the Minnesota House of Representatives which would abolish the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District and would permit the formation of a mosquito abatement joint powers board.

Commissioner Engstrom, who is appointed to the Metropolitan Mosquito Control Board, stated that abolishing the Mosquito Control Board would return the budget control back to the County Board. The budget for the Mosquito Control Board is \$8,950,000, with \$500,000 of that amount coming out of Washington County. He feels that the County Board should be able to vote on how that \$500,000 is spent, or what amount of money should be appropriated to mosquito control in Washington County. He asked the Board to support this bill.

Commissioner Hegberg, who is also appointed to the Metropolitan Mosquito Control Board and is serving as Chairman this year, totally disagreed with the proposed bill. He stated that some of the funds used is for disease control. Also, to a lot of people the annoyance of mosquitos is a major item. He said that areas outside the Mosquito Control District are bothered more by mosquitos than we are.

Commissioner Engstrom stated there should be mosquito control in some form, but feels spending \$10 million dollars a year is too much. He is not sure if the County Board were in charge of the \$500,000 that it would spend that much on mosquito control.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to support legislation which would abolish the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District and would permit the formation of a mosquito abatement joint powers board. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hauser stated she supports the legislation because the County should have more control over where our money goes, and that the Mosquito Control District is just another commitment that is imposed on the County by statute; that it is in fact an unfunded mandate.

Commissioner Peterson stated that members of her family are allergic to mosquitos and is afraid that if this bill goes into enactment there will be no taxing authority that would take care of divesting ourselves of the perennial beast that attacks us during the summer. She stated she is not in support of this legislation.

The motion to support legislation which would abolish the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District and would permit the formation of a mosquito abatement joint powers board was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Abrahamson, and Hauser; No, Commissioners Peterson and Hegberg.

Commissioner Hegberg indicated that as Chairman of the Mosquito Control Board he will be lobbying the State Legislature for the continuance of the Mosquito Control Board. He also stated that he would bring the concerns of the County Board back to the Mosquito Control Board for discussion.

5¢ Per Gallon Increase on the Motor Fuel Tax

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-024 as follows:

Support for a 5¢ Per Gallon Increase on the Motor Fuel Tax

WHEREAS, The State Advisory Council on Major Transportation Projects examined the level of transportation need facing the state. This need is often difficult to quantify because it can vary considerably with the level of service goals which are to be met. While there is not widespread agreement of the precise dollar amount of need, there is general agreement that transportation funding must be increased if we are going to maintain and improve the existing system.

WHEREAS, There are a number of factors and trends which are contributing to Minnesota's growing transportation needs and the gap between these needs and transportation spending. Over the past decade, travel on Minnesota's highways has increased at a rate much faster than population or job growth. From, 1980 to 1990, population rose seven percent, the number of households grew by 14 percent, Minnesota added over 400,000 new jobs, and total travel on our roadways increased by over

36 percent. This rapidly growing travel demand is reliant on an aging transportation system that receives comparatively fewer dollars than it did in 1972.

WHEREAS, Minnesota's last gas tax increase occurred in 1988, at which time the tax went from 16 cents per gallon to the present 20 cents per gallon. However, because the gas tax is not indexed for inflation, Minnesota's buying power in the area of transportation has dropped substantially. An Information Brief prepared by House Research indicates that since 1972 highway expenditures as a percent of total state and local government spending have dropped from 11.6 percent of total spending in 1972 to 7.5 percent of government expenditures in 1992.

WHEREAS, The Minnesota Advisory Council on Major Transportation Projects recommends that the Legislature should increase the present motor fuel tax by five cents per gallon and provide for annual indexing of the tax at the rate of inflation in subsequent years.

WHEREAS, The Minnesota Transportation Alliance supports a motor fuel tax increase of at least five cents per gallon and that legislature provide for the annual indexing of the motor fuels user fee rates to reflect the rate of inflation.

WHEREAS, the motor fuels tax is a user fee related to the amount of travel and therefore reflects the cost to the state and local government of providing and maintaining highways and streets.

WHEREAS, Association of Minnesota Counties supports amending existing legislation to include motor fuels tax increase of five cents per gallon, and providing future increases through indexing conditioned on inclusion of the following changes to the County State Aid Highway System:

* modify the make-up of the County State Aid Screening Board to consist of one county engineer from each of MN/DOT's seven non-metropolitan maintenance districts and five from the metropolitan district; no county engineer can serve consecutively for more than four years;

- * change the mileage factor to use lane miles for allocation of 30 percent of CSAH funds in place of centerline miles;
- * remove the 30,000 mile CSAH system limit and direct the Screening Board to develop a process to add qualified miles to the CSAH System.

WHEREAS, Washington County residents would benefit by the timely construction of state highways to allow for the movement of people and goods in Washington County; by an increase in state funding to the county for the construction and maintenance of county state aid highways; and by an increase in funding to municipalities over 5000 population in Washington County for the construction and maintenance of municipal state aid roads. Washington County's current constructions needs for the county exceed \$96,000,000.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, Washington County supports the motor fuel tax increase to twenty-five cents per gallon and provide for the annual indexing of the tax at the rate of inflation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED Washington County supports the transportation platform of the Association of Minnesota Counties as proposed by its Transportation Policy Committee on January 27, 1995; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED Washington County urges its legislative delegation to support increasing and indexing the motor fuels tax during the 1995 legislative session.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Hauser, and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Abrahamson.

A workshop to discuss transportation funding and legislative proposals and recommendations has been scheduled for February 14.

National Highway Funding

Commissioner Peterson indicated that due to President Clinton's proposed 1995 budget which calls for the U.S. Department of Transportation to "defund and dismantle the federal-aid highway program", she will not be bringing forward a resolution in support of national highway funding.

Additional Squad Cars for Sheriff's Department

The County Sheriff spoke to the Board on the need for four additional squad cars. He indicated that there were squad cars with over 100,000 miles on them, and these could pose a safety hazard to the police officers.

Commissioner Hauser stated that she could vote for two additional cars, and in the mean time, the fleet management policy could be developed to see what is actually needed. But at this time she feels four cars may be too many.

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the purchase of two additional squad cars to be paid for out of fund balance. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion.

Commissioner Peterson moved to amend the motion to approve the purchase of four additional squad cars to be paid for out of fund balance. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the amended motion, and the amended motion failed with the vote as follows: No, Commissioners Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg; Yes, Commissioners Engstrom and Peterson.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to amend the motion to approve the purchase of three additional squad cars to be paid for out of fund balance. Commissioner Peterson seconded the amended motion, and the amended motion was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, and Abrahamson; No, Commissioners Hauser and Hegberg.

The motion to approve the purchase of two additional squad cars, and as amended to purchase three additional squad cars to be paid for out of fund balance, was adopted unanimously.

Board Room Remodeling

The County Administrator announced that County Board and other committee meetings are now being held in the Fifth Floor Conference Room of the Government Center. The remodeling of the Board Room and Training Rooms hopefully will be completed in mid-March.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Judy Atkins, Auditor-Treasurer's Office, asked the County Board to persuade the Library Board to not appeal the Appellate Court's decision on Library employees being joint employees of Washington County and the Library Board. Commissioner Engstrom indicated to Ms. Atkins that the County Board did not partake in the appeal, the Library Board did that on their own. Commissioner Hauser stated that the County Board has not seen a copy of the Appellate Court's decision. The County Attorney indicated that he has not seen a copy, but would make sure the Board members receive one.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom indicated that the Housing and Redevelopment Authority has decided to stay in-house and not contract out for property management services. An extensive study was conducted and

found that the HRA would save approximately \$100,000 county-wide. He also indicated that if the Commissioners got correspondence from residents at these properties, to forward them to HRA for response.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

EXECUTIVE (CLOSED) SESSION

Commissioner Engstrom moved, seconded by Commissioner Hauser to go into Executive (Closed) Session for attorney-client discussion on a Medicare reimbursement claim; the time being 8:30 p.m. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Richard Arney, Greg Tavernier, and Patricia Raddatz.

The Board reconvened at 8:45 p.m.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Engstrom moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Board meeting was preceded by a workshop with the Public Works Department to discuss the possible acquisition of a house adjacent to the Law Enforcement Center and Government Center. Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board's Statement of Need

Ratify the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Boards Statement of Needs

WHEREAS, Washington County is a member of the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board (SWMCB), pursuant to a Joint Powers Agreement approved by Washington County on June 8, 1993; and

WHEREAS, Washington County approved the Washington County Solid Waste Management Master Plan in July 1992; and

AND STA

WHEREAS, the Washington County Master Plan include the Regional Operations Plan which identifies those areas of responsibility for a joint powers board of the counties in solid waste management, including analysis of the need for future facilities and programs; and

WHEREAS, the SWMCB developed a Statement of Need for the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area Regional Solid Waste Management System, in consultation with other interested parties, including a peer review of the draft document; and

WHEREAS, the Statement of Need provides specific recommendations for minimizing landfilling during the 1995-1997 period by increasing waste reduction and recycling and making more efficient use of existing processing facilities; and

WHEREAS, the SWMCB adopted the Statement of Need on December 14, 1994 and recommended that its member counties ratify the Statement of Need; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners ratify the SWMCB Statement of Need; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes staff to work with the Ramsey County and the Resource Recovery Project staff to develop and negotiate contracts with waste haulers to assure the flow of waste to the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Facility; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby encourages Ramsey County, Washington County and the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project to work together with NRG to seek maximize efficiency from the bulky waste shredder at the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Facility;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby encourages Ramsey County, Washington County and the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project to work together with NSP and NRG to maximize use of combustion capacity at NSP;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby encourages NRG to enter into waste sharing agreement with Hennepin County and EPR, if necessary to make maximum use of waste processing capacity in the region.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board Joint Powers Agreement

Commissioner Engstrom moved to approve Amendment No. 1 to the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board Joint Powers Agreement which would establish a regional hauler licensing program

Qualified Allocation Plan for Low Income Housing Tax Credits

WHEREAS, Congress has permanently extended the Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program by enactment of the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993; and

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations") which would require allocators of low income housing credits, including the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (the "Authority") which allocates such credits on behalf of Washington County (the "County"), to monitor compliance by projects to which it has allocated low income housing tax credits with the requirements of Section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, have been published; and

WHEREAS, the Regulations, as well as certain revisions to state law, require modifications to the Authority's previously adopted Low Income Housing Tax Credit Qualified Allocation Plan (the "Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority has approved the Plan, as amended, in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A following a public hearing regarding the revision of the Plan for which not less than 14 days notice was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County.

CITY OF OAKDALE - COMMUNITY TAX ABATEMENT PROGRAM

Craig Waldron, Administrator, City of Oakdale, presented a proposal for a development that would include 250 housing units and a golf course in Oakdale. The County would be asked to enter an agreement with the City whereby 50% of the County share of the taxes from the new housing would be returned to the City of Oakdale over the next twelve years. This would facilitate the bond payments for the land purchase. The proposal would be in lieu of the City creating a Soils Tax Increment Financing District, whereby the County would lose all property tax revenue from the district for the same period of time.

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize staff to work with the City of Oakdale on an agreement to financially support a housing and golf course development in lieu of a Soils Tax Increment Financing District. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Representatives from Orr-Schelen-Mayeron & Associates, presented an update and project schedule on the CSAH 16 (Valley Creek Road) project in Woodbury. The project has an EAW that is now in the comment period. This matter will come back to the Board for a decision on the need for an EIS in March.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Commissioner Hauser moved to refer Chapter 4 of the Washington County Development code: Individual Sewage Treatment System Ordinance to the County's Planning Advisory Commission for a review and recommendation. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

He stated that the issue became so technical, and the question on how to enforce the ordinance became complicated, that he thinks it may have gotten shelved for the time being.

Chairman Abrahamson asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson called the Board's attention to page 9 of the Metropolitan Council's 1994 Annual Report. Two issues which may impact the County are: 1) Southeast Area Wastewater Study; and 2) Development Around Possible New Major Airport.

Commissioner Engstrom asked if the vacancy on the Metropolitan Council in District 5 has been filled. Commissioner Hauser stated that she believes Mary Carlson of Afton will be the appointment, but nothing has been finalized. Commissioner Engstrom suggested a meeting with the new Metropolitan Council representative and the local municipalities to discuss issues that are important to Washington County and local communities.

Commissioner Peterson stated she has meet with Congressman Luther at his office in Woodbury to discuss Highway 61, the Wakota Bridge, and getting other Minnesota legislators to sign on in support of flow control legislation.

Commissioner Hegberg indicated he will be attending a meeting tonight to discuss the pros and cons of a merger between Forest Lake and Forest Lake Township.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked the Public Works Director to update the Board on speed zones on Highway 5. The Public Works Director indicated that MN/DOT has made the following decisions on Highway 5 regarding speed limits: 1) Between TH 36 to Croixwood the speed limit will be 45 mph; and, 2) From Croixwood to Pine Street 35 mph. He indicated that the signs should be posted by the end of next week.

Commissioners Abrahamson and Engstrom indicated they have received favorable comments from citizens regarding the posting of stop signs at the intersection of County Roads 10 and 15.

PUBLIC HEARING-HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

Rezoning Request by Bernard & Delores Preiner

The Board Chairman presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance. Bernard and Delores Preiner, the applicants, are seeking to rezone 170 acres of land from A-1 to A-2.

The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of intent to adopt said ordinance amendment. The Board Chairman declared the public hearing open at 9:05 a.m.

Dennis O'Donnell, Land Use Specialist, presented an overview of the rezoning request.

John Bannigan, Attorney for applicants, gave an brief presentation and requested the Board approve this action.

The Board Chair asked for further comments; none were heard. Commissioner Engstrom moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent. The public hearing was closed at 9:25 a.m.

The Board secretary indicated that all documentary evidence had been received and was made a part of the record.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the rezoning request by Bernard & Delores Preiner to rezone 170 acres of land from A-1 to A-2. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

The County Attorney's office was directed to prepare a resolution adopting the Zoning Ordinance Amendment, and that said resolution will be presented at the next County Board meeting.

Negative Declaration for an EIS - Tiller Corporation Mining Operation, West Lakeland Township

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt **Resolution No. 95-030** as follows:

Negative Declaration for an EIS Tiller Corporation Mining Operation, West Lakeland Township

WHEREAS, Tiller Corporation has applied for a Conditional Use Permit for a mining operation; which indicates the operation will excavate 40 acres or more of land to a mean depth of 10 feet or more during its existence and Minnesota Rule 4410.4300, § 12 and § 1 requires an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) be prepared in this situation; and

WHEREAS, Washington County, as the Responsible Government Unit (RGU) has prepared an EAW which meets the requirements of Minnesota Rule 4410.1200 in terms of content and has been published in the January 2, 1995 issue of the Environmental Quality Board Monitor and distributed as required by Minnesota Rule 4410.1500; and

WHEREAS, the comment period for review has elapsed pursuant to Minnesota Rule 4410.1600 and a decision on the need for an EIS is required pursuant to Minnesota Rule 4410.1700; and

WHEREAS, the major environmental issues of concern as identified in the EAW are:

- 1. Impact of mining operation on air quality. Dust will be generated when the soils are stripped, excavated, processed, loaded and hauled off-site. The particulate emissions from this facility will be regulated by an Air Emissions General Permit issued by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. To reduce dust emissions, the EAW identifies mitigative measures such as establishing buffers along property lines, locating processing and operating equipment on the pit floor, watering haul roads on the site, establishing vegetation on stockpiles and reclaiming areas as soon as possible after mining has ceased.
- Noise generated by the mining operation. The processing, screening and transfer equipment, excavation and loading equipment, and vehicles generate noise. The EAW states noise will be mitigated by locating the equipment, crushing and washing facilities in the pit floor, establishing and retaining a buffer along property lines.
- 3. Impact of mining operation on surface water runoff. Surface water runoff will pick up and transport fine sediment from exposed slopes and other surfaces. The EAW identifies mitigated measures which prevent sediment laden runoff from leaving the site. The majority of stormwater is expected to infiltrate into the soils. Surface water which does not infiltrate into the soils is directed to flow into the operating area.

4. Impact of mining operation on groundwater. Once the surface soils are stripped and the soils with high infiltration rates are exposed, the risk for groundwater contamination increases. At it's lowest elevation, the pit floor will be 15 feet above the groundwater table. Hazardous materials on site which may affect groundwater include fuel and wastes from the maintenance of equipment and trucks. To mitigate potential impacts, the EAW states the mining permit will require the above ground fuel tank to be contained within a secondary containment structure. Hazardous wastes generated from maintenance are to be hauled off site for disposal at a designated waste facility.

and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Mining Ordinance and Conditional Use Permit provisions in the Washington County Zoning Ordinance provide a mechanism for requiring an applicant to evaluate and demonstrate potential impacts and mitigate significant impacts; and

WHEREAS, the RGU has compared the impacts that may reasonably be expected to occur from this project with the type, extent and reversibility of environmental effects, cumulative potential effects on related or anticipated future projects, extent to which the environmental effects are subject to mitigation by ongoing public regulatory authority, and the extent to which the environmental effects can be anticipated and controlled as a result of other environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the project proposer and has concluded that the identifiable major environmental issues can be adequately addressed through the Conditional Use Permit process.

BASED ON THE FOREGOING,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners as the RGU, makes a negative declaration of the need for an EIS in connection with the application of Tiller Corporation for a Conditional Use Permit for their mining operation in West Lakeland Township.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that said decision be distributed and published in the Environmental Quality Board Monitor in accordance with Minnesota Rule 4410.1700.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the major areas of environmental issues be satisfied before the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit by the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

Legislative Update

Sue Ladwig, County Legislative Representative, presented an update on the legislative session. The Board discussed a possible property tax freeze in the Senate tax bill and a reverse referendum provision in the House tax bill. Star Trail Association

The Public Works Director distributed copies of council minutes from the Cities of Forest Lake and Hugo and Forest Lake Township supporting the use of the railroad bed north of Hugo as a snowmobile trail.

Nora Gallmeyer, Star Trail Association Coordinator, presented the Board with a copy of the certificate of insurance naming the Cities of Hugo, Forest Lake, and Forest Lake Township as additional insured under their policy.

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize the Public Works Department to prepare an agreement with the Washington County Star Trail Association to allow the use of the railroad bed that runs through the Cities of Hugo and Forest Lake, and Forest Lake Township; and, that the conditions outlined by the City of Hugo be incorporated into the agreement. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Engstrom and Peterson absent.

Commercial Fishing Permits at Point Douglas Park

The Public Works Director gave a brief overview on allowing access for commercial fishing through Point Douglas Park. He stated that the County has permitted commercial fishing off Point Douglas Park Beach for many years. He indicated that last year, two commercial fisheries wanted to use the same space. To avoid future conflict, staff developed a request for proposals for individuals requesting the special use permits and that the highest bidder receive the permit.

Steve Breitung, Breitung Fishery, Pepin, Wisconsin, indicated that he has been fishing this spot for 45 years. He indicated that last year they were unable to exercise their use of the permit because other fishermen placed their nets in such a way that it was impossible for them to get over the nets. He feels that it wouldn't pay to bid if you can't use it.

The County Attorney stated that the County can only allow the use of County property up to the water line. The County can only license an individual or firm to access the river from the County land. The County has no legal authority to protect a business or exercise the right to use the river. That would be governed by federal law or in this case the Coast Guard. It is a public's right to use the river, you cannot protect a fishing spot.

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize the solicitation of quotes to allow commercial fishing at Point Douglas Park, and that this process be reviewed after one year. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Engstrom and Peterson absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The Auditor-Treasurer presented three possible legislative tax initiatives and their impact on the County. The three initiatives being considered by the State Legislature are: 1) Voucher System; 2) Property Tax Freeze; and 3) Reverse Referendum. He indicated that he will continue to monitor these activities and report back to the Board when new information is available.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

St. Croix River Boating Rules Update

Steve Johnson, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, presented an update on amendments to water surface use regulations on the Lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway. He reviewed the two amendments enacted by the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board on February 23, 1995. He indicated that the Minnesota DNR agrees with Wisconsin's first amendment which expands the existing no-wake zone at Lakeland-Hudson to include the area between the south boundary of the existing no-wake zone and the Interstate 94 bridges, as well as the South Hudson Bay area east of the existing no-wake zone. He informed the Board that the Minnesota DNR is currently preparing a public notice for amendment of this rule, and hopes to have this amendment in effect and enforceable before the Memorial Day Weekend. The second amendment enacted by the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board deals with the five-mile stretch of river between Stillwater and the Arcola Sandbar. This rule contains three different speed zones on summer weekends; unrestricted speeds between sunrise and noon, no-wake between noon and 6:00 p.m., and slow-speed between 6:00 p.m. and sunrise. He stated that the MN DNR feels establishing three different speed limits for the same area in a single day is not reasonable, and they will not be pursuing this rule amendment.

PERA President Elected

The County Administrator announced that Auditor-Treasurer Dick Stafford has been elected President of the PERA (Public Employees Retirement Association) Board of Trustees.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

The Board discussed the following legislative issues: Metropolitan Mosquito Control District, retroactive refund of sales tax for the law enforcement center, property tax reform as supported by AMC, and a larger budget reserve as proposed by the Governor. PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-047 as follows:

Negative Declaration on Need for Environmental Impact Statement on CSAH 16

Acres de la company

WHEREAS, Washington County, in conjunction with the City of Woodbury, is proposing the reconstruction of Valley Creek Road (CSAH 16) from Interlachen Parkway to 800 feet east of St. Johns Drive in Woodbury, Washington County, Minnesota.

WHEREAS, the proposed project is expected to meet applicable local, state and federal guidelines for reconstruction of the roadway.

WHEREAS, Minnesota Rule 4410.4300 Subp. 22(b) requires an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) be prepared for the project.

WHEREAS, Washington County, as the Responsible Government Unit (RGU) has prepared an EAW for this project and has presented the findings of facts and conclusions.

WHEREAS, based upon the EAW, and comments received on the EAW, findings of fact include:

- 1. The type and extent of environmental effects are similar to effects associated with other road construction projects.
- 2. The environmental effects to the adjacent wetlands and project area can be mitigated as part of this project.
- 3. No cumulative potential effects of related or anticipated projects exist that would pose significant environmental effects.
- The anticipated environmental effects are subject to mitigation by ongoing regulatory authority including the Corps of Engineers, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, and Minnesota Historical Society.
- 5. The extent of environmental effects can be anticipated and controlled as a result of experience with other similar highway improvement projects with similar environmental effects.

WHEREAS, based on the criteria in Minnesota Rule 0410.1770, the project does not have significant environmental affects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners, as the RGU, makes a negative declaration of the need for an EIS in connection with the Valley Creek Road (CSAH 16) improvements - Interlachen Parkway to 800 feet east of St. Johns Drive.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Community Services Director advised the Board that Washington County has been designated as a child support administrative process county by the Commissioner of Human Services. He indicated that the County will be implementing a contested administrative hearing process sometime in June, 1995. An Administrative Law Judge will conduct hearings on-site rather than District Court Judges. A workshop is planned for April to present a model of this process.

FOREST LAKE DAM AND SUNRISE RIVER OUTFLOW

William House, Forest Lake, requested that the County Board take corrective action to lower the elevation of Forest Lake by eleven inches to the established elevation set in 1923. He stated that sixteen to eighteen feet of lakeshore has been lost since the dam was rebuilt in 1953.

Bob Turrentine, Assistant County Attorney, stated that Mr. House is requesting the County to lower the elevation of that lake by 9/10 of a foot. He indicated that that elevation has been there for 42 years. In his review of the statutes and case law, he finds nothing that authorizes or requires Washington County to lower the level of the lake. Washington County is only responsible for maintaining the dam. The lake elevation is controlled by the Corps of Engineers and the Minnesota DNR.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he will meet with Mr. House and Public Works staff to look into this matter. Commissioner Hauser suggested meeting with the Corps of Engineers and the Minnesota DNR to investigate a solution to Mr. House's request.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-048 as follows:

National Highway System (NHS)

WHEREAS, Congress called for the establishment of a National Highway System as part of the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991; and

WHEREAS, State departments of transportation, working with local and regional governments and the public, have identified 159,000 miles of the nation's busiest and most important roads to be part of the system; and

WHEREAS, the National Highway System comprises only 4 percent of our nation's roads, but it carries 40 percent of our car travel and 75 percent of our truck traffic; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota is as far from the ocean ports and international markets as any state in America; and

WHEREAS, moving Minnesota commodities, products and services to national and international markets is critical to the economic well-being of the state, its communities and its citizens; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota has designated 3,901 miles of highways to be included as part of the National Highway System; and

WHEREAS, Congress must act to designate the National Highway System by September 30, 1995 or funds (\$6.3 billion) for the system will cease and Minnesota could lose \$111 million annually;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County supports the designation of the National Highway System and miles identified in Minnesota; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County urges the Minnesota Congressional delegation to support designation of the National Highway System by September 30, 1995.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom stated that he attended a Pollution Control Agency meeting yesterday and presented a letter from the County Board asking for a delay in action on a garbage transfer station in Ramsey County until such time as the joint Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Facility had time to review the document to identify any possible implications it may have on the facility.

She will also send a copy of a survey on businesses who have left Minnesota to relocate in Wisconsin and why they left.

Chairman Abrahamson updated the Board on a meeting he, Commissioner Hauser and the County Administrator had with the County Sheriff concerning the jail. The Sheriff will be presenting a workshop in a few weeks to discuss several different issues.

The Board discussed legislation that would add judges to the various judicial districts. One bill has two judges being added to Judicial District 10 with one judge being housed in Washington County.

Commissioner Peterson suggested taking a tour of other County court rooms in the metropolitan area to see what they look like and what their plans are for making them handicapped accessible.

The Board Chairman asked the boy scout who was sitting in the back of the room, to identify himself and indicate what badge he was working on. Jon Monsen, Stillwater, indicated he was from Scout Troop 132, and was working on his citizenship badge. Commissioner Engstrom asked that a copy of today's minutes be sent to Jon.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Public Safety has continued to promote efforts to reduce crashes and injuries on our roadways during this project through education and enforcement; and,

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Public Safety has established County Crash Reduction Enforcement Effort for 1995 to achieve the above stated purpose, promoting law enforcement and traffic safety; and,

WHEREAS, the County is eligible to receive up to \$7,000.00 in reimbursement for participation in County Crash reduction Enforcement Effort to be conducted beginning on May 12, 1995, and extending through September 4, 1995, to offset any increased overtime patrol costs:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Washington County enter into agreement with the State of Minnesota, Department of Public Safety for the following purposes, to wit: to reimburse the County for money spent for approved activities in connection with County Crash Reduction Enforcement Effort for additional traffic law enforcement on County State Aid Highways within said County to increase compliance on speed, seatbelts, child restraints and other hazardous driving violations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairperson of the County Board or the County Administrator hereby are authorized to execute such agreement and any amendment thereto.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Jim Frank, County Sheriff.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

The County Attorney presented an overview of the proposed juvenile curfew ordinance and requested that it be set for public hearing on May 16, 1995. The Board discussed the proposed juvenile curfew ordinance.

Commissioner Hauser asked the County Attorney what statistics he had on how this ordinance would solve any of the juvenile problems if it were enacted. The County Attorney indicated he didn't have any hard statistics, but research has found a substantial number of juvenile criminal activity occurs during the proposed curfew hours. Commissioner Hauser stated she did not believe dragging juveniles through the judicial system would solve the juvenile crime problem; it would only clog the courts. She also indicated that whether the cities and townships know it or not, there will be a huge cost factor. The ordinance is only as good as the enforcement.

Commissioner Peterson read from a letter she received from Dennis Cusick, City of Cottage Grove Police Chief, who asked that the Board consider the following when making their decision to adopt the juvenile curfew ordinance: "There are far more juveniles than police officers. We cannot afford to have too many officers off the street tied up on volumes of paperwork needed to process juvenile status offenders. To be effective, the enforcement strategy must include immediate intervention of the offending juvenile and their parents. We must identify a location within the city to process these juvenile offenders. The County facility, even if they could accommodate this volume, is simply too far away." The County Attorney indicated that he talked to Chief Cusick and that the Chief was very much in favor of this ordinance, although they are anticipating some problems. Cottage Grove was one of the communities that was very much in favor of the concept.

Commissioner Peterson stated it was imperative that a cost analysis be done. She also asked: What is this going to cost us; what facilities will we need to have; how are we going to implement this. She stated she was tired of passing laws and ordinances that do not have a fiscal impact statement for communities as well as the county.

Chairman Abrahamson stated that this was not a public hearing, it's a request to set a public hearing. He indicated that if this ordinance is not adopted, that juveniles from other counties with the ordinance will come to Washington County and cause trouble.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to set the public hearing to consider the proposed juvenile curfew ordinance for May 16, 1995, at 9:00 a.m. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

City of Oakdale Housing Project Agreement

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-061 as follows:

Oakdale Housing Project Agreement

WHEREAS, the Oakdale Housing and Redevelopment Authority, pursuant to MN Statute Section 469.001-469.047, has formed a redevelopment area designated as Redevelopment District No. 2; and,

WHEREAS, as part of this redevelopment district, the Authority proposes to assist in the acquisition and development of a single-family housing project and a public golf course facility; and,

WHEREAS, the public golf course facility is located on land parcels on which there are unusual terrain or soil deficiencies and the City of Oakdale proposes to expend public monies to finance the cost of acquiring the parcels and certain site improvements thereon; and,

WHEREAS, instead of creating a soils tax-increment financing district coterminous with the housing project to defray the public redevelopment costs, it is reasonable and in the best interests of the County, the city and the Housing and Redevelopment Authority that this agreement be entered into; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 469.041 of the Development Act, the County and the city may make contributions for the project and enter into long-term agreements, such as this agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County agrees to pay to the Oakdale Housing and Redevelopment Authority in semi-annual installments, a sum equal to 50% of the additional property taxes actually received by the County on a schedule as set forth in the agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes its Chairman and County Administrator to execute the agreement by and between the Oakdale Housing and Redevelopment Authority, the City of Oakdale, and the County of Washington.

Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Contract with AMC for Metropolitan Council Monitoring Services

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize the expansion of the agreement with AMC District X and Boland & Gohl to include monitoring of Metropolitan Council activities. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Metropolitan Mosquito Control District

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt a resolution that would support the continuation of the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District as it is currently structured by the State Legislature; and, opposes legislation that would divert the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District levy dollars to other programs. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-062 as follows:

Support Study of the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District

WHEREAS, Washington County has passed a resolution calling for more local control over the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District programs and budget; and

WHEREAS, current legislation seeks to divert Metropolitan Mosquito Control District levy dollars to other unrelated programs and levy more taxes to control mosquitoes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County supports a study of the Metropolitan Mosquito Control District to determine program scope, levy formula and governance structure to best serve the citizens of the metropolitan area.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Legislative Update

The County Administrator updated the Board on the legislative activities including the property tax freeze and sales tax refund for the law enforcement center.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

Resource Recovery Project

The Board discussed two letters received prior to today's Board meeting. The letters were from Kevin Tritz, Browning-Ferris Industries, (BFI) and Ronald J. Will, NRG Energy, Inc. Both letters dealt with the tipping fee currently being charged at the Ramsey-Washington Resource Recovery Facility in Newport. The BFI letter requested that the tipping charge be lowered to the mid-\$30.00 per ton range, or they would start shipping their garbage to an out-of-state facility.

Jerry Turnquist, Resource Recovery Project Manager, indicated that the Project Board will be meeting on April 27. He will be meeting with the financial consultants to discuss what the impacts would be of lowering the tipping fee.

Commissioner Peterson suggested that the federal legislative delegation be contacted and a meeting set up during their spring recess to discuss the issue of flow control.

Commissioner Reports - Comments - Questions

Commissioner Engstrom reported that he and Commissioner Abrahamson will be meeting with Jim Heltzer, Housing and Redevelopment Authority Director, to discuss the HRA's plans for the next year.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Urban Strategies Task Force meeting she attended last Friday. There will be another meeting on April 14 and she urged other Board members to attend because the discussion will have an impact on how counties respond with delivery of social services and transportation. She attended the Mississippi River Coordinating Commission and indicated she will be attending a reception in Dakota County honoring their volunteers. She also reported that the Salvation Army is opening an office in the City of Oakdale, and will be working with the Ramsey Action Program. She also stated there will be a public hearing on the Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Plan on April 20. She indicated she will prepare a resolution requesting that the time frame for the Wakota Bridge and Highway 61 projects be expedited.

The Board viewed a video tape of the 800 megahertz system.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board Correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Engstrom and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:15 a.m.

Grant contract for implementation of an Automated Citation System in Washington County from the Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation (hereinafter referred to as Board) to County of Washington (hereinafter referred to as Grantee) on behalf of the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Washington County Information Systems Office, Washington County Court Administration, the cities of Bayport, Cottage Grove, Forest Lake, Newport, Oakdale, Oak Park Heights, Stillwater, St. Paul Park, and Woodbury and the Minnesota Supreme Court Information Systems Office.

Sue Ladwig, County Legislative Representative, presented an update on legislative issues including transportation, corrections funding, and the property tax freeze.

Commissioner Peterson indicated she would be meeting with Representative Marko and Congressman Luther this afternoon to discuss the Wakota Bridge and present a letter to Congressman Luther regarding the youth employment programs.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Bill House, Forest Lake, discussed the Forest Lake outflow channel. He asked the County Board members if they had received and read the information he supplied to the County Attorney's Office, and the Public Works Department on February 16 which pertains to the dam and outflow. The Board members indicated they had reviewed several documents pertaining to this matter. The County Administrator stated that a meeting was held last Thursday with representatives of the County, watershed management district and Mr. House. He stated that after the County had a chance to review the information the Public Works Department would bring back a recommendation to the Board.

The Public Works Director reported that he met with Mr. House, Commissioner Dennis Hegberg, Bob Turrentine, Assistant County Attorney, John Skogland, water management organization, Chip Robinson, Forest Lake City Administrator, and Don Theisen, Deputy Public Works Director. He indicated that the conclusion reached after that meeting was that the County no longer has authority to set lake levels. Over the years, those kinds of decisions have been made by the Department of Natural Resources. It was the conclusion at the end of that meeting that the dam elevation or dam itself could not be modified. The only thing the County could do is clean out the channel that takes water from Forest Lake to the Sunrise River. The City Administrator of Forest Lake indicated at that meeting that they have contracted to begin work on cleaning out the channel in late June. The Public Works Director stated there was a possibility that the County should work with the City of Forest Lake and Forest Lake Township to deed that dam to the local units of government and that it may be managed by the water management organization.

The Board Chairman asked if the County had received anything in writing from the Department of Natural Resources regarding this issue. The Public Works Director indicated that the DNR was invited to attend this meeting and they declined to come because they have been through this many times. They have decided and made their ruling in terms of the water elevation. In their letter they indicated that if the County wanted to go through a fairly detailed hydrological analysis of the lake, present information to the DNR regarding whether or not that lake elevation should change, the County could undertake that. The Public Works Director stated that would be a very expensive process. He

also indicated that it would be contested by a number of landowners that live around the lake. He would not recommend to the Board pursuing that route.

Mr. House asked for an hour of the County Board's time to go over the documents that he presented to the County Attorney and County Engineer. He stated that he was sure the County Board would not reach the same conclusions as the two departments have.

The Board Chairman asked that the following items be provided from staff: Conclusions reached by staff at last week's meeting; Copy of the letter from the DNR; The number of residents around the lake, how many are cabins and how many are permanent homes, and how they are affected by this dam.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom stated that staff from the Housing and Redevelopment Authority had met with each individual Commissioner and outlined their ongoing projects. He indicated that he was pleased with the progress they are making. Commissioner Peterson also stated she thought Jim Heltzer, the HRA Director, was doing a wonderful job.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Urban Strategies Task Force meeting last week. The task force will continue to work on refining their report. She indicated to the group that the next chapter should include a lot of input from the counties because the counties will be delivering the services. She suggested a workshop to discuss this matter in greater detail.

Commissioner Peterson encouraged the audience to attend the comprehensive public hearing tonight and Thursday night at 7:00 p.m. in the County Board Room.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to go into Executive (Closed) Session. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

EXECUTIVE (CLOSED) SESSION

The Board met in Executive Session at 10:00 a.m. for a negotiation strategy for 1994-95 agreement with employees in the County Library system. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Judy Honmyhr, Frank Madden, Labor Negotiator, Richard Arney, and Patricia Raddatz.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Lake Elmo Park Reserve Group Picnic Facility & Pine Point Park Comfort Station

The Parks Planner presented the proposed plans and specifications for the construction of the group picnic facility - south complex at Lake Elmo Park Reserve and the comfort station at Pine Point Park. He indicated that the Board had previously authorized \$40,000 from the stewardship account for the design of the group picnic facility at Lake Elmo Park Reserve and authorized \$30,000 in matching funds from the 1995 CIP budget for the Pine Point Park comfort station.

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the plans and specifications for the construction of the group picnic facility - south complex at Lake Elmo Park Reserve and the comfort station at Pine Point Park and authorize staff to advertise for bids. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Forest Lake Dam and Lake Level

The Public Works Director presented an overview of the Forest Lake dam and lake level issues raised by William House at previous County Board meetings. He discussed the following information: 1) Draft letter to Forest Lake on turnback of dam to local unit, dated 4/18/95; 2) Minutes and sign in of 4/13/95 meeting to discuss issues; 3) DNR letter declining to participate in 4/13/95 meeting and describing process to change lake level dated 4/7/95; 4) Mr. House's letter of requests for 4/13/95 meeting dated 4/5/95; 5) Mr. House's letter and photos to County Board Chair dated 4/3/95; 6) Mr. House's letter and information packet to County Engineer dated 2/16/95. Plan for dam not included but can be provided. This packet includes 1923 Board Resolution; and, 7) DNR letter on the ordinary high water of Forest Lake and concerns of Mr. House dated 2/5/90. The Public Works Director stated that the DNR letters 3 and 7 expresses their position on the lake ordinary high water level, the dam elevation, and the outlet channel. He stated that based on review of the file, discussions with local and regulatory agencies, that no action be taken to lower the outlet dam or change the ordinary high water of Forest Lake. He also recommended that a letter concerning the ownership of the dam be sent to Forest Lake. He indicated that the County role in water management has diminished over the years and that the local units managing Forest Lake are the logical units to own this dam. He informed the Board that no actual count of homes on Forest Lake was made, but looking at aerial photographs there appears to be hundreds of homes that would be impacted by the lake level.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to approve staff recommendations that no action be taken to lower the outlet dam or change the ordinary high water level of Forest Lake; and that a letter be sent to the City of Forest Lake, Forest Lake Township, and the Forest Lake Water Management Organization concerning the ownership of the dam. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Susan Ladwig, Legislative Representative, presented an overview of the following issues: Tax Bill, Transportation Funding; and, Corrections Funding. The Court Services Director gave an overview of the Corrections Funding. He indicated that there is legislation which calls for an interim formula for distribution of Corrections funding. The Association of Minnesota Counties (AMC) supports this legislation and the Minnesota Association of Community Correction Act Counties (MACCAC) is opposed. He asked for the Board's direction in this matter.

Commissioner Hauser moved to support the Minnesota Association of Community Correction Act Counties (MACCAC) position on corrections funding, and that a letter be sent to the legislative delegation, the Minnesota Department of Corrections and that a copy be sent to Governor Carlson to that effect. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Space Planning Committee for Courts and Supporting Services

The Director of Planning and Administrative Services presented the structure of a committee for Courts and supporting services to continue the process of space planning and ADA conformance. Commissioners Engstrom and Peterson expressed an interest in serving on this committee. Other members would include two District Court Judges, County Administrator or Deputy, Public Works Director or Deputy, Court Administrator, County Sheriff or designee, and Planning and Administrative Services Director.

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the establishment of a space planning committee for courts and supporting services and the committee's charge. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom stated that he enjoyed visiting with the employees in outlying offices and distributing mission mugs. He hopes that the Commissioners will visit these facilities on an ongoing basis. He also stated that the County Board retreat will be held on May 22. He has been working on the topics to be discussed that day.

Commissioner Peterson reported on her visit to schools in her area to discuss some of the social service programs they provide. She also enjoyed visiting with employees in the outlying facilities.

Commissioner Hegberg updated the Board on the Judicial Ditch 1 meeting he attended on May 1. He informed the County Attorney that there may be attorney fees that have to be paid on a one-third/two-third basis. He also stated that the Auditor-Treasurer's Office needs to be aware that the County is required to send out notice when the viewers report comes out. This might include quite a list of property owners that would have to be notified. Commissioner Hegberg also notified the Board that a lot of businesses received their assessed evaluation notices close to the time of the local board of review date which wouldn't allow enough time for them to prepare to contest the evaluation. He suggested that the Board talk to the County Assessor about this and if there is somebody who wishes to make our meeting that didn't make the local review first that they be allowed to do that.

Commissioner Abrahamson thanked the Community Services staff for the foster parent banquet held last week. There were over 150 foster parents and two of the foster parents together had over 105 years of service. He stated he was grateful to all the people willing to give of their time to become foster parents. Adoption of Resolution No. 95-073 as follows:

Workers Compensation Resolution

WHEREAS, the average cost of workers compensation in Minnesota is 40% higher than in Wisconsin; and,

WHEREAS, nearly \$100 million is spent by counties (\$15.3 million), cities (\$35 million), school districts (\$23.9 million) and the state of Minnesota (\$24.7 million) for direct workers compensation. If these counties, cities, and school districts were located in Wisconsin, their premiums for workers compensation could be up to 40 percent less; and,

WHEREAS, local governments pay these high workers compensation costs when employing private Minnesota contractors to perform services for their governments and these costs are not included in the \$100 million direct workers compensation costs; and,

WHEREAS, if Minnesota had workers compensation reform which would be close to any of the bordering states, there would be less money spent on workers compensation premiums and more money spent for property tax relief, or services; and,

WHEREAS, local city and County development agencies find it increasingly difficult to bring good jobs to their community and expand their tax base because of high business costs, including workers compensation; and,

WHEREAS, local governments need expanding tax base if they are going to hold down property tax increases; and

WHEREAS, between 1991 and 1992, 30 Minnesota manufacturing companies employing 1,500 workers moved from Minnesota and all gave the reason for their move Minnesota's high workers compensation costs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners is calling upon our legislators and the Governor to pass major workers compensation reform which will make Minnesota workers compensation rates comparable to those of surrounding states.

Service Agreement Amendment No. 6

WHEREAS, Section 3.07 of the Service Agreement requires Ramsey and Washington Counties to contract for landfill capacity for County Rejects, Excess County Waste, and Secondary Materials not marketed and Guaranteed Tonnage, or Unused County RDF landfilled; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has executed an agreement with Spruce Ridge, Inc. effective April 1, 1995 to provide landfill capacity; and

WHEREAS, the Service Agreement (Section 6.08 Adjustments (G) Transportation Cost Increases) provides for an adjustment in the Service Fee to NRG Energy, Inc. if a landfill at a distance in excess of 9.5 miles from the Newport Facility is used for disposal; and

WHEREAS, the Spruce Ridge Resource Management Facility (Landfill) is 62 miles from the Newport Facility; and

WHEREAS, Service Agreement Amendment No. 6 provides an adjustment of \$10.29 per ton delivered to the Spruce Ridge Resource Management Facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Chair and County Administrator to execute Amendment No. 6 to the Service Agreement between Ramsey County, Washington County and NRG Energy, Inc. to provide for payment of a differential of \$10.29 per ton to NRG Energy, Inc. for transportation of County waste to Spruce Ridge Resource Management Facility.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COURT SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Secure Juvenile Detention Facility Joint Powers Agreement

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-075 as follows:

Joint Powers Agreement for Secure Juvenile Detention Facility

WHEREAS, Washington County is in need of adequate facilities to house certain juveniles in a secure setting at a reasonable cost; and

WHEREAS, Washington County desires to join with Anoka County and other counties to make joint application for grant funds for the cost of secure juvenile detention and treatment facilities in accordance with 1994 Minnesota Laws 643 & 79; and

WHEREAS, Washington County desires to enter into a joint powers agreement with Anoka County and other counties for this purpose; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has authority to enter into such joint powers agreement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes § 471.59 and 1994 Minnesota Laws 643 & 79; and

WHEREAS, Commissioner Mary Hauser shall serve as Washington County's representative to the Advisory Board to serve until such time as a successor is elected by this Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Chairman of this Board to enter into a joint powers agreement with Anoka County and other counties for secure juvenile detention and treatment, provided the agreement is approved to form by the county attorney.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County shall contract for five (5) secure juvenile secure detention beds in the facility pursuant to the terms of the joint powers agreement.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Sentence to Service Joint Powers Agreement

The Sentence to Service Coordinator presented an overview of the 1994 year end report for sentence to service.

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-076 as follows:

Authorizing Execution of Agreement with the Minnesota Department of Corrections

BE IT RESOLVED that Washington County intends to enter into a Joint Powers Agreement with the State of Minnesota for Sentencing to Service Program, to be conducted during the period from July 1, 1995 to June 30, 1997. Wally Abrahamson, Chair and James R. Schug, County Administrator are hereby authorized to sign and execute the Joint Powers Agreement as necessary to implement the program on behalf of the County.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

Set Public Hearing for Amendments to the Solid Waste Management Ordinance

Commissioner Engstrom moved to set the public hearing to consider amendments to the Solid Waste Management Ordinance for May 23, 1995. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Alternative Strategies for the Resource Recovery Project Facility Tipping Fee and Solid Waste Management Service Fee

The Waste Management Manager presented an overview of a report prepared by staff from Ramsey and Washington Counties concerning options for the Resource Recovery Project Facility tipping fee.

Commissioner Hauser moved that the Washington County Board of Commissioners continue to support the Resource Recovery Project Facility in Newport. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Board discussed alternative strategies for tipping fees at the Resource Recovery Project Facility. Commissioner Engstrom stated that he was surprised by some of the information contained in the staff's report. He feels that the Resource Recovery Project reserves are too high and that NRG is making a lot of money on this project and needs to participate more in any reduction activity. He supports the continuation of the project, but would like to look into these other areas more carefully.

Commissioner Hauser stated that we should design a system that would make the facility independent from outside influences. She is in favor of a zero tipping fee and feels that the amount it costs to process the garbage should be applied to each parcel through the property taxes. She stated that all entities, the Resource Recovery Project Board, NRG, and the haulers work together.

Commissioner Engstrom asked the County Attorney if the facility went to a zero tipping fee would there be court challenges that we are putting landfills out of business because we are subsidizing our plant to the point where the other processors would be unable to compete economically? The County Attorney stated he would be ready to answer that question at the Resource Recovery Project Board meeting on Thursday.

Commissioner Peterson feels that Washington County should have more discussion with Ramsey County regarding this issue. She stated that choosing a course of action at this point without entering into discussion with haulers, Ramsey County and NRG is foolhardy. The Board really needs to have more dialogue with out staff. She stated she is not in favor of a zero tipping fee and putting it on the tax rolls at this time.

Commissioner Hegberg stated we should look at a market approach. He feels there is much more discussion that needs to take place. We need to have incentives to recycle.

Commissioner Engstrom asked the staff to provide him with the consequences to the recycling market if the tipping fee is lowered. He feels that going to a zero tipping fee would have a tough effect on recycling markets and we would wind up with many things in our waste that we don't currently have. It's easier to dump than recycle. Commissioner Hauser stated that there will still be volume based collection which will lower the price to a homeowner who continued to reduce their volume of trash.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated the Resource Recovery Project Board meeting will be held at the Washington County Government Center Board Room at 8:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 11 to discuss the tipping fee matter further. He also indicated that it will be cablecast live for those who wish to watch it at home.

Cameron Strand, Forest Lake Sanitation, stated that his company lowered their rates when the tipping fee dropped in January. He commended the Board for supporting the facility so that independent haulers have an environmentally responsible place to take their material. He stated there are fewer and fewer independent haulers left, and they would appreciate the Board's support for their independent status.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

The County Sheriff invited everyone to attend the Law Enforcement Memorial Day on May 15, 1995 at 12:00 noon at the entrance to the Law Enforcement Center. A brief ceremony will be held to honor those officers who have given their life in the line of duty.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Ted Wariakois, 16694 May Avenue, which is located in the Big Marine Park Reserve, appeared before the Board and asked what the possibility would be of getting a building permit to subdivide his property and sell it to the public. He has to have a yes or no answer, because if it's no there's no use going through subdivision; if yes, he already has people who are interested in the land. He has tried to sell his property to the park commission but they are \$75,000 apart. The County Attorney indicated that he has been in contact with Mr. Wariakois' attorney. He stated they will continue to attempt to resolve the matter. With regard to his question about subdividing, the County Attorney suggested that should be submitted in the normal channel as any other citizen would submit a request for subdivision. It should be addressed in that manner. Mr. Wariakois stated that this is not a normal request, he lives in the park reserve. He just wants to know whether or not they will issue a building permit if he goes through the subdivision process. The County Attorney stated there was no way to know what will happen until the County knows what the facts are and exactly what the request is. He suggested going through the appropriate channels, and if there is an emergency he indicated that every possible step would be taken to get him an answer as quickly as possible.

The County Administrator recommended that both of the matters, the current status of the bid offer and the County policy that's already in place for building permits in our planned parks, be referred to Public Works for a report back to the Board at a later date.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hauser updated the Board on a General Government Meeting of the AMC to discuss economic development authorities and housing and redevelopment authorities. Other topics discussed were sales tax on garbage disposal retroactively; constitutional amendment to local property taxes for schools; and a legislative bill regarding shooting ranges. PUBLIC HEARING - COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE JUVENILE CURFEW ORDINANCE

The Board Chairman presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider adoption of a Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of intent to adopt said ordinance. The Board Chairman declared the public hearing open.

The County Attorney gave a brief overview of the proposed Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. He addressed the following issues: Why the county needs this ordinance; who supports the adoption of this ordinance; and, concerns that have been raised. He also indicated that there is a sunset provision to this ordinance which requires the County Board to review the continuing need of this ordinance and to evaluate the prior year as to its effectiveness.

Dave Schwartz, Chief of Police, City of Forest Lake, stated he supports the proposed Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. He indicated that the City of Forest Lake has had an ordinance that is even more restrictive than the one proposed here and it has not been a burden to the police department or court system. He stated that it is another tool the police have to help their community. They work closely with the Youth Service Bureau in the Forest Lake area. Commissioner Peterson asked if this ordinance passes would the City of Forest Lake continue with their more restrictive ordinance or go along with the County Ordinance? Chief Schwartz indicated that they would stay with their ordinance until the County decided whether or not they would sunset the county ordinance. If the County decides to keep the ordinance then he will recommend that the City of Forest Lake adopt the County ordinance.

Commissioner Hegberg asked Chief Schwartz why this ordinance would be of help to the Forest Lake area? Chief Schwartz stated they have a lot of visitors from outside the community. Forest Lake borders on Chisago and Anoka County. What he hopes happens with this ordinance is that they won't have juveniles running in from the townships into the city. They also have a lot of kids from Minneapolis that they have to baby-sit until they can locate responsible adults to take them home.

Jim Frank, Washington County Sheriff, also supports the proposed juvenile curfew ordinance for the same reasons the other officer mentioned. He feels that a uniform ordinance throughout the County would help law enforcement officers. If the County does not become uniform in our ordinance with the rest of the metropolitan counties we'll become magnets for juveniles from St. Paul and Minneapolis and surrounding areas. He stated that the Chief of Police Association are also in favor of this ordinance.

Commissioner Engstrom asked the County Attorney which other Counties have adopted this ordinance. The County Attorney indicated that Hennepin and Dakota Counties have adopted this ordinance and it will become effective June 1. He also stated that the Ramsey County Attorney informed him that they

will adopt this ordinance shortly; and Anoka County will adopt the ordinance before the beginning of July. He indicated that Carver and Scott Counties have similar plans to adopt the ordinance before the end of the summer.

Chief Steve Sawyer, Newport Police Department, stated he also supports the juvenile curfew ordinance. He feels that the cost of juvenile crime far exceeds any cost that would be related to this ordinance. He also feels that this ordinance will give the police officers another tool to force the parents to take the responsibility for their children. He stated that a consistent ordinance is imperative so juveniles are not tempted to go from community to community to do whatever they are going to do. He stated he will urge the Newport City Council to adopt the same ordinance as the county to make it consistent.

Russ Reetz, Court Services Director, asked the Board to carefully consider this ordinance. He stated that the juvenile justice system is currently overburdened. He is worried that more time will be taken from the serious offenders and placed on the less serious offenders. He strongly supports the sunset provision of this ordinance and that the Board request very specific outcomes at the end of the one year period. Commissioner Peterson asked Mr. Reetz to help put together some specifics for outcomes.

Mr. Reetz also stated that youth service bureaus are helpful, but they are not located throughout the County. He stated that the resources are limited and if you strengthen a law you have greater numbers of kids entering the diversion program than are currently there.

Paul Weiler, Youth Service Bureau of Stillwater and South Communities Counseling of Cottage Grove, stated he is somewhat on the fence in this issue. On one hand he sees it as an incredible tool for the police if used appropriately. It's a very effective way of requiring parents to sit up and take notice that they have a responsibility, it's not the court's or law enforcement's responsibility to set reasonable requirements for their children. He does believe there will be a cost involved. Both the Stillwater and the south communities do not have a program in place to accept these kids and that's a concern to him. He stated that there are benefits to providing a uniform ordinance. He suggested that during the next several months that the different programs for youth get together and see if they can save the County some money.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that Barbara Swanson of the Forest Lake Youth Service Bureau is very much in favor of this ordinance and felt that it was a preventative measure.

Commissioner Hauser stated she was concerned about placing more people, whether they are adults or juveniles, in the court system. However, she stated it was reasonable to try this for one year. She feels the school districts should play a larger role and that this should be coupled with the truancy issue, we just cannot treat a portion of the juvenile problem; a lot of it is connected. She is an advocate of working through the youth service bureaus and using the Forest Lake Youth Service Bureau as a model

in making sure diversion, counseling, schools, parents and law enforcement folks are brought into it. She thinks maybe the hours of the curfew should be the same whether they are week nights or weekends. She also suggested looking at an initiative that would raise the driving age to 18.

The Board Chairman asked for further comments; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:45 a.m.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he has been to several council meetings where this ordinance was discussed. The one thing he heard was that a uniform ordinance throughout the County would be easier to enforce. Also, if Washington County was the only metropolitan county to not adopt this ordinance we would become the playground for juveniles and the place for them to go on weekends. He feels the County should try this for one year and see how it goes.

Commissioner Peterson stated that if the Board is asked for more money for programming that the money be used for diversion and youth service bureaus rather than into enlarging the County Attorney's staff.

Commissioner Engstrom moved that the County Attorney's Office be directed to prepare a resolution for next week's Board meeting approving the Washington County Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that the Sensible Land Use Coalition will meet on May 31 to discuss demographic trends in the Twin Cities. The Association of Minnesota Counties and the Minnesota School Board Association will have a joint conference on collaboration on June 29.

WHEREAS, the City of Cottage Grove has already made the spelling change;

WHEREAS, the City of Lake Elmo and Forest Lake Township have all adopted resolutions supporting this spelling change; and

WHEREAS, this spelling change will provide a uniform street name throughout Washington County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all references in the Washington County Uniform Street Naming and Property Numbering System to "Jamaca" shall hereby be changed to "Jamaica".

15. Approval for plat of Riverview Estates, New Scandia Township.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to approve the Metropolitan County-wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted with a roll call vote as follows: Commissioner Engstrom, Yes; Commissioner Peterson, Yes; Commissioner Abrahamson, Yes; Commissioner Hauser, Yes; and Commissioner Hegberg, Yes.

RESOLUTION NO. 95-082

Metropolitan County-wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 145A.05, subd. 7(a) (1994) provides that a County Board may adopt an ordinance establishing a county-wide curfew for person under 17 years of age; and

WHEREAS, it has been proposed that Washington County adopt a metropolitan countywide juvenile ordinance; and WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on May 16, 1995 on the proposed juvenile curfew ordinance; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, there has been a significant increase in juvenile victimization and crime. At the same time, the crimes committed by and against juveniles have become more violent. A significant percentage of juvenile crime occurs during curfew hours. Because of their lack of maturity and experience, juveniles are particularly susceptible to becoming victims of older perpetrators. The younger a person is, the more likely he or she is to be a victim of crime. While parents have the primary responsibility to provide for the safety and welfare of juveniles, Washington County has an interest in preventing juvenile crime, promoting parental supervision, and providing for the well being of the general public; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners is unanimously in favor of the county-wide juvenile curfew ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopts the attached Metropolitan County-wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance to be effective June 1, 1995.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Administrator cause the Ordinance to be published in its entirety pursuant to statute.

ORDINANCE NO. 115

JUVENILE CURFEW ORDINANCE

An ordinance setting a county-wide, nighttime curfew for juveniles. This ordinance is adopted pursuant to MINN. STAT. §145A.05, SUBD. 7A (1994).

SECTION 1: FINDINGS AND PURPOSE

- (A) In recent years, there has been a significant increase in juvenile victimization and crime. At the same time, the crimes committed by and against juveniles have become more violent. A significant percentage of juvenile crime occurs during curfew hours.
- (B) Because of their lack of maturity and experience, juveniles are particularly susceptible to becoming victims of older perpetrators. The younger a person is, the more likely he or she is to be a victim of crime.
- (C) While parents have the primary responsibility to provide for the safety and welfare of juveniles, Washington County also has a substantial interest in the safety and welfare of juveniles. Moreover, Washington County has an interest in preventing juvenile crime, promoting parental supervision, and providing for the well being of the general public.
- (D) A county-wide curfew will reduce juvenile victimization and crime and will advance public safety, health, and general welfare.

SECTION 2: DEFINITIONS

- (A) "Juvenile" means a person under the age of seventeen (17). The term does not include persons under 17 who are married or have been legally emancipated.
- (B) "Parent" means birth parents, adoptive parents, and stepparents.

- (C) "Guardian" means an adult appointed pursuant to MINN. STAT §525.6155 or §525.6165 who has the powers and responsibilities of a parent as defined by MINN. STAT. §525.619.
- (D) "Responsible adult" means a person over the age of eighteen (18) specifically authorized by law or by a parent or guardian to have custody and control of a juvenile.
- (E) "Public Place" means any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment houses, office buildings, transport facilities, and shops.
- (F) "Emergency" means a circumstance or combination of circumstances requiring immediate action to prevent property damage, serious bodily injury or loss of life.
- (G) "Serious bodily injury" means bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes death, serious permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any body or organ.
- (H) "Establishment" means any privately-owned place of business to which the public is invited, including, but not limited to, any place of amusement, entertainment, or refreshment.
- (I) "Proprietor" means any individual, firm, association, partnership, or corporation operating, managing, or conducting any establishment. The term includes the members or partners of an association or partnership and the officers of a corporation.

SECTION 3: PROHIBITED ACTS

- (A) It is unlawful for a juvenile under the age of 15 to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:
 - (1) any time between 10:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday and 5:00 a.m. of the following day.
 - (2) any time between 11:00 p.m. on any Friday or Saturday and 5:00 a.m. on the following day.
- (B) It is unlawful for a juvenile, age 15 or 16, to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:
 - (1) any time between 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday and 5:00 a.m. of the following day.
 - (2) any time between 12:01 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday.
- (C) It is unlawful for a parent or guardian of a juvenile knowingly, or through negligent supervision, to permit the juvenile to be in any public place or establishment within Washington County during the hours prohibited in paragraphs (A) and (B) of this section.
- (D) It is unlawful for a proprietor of an establishment within Washington County to knowingly permit a juvenile to remain in the establishment or on the establishment's property during the hours prohibited in paragraphs (A) and (B) of this section.

If the proprietor is not present at the time of the curfew violation, the responding officer shall leave written notice of the violation with an employee of the establishment. A copy of the written notice shall be served upon the establishment's proprietor personally or by certified mail.

SECTION 4: DEFENSES

- (A) It is an affirmative defense for a juvenile to prove that:
 - (1) the juvenile was accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, or other responsible adult.
 - (2) the juvenile was engaged in a lawful employment activity or was going to or returning home from his or her place of employment.
 - (3) the juvenile was involved in an emergency situation.
 - (4) the juvenile was going to, attending, or returning home from an official school, religious, or other recreational activity sponsored and/or supervised by a public entity or a civic organization.
 - (5) the juvenile was on an errand at the direction of a parent or guardian.
 - (6) the juvenile was exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution or Article I of the Constitution of the State of Minnesota.
 - (7) the juvenile was engaged in interstate travel.
 - (8) the juvenile was on the public right-of-way boulevard or sidewalk abutting the property containing the juvenile's residence or abutting the neighboring property, structure, or residence.
- (B) It is an affirmative defense for a proprietor of an establishment to prove that:
 - (1) the proprietor or employee reasonably and in good faith relied upon a juvenile's representations of proof of age. Proof of age may be established pursuant to MINN. STAT. §340.A.503, SUBD. 6, or other verifiable means, including, but not limited to, school identification cards and birth certificates.
 - (2) the proprietor employee promptly notified the responsible police agency that a juvenile was present on the premises of the establishment during curfew hours.

SECTION 5: PENALTY

- (A) Violation of Section 3(A) or (B) will be prosecuted pursuant to MINN. STAT. § 260.195 and will be subject to the penalties therein.
- (B) Violation of Section 3(C) or (D) is a misdemeanor and will be subject to the penalty set forth in MINN. STAT § 609.09(3).

SECTION 6: REVIEW

The County Board shall conduct yearly reviews of this ordinance to assess the effectiveness of and continuing need for a juvenile curfew. Prior to the annual review, the County Attorney shall prepare and submit a report to the County Board evaluating violations of this ordinance and juvenile crime and victimization during the preceding year.

SECTION 7: EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall take effect on June 1, 1995.

MUNICIPAL BOARD APPOINTMENTS

Commissioner Engstrom moved to appoint Commissioners Abrahamson and Hauser to serve on the State of Minnesota Municipal Board to hear a proposal for a boundary adjustment by the City of Forest Lake. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING-HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

AMENDMENTS TO THE SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE

The Board Chairman presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider adoption of proposed amendments to the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #105, #110 and #112. The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of intent to adopt said ordinance. The Board Chairman declared the public hearing open.

The Waste Management Manager gave a brief overview of the proposed amendments to implement the regional mixed municipal solid waste hauler license program and to incorporate previous amendments #110 and #112.

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:10 a.m.

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt a resolution approving Ordinance No. 114, Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Resolution No. 95-086

Amendments to Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #105, #110 & #112

WHEREAS, the Waste Management Act, which imposes various mandates upon counties, was created out of concern for the protection of water, air and land resources, as well as protection of public health; and

WHEREAS, 1994 Minnesota Laws, Chapter 644, Section 80, Minnesota Statutes Sc. 115A.93 and Sc.473.811 subd. 5, authorize Washington County to license solid waste collection and transportation; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is a member of the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board (SWMCB), pursuant to a Joint Powers Agreement approved by Washington County on June 8, 1993; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the SWMCB is to establish a mechanism whereby the Counties can fulfill their responsibilities and jointly address certain regional needs for solid waste management, to increase landfill abatement, to maximize the efficiency and cost-effectiveness of the system, to ensure compliance with state, regional and county policies and to assist each other in the development and management of the system; and

WHEREAS, the Counties, through the SWMCB, seek to coordinate the licensing of mixed municipal solid waste haulers in order to eliminate duplication of licensing, simplify hauler licensing work, and provide for improved county hauler data base; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes Sc. 115A.93 subd. 2(b) allows Washington County to delegate this licensing authority to a consortium of counties; and

WHEREAS, on February 14, 1995, the Washington County Board of Commissioners approved of an amendment to the SWMCB joint powers agreement to establish a regional hauler license program; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted the Washington County Solid Waste Ordinance #105 on November 24, 1992, Ordinance #110 on March 22, 1994 and Ordinance #112 on December 6, 1994.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopts the attached amendments to Ordinances #105, #110 and #112 of the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance and to implement a regional mixed municipal solid waste hauler license program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the provisions of Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinances and amendments thereto be and hereby are consolidated a Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #114.

The purpose of the amendments is to implement a regional mixed municipal solid waste hauler license program and to incorporate previous amendments in the solid waste management ordinance. Major revisions were in Section 8.7 and are included as follows:

WASHINGTON COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE NO. 114

An Ordinance Amending the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #105 adopted November 24, 1992 and amended by Ordinance No. 110 adopted March 22, 1994 and amended by Ordinance No. 112 adopted December 5, 1994.

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

Delete Section 8.7 in its entirety and replace with the following language:

8.7 Regional Mixed Municipal Solid Waste Hauler Licensing

8.7.1 Applicability. This section shall apply to all persons seeking a license to collect and transport mixed municipal solid waste, as that term is defined by Minn.

Stat. Sec. 115A.03 subd. 21, at the point of generation or that transfer or otherwise transport solid waste to a disposal or processing facility. Persons hauling the solid waste they generate in vehicles bearing passenger license plates are exempt from the licensing requirements of this section; but, solid waste shall be collected and transported in a nuisance free manner consistent with the intent of this section.

- 8.7.1.1 License Application for Base and Operating Licenses. In order to obtain a Base License and a Washington County Operating License, the Hauler shall submit a completed application to the Department on forms provided by the Department. Information necessary to obtain a Base License and Operating License shall be set forth on the application forms as determined by the Department. Applications which are not complete shall be returned to the Hauler. An application will be deemed incomplete if information is omitted, incomplete, inaccurate, or non-compliant, or if required fees do not accompany the application.
- 8.7.1.2 Incomplete or Non-Conforming Application. If an application for a Base License or Operating License is made with Washington County and is not complete or otherwise does not conform to the requirements set forth in this ordinance, the Department shall notify the applicant, in writing, of the reasons for non-acceptance and may request that the applicant resubmit, modify, or otherwise alter the application. The notification required in this section shall be served upon the applicant by first class mail sent to the address provided on the application form.
- 8.7.1.3 License Fees. The Hauler shall pay to the Department all license fees required. If Washington County is not the Base County, the fee for a Washington County Operating License shall be paid to the Base County. Such license fees shall be established by the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board. No license fee shall be prorated for a portion of a year and no license fee shall be refunded.
- 8.7.1.4 Late Fees.

Complete application submitted after the due dates specified is Section 8.75 shall be subject to the following late fees:

- 1. One to seven days late twenty-five percent (25%) late fee;
- 2. Eight to thirty days late fifty percent (50%) late fee;
- 3. Thirty-one or more days late one hundred percent (100%) late fee.
- 8.7.1.5 No Bar to Enforcement Action. Payment of the license fee together with payment of any late payment penalty shall not bar enforcement action by the County.
- 8.7.1.6 Application Due. Hauler license renewal applications must be submitted to the Base County by April 30 each year. A Hauler license renewal application received after April 30 shall be subject to a late fee.
- 8.7.1.7 Failure to Act on License Application. If the Department does not act on a license renewal application, which is timely submitted, the current Base License and Operating License shall continue in force until the Department takes action on the application. If a license has expired, an application shall be deemed an initial application except that such applicant must pay late fees imposed by Section 8.7.1.4. If the Department fails to act within 60 days of receipt of a properly completed initial application or a renewal application that is received

after the due date, the applicant may request a hearing on the application. The request for a hearing shall be governed by the Washington County Administrative Ordinance.

- 8.7.1.8 Notice of Denial. If the Department denies a Base License or Operating License to an applicant, the applicant shall be notified of such denial in writing.
- 8.7.1.9 License Transfer. Base Licenses and Operating Licenses are non-transferable.
- 8.7.2 Base License
- 8.7.2.1 Base License. If Washington County is a Base County, a Hauler must obtain and maintain a Base License from Washington County. In addition, a Hauler must obtain an Operating License for each of the Counties, including Washington County, in which the Hauler collects and/or transports mixed municipal solid waste. Application for the Operating License would be made to the Department.
- 8.7.2.2 Vehicles Licensed. The Hauler's Base License shall identify all vehicles used by the Hauler for the collection or transportation of mixed municipal solid waste generated within the Counties.
- 8.7.2.3 Decalcomania. The Hauler shall be issued a license decal for the current license year for each vehicle used by a Hauler for the collection or transportation of mixed municipal solid waste generated within the Counties. The decal shall be affixed in a conspicuous place on the left side of the cab of the vehicle for which it was issued. The Hauler must maintain the license decal so that it is readily visible and legible at all times. Any vehicle not bearing the required decal shall be deemed unlicensed. If a vehicle not previously identified is put into service during the license year, the Hauler shall submit the required information for this vehicle to the Base County and shall not use the vehicle collect or transport mixed municipal solid waste within the Counties until a decal has been issued and affixed to the new vehicle.
- 8.7.2.4 Insurance. The Hauler shall obtain and submit certificates of insurance issued by insurers duly licensed by the State of Minnesota providing the following coverage, or a self-insurance plan certified by the Minnesota Commissioner of Commerce for providing equivalent coverages.
 - A. general liability coverage in the amount of \$500,000 for bodily injury per occurrence, \$250,000 for property damage per occurrence, or \$500,000 combined single limit; and
 - B. automobile liability coverage in the amounts of \$500,000 for property damage, \$250,000 for bodily injury per person and \$500,000 for bodily injury per accident, or \$500,000 combined single limit.
 - C. Workers Compensation insurance in accordance with Minn. Stat. Chapter 176

Nothing in this provision shall prohibit a hauler from providing insurance with limits higher than the limits required herein. All such required policies shall name the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board, Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott and Washington Counties as additional insureds. All policies and certificates shall be endorsed to require that the insurer provide at least a sixty (60) day written notice to the County prior to the effective date of policy cancellation, non-renewal, or material adverse change in coverage terms. The Hauler shall maintain insurance in compliance with this paragraph throughout the term of the Base License.

- 8.7.3 Operating License
- 8.7.3.1 Operating License. Any Hauler that collects or transports mixed municipal solid waste in the County must obtain and maintain an Operating License from the Department.
- 8.7.3.2 Vehicles Licensed/Vehicle Decals. All vehicles used by the Hauler for the collection or transportation of mixed municipal solid waste within the County shall be included in the Hauler's Base License application to the Base County. The Hauler shall affix a decal as required by the Base County in a conspicuous place on the left side of the cab of the vehicle for which it was issued as directed by the Base County. The Hauler must maintain the license decal so that it is readily visible and legible at all times. Any vehicle not bearing the required decal shall be considered unlicensed.
- 8.7.3.3 Identification. The business name and telephone number of the Hauler shall be printed or painted in legible characters on both sides of all vehicles or containers used by the Hauler to store, collect, or transport mixed municipal solid waste in the County. Such characters shall be at least four inches in height for all vehicles and at least two inches in height for all containers. This provision shall not apply to containers owned and maintained by a solid waste generator.
- 8.7.3.4 Standards. The issuance of an Operating License shall be subject to the provisions of the Washington County Administrative Ordinance and any other conditions set forth in this Ordinance or established by the County Board of Commissioners. A Hauler shall obtain and maintain a Base License from its Base County in order to be eligible for an Operating License from Washington County.
- 8.7.3.5 Conditions of Operating License
- 8.7.3.6 Revocation or suspension of the Base License shall constitute sufficient basis for summary suspension of the County Operating License in accordance with the Washington County Administrative Ordinance.
- 8.7.4 Effective Date and Duration
- 8.7.4.1 Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon passage by the County Board of Commissioners and publication as required by law and shall apply to the license year commencing July 1, 1995.
- 8.7.4.2 If the County withdraws from the Regional Hauler Licensing Program, any Hauler licenses in effect at that time, shall continue in force until the end of the current license year unless otherwise suspended or revoked.
- 8.7.5 Specific Licensing Requirements. In addition to the applicable requirements of section 7.0, an applicant shall submit the following information:
 - a. a list of all vehicles, including satellite vehicles, to be used for solid waste collection and transportation, specifying make, model and year for each vehicle; each vehicle's rated capacity, tare weight, license plate number, state issued registration number, and the Northern States Power Company or other designated facility number exclusively issued for that specific vehicle.
 - b. the total number of commercial accounts in the County, the total number of residential accounts in the County, the days of the week solid waste is collected for each city and township in the County;

- c. a description of the company's recycling and other waste abatement activities.
- d. certificate(s) of insurance pursuant to Section 7.18 of this ordinance.
- e. additional information pertaining to solid waste management requested by the Department.
- 8.7.5.1 Equipment and Operation Requirements.
- 8.7.5.2 Each vehicle or other conveyance used by a hauler for the collection or transportation of solid waste shall be easily cleanable, leak-proof, and be covered with metal, canvas, or a fish-net type material made for this purpose.
- 8.7.5.3 The business name and telephone number of the licensee should be easily visible and be printed or painted in legible characters on both sides of all vehicles, containers, and conveyances used by the hauler to store, collect, or transport waste generated within the County.
- 8.7.5.4 The Department may inspect and approve all solid waste storage, collection, and transportation containers, vehicles, and conveyances if deemed necessary by the Department to protect public health, safety, or the environment.
- 8.7.5.5 The licensee shall not allow solid waste to remain or be stored in any collection or transportation vehicle in excess of 48 hours, except in the event of an emergency such as inclement weather, equipment breakdown, or accident. The Department may approve storage for greater than 48 hours, on a case-by-case basis, for reasons other than emergencies, provided such storage will not adversely affect public health, safety, or the environment.
- 8.7.5.6 The licensee shall be responsible for the cleanup of any solid waste that must be dumped in an emergency. In addition, a licensed hauler shall be responsible cleaning up any litter or solid waste discharged onto roadways while in transit. Should the responsible hauler fail to clean up solid waste dumped in an emergency or discharged onto roadways while in transit, the County may charge such hauler the entire cost of the removal and disposal of the solid waste.
- 8.7.6 The licensee shall charge residential and commercial customers rates for the collection of mixed municipal solid waste that vary with the volume or weight of the waste collected. The licensee shall provide, upon request of a residential customer, a quote of the licensee's charges.
- 8.7.7 The licensee shall not impose a greater charge on residents who recycle than on residents who do not recycle.

A complete copy of the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance No. 114 is on file in the Department of Health, Environment and Land Management and the Office of Administration.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Engstrom moved to submit a grant application, in the amount of \$194,196, to the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency for the Family Homeless Prevention and Assistance Program. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The County Administrator stated he has tentatively set August 30 or 31 as the date to meet with cities and school boards in Washington County and representatives from the Metropolitan Council and some of their key committee chairs. It was Board consensus that either August 30 or 31 would be good dates for them and that an evening meeting at 7:00 p.m. would be a good time.

Legislative Update

Sue Ladwig, Legislative Representative, gave a brief update on the following legislative issues: Tax bill; Property tax freeze; Education bill; Correction's Funding Formula; Workers Compensation Bill; and Cap of commissioner and appointed department salaries.

The County Administrator indicated that there will be no County Board meeting on May 30 because it is the 5th Tuesday. He also stated that the South Washington County Service Center will be having an informal open house at 1:00 p.m. this afternoon to celebrate the recent remodeling that has taken place.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson indicated that the Minnesota Department of Transportation and the Wakota Bridge Coalition will be holding two open houses regarding I-494, Highway 61 and the Wakota Bridge. They will be held today and tomorrow from 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the South St. Paul City Hall.

Commissioner Abrahamson presented the Public Works Director with a petition from 200 people concerning the traffic speed problem on Myrtle and County Road 12. The petitioners feel the speed limit of 50 miles per hour is too fast due to the fact there is a playground close by and a new housing development under construction. He asked that the Public Works staff request the State to lower that speed limit.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

The West Half of the Southeast Quarter (W½SE¼) and the Northeast Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (NE¼SE¼) of Section Twenty-six; the East Half of the Northeast Quarter

(E½NE¼) of Section Thirty-four (34); and the West Half of the Northwest Quarter (W½NW¼) of Section Thirty-five (35); all in Township Thirty-two (32) North, Range Twenty-one (21) West.

WHEREAS, it appears that there is need for such lands and the applicant desires to obtain such lands for wildlife management and conservation purposes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners grants the petition of said Rodney W. Sando, Commissioner of Natural Resources of the State of Minnesota, and that the above described lands be and hereby are released from the trust in favor of the taxing district, as a gift, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged.

18. Adoption of Resolution No. 95-099 as follows:

Right of Way Acquisition on County State Aid Highway 12

BE IT RESOLVED THAT, Washington County proceed to improve and widen County State Aid Highway 12 at the intersection of County State Aid Highway 36 and County State Aid Highway 12 in the City of Mahtomedi.

Authorize Acceptance of Continued Grant Funding from Minnesota Department of Corrections Victim/Witness Division

WHEREAS, the Victim Service Unit of the Department of Corrections of the State of Minnesota has awarded to the Washington County Attorney's Office in Washington County a grant in the amount of \$33,700 for the period July 1, 1995 through June 30, 1996; and

WHEREAS, funds exist in the current approved budget which are sufficient to meeting matching fund requirements; and

WHEREAS, Washington County Board of Commissioners and Washington County Attorney believe it would be in the best interest of service to the public to use these funds to continue the current level of service to crime victims and witnesses;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the County of Washington, State of Minnesota, enter into an agreement with the State of Minnesota to be conducted during the period from July 1, 1995 through June 30, 1996.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Washington County Board of Commissioners, Washington County Administrator, and the County Attorney or his designee are hereby authorized and directed to sign and execute such agreements as are necessary to implement this project on behalf of Washington County and the Washington County Attorney's Office.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Hegberg moved to enter into an agreement with Connecticut General Life Insurance Company to offer employee paid CIGNA Dental Care Insurance coverage to County employees. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Engstrom moved to authorize the submittal of a grant proposal to the Department of Human Services for receipt of funds to provide services as a SAIL (Seniors' Agenda for Independent Living) project for the three County East Metro Area (Dakota, Ramsey and Washington Counties). Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Lake Elmo Park Reserve Survey

The Deputy Public Works Director outlined the plans for a proposed survey to determine future development needs for an environmental education facility, educational farm, and equestrian facility at Lake Elmo Park Reserve.

Commissioner Engstrom stated he is in support of the survey to the specific target groups such as a random sampling of 800 teachers of Ramsey and Washington Counties. However, he feels that sending a random sample to 800 households in Ramsey and Washington Counties will not produce a 50% return of the surveys. He feels that a telephone survey may produce better results for that group, although it is more expensive.

Commissioner Abrahamson suggested sending out the survey in the Commissioners' newsletter which might produce a better return.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to approve a survey to determine future development needs for an environmental education facility, educational farm, and equestrian facility at Lake Elmo Park Reserve. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Square Lake Park Master Plan

The Deputy Public Works Director presented an overview of what a Master Plan for Square Lake Park would do. He indicated that the Metropolitan Council's 1991 Recreation Open Space Development Guide/Policy Plan requests that a thorough investigation be done on whether the proposed Square Lake Park should continue to be included as a recommended component of the regional system.

The Board discussed this matter. Commissioner Hauser stated that in the past she has not been an advocate of Square Lake Park becoming a regional park; but the increased costs in operating a park makes it more appealing to be able to use metropolitan funds. She does not feel that becoming a regional park will increase the numbers of people coming to the park. Since this park is already being used by so many citizens in the region, it would only benefit the County to use metropolitan funds to pay for the cost of operating, maintaining and developing this park.

Commissioner Engstrom echoed the comments of Commissioner Hauser. He feels the use of Square Lake Park is regional and it would be appropriate for the County to develop a plan that could show it would be a good regional park. The taxpayers will benefit because the County will be qualified for regional maintenance of this park.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the use of the park is very much regional, but it's only 27 acres. If it is expanded another 100 acres it will damage the lake. Square Lake is a small lake, it cannot environmentally support a lot of traffic on the lake. There will be pressure to build additional parking areas. At present, the parking holds the population down. Another issue is how much longer will metropolitan funds be available for maintenance of these regional parks? He is opposed to this park becoming a regional park.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated the County already has plans for a couple of regional parks, it does not need any more right now. He does not feel that Square Lake should be a regional park based on size and other considerations. It's going to cost taxpayers in Washington County a lot of money even if there are metropolitan funds. The increase in traffic in that area will not make people who live there very happy; it's congested now. There is the Big Marine Park Reserve just to the north of Square Lake Park. He's opposed to the plan.

The Deputy Public Works Director stated that this plan would only be a guide to answer questions on whether or not this park should become a regional park or stay a county park. This plan would give

the citizens an opportunity to become involved in the decision making process. After the plan is completed it would still come back to the Board.

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize staff to advertise for professional services to prepare a Master Plan for Square Lake Park. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion. The motion failed on a 3/2 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom and Hauser; No, Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson and Hegberg.

Commissioner Hegberg moved that the Square Lake Park remain a county park. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hauser stated that May Township had a concern about the future use of Golden Acres, the resort next door to Square Lake Park. If the County decides there is no future for Square Lake Park beyond a county park, then it means that the County alone might be asked at some time to purchase Golden Acres. There is also a possibility of acquiring other available property around the lake as time goes by. By taking this action the County limits funds available to make these purchases to County funds alone. She feels that would be shortsighted in view of what is there today.

Commissioner Engstrom stated it was shortsighted for the County to say yes we want this as a County park forever when the park has a regional use. We should qualify for the regional funding. The taxpayers of Washington County should not support that park in its entirety, it should be based on a metropolitan, regional or state basis. It should be something other than the County supporting that park.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to table the motion that the Square Lake Park remain a county park. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion. The motion failed with a 3/2 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom and Hauser; No. Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson and Hegberg.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend his motion that Square Lake Park stay a County park unless the metropolitan council will consider regional funding for the 27 acre park as is with no expansion. Commissioner Peterson seconded the amended motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Public Works Director stated he will prepare a letter to the Metropolitan Council stating the County Board's action today and asking them to consider regional funding for the 27 acre park.

Lighting Retrofit of the Government Center

Donna Folsum, NSP Community Services Manager for the Metro East Area, presented the Board Chairman with a plaque that "recognizes the commitment of Washington County to energy conservation and participation in the Northern States Power Company Local Government Conservation Program."

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson stated that the Family Links Program will be having a conference this fall. She has been working with the communities in South Washington County to try and establish a program where children can be put first.

Commissioner Engstrom thanked Joanne Helm for answering a question he asked at last week's meeting regarding the TIF district in Bayport. She indicated that Bayport did expand their TIF district, not through the legislature but through the normal process to include the new Andersen plant expansion.

Commissioner Hauser indicated that she attended a sentence-to-service meeting this morning. She indicated that the crews are switching from the snow services to summer yard service. The crews have moved over to their new location in the Law Enforcement Center and are happy to be there close to the other programs offered in the jail. Commissioner Hauser also gave an update on the AMC District X Annual meeting held on June 7. She stated that elections were held and the new chair is Dick Underferth, Scott County and the Vice Chair is Dennis Berg, Anoka County. She also indicated they approved the extension of the Boland and Gohl Associates contract to include monitoring of the Metropolitan Council activities as they go forward in implementing their blueprint. She stated that the contract was approved with a vote of 6 to 1 with Dakota County voting against it.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that the County's Legislative representative look into the matter of lawsuits from citizens who are currently residing in the County jail. He feels the taxpayers are paying a considerable amount of money for these legal maneuverings and it's a misuse of the justice system.

Commissioner Abrahamson informed the Board that Commissioner Wedell of Ramsey County would like both Washington and Ramsey County Boards to meet and discuss joint correction ventures. The County Administrator stated that he has talked with Terry Schutten, Ramsey County Manager, regarding a joint meeting of the County Boards to discuss sharing arrangements for jail space and work release space. He also has informed the County Sheriff about these discussions. Commissioner Hauser suggested meeting with our staff people first before meeting with Ramsey County to see what sort of suggestions they would have.

Commissioner Engstrom stated that the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board at their last meeting voted to continue for two more years to work with the other counties on solid waste issues.

June 13, 1995

Commissioner Peterson asked if a staff member from Public Works could attend a joint meeting of the Transportation Alliance and the Transportation Committee. This meeting will take place on Thursday, June 15. The Public Works Director will see if someone from his office will be able to attend.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Engstrom and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:10 a.m.

Work Readiness Program

HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

The Waste Management Manager presented a brief overview of the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board and the benefits it has provided to Washington County. She requested that the Board adopt a resolution extending the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Joint Powers Agreement for two years. Commissioner Hauser questioned whether this coordinating board has given the County its money's worth. Some of the items listed as accomplishments have been done in-house by County staff. Commissioner Hegberg stated he will approve the extension of the joint powers agreement but will make it subject to an acceptable budget. He does have some concerns about the budget and its growth.

Wyn John, Mayor, City of Lake Elmo, presented a counter-proposal to Washington County's offer of \$150,000 to resolve the SW-1 Landfill site issue. A letter was presented to the County Board outlining the City of Lake Elmo's consulting engineer's estimate of replacement costs to the present maintenance building, cold storage building, and the fire station presently located on the SW-1 Landfill property. This counter-proposal was in the amount of \$560,800.

Chairman Abrahamson suggested that this counter-proposal be discussed at a Board workshop. Since the Board just received this information this morning, more time will be needed to study this request. He also requested that a history of the SW-1 Landfill site be prepared so the entire Board is made aware of what has gone on with this property. He invited the City of Lake Elmo to attend this workshop.

The County Administrator stated that staff will review the counter-proposal and also check with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to see what the deadlines are for the County to be in compliance in order to turn this property over to the MPCA.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The County Administrator stated that the Auditor-Treasurer, Recorder, and Assessor's offices have invited the County Board and the public to stop up at their offices to view the 4th of July decorations.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported that he met with New Scandia Township and they informed him that Metropolitan Council may have funds available to help them with their planning process. It was suggested that maybe Washington County could provide additional funds. He indicated that no dollar amounts were discussed, and that he was just making the Board aware that this may be brought up in the future. He also stated that on July 5 the Judicial Ditch No. 1 group will be meeting all day.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION OF

WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JUNE 20, 1995

The 1995 Washington County Board of Equalization was called to order at 11:00 a.m. on June 20, 1995 with the following members present: Wallace L. Abrahamson, Chairman, D.D. "Dave" Engstrom, Mary M. Hauser, Dennis C. Hegberg, Myra Peterson and R.H. Stafford, Auditor-Treasurer. The members were sworn in by Washington County Assessor, Scott Hovet.

Also present were Scott Hovet, Washington County Assessor, Ed Hervin, Staff Appraiser, Molly O'Rourke, Assistant Auditor-Treasurer and Sharoan Harp acting as recorder.

CASE #52 -- Onno VanDemmeltraadt appeared before the Board regarding property in the City of Lake Elmo, parcel #37155-2150/10-029-21-24-0020. Mr. VanDemmeltraadt was concerned about the increase in market value. He felt the building was of a low grade of construction and the lot would not be considered "buildable" under today's standards. The Board asked the assessor to check on the buildable lot question and to research the value of similar lots before making a decision.

Also in question was the value of parcel #37090-2600/10-029-21-24-0009. Mr. VanDemmeltraadt stated the property was in need of maintenance and questioned the percentage of increase of market value. No action was taken on these properties at this time.

CASE #55 -- John Kraemer came before the Board to appeal the market value of parcel #11150-2200/21-030-20-43-0101 in the City of Stillwater due to the loss of direct view of the St. Croix River. The local assessor had lowered the value by \$900 for the 1995 assessment and would have increased the land value had there been no obstruction of the view. Partial view up and down the river still exists. No action taken at this time.

CASE #25 -- Joseph and Grace Nicoletti appeared before the Board to appeal the market value on two parcels in the City of Mahtomedi, parcels 87460-2950/29-030-21-12-0063 and 87460-3000/29-030-21-12-0064. The first parcel contains the house and garage while the second parcel is a backlot. The backlot has experienced water problems caused partially by a city road and partially by the positioning of a building on the neighbors property. Mrs. Nicoletti provided pictures of standing water for the Board to view. The County appraiser had offered a reduction in value on both parcels, however, the Nicoletti's felt the offer was not large enough. The Board tabled the matter for further discussion.

CASE #1 -- Robert Corey came before the Board concerned about the market value of parcel #50510-3970-20-030-21-34-0084 in the City of Mahtomedi. Mr. Corey provided a bank loan appraisal dated February, 1994 indicating a value of \$91,000. The Board stated it would consider this appraisal in making a decision.

CASE #54 -- Michael and Linda Nebur -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #19 -- Benjamin and Jane Nicholson, along with their neighbors William and Nancy Krawczak, appeared before the Board regarding a problem with unauthorized use of an easement next to their properties in the City of Mahtomedi. Both parties stated that their problem was not an issue of market value, but they came before the Board because they had not been able to get any relief from other governing agencies. There was considerable discussion regarding easements with county assessor, Scott Hovet stating that the market activity did not show easements as a detriment to a property. Commissioner Hauser expressed the Board's empathy with this problem but stated that it was a situation for local authorities to handle.

CASE #5 -- James and Nancy Stratton -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #7 -- Harry Sell appeared before the Board questioning the market value of parcel #81445-2450/14-032-21-23-0029 in Forest Lake Township. He stated that he had not seen the local assessor and could not understand why his property increased in value. County Assessor Scott Hovet explained to the Board that this property is on a lake and received a typical increase for lakeshore property. No action was taken by the Board at this time.

CASE #8 -- Michael Hill -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #11 -- Arthur Potts questioned the market value of parcel #91011-2150/11-032-20-41-0002 in Scandia Township and stated that he felt the increase was excessive. He compared his home to some properties that sold in Woodbury. Mr. Stafford stated this comparison was not of equal properties and that the increase in value was due to the property being brought up to its market value in the CAMA system. Commissioner Abrahamson suggested that Mr. Potts may want to get a fee appraisal to affirm the value. No action was taken at this time.

CASE #10 -- Sharon Thorp came before the Board to question the equalization of the assessment for parcel #33424-2325/16-032-21-12-0065 in the City of Forest Lake. Mrs. Thorp compared three (3) homes on her block one of which sold for a considerable amount more than the market value while the estimated market value for tax purposes of that house was almost equal to the market value of her property. She felt that she was paying more than her fair share of taxes because of this situation. There was much discussion about building permits and when the new construction was added to the assessment. Commissioner Engstrom suggested that the local assessor review comparable properties in regard to the Thorp assessment. No action was taken at this time.

CASE #56 -- Sarveswara Kilaparti came before the Board to question the land value of parcel #10605-2020/20-030-20-23-0005 in the City of Stillwater. Mr. Kilaparti indicated that his lot was not on the pond or the golf course yet all the lots had the same value. He felt this was not equal. Barry Staberg, Stillwater City Assessor, told the Board that there were a number of sales in 1991 in that subdivision that showed no difference in lot value. Just recently have sales begun to reflect location, and that factor will now be considered in future land values. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #13 -- Mike Edgell -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #14 -- Thomas Halbach was concerned about the estimated market value of parcel #49473-2400/29-030-21-23-0035 in the City of Mahtomedi. He owns three (3) lots which together create one (1) buildable lot. He had problems with the land being valued as more than (1) buildable lot. Mr. Halbach presented an appraisal dated June, 1993 for \$115,500. Frank Langer, Mahtomedi City Assessor, informed Mr. Halbach that his property was now in the CAMA system and the problems he previously experienced should now be resolved. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #15 -- Cai Quing & Cheung Hiu-Hung -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #2 -- Eric Olsen & Donna Neely -- Did not appear before the Board.

The meeting recessed at 5:00 p.m. The Board will reconvene at 9:30 a.m. on June 21, 1995 in the 5th Floor Southwest Conference Room of the Washington County Government Center.

WASHINGTON COUNTY 1995 COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION JUNE 21, 1995

The Washington County Board of Equalization reconvened at 9:30 a.m. on June 21, 1995. The meeting was called to order by Wallace L. Abrahamson, Chairman, with the following members present: D.D. "Dave" Engstrom, Mary M. Hauser, Dennis C. Hegberg, and Molly O'Rourke, Assistant Auditor-Treasurer representing R.H. Stafford. Member absent: Myra Peterson.

Scott Hovet, Washington County Assessor, administered the oath to Molly O'Rourke.

CASE #28 -- Kevin Mann -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #57 -- Samuel Wertheimer appeared before the Board concerned with the increase in market value of parcel 58024-3000/18-029-21-24-0066 in the City of Oakdale. Mr. Wertheimer stated that a city zoning change across the road from his property greatly affected the resale of his property. He provided a fee appraisal dated June 2, 1995 in the amount of \$130,000. The Board reviewed the appraisal and discussed the effect of the rezoning. No action was taken at this time.

Commissioner Peterson joined the Board at this time.

CASE #58 -- Thomas Follmer came before the Board stating that the market value was too high for parcel #87775-2150/30-030-21-31-015 in the City of Mahtomedi. He presented the Board with a market analysis from a local realtor. Frank Langer, Mahtomedi City Assessor, explained that this property was entered into CAMA for the first time this year. He explained that the computer generated the value based upon characteristics of the property. He felt this property was equalized with other properties in the City. The Board asked Mr. Langer to bring in comparable properties that have sold before making their decision.

At this time Commissioner Hegberg left the meeting.

CASE #32 -- James Gondek came before the Board concerned about the increase in market value of parcel #93032-2600/32-031-21-33-0001 in the City of Hugo. The parcel consists of ten (10) acres zoned agricultural with a pole building and a small shed. There was no garage. Frank Langer, Hugo City Assessor, explained this parcel was valued by CAMA and that the attached garage was converted to living space. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #37 -- Al Eggers came before the Board representing Margaret Christenson, parcel #81010-0450/10-032-21-42-0004 in Forest Lake Township. Mr. Eggers felt the market value was too high in relation to the condition of the property. He stated that the cabin had no heat or shower facility. Ken Tolzmann, Forest Lake Township Assessor, told the Board that the grade of the building was consistent with the lack of amenities mentioned. He also told the Board that this property is located in a very desirable area and the market value was consistent with other properties around the lake. The Board directed Mr. Tolzmann to view the cabin with Mr. Eggers, however Mr. Eggers said he would get in touch with Mr. Tolzmann at a later date to do this. The Board took no action.

Commissioner Peterson left the meeting at this time.

CASE #39 -- Nancy Bass & Jack Nadler -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #40 -- Barbara Ferderer -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #42 -- A. Dwayne Nelson came before the Board to discuss the market value of three rental properties in the City of Stillwater, parcels #9305-2840, #9270-6040, and #9311-3300. Mr. Nelson asked the Board to value these properties strictly by the income approach and not the market approach to value. At this time Scott Hovet, Ed Hervin and Barry Staberg, Stillwater City Assessor, discussed with the Board the merits of both approaches to value and how they work under a mass appraisal system. Mr. Staberg also informed the Board that the duplex market has gotten stronger during the past two years in the City of Stillwater. Mr. Nelson had no supporting data in either a fee appraisal or a market analysis to arrive at a lesser value for these properties. The Board took Mr. Nelson's request under advisement.
